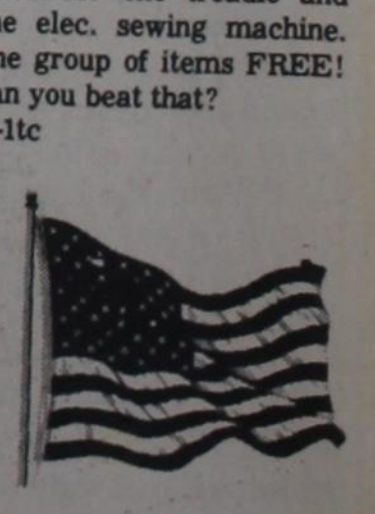

PREVENT CRABGRASS
BY TED BRICE, GARDEN EDITOR

You will note the title of this article is PREVENT and not control. I will discuss the prevention of Crabgrass from ever appearing in your lawn and not controlling it after it has appeared.

Last year many homeowner's lawns were blemished with Crabgrass. This can be avoided this year if the homeowner acts soon according to various agronomists.

The answer to eliminating Crabgrass is as simple as applying a pre-emergent weed control. This will prevent the weed seeds (Crabgrass) from germinating without harming existing grass. This crabgrass prevention should be applied in the early spring before the lawn is mowed the third or fourth time. Crabgrass is an annual, therefore, it does not survive winter, but thousands of

seeds are left behind the year before and will begin to germinate in the Spring when the temperatures reach the 80 degree mark. If Crabgrass is left unchecked, it will spread, consuming moisture and the nutrients in the soil that your regular, more desirable grass needs. Crabgrass will soon choke out your more desirable grass if left unchecked. It is better to prevent the germination of Crabgrass seed than it is to control the Crabgrass (seed) after it has germinated.

Since grass in this area comes out of Winter dormancy with a hearty appetite, early Spring is an excellent time to feed the lawn with your fertilizer. The same facts apply to Crabgrass, and by feeding the Crabgrass a pre-emergent weed killer, you can prevent the Crabgrass from ever germinating and, therefore, preventing it from ever darkening your lawn this

PEANUT PEST SCOUTING

Recently the Comanche/Eastland County Pest Management Steering Committee decided to re-establish a peanut pest scouting program. The scouting program has been available in the past in Comanche county but will be new this year to Eastland County.

Peanut scouting is a key component of an integrated pest management program. It is a system that relies on field scouts going into the farmer's fields to examine crops and checks on the presence and number of plant pests. Fields are inspected on a weekly basis and the results reported to the farmer.

The objective of the Peanut Pest Scouting Program is to limit pesticide application to as needed basis and possibly reduce production costs. Scouting field can be supplemented monitoring weather conditions to forecast favorable disease conditions.

The program is producer financed and supported by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, United States Department of Agriculture, Texas Department of Agriculture, and the Texas Pest Management Association. OLD PRUNEFACE

Not a very flattering expression, is it? I don't believe there are many—if any—who want to be called prune-face even though, in growing older, wrinkles are inevitable. It's strange, though, that millions are rushing the wrinkles by the lifestyle they intentionally pursue.

Do you know how to become a prune-face real quick? Smoke cigarettes. Lots of them. Especially if you are a complexion-conscious woman. While in your teens and twenties you may not look that much different than your non-smoking friends, but it'll begin to show up in your thirties. By the time you're in your forties your face will be as prominently wrinkled as that of a non-smoker 20 years older than you.

If you are the outdoor type or if you like to sunbathe—and you also smoke cigarettes—you're a real winner! It's much easier to produce wrinkled skin under such conditions. Proof of this: studies show a larger number of heavily wrinkled individuals among the least sun-exposed smokers in any age group than among the most sun-exposed non-smokers in the same group. There's no contest for the most sun-exposed smoker. No one can match the quality of wrinkled and aged-looking skin.

But this is all looks. In contrast to what's happening in the body of the cigarette smoker, wrinkled skin is only a minor problem. Also, an early death because of smoking may allow you to escape the embarrassment of sagging wrinkles.

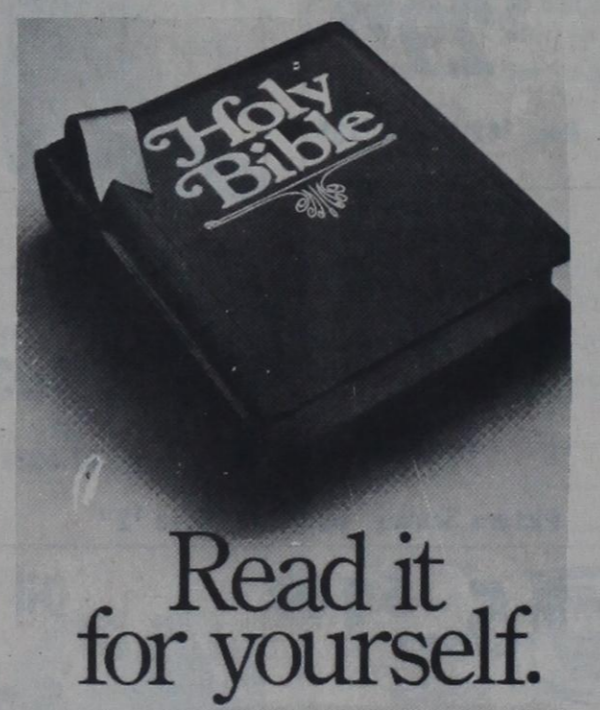
ing may allow you to escape the embarrassment of sagging wrinkles.

