The event of the year in Eastland the Old Rip Festival and Parade is just two weeks away.

On Saturday, October 1, at ten a.m. the parade will begin, and when it ends there will be booths to the south and west of the Courthouse offering so many kinds of foods that one, or maybe several, will be just what you want.

Displays and games will probably hold your attention as you eat.

The Old Rip Marching Festival will have a number of area high school bands marching and playing their best as they try to earn one of the coveted trophies.

Six bands signed up early for the parade and contest, and at least three more are expected. The marching contest will be at Maverick Stadium.

Just a block from the booths at the Majestic Theatre, a locally produced historical play, "Eastland Countys' First Wedding", which proved to be quite popular will be re-staged.

But at the same time there will be a steady flow of entertainment near the booths. And forty-eight booths were already rented

and several more spoken for at last check.

There will be a concert by a bluegrass band, young people from the Popovers, the Jammie Dee Dancers, and the Folklife Dancers will be dancing and tumbling, and there will be a tricycle race.

Fire truck pumper races will be held in front of the Majestic, and there will be an auction near the booths.

Bulldogs Nip Wildcats

The Rising Star Wildcats traveled to Eden on Friday, September 16 to take on the Bulldogs in non-district play. This was a night of mistakes for the 2-0 Wildcats. The Wildcats' opening drive stalled and the Cats were forced to punt. Derrick White had a backfield tackle and teammate, Stacy Green batted down a pass and Eden was forced to punt. It looked like the Cats were going to get a drive going when they had 1 & 10 on the 44 following a 17 yd. gain by Green, but the drive stalled and the Cats punted. It seemed to be a defensive battle when 4 plays later, Eden also punted, but the Cats' #32, Reil Barron broke tackles and outran everyone 71 yds. into the end zone. With 5:15 left in the 1st quarter, Green's PAT was good and the Cats jumped out ahead 7-0. Eden came up emptyhanded on their next drive when #52 Roanen Barron came up with a Bulldog fumble on the 46 yd. line. The Cats were unable to capitalize on the turnover and the quarter ended 7-0 Cats.

The Bulldogs had the ball on the Wildcat 8 yd. line when senior #25, Kevin Bond came up with a very important backfield tackle and it was 4th & 18. Eden's coaches decided to go for the field goal from the 20, but the kick was no good and the Cats took over on the 20. Two plays later, the Bulldogs ran an interception back to the Cats' 15 yd. line. Although the Bulldogs scored on the next play, the kick for the extra point was no good and with 10:28 in the first half, the Cats held on to a 7-6 lead.

On Eden's next drive, they opened their bag of tricks. On a reverse, they threw a pass and it was 1 & 10 on the Cats' 12 yd. line. Donny Alcorn came up with a backfield tackle and it was 4

& 15 on the Cats' 18. Due to the missed field goal and PAT by Eden's kickers, the coaches decided to go for the Touchdown. The Bulldog runner must have been greased, because he broke tackles and scored. The pass for 2 was good and Eden went ahead 14 to 7. The Cats seemed determined to make things hard when a miscue on the next punt resulted in Stacy Green being unable to get the punt off. His run came up short and the Bulldogs took over on the Wildcat 14 yd. line. A clipping penalty and good defense kept the Bulldogs from scoring. Once again Eden's defense held the Wildcats and they were forced to punt on their next drive. Eden scored 5 plays later, but once again the PAT was no good and the score was 20-7 Eden, with 1:23 before half time. Despite Toby Long's pass interception, the Cats were unable to put any more points on the scoreboard before half time.

On the Bulldogs opening drive of the second half, Wildcat Stacy Green recovered a Bulldog fumble on Eden's 30 yd. line. The Cats were forced to settle for a field goal. Green's 30 yd. kick was good for 3 and with 6:18 left in the 3rd quarter, the score was 20-16. Eden. The Cats defense came alive and Eden was forced to punt. Once again, Wildcat Reil Barron broke tackles and dashed 53 yds. for his second TD of the game. Following a high snap, the pass for 2 points was short and with 4:53 left in the 3rd quarter, the Cats moved within 4 as the score was 20-16. The Cats held Eden on their next drive when Donny Alcorn came up with a backfield tackle.

The Cats took over on Eden's 15, but on the 5th play of the 4th quarter, threw another interception and Eden had the ball on the

Wildcat 38 yd. line. Eden scored on the next play. The PAT was good and with 11:13 left, Eden now led 27-16. The next Bulldog drive was over when Alcorn came up with the fumble recovery and it was Cats' ball on Eden's 46. The Cats were unable to turn the turnover into points when they had a turnover of their own. Eden intercepted another Evans' pass and this one was good for a TD. The PAT split the uprights and with 7:52 left to play, Eden lead 34-16. On the Wildcats next possession, they had another interception and Eden had the ball at the Cats' 44 yd. line. The defense rose to the challenge and Eden was forced to punt. The Wildcats' drive was going good when Wildcat Derrick White scored on a screen pass from Jimmy Evans. The 12 yd. pass play was called back on a penalty and was 3 & 17 instead. Eden once again intercepted the ball and the game was over. Eden 34, Rising Star 16. The Cats are 2-1 for the season.

The Wildcats had two injuries in the game. Senior, Kevin Bond, went out in the 2nd quarter and senior, Stacy Green, was sidelined early in the 4th quarter. Bond was able to work out Monday and although Doc would not let Green work out, he says he definitely plans on playing Friday when the Wildcats travel to Tolar.

