J.C. Butler is married to Ray and Garry's sister, Jettie Sue. J.C., Buddy and Garry will be doing most of the field work while Ray will be working in the shop, taking orders and building cabinets on the shop premises.

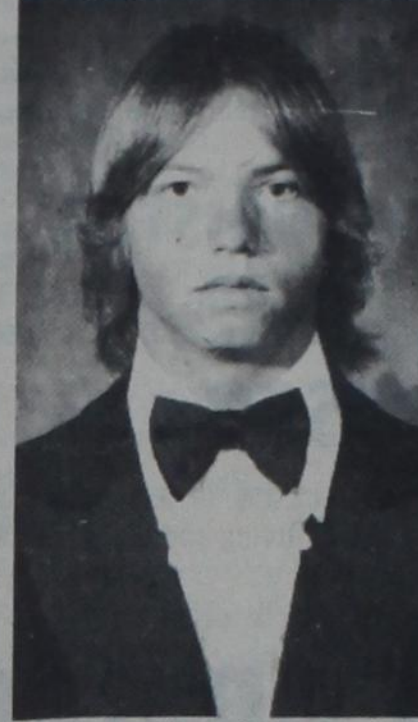

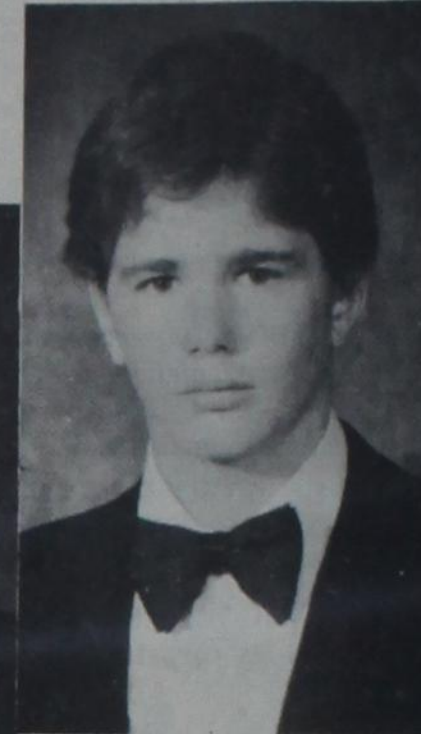

causing its eventual disintegration.

If you follow the following steps, you will effectively control these weeds:

1. Mow the lawn before applying the weed control, in order to keep the grass blades and weed leaves from touching the bottom of the spreader.

2. Select a day when rain is not expected for at least 24 hours, since the weed control particles need to stick to the leaves for at least that long to accomplish their mission.

3. Be sure the lawn is wet at the time you put down the weed control. This could be from rain or watering, or probably best of all from early morning dew.

4. Be sure to use a precision lawn spreader to give an even and accurate application without waste.

5. Stay off the lawn for at least a day after, to avoid knocking the particles off the leaves.

Within a few days the weeds will begin to curl and shrivel noticeably, and in approximately one month they will disappear completely.

Wearing safety belts are being emphasised

This summer the National Safety Council and the Eastland County Extension Homemakers are asking the public to make a special effort to wear their safety belts.

"Make It Click - Buckle-Up" is a national campaign in which volunteers across the country and Extension Homemakers in Eastland County will be asking people to sign pledges promising to buckle their safety belts and put their children in child safety seats.

According to National Safety Council statistics, every year an estimated 1.8 million motor vehicle occupants are injured and more than 35,000 are killed in motor vehicle crashes.

Mrs. Morris Underwood, of Extension Homemakers,

says the national campaign will focus on the "101 critical days" from Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day. "During this period, more persons are injured and killed in motor vehicle crashes than at any other period of the year, explains Mrs. Underwood.

Mrs. Underwood says a pledge to buckle-up is the first step toward commitment. "We hope once people become comfortable wearing their belts during their pledge period, they will make it a lifetime habit."

Extension Homemakers points out that about 12,000 of the 52,600 people killed in 1980 would have been saved if they had been wearing safety belts or were protected by approved child safety seats.

GORDON SPOT

It is time to spray pecan trees for the control of the pecan nut casebearer according to Eastland Co. Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon. The best control will be achieved if trees are sprayed between May 27 and 31.

