Rep. Parker Responds To Article Asking For Prison Commitment

Editor,
I was deeply disappointed as well as amazed at your recent article concerning Eastland County's desire to be the site for the location of a prison facility.

Apparently, you know someone, although I cannot imagine who it would be, who is more knowledgeable on prison plans than the Legislature. Your comment that Senator Glasgow and I were "less than fully informed" is ludicrous at best. Other than speculation, we would have to be clairvoyant to know what is going to be built, much less where. If you are interested in facts, the fact is that the House Corrections Committee began work on the proposed prison package at 2:00 p.m., April 19, 1989. Until they complete their

work, there is not way to be "informed" regarding prison prospects.

250 communities in the State of Texas are in vigorous competition for whatever prison facilities may be constructed, and there is no doubt in my mind that the "winners" in the competition are going to be those areas that offer the best inducements.

Each time I have been contacted concerning the Eastland County proposal, I have advised the interested parties to put together the best firm package of inducements they can muster, and I will then be happy to give my opinion as to what can reasonably be expected.

Although I have asked several times, I have yet to see any package and have only heard of an inducement pack-

age in very general terms. My address has been the same for the last six years, and as of yet, I have received nothing from anyone in Eastland County that I can take to any entity involved to demonstrate why Eastland County should have a prison facility as opposed to one of the other two hundred or so "contestants."

Articles such as the one complained of, by an author unnamed, are helpful to no one and counterproductive to all.

State To Be Billed For County Prisoners

Along with discussions Monday about ambulance service, the County Commissioners also dealt with matters relating to the county jail and law enforcement.

A contract was signed with the City of Rising Star to house City prisoners in the county jail for \$15 per day.

Commissioner Billy Bacon reported that 13 prisoners were currently in the jail, with 8 of these TDC prisoners. He said that the jail was "spotlessly clean," but that the washer and dryer for the facility was "worn out." The Commissioners suggested getting prices on heavy duty equipment.

Sheriff Dee Hogan requested that the Commissioners approve a plan for the County Treasurer's office to submit a bill to the appropriate State agency each month setting forth the monthly cost to the county of keeping TDC inmates. This would be based

on \$45 per day for each prisoner.

The Sheriff explained that a recent court case was decided by ordering the State to reimburse a county their cost of maintenance of these inmates. He said that in the future the State may have to reimburse all counties their cost - and of course only those who have itemized billings would have basis for payment.

He estimated that Eastland County might save as much as \$200,000 per year if the state began this type of payment.

The Commissioners approve his request for the billings.

Also approved was a request from the Sheriff to keep a 1982 Chevrolet which was offered as a trade-in on a new car recently purchased from Hood-King Motor Company. Estimated value of the car is \$200. The vehicle will be repaired and used for back-up runs around the cities.

The Court session ended with a discussion of the 911 Emergency System. A public meeting on this matter is scheduled for Friday morning, April 28 in the Commissioners Courtroom. The time will be announced.

