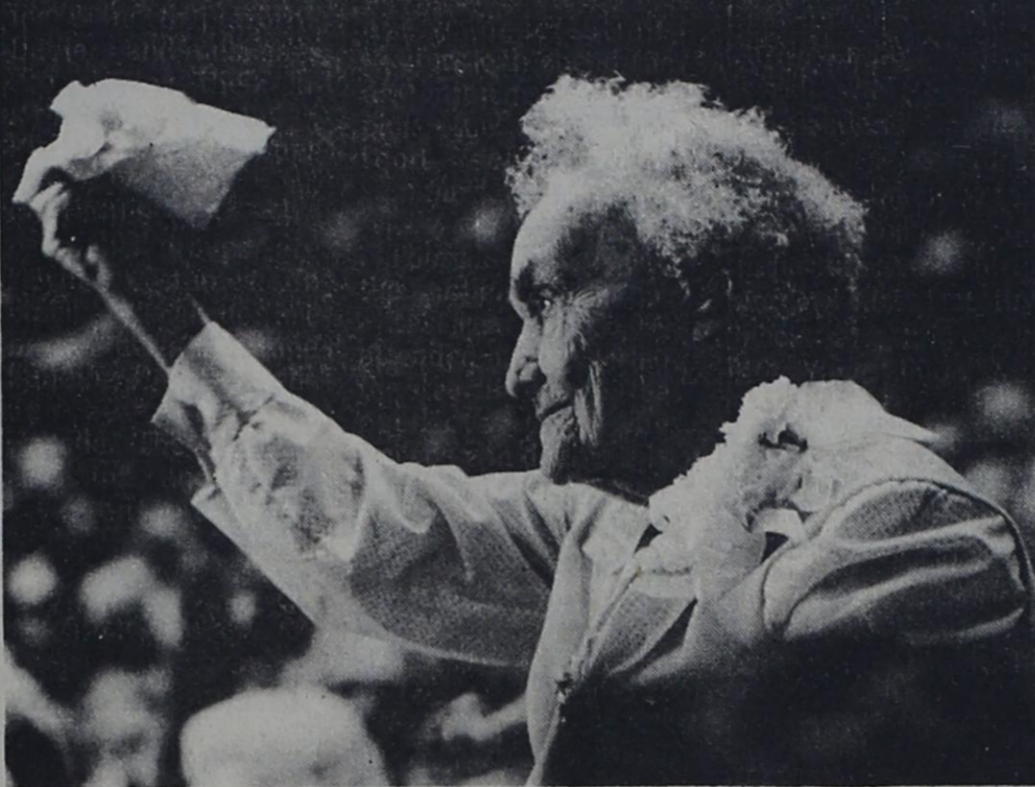
## Brownwood's Christmas Fest Scheduled For Dec. 4-5-6

## Special Celebration Honors Mrs. Beulah Cain Arvin

ACU Abilene, Texas—Beulah Cain Arvin, a resident of the Colonial Oaks Rest Home in Cross Plains, remembered her 100th birthday with a special celebration at Abilene Christian University.

Nov. 24, her birthday, was declared "Beulah Cain Arvin Day" at the University. Mrs. Arvin, the oldest living alumna of ACU, was honored in the daily chapel services and at a special luncheon.

In chapel she was escorted to the front of the student body, faculty and guests while the Big Purple Band played "Happy Birthday to You" and the audience sang along. A cake lighted by 100 candles was brought out, and Mrs. Arvin was given a bouquet of roses by the Student Association.

Dr John C. Stevens, president of ACU,

presented Mrs. Arvin with a medallion commemorating the school's 75th anniversary which is being celebrated this year. She was given the medallion serially numbered 100, which had been reserved for her.

During the luncheon, the Alumni Association made a presentation to her, and President Stevens gave her an autographed photo of herself taken during the school's opening day ceremonies in September. In the picture, she was standing and waving her handkerchief to the audience as she was introduced as one of the university's nine oldest living alumni.

Mrs. Arvin enrolled in ACU when it opened in 1906 as Childers Classical Institute. She was born Nov. 24, 1880, in Lee County, Texas,

east of Austin, where she lived until she moved to West Texas in a covered wagon after she was grown.

Mrs. Arvin said that she was "courted" by Major Andrew Arvin for 25 years before they married. Their wedding took place on Nov. 20, 1917, while they were sitting in a Model T in the middle of a street in Cottonwood. Her husband died in 1977 at the age of 96.

Mrs. Arvin recalled that when she went to Childers Classical Institute, she wrote to the president and asked him to find her a place to stay. He found her a place to stay in a home where she helped with the housework for her room and board.