The adult casebearers which are small moths have been depositing eggs on the small nuts during the past few days. These eggs will be hatching by May 27 and 28.

Gordon says the spray should be applied after most of the eggs have hatched and before the small worms enter the pecans. This time may vary throughout the county with the southern part of Eastland County needing control earlier than the northern part. Proper timing through coverage of spray on the trees and recommended insecticides are all important in the control of this pest.

The best insecticides for yard trees include Sevin, Malathion and Zolone. Commercial producers may use Zolone, Sevin, Guthion, Malathion or Torak P. Malathion gives a quick kill, but the residual lasts for only a day or two. Both Zolone and Sevin will leave a residual for about one week. It takes Zolone about two days before it affects the insects. Gordon warns producers and homeowners to read the label and follow directions on the insecticide containers.

Gordon suggests using zinc sulfate or NZN with the insecticide to provide needed zinc.

It is important for commercial producers to check trees daily to determine the best time to spray.

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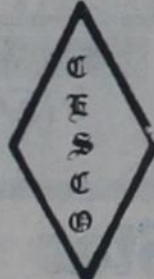

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE A CHRISTIAN IN TODAY'S SOCIETY

The Christian, on the other hand, is a person who has accepted a set of priorities which places others over self, the call of God over the call of success. They have come to a point in their lives when they have realized that the secular way of life has no real underlying values and have called upon God through the person of Jesus Christ to come into their lives, recreate those lives into the image of Jesus himself. The life of the Christian is a regenerated life, with new values and priorities.

Secondly, a Christian is a person who is willing to risk himself or herself in order to serve people and in situations which might not be acceptable to the more 'class' conscious of society. Let's face facts; there are people who are poor in spirit as well as in economics. There are people who have done things which went against the standards of genteel people. There are situations in which truly committed

Christians will be involved with from which certain 'respectable' people would shy away. There are not too many people who would be willing to work with derelicts, alcoholics and drug addicts out on the streets and in the gutters of life. Yet a Christian, if he or she is serious about following Christ, would not hesitate in reaching out to these persons. By the way, acts like these also separate social Christians from those whose lives are uniquely tied to the full gospel of our Lord Jesus. The Church cannot afford to be anything less and individual Christians cannot afford to be joined to anything less than the full gospel of Jesus Christ.

Thirdly, it is because Christians have accepted a new set of priorities and because they are uniquely tied to the full gospel of Jesus Christ that, in the roughest times, we have a source of strength which is infinitely greater than that of society. If one places faith on temporary things alone, then when those things are threatened. But we who are in Christ have placed our faith (trust, hope, etc.) in a person, the person of God, as revealed in Jesus Christ. It is because of this that, even when the temporary things are threatened, Christians can face each day with a calm assurance that things are not really as bad as they seem. God is near; fear, therefore, has no foothold.

What does it mean to be a Christian in today's society? It means the same as it always has. We have Christ as our Savior, we seek to serve others and to live each day depending on God's strength alone.

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Here's a way to use a little ingenuity and save a whole lot of money
SHINGLE YOUR ROOF