Pipe Litters Main Street

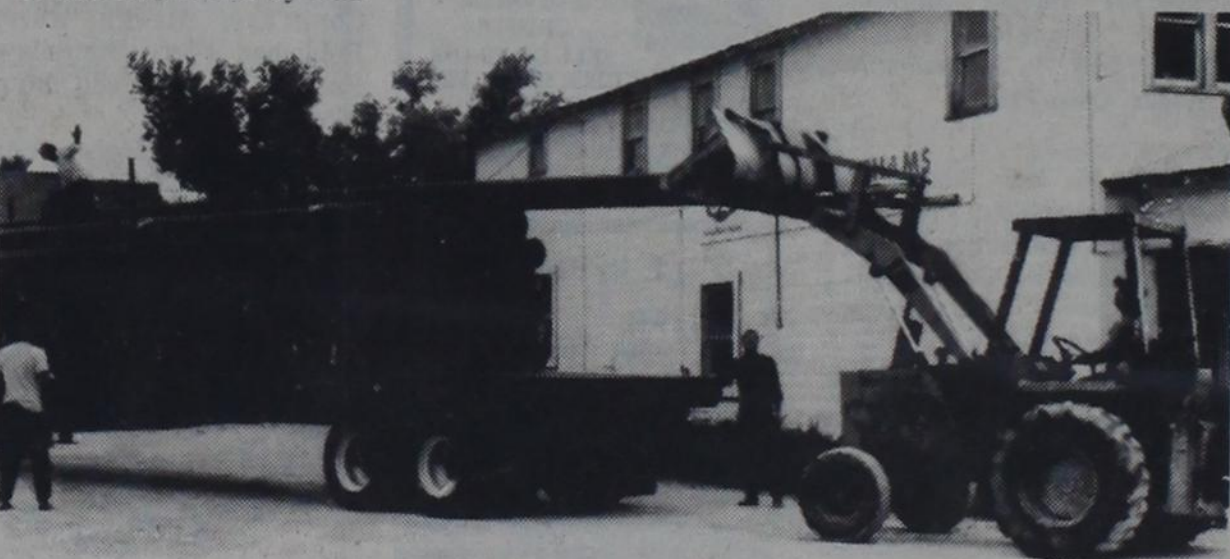
Several lengths of large heavy gauge plastic pipe came loose from a truck and skidded up N. Main Street from the traffic light in Rising Star late Monday night. There were several pipes at the curbs on either side of N. Main in the 100 block as business owners and employees and cafe goers drove downtown Tuesday morning.

Truck driver Douglas Green of Dallas came from Brownwood headed north on Highway 183 when the load of pipe shifted and the mishap occurred. Green said the load would be returned to Brownwood and a new load would be sent on to its destination in Arizona. A backhoe owned by Bud-

dy's Plumbing & Appliances was used to reload the pipes onto the truck. Johnny Cook operated the backhoe and James Cook and Kevin Bond guided and helped with the loading.

Green said he was very impressed with the concern shown by townspeople for his dilemma. "The people of Rising Star are supportive and very, very nice - it's overwhelming," said Green. He added that the Cooks were volunteering their help and backhoe but that he intended that they be compensated for their efforts. Rising Star can be counted among the best, Green said.

By mid-morning the pipe was reloaded and traffic on N. Main returned to normal.