During an interview earlier this year, Mrs. Arvin was quick to say, "I read my Bible every day...for a long while."

**Pecan Show Set For Dec. 12 & 13**

The 28th Annual Eastland County Pecan Show has been scheduled for December 12 and 13 reports Dan Childress, President of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association. The Pecan Show, co-sponsored by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, will be in the County Courthouse Lobby.

Even though there is a shortage of pecans this year the local growers expect to have a good show. Most growers agree that the quality will be better than last year.

Anyone producing pecans in 1980 may enter the Pecan Show. An entry consist of 43 pecans of one variety and natives from one tree. All entries should be sacked and labeled with the grower's name, address and variety of pecans. These entries may be entered at the County Agent's office up until 5:00 p.m. on December 11.

On Friday, December 12, ten pecans from each entry will be weighed, shelled, and kernels weighed to determine the number of pecans in one pound and percent kernel. These two factors are important along with appearance, color, uniformity and texture.

Plaques will be given for the champion in-shell, champion shelling, and champion native pecans. Ribbons will be awarded to the first, second, and third place entries of each variety.

Childress hope to have 150 entries representing over 40 varieties in the show. Comanche County growers will also compete in this show since there will not be a Comanche County Pecan Show.

Members of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce will assist process of pecan entries.

**Financing Approved To Service Comanche Electric Customers**

Financing has been approved by the Rural Electrification Administration to service an additional 1,800 Comanche County Electric Cooperative Assn. customers, according to Congressman Charles W. Stenholm.

The \$3,702,000 REA loan

will also finance 204 miles of distribution line and other system improvements, Stenholm said.

The Electric Co-op serves Comanche, Callahan, Eastland, Shackelford and Stephens counties in the 17th Congressional District, as well as Mills and Brown counties.

Co-op president is Joe V. Morgan of DeLeon and William G. Parker of Comanche is manager.

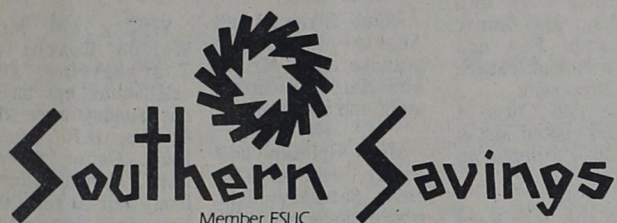

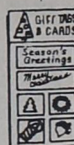

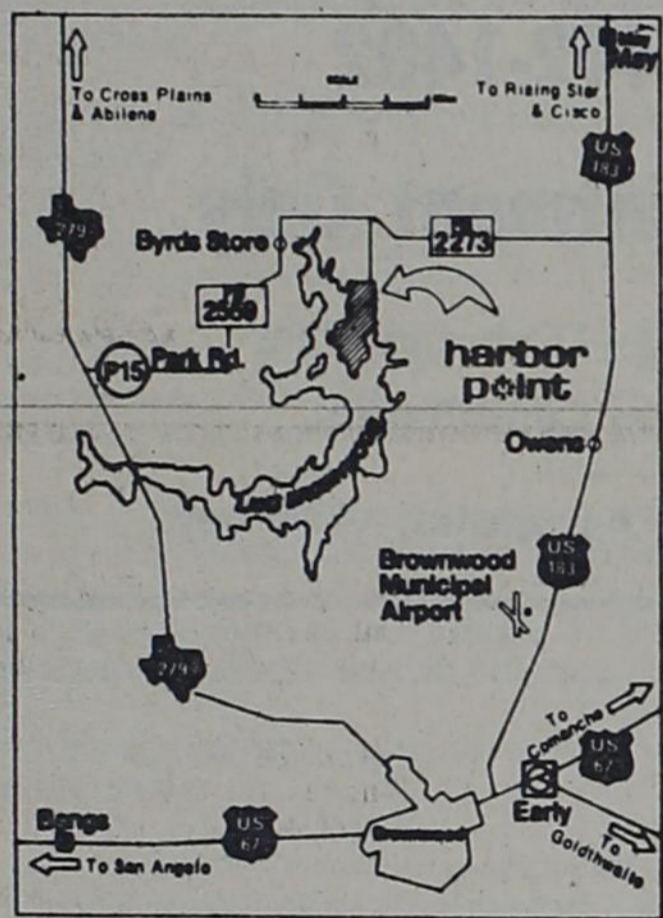

# GORDON SPOT

By DeMarquis Gordon

Think back to last summer's heat and imagine what a difference a green canopy of shade would make around your home.