by D. Simmons
A number of years ago, I covered my home's entire 1,800 square foot roof with aluminum shingles—a job that would have set me back more than \$2,000 if it had been done commercially.
I chose aluminum because it can last a lifetime is fire and rustproof, and will often reduce heating and cooling expenses. In addition, such shingles are lightweight...an important consideration when you have to lug hundreds of them up a ladder. What really clinched my choice, however, was the discovery that this roofing material can be easily salvaged from inexpensive, used printing plates.
SHOP AROUND
A little research convinced me that the best print-shop "leftovers" for shingle use, at least were .009" thick and measured 24-5/8" X 36". Telephone calls to several local presses proved that such plates vary quite a bit in availability and in price. However, I finally located one small job printer who had thousands of the shingles-to-be that he was more than willing to unload for a bargain price.
So, I drove to his shop and carefully selected undamaged plates that had a sturdy, 1/8" doubled-over edge (created when the aluminum was locked in the press). In two hours I had loaded 600 of the metal sheets in my truck...and had thoroughly blackened my clothes and gloves. (Printers ink soils everything it touches, so always don old stained garments when you work with this recycled aluminum.)
CUT 'EM UP
I soon determined that if I cut the 2' X 3' plates into fourths—I could produce shingles that were attractive and strong enough to resist our Utah mountain winds. So I place a single aluminum sheet-printed side up—on my work surface...measured carefully to determine the midpoint of each side...lined a yardstick up across the marks...and scratched in a "cross hair." I then used scissors to divide the plate into four equal sections...and these rectangles became the patterns for the rest of my plates.
I found it easy to cut the sheets with my stout scissors. In fact, I was able to quarter 10 sheets in about 25 minutes...and the job could be done much more quickly with a paper cutter. (An even faster method would be to pay the print shop to "size" the plates with a power knife...but my pressman didn't have one of the tools on hand.)
A TEMPLATE AND TOOLS
I decided to fashion each shingle into a parallelogram...for a number of reasons: The "lopsided rectangles" only required one thickness of aluminum, involved few manufacturing steps, allowed me to overlap each piece of "roofing" on all four edges, produced slanted vertical "flaps" (to shed water well), were easy to mount,



MY SHINGLE MOUNTING METHOD
I'm not a professional roofer by any stretch of the imagination, so what I'll say here certainly won't be the last word on shingle mounting. However, the method that follows did work on my own house, and can probably give you some idea of how to proceed.
First, since aluminum is slippery stuff—and because I didn't want to put too much stress on my lightweight creations—I planned to work from right to left and place the shingles (one above the other) in vertical strips...while I sat safely to one side on the old asphalt roof.
Here's the procedure: I hooked each plate's 1/8" "lip"—beneath edge "A"—over the top of the shingle below it, and slipped the right side "B" of the aluminum shake into the strap-formed pocket of the matching shingle in the row immediately to the right. This placed the upper right obtuse corner of the "new" tile beneath the upper left acute angle of the shingle in the preceding row. These two corners—"C" and "D"—were then secured with one nail (near enough to the upper edge to be covered by the next shingle), while a second fastener was used to hold down the "flap" at "E". In this way, all of the sides of my shingles overlapped, and two roofing nails were sufficient to secure three corners of each of my plates. Finally, any nailheads that—because of non-uniform shingles—were not covered by another aluminum plate received a waterproofing coat of black plastic sealant.
EDITOR'S NOTE: Although Mr. Simmons didn't use them, we recommend rubber-fitted roofing nails for this job.

Home Ventilation Saves Energy

Using outside air wisely can reduce energy use for residential air conditioning, says an agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. During the spring and fall when average outside air temperatures are com-

fortable, whole house or attic fans can be used to pull outside air into the home and remove heat. Air flow depends on having windows or doors that will open in each room to admit air. Attic ventilation also helps reduce air conditioning bills during the summer. This calls for

outlet vents near the peak of the roof along with the same amount of inlet vents at the eave.

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Applying For Social Security Benefits

Persons who are planning to retire before age 65 should apply for their monthly Social Security benefits no later than the last day of the month they want benefits to begin, Glyn Hammons, Social Security district manager in Abilene said recently.

Generally, benefits payable for months before age 65 can begin no earlier than the month of application. This limitation also applies to widows and widowers who will receive benefits before

their 65th birthday. A person who applies for benefits after age 65 can receive benefit payments for up to 6 months before the month of application. Those who want to make certain that their benefit payments will begin on time may apply as early as 3 months before they want benefits to start.

Benefits can be paid only for months a person meets the eligibility requirements throughout the entire month.

To facilitate the processing of their ap-

plications for Social Security benefits, applicants should bring to the Social Security office their Social Security card; proof of age; a marriage certificate for those applying for wife's, widow's, or widower's benefits; children's birth certificates, where applicable; and records of their earnings during the preceding 2 years. In addition, persons applying for disability benefits should have the names, addresses, and telephone numbers of the doctors who

treated them and the medical facilities where they were treated for their disabilities.

"People who do not have all these documents should not delay applying for benefits," Hammons emphasizes. "It is possible that other records could serve the same purpose. Applicants can learn what other documents may be submitted by contacting their local Social Security office," call toll free 1-800-392-1603; 142 S. Pioneer, Abilene.