However, since most people are more conscious of their appearance than the condition of their hearts or lungs, an appeal to their vanity may help them quit a dangerous habit.

When a person smokes the skin temperature decreases, the heart beats faster, the blood flow is upset, air has more difficulty getting in and out of the lungs, and resistance to infection is decreased because the smoke paralyzes the cilia in the lungs and destroys the germ-killing lysozymes.

The smoker's chance of dying from bronchitis and emphysema is ten times greater. From lung cancer twelve times greater, and from heart disease two times greater than the non-smoker's. Yet, if those statistics don't impress you, maybe you'll shudder at the prospect of carrying those saggy, baggy wrinkles. And if that doesn't bother you, never mind. You've come a long way, prune-face!





Water can 'turn over' too

"Mother," asked the little boy, "How can a lake 'turn over'?"

That's a good question, for persons of all ages notice this phenomenon - and especially in an area where there are a lot of lakes. People of Eastland County not only see it, but they sometimes have to taste it, since many of the towns in this area depend on lake water for city use.

"Turnover" usually happens right in the blistering hot weather, when both man and beast crave pure, cold water. A lake will suddenly appear full of green slime, with algae floating to the top. There is a distinctly stagnant taste to the water.

At that time the ranchers turn on a faucet from their deep wells (providing they aren't having to depend on pond water too) and decide they don't want to move into town after all!

But "water turnover" is a natural phenomena, according to Dr. Ken Johnson, a specialist from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. He explains that water in all ponds and lakes stratifies during the summer, with the cooler water going to the bottom and the warmer water near the top. The heavier bottom water normally does not mix with

the upper layer. In fertilized ponds, or in ponds where fish are being fed, a waste deposit also builds up in the lower layer.

As this material decomposes, most or all of the oxygen in the bottom layer is depleted. Johnson says that a cool rain or strong wind in the summer will often lower the temperature of the upper layer to the degree that all the water mixes.

If this "turnover" is severe, fish may die from lack of oxygen. Fishing is generally poor in the pond following the "turnover". But as the oxygen level returns to near normal, the fish are hungry and begin to feed again.

If it be any consolation, lake "turnover" can occur in a cool climate as well as a warm one. Fishermen to the Gila National Forest area of New Mexico were surprised, several summers ago, to find that Lake Roberts had experienced a severe "turnover" and actually required restocking of trout.

But this doesn't help much when you drive up somewhere on a hot day and your soft drink from the Drive In tastes like it came from a frog pond! This "turnover" problem, natural or not, is in line for some scientific correction!

Rising Star High School and Jr. High students, together with many of their parents, heard Mrs. Evaline Edge speak Monday morning on the alcohol/drug abuse problems which, she avers, have reached epidemic proportions throughout the United States.

Mrs. Edge is employed by the Palmer Drug Abuse Program in Austin and speaks from the experience of a mother whose children became victims of this widespread disease, chemical (alcohol and/or drug) abuse. She and her children are all survivors of the illness which pervades an entire family.

Stating that every individual needs to feel loved, accepted and to feel good about himself, Mrs. Edge then pointed out that although using chemicals may, in the beginning, make a person feel good and ease painful feelings, that continued use ultimately brings much more pain and low self-esteem into a person's life.

To the student body, Mrs. Edge declared, "Trust me. There are no safe drugs." That students begin using chemicals with a friend and because they feel they would be more readily accepted by their peers if they, too, use chemicals, are two of the reasons abuse has become so insidious and so dangerous.

Another reason for widespread use and abuse of chemicals is that it is big business; large profits are made in drug trafficking and those profiting in drug and liquor sales are determined that they continue to profit. It's Mrs. Edge's opinion that there are not enough law enforcement dollars in the world to stop the supply. Therefore, she advises that those concerned work on the problem from the demand angle.

To approach the problem from the demand angle requires students to reach out to one another, to support one another and to make it clear that use of drugs and alcohol is not necessary for one to be accepted.

Parents also need support from one another in the difficult task of surviving and helping their children survive the chemical abuse illness, for the steps parents are advised to take are indeed difficult. First, Mrs. Edge urged parents to avoid denial of the problem. Ignoring it will not make the problem go away. Second, let your child experience the consequences of his actions. Third, don't help your child continue to be a drug abuser by giving him/her food and shelter.

An important thing for parents to note, Mrs. Edge told these parents present, is that the fact that a child is a chemical abuser does not mean the parent is a failure. In spite of the best efforts of parents, children often make to choice to use chemicals. And the children have to make to choice to stop. In addition to the steps suggested in the preceding paragraph, Mrs. Edge advocated parents to

look for other ways the parent lets the child keep on using chemicals, then discontinue those practices. Accompanying Mrs. Edge was a 16-yr-old who described herself as having been "Heavy into drugs: acid, coke and speed," but who is now a member of the Palmer Drug Abuse Program. With the support and understanding of fellow members and with the

aid of her daily prayer of "Please, God, don't let me slip today," the former drug abuser is well on her way to being another survivor. High School Principal, Frank Gray, told the parents in attendance that high school students had set up the program with Mrs. Edge and had advanced the date because "we need it now." He also stated that similar programs have been scheduled to be

presented to students and parents every two weeks until the end of the school term. Mr. Gray recently made his third appeal to the State agency for local help on the drug problem, but does not yet know whether help will be forthcoming.



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