Trees provide more than landscape beauty. They provide climate control. They make important contributions to improving the environment. They add increased value and esteem to our property.

Trees are one of nature's best gifts; and a mighty fine investment for our homes and communities.

If you've been thinking of adding trees to your landscape, this fall - right now - would be an excellent time to do so.

Many folks think of spring as the best time to plant, but fall planting offers distinct advantages. During the winter months the root systems of the fall planted specimens develop and become well established. When spring arrives this well-developed root system makes it possible for the plant to take advantage of the full surge of spring growth.

The selection of trees is very important. Select trees that are adapted to our area and trees that have the characteristics you want.

If I were selecting a landscape tree I would first look for one that is resistant to diseases and insects. Trees that have to be sprayed several times a year can be very expensive. I would want a tree that has strong wood that will not be easily broken in high winds and ice storms. It should be a tree that can withstand our hot

dry summer without having scorched or burned leaves. Another characteristic to avoid is a tree that has shallow root. Some trees roots emerge above the soil surface and usually the roots sprout causing young trees to come up in the area. I would also avoid trees that produce messy flowers, cotton, or seed pods.

Another characteristic that many look for is fast growth. Unfortunately, the fast growing trees tend to have weak and brittle branches and shallow roots. Fast growing trees usually have shorter lives than the slower growing trees. Actually, the so called "slow growing" trees will grow rather rapidly if they are properly planted, watered and fertilized.

You may disagree with me, but the following are landscape trees that best meet these requirements for Eastland County: Texas Red Oak, Live Oak, Cedar Elm, Burk Oak, Shumard Oak, Chinese Pistachio, Bald Cypress, Bradford Flowering Pear, Mexican Plum and Caddo Sugar Maple. If you like pine trees, the best in our area are Japanese Black Pine, Austrian Pine and Mondale Pine.

Existing, native Post Oak and Mesquite are good landscape trees but are very sensitive to any change in soil conditions or treatment.

You notice I did not list Pecan. The Pecan tree is my favorite, but it does not meet the first requirement of a good landscape tree. Pecan trees are susceptible to insects and diseases. They have to be sprayed several times a year.

Now, here is a list of trees to avoid, and there may be a lot of disagreement. I would not plant Lombardy Poplar, Non-bearing Mulberry, Silver Maple, Magnolia, Cottonwood, Weeping Willow, Green Ash, Siberian Elm and Sycamore.

Everyone has their own preference and yours is probably different than mine. My preference is based on the trees I have observed in Eastland County.