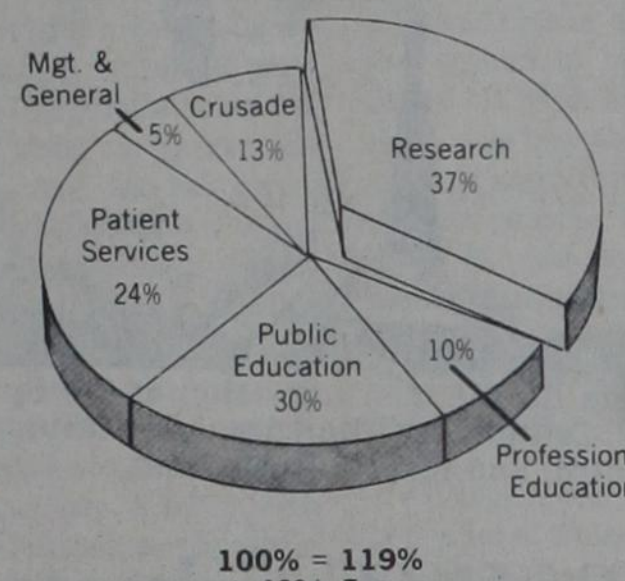

Warmer Temperatures Means More Water Usage

As the warmer temperatures of spring and summer approaches, residential water use will increase significantly as people begin to water lawns. In fact, over half of the water used by homeowners in the summer is for lawn watering. This causes significant peak demands that utility systems must meet by building reserve excess capacity into water supply, treatment, and distribution systems. Unfortunately, it is estimated that as much as 60 percent of the average municipal water system is idle 75 percent of the time; that is, the idle capacity is just in reserve to meet summer peak demand. This represents a substantial capital investment that must be paid for year round by rate payers even though it is not used for long periods of time. High water demand during summer for lawn watering is also often a major culprit, along with droughts, that stresses water utilities to the point that they must limit use or ration water. While this situation is certainly regrettable, it is made even worse because half of the water used for landscape watering is wasted, according to the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. In other words, both the rate payers dollars and the state's precious water resources are literally going down the drain. The Texas Water Development Board, the state agency statutorily responsible for administering Texas' water conservation program, has joined with other state agencies and water organizations to try to reduce water waste by educating the public on the need to conserve water. As the high water demand days of summer approach, it is would be extremely helpful to remind Texans that the best ways to reduce waste and needless water use are often the simplest.

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
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
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


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**"Tornadoes"
A Texas Whirlwind**

EACH YEAR IN TEXAS, 119 TWISTERS LEAVE 11 DEAD. BUT THE STORMS CAN BE ESCAPED.

Since 1916, 1,103 people have been killed in tornadoes in Texas annually, more than in any other state. When figures are averaged per 10,000 square miles, Oklahoma moves into first place.

The three worst spots in the United States for tornadoes per 10,000 square miles are Fort Worth-Dallas and counties north to the Red River, a section in the Panhandle between Amarillo and Lubbock, and the very center of Oklahoma including Oklahoma City. All three areas show an annual average of nine tornadoes.

Statistics put Tarrant, Johnson and Dallas counties into the hot spot in North Texas with 55, 56 and 52 tornadoes respectively reported between 1950 and 1988 - the highest rates in North Texas.

Meteorologists say the figures are high because the three counties are so densely populated. Tornadoes that touch down without being seen can't be counted.

Tornadoes already have stirred Texas soil this year, causing minor damage in Central Texas. And the outlook for the rest of the spring is not promising.

Fort Worth-Dallas has not had a killer tornado since April 2, 1957, when a twister swept through Dallas, killing 10 people and injuring 200.

If a similar tornado were to hit the same area today, the death toll would be worse because of the increase in population.

One of the biggest hurdles meteorologists face - aside from daily forecasts is educating the public. Members of the public normally fall into two classifications: either overly frightened of storms or totally blasé. Meteorologists hope people will become educated about weather so they can recognize a potentially dangerous situation and respond accordingly.

The most vulnerable people during a tornado are those in cars and mobile homes. When one of the largest tornadoes tore through Wichita Falls in 1979, more than half of the 46 people who died were killed in automobiles.

A large number of those were in a safe place to begin with in their home or malls. They heard the sirens and went to their cars to drive away. That is the wrong thing to do.

People in buildings should move to the bottom floor or basement, away from windows and outer walls and reinforced buildings. If no shelter is available, they should move to the nearest ditch or depression and cover their head with their hands.

Texas lies at the southern tip of Tornado Alley, a strip of Plains area where tornadoes are most frequent.

Tornadoes are most prolific in Texas in April, May and June. All of the major killer tornadoes in Texas since 1900 have occurred in April and May. But it's not unusual for tornadoes to occur in the fall when cold and warm air collide or when hurricane pass onto land, stirring up the atmosphere.

Between 60 and 70 percent of all tornadoes are considered weak, with rotating winds up to 110 mph. Although they are narrow and stay on the ground only a few minutes, they are still capable of damaging roofs and windows.

About 30 percent are strong tornadoes, which contain winds of 110 to 200 mph. Strong tornadoes are a couple of hundred yards wide and can remain on the ground 10 to 15 minutes. They can destroy a home but probably won't level all walls.

Only 1 percent to 2 percent are violent tornadoes, often a quarter of a mile wide with winds exceeding 200 mph.

New technology in radar and computers being integrated into National Weather Service forecasting in the next five to six years is expected to improve forecasting accuracy. The new equipment called Doppler radar will tell meteorologists where moisture is and in what direction winds are moving within a cloud.

More research on weather and more training is needed to put that equipment to best use.

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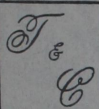
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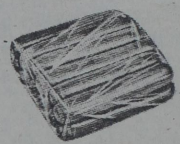