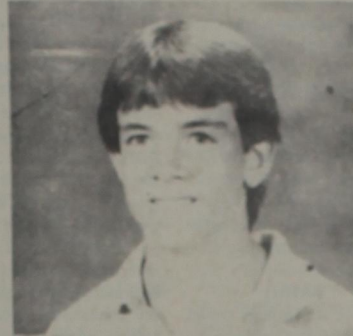

News Briefs

RANGER

This is Homecoming week in Ranger, and a number of activities are underway. Each High School class was given one of the halls of RHS to decorate, and they are certainly colorful. Judging will be done on Wednesday afternoon. Wednesday is also "Western Day" at the school, with Thursday "Dress Up" Day and Friday "Girls Hush" Day. On Friday the Homecoming Pep Rally will be held, with Queen candidates and escorts introduced at 10 a.m. The Spirit of Ranger Band will perform a pre-game show at 7:20 p.m., with the big game between Ranger and Hamilton at 8 p.m. A number of former students of Ranger High School are expected in town for the festivities.

The First United Methodist Church will hold its annual Turkey Dinner on Saturday, Sept. 23 at 11:30 a.m. in the basement of the Church. Visitors for the Homecoming as well as area residents will want to sample this good cooking. The cost of the meal for adults is only \$5, and for children, only \$2.50.

CISCO

The citizens of Cisco are to continue with their voluntary water conservation, it was decided at the City Council meeting last Tuesday. City Manager Mike Moore said even though there is no new water in the lake, this will be the present action. Moore told Council members that if there is normal rainfall for the next three years, then Cisco will do fine. But if there is another year like 1983, then the town will be hurting bad. Moore also told Council members the Texas Water Development Board will have a new water study completed around Oct. 1989. He indicated there is not a short term water source answer avail-

able, but there is a permanent water solution for Cisco. If anyone wants the city to grow, then the city will have to find more water, he added.

A burned-out pickup headlight and two alert city policemen resulted in what is believed to be the largest drug bust in Eastland County. Last Thursday night Cisco Patrolmen Larry Weikel and Don Wylie stopped a pickup with one headlight out, and saw there was a great deal of laboratory equipment in the back of the vehicle. Soon an automobile drove up, and it too had lab equipment. A Wichita Falls man and a couple from Vernon were placed in Eastland County jail, with charges of felony filed later. Also taken into custody were some \$400 to \$500 in cash, and glassware and laboratory equipment. One official guessed there was enough equipment to set up three labs.

Everyone is invited to join the Community Choir, which meets each Sunday at 4:30 p.m. at First Baptist Church, with Doug Bromley as Director. The Choir will perform at 7 p.m. Dec. 3 for "Christmas at the Hilton," and at 7 p.m. on Dec. 4 at First Baptist Church. "We have been blessed for several years by the unity this fellowship creates. Please come and join us," a Choir spokesman said.

Cisco is one of 13 cities in

a WTU Rate Case Appeal. Recently City Manager Mike Moore gave City Councilman a status report on this Appeal. A Travis County District Judge affirmed the Public Utility Commission's order authorizing a rate increase for West Texas Utilities. Moore said the lawyers that the 13 cities used for this case will need to decide whether further appeals should be pursued. WTU has said they need the price rate to buy more gas, but it was brought out that WTU has a brand-new coal-fired plant that the citizens have to pay for too.

Cisco City Council has approved the payment of the cities' share of the cost of the West Central Texas Drug Task Force. City Manager Moore told the Council that the County's share is \$5,325, and Cisco's share is \$1,000. He said the Drug Task Force is the most effective Force ever.

EASTLAND

The event of the year in Eastland - the Old Rip Festival and Parade - is just ten days away. The Parade will begin on Saturday, Oct. 1 at 10 a.m., and wind around the Square. There will be booths to the south and west of the Courthouse with food, displays and games, and a steady flow of entertainment. During the afternoon there will be a Band Contest at Maverick Stadium, and the re-staging of a historical pageant - The First Wedding - at the Majestic Theatre. Fire truck pumper races will be held in front of the Majestic, and there will be an auction near the

booths. Many items are coming in for the auction, which will be conducted by the Wrangler-Belles of Cisco Junior College. The final event Saturday night is the statewide Old Fiddler's Contest at the Majestic Theatre. This is a big event to climax a full day.

A Barbershop show by the Memory Men is being featured at the Majestic Theatre on Tuesday, Sept. 27, beginning at 7:30 p.m. Admission will be \$5 for adults and \$3 for children. BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS
OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

GENERAL ELECTION

NOVEMBER 8, 1988

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for those purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium.

The state comptroller and the state treasurer could decide to trans-

fer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate monies from the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources. The Texas

growth fund will be managed by a board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund and the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."

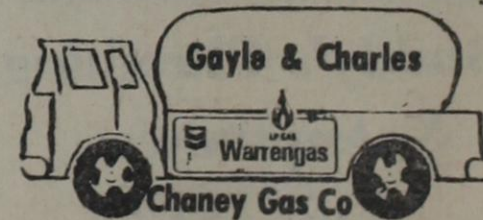



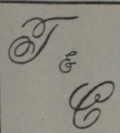

Eastland County will use the following rules and procedures to comply with its responsibility under the Indigent Health Care and Treatment Act.

Application can be requested from County Auditor's Office or at County Judge's Office, Eastland County Courthouse. Assistance in completing the application will be provided if needed. Contact County Judge/Auditor for assistance.

Eastland county will use rules and procedures found in the County Indigent Health Care Program Handbook published by the Texas Department of Human Services. In summary, these are the rules:

1. Application forms must be completely filled out.
2. Verification of income, termination of income, residence, household composition, and resources is required, if questionable.
3. Net income cannot exceed

4. Liquid resources assets cannot exceed \$1000. The equity value of a car greater than \$1500 is counted against the \$1000 limit. Personal property and homestead are exempt assets.

5. Eligible persons must be a resident of Eastland county, and not residing in a hospital district.
