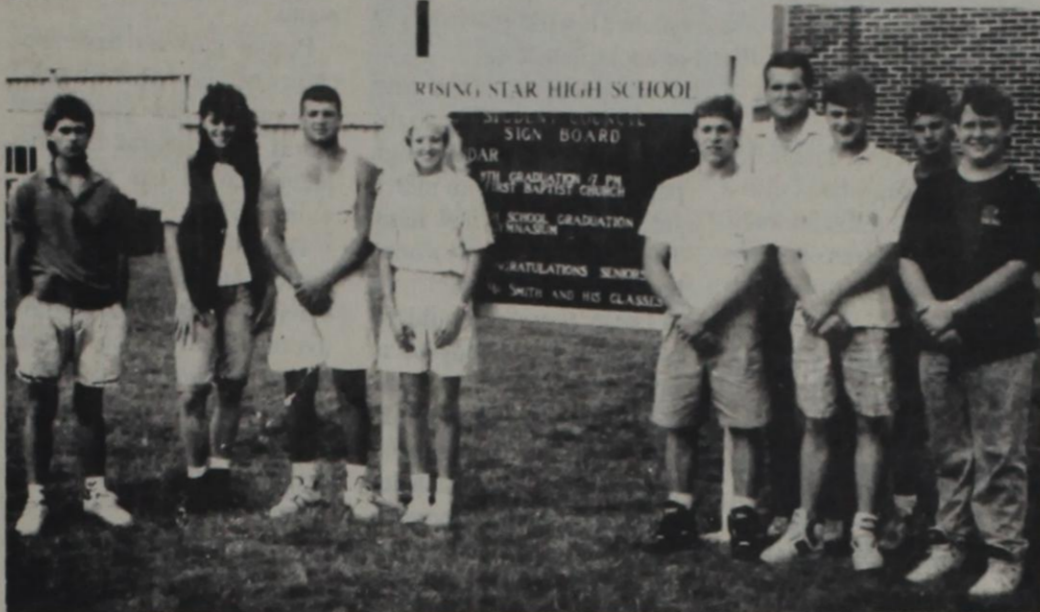
Queen," 1951, and "Lost Horizon," 1937.

Gordon Spot

There seems to be a variety of foliage eating worms in home landscapes. Some are armyworms and some are other species which causes the same damage and may be controlled with the same methods. Larvae, or caterpillars, are green or brown with various markings. Color depends on the species, individual variation and food. They range in size from about 1/8 inch or less for the newly hatched to a full grown larva of about 2 inches.

When feeding, larvae strip foliage and then move to the next available food. High populations appear to march side by side to the new food. Thus, the name armyworms has been applied.

These worms should be controlled when they occur in large numbers or plant damage is becoming excessive. Preventive treatments normally are not justified because attacks are sporadic. Early detection seems to work best and is achieved by frequent, thorough inspection of

plants.

Insecticides recommended for armyworm control are: carbaryl (Sevin), chlorpyrifos (Dursban), diazinon (Spectracide), malathion, methoxychlor, and trichlorfon (Dylox). Follow all directions, particularly safety precautions on the insecticide package label. Although any of the insecticides will control armyworms, not all are labeled for use on all host plants.

Peanut growers have the choice of a new Spanish peanut variety this year. The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has released Tamspan 90.

Dr. Olin Smith, peanut breeder at Texas A&M University, said that Tamspan 90 averaged more than 10% higher gross value per acre return than Starr, the Spanish peanut variety that has been the most popular in Texas for about 25 years.

Smith thinks the Tamspan 90 will provide some protection against diseases and yield

more, which means more dollar for the farmer.

The new variety has resistance to two major soilborne diseases of the peanut: sclerotinia blight and pod rot.

Smith said the development of Tamspan 90 can be traced to 1976, when the first cross was made. He said the vegetative growth and physical appearance are similar to Starr, but the seed size is larger.

The use of organic mulches is very important in the home vegetable garden. An organic mulch is especially desirable on light, sandy soils, and on cool-season crops. Organic mulches keep the soil several degrees cooler than bare soil or soil covered with black plastic mulch. Mulches re-

duce heat radiation from the soil, increasing the chance of frost damage on a cool night. Organic mulches are best applied after the soil is warm and as soon as plants are large enough to avoid being buried

by the material. It is usually applied just after the first cultivation.

Use organic mulches when vegetables are 2 to 3 inches high. Before applying remove weeds, any weeds remaining the soil will grow through the organic material, but they can be removed easily by hand.