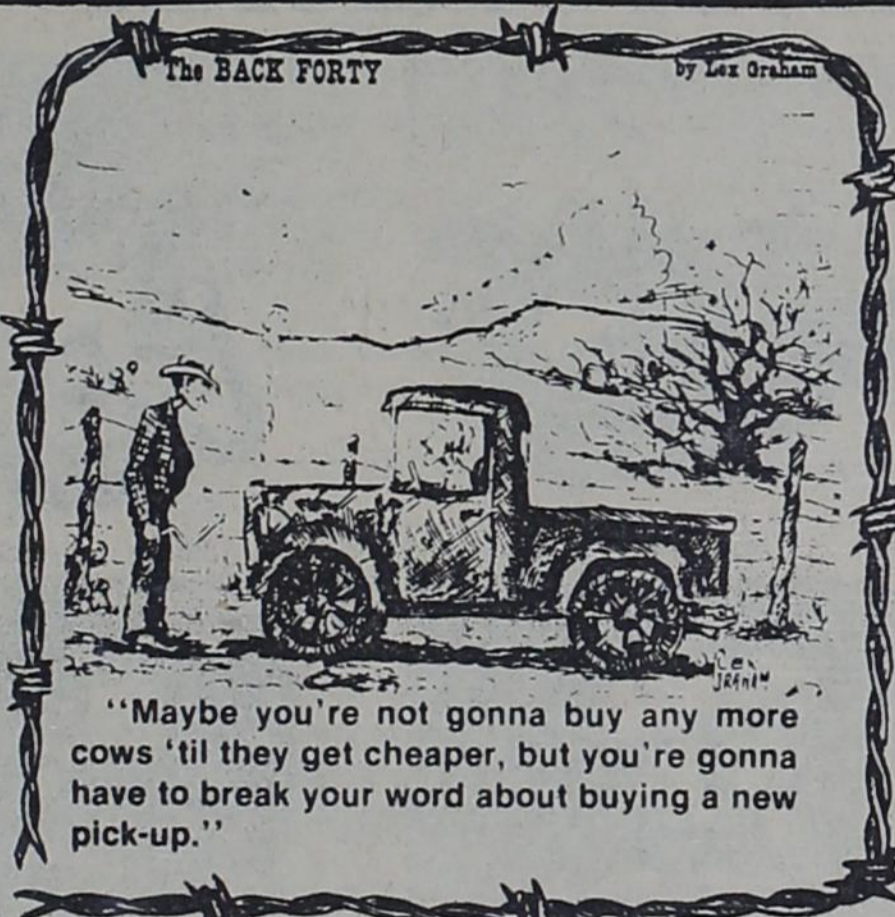

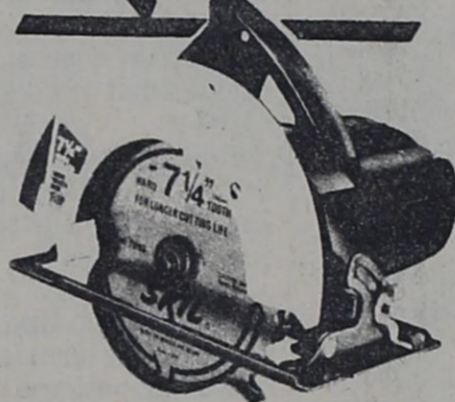

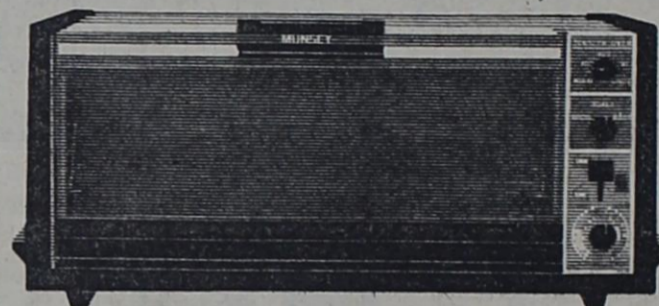

## They All Want Your Checking Account Money!

Consumers soon will face new economic decisions—about banking.

Be prepared for an onslaught of aggressive advertising by financial institutions competing for your checking and savings-account business—and study the ads before making a move, Nancy Granovsky, a home economist cautions consumers.

Mrs. Granovsky is a family resource management specialist on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

There's a reason for all this: starting Jan. 1, 1981, financial institutions will be able to offer interest-bearing NOW (negotiable orders of withdrawal) accounts.

In short, banks will be able to pay interest on checking accounts, AND savings-and-loan-associations and credit unions will be able to offer checking-account privileges on savings accounts, Mrs. Granovsky explains.

Credit unions will call theirs "share-draft" accounts.

### A CLOSER LOOK

From all reports, institutions are gearing up for this major change in banking services by trying to determine the terms and conditions under which the new accounts will be offered—or, indeed, if they will offer them at all.

Financial institutions are looking closely at the costs and benefits of offering the accounts—and so should consumers.

Consumers should read advertisements and literature from financial institutions carefully, Mrs.

Granovsky advises.

But because this is a new type of account, don't expect that answers to all your questions will appear in the ads.

A telephone call or personal visit will probably be necessary to get the facts you need.

**BATTLE FIRES KINDLING**  
Economic crystal-ball gazers say the battle fires will blaze as institutions fight for the consumer's checking and savings-account dollars.

Competition for business will be aggressive, especially in urban areas, they say.

Some predict a regular "price war" among competing financial institutions in order to attract new customers and retain old ones.

### CONSUMERS DON ARMOR

How can consumers decide what to do with their "checking-account money" as they don their sales-pitch-resistant armor?

Ask plenty of questions—compare, compare the terms and conditions offered by financial institutions in your area, Mrs. Granovsky suggests.

### QUESTIONS WILL SAVE THE DOLLAR

If questions are the "answer" to saving the day's dollar against battery of ads, then there ought to be specific questions to ask.

Indeed, Mrs. Granovsky says.

First, ask about costs. **HOW MUCH DOES IT COST?**

Ask these questions about cost—and remember to compare, compare the answers:

1) What is the minimum amount required to open an account?

2) What is the amount of the monthly balance that must be maintained to keep the account open?

3) How is the MONTHLY BALANCE determined? Is it the lowest balance in the account, or the highest balance, or the average of daily balances, or is it the closing balancing in the account?

4) Is the service free under certain conditions?

Is it free if a certain monthly balance is maintained, or if other services are used, such as savings accounts, credit cards, personal loans, mortgage loans, automated teller or bill-paying services?