Old straw or hay which is free from weed seed is ideal. A 3 to 6 inch layer of straw or hay is required, whereas a 1 to 3 inch layer of peat moss, grass clippings or composted leaves is sufficient.



Pharmacy Topics

Chest pain is not the only indication of a heart attack in people at high risk. Doctors at the University of California/Los Angeles found that any unusual pain -- in the jaw, teeth, neck, wherever, may be a warning for high risk people.

New Recommended Dietary Allowances have been announced by the National Academy of Science's Food and Nutrition Board. They call for more iron for women, more calcium for men and women up to age 24, more vitamin C for smokers, and less sodium for everyone.

Experimental vaccine uses cowpox virus together with strains of melanoma cells to fight cancer recurrence in people who've had melanomas. Testing is coordinated at M. D. Anderson Cancer Center and six other centers are involved.

Lyme disease continues to spread across the country, and more people are using insect repellents to ward off the ticks that carry the disease. However, the products should be used strictly according to directions to avoid toxic reactions, especially among youngsters.

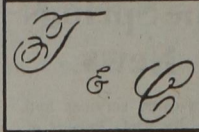

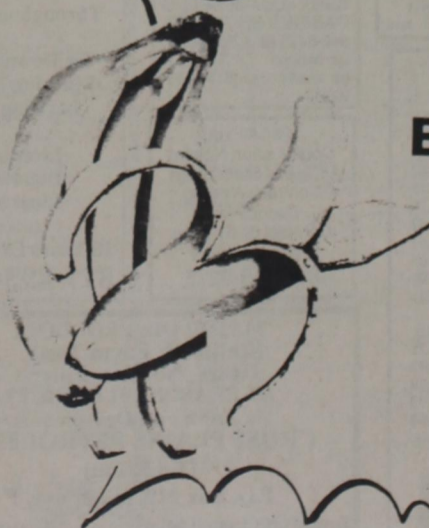

ASCS News

The County Committee has requested Emergency Conservation Funds for providing assistance to agriculture producers who have suffered severe damage to their farmland due to recent flooding.

Cost-sharing will be limited to those cases that are truly emergency situations for the individual. It is not intended that the program be offered in cases where an individual, using usual farm labor and equipment that is normal for the area, could restore the damaged farmland in a relatively short period of time at a minimal cost. The cost must be too costly for the producer to rehabilitate without assistance.

Applications for ECP assistance will be accepted through June 15. An application must be on file at the ASCS office and a farm inspection made by ASCS before work on a practice starts. Producers who have program crops that fail due

to drought, freeze, flood or other conditions beyond their control should file a failed acreage report before making other use of the crop. ASCS must inspect the crop before disposition in order to receive disaster credit, and planted and considered planted credit. Farm program participants

must designate land for ACR that has been planted annually in two of the last three years or has been credited as planted to the crop or ACR in two of the past three years. Designated ACR land must be a minimum of 66 feet wide and a minimum size of five acres, unless it is the balance of the ACR needed. ACR may not be harvested and may not be grazed or baled from May 1 through Sept. 30. Erosion and weeds must be controlled on the ACR throughout the calendar year.

The final planting dates for program purposes are: cotton, May 31; grain sorghum, June 20; peanuts: spring runners, June 10, spring Spanish, June 25, fall Spanish, July 15.

Ending planting dates for irrigated and nonirrigated plantings are the same. An application for prevented planting credit must be filed within 15 days of the above dates. Planted and considered credit may be available for approved prevented planting.

ASCS office to be closed on Friday In an effort to improve service to Eastland County producers, USDA has authorized a compressed work schedule for all employees. The new schedule provides for employees to schedule an extra work hour each day during any eight of the ten days of the pay period. The employee will be compensated by having the tenth workday off.

The extra work hour will be utilized 30 minutes before the official county office opening of 8 a.m. to perform an initial program load for the automated system and 30 minutes after the official county office closing of 5 p.m. to perform end-of-day procedures. The automated system will now be fully operational during the official office hours of 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Compressed work schedules have been staggered to ensure that telephone coverage, technical assistance and services are provided during official office hours. In addition, the previously authorized policy of closing the county office for one workday to allow employees to complete paperwork, issue payments and perform computer upgrades, installs and backups has been standardized so that all county offices now have a uniform Friday closing day.

We request your assistance in scheduling your county office business so that it will not conflict with the scheduled Friday closing. We welcome any comments and suggestions you might have concerning the above policies and procedures.