5) What service charges are assessed and what are the amounts? There are several possibilities—ask about them. These include: **FLAT MONTHLY FEE**—does the fee vary according to monthly balance or is it the same for all accounts?

**TRANSACTION FEE**—what is the charge for each check or draft processed?

**CHECK (DRAFT) FEE**—what is the price range for checks (drafts)?

**OVERDRAFT FEE**—is there one, and how much is it? **STOP-PAYMENT FEE**—is there one, and how much is it? **ADDITIONAL FEES**—what is the penalty for dropping below a certain monthly balance? Are there any other fees or charges?

6) Are canceled checks (drafts) returned with the monthly statement? If not, what is the charge for obtaining a copy of the cancelled checks?

7) Is postage-paid banking by mail available?

**WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS?** Next, ask about the benefits.

Ask what the annual percentage rate is.

Ask what the annual percentage yield is.

Ask how often earnings will be compounded: continuously, daily, monthly, or quarterly.

Finally, ask how earnings will be computed: on the closing balance, the lowest balance, each day's balance, the average monthly balance, or on a specific amount only.

**KEEP ON CHECKIN', SAVING?** If the answers don't meet your needs, there will be the choice of doing nothing—and just

continuing to bank as you always have with your same traditional checking and savings accounts, Mrs. Granovsky says.

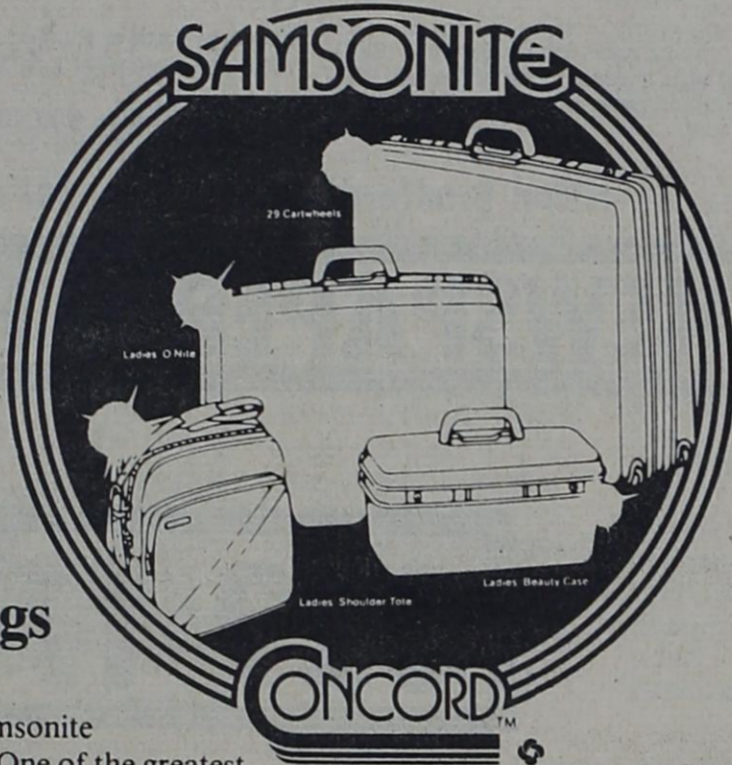

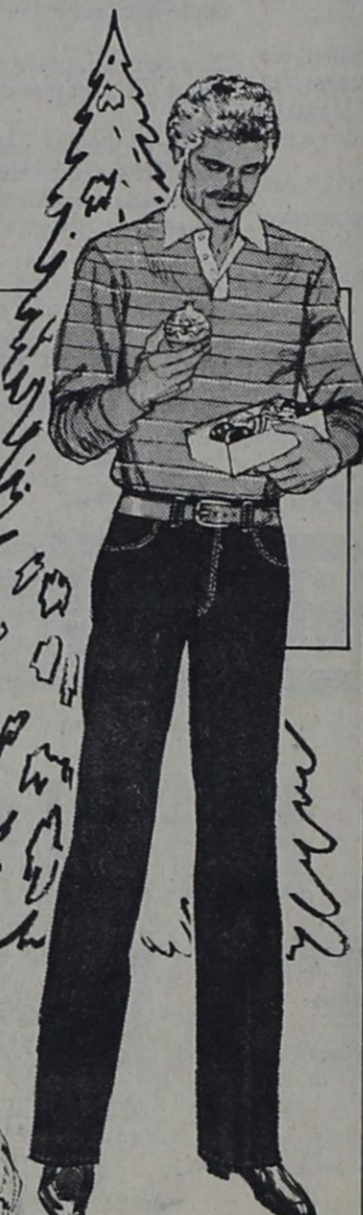
