County Livestock Show

This is Eastland County Livestock Show week with the annual show, sponsored by the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association, to be held Wednesday through Saturday at the show grounds northwest of Eastland.

Six hundred and twenty-six animals, not including entries in the dog show, were registered to be shown.

Wednesday afternoon market animals are to be weighed and all livestock must be entered and in their places by 8 p.m. Judging starts on Thursday afternoon with dairy goats and breeding swine. The market swine judging is scheduled to begin at 5 p.m.

The judging starts at 9 a.m. Friday with dairy cattle followed by broiler judging, then breeding rabbits at noon. Market rabbits are to be judged at 1 p.m. Angora goats at 3 p.m., breeding sheep at 4 p.m., and finally market lambs at 5 p.m.

On Saturday morning the Horse Show and the beef cattle judging are to begin at 9, followed by market steer judging at 11.

Animals will be removed from the grounds after noon on Saturday. An Ag Boosters barbecue will be at 4:30 with a drawing at 5:30. Then at 7 p.m. qualifying animals will be auctioned and special awards will be presented.

There are always some tasty concessions whose sales benefit worthwhile groups and there is always a lot to see. There is no admission charge and the young people merit support for their hard work.

Fires Take Toll

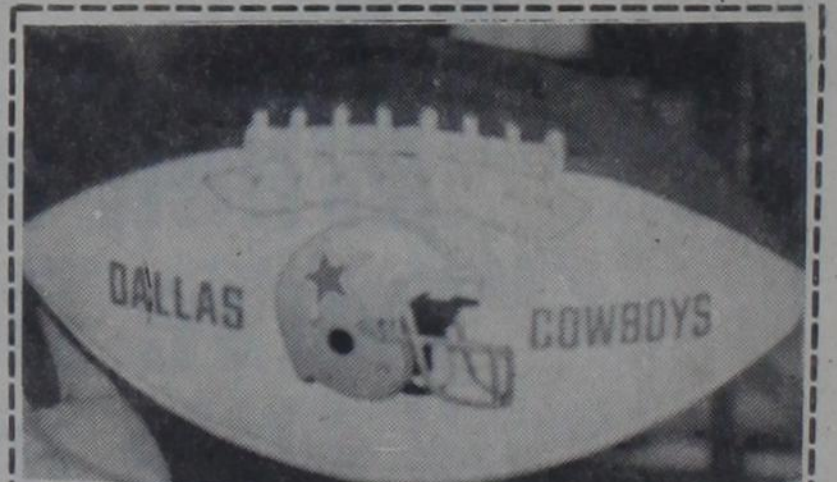
The large number of fires to which the Rising Star Rural Fire Department has responded recently has taken a large toll on the bank account.

"Fishing - How to Bait a Hook"

To go fishing, you may use many things, but the basic necessities are a fishing pole (with string), a hook, and bait.

To bait a hook, take it and hold it very carefully at the point farthest away from the sharp hook. Take a small piece of bait and carefully press it onto the hook. Gently shake the hook to make sure that the bait is on the hook properly. If the bait is on properly, it will not fall off.

Now your fishing pole (with string) is ready to be cast. Before you begin casting, look around to make sure that you do not hit anyone. All that is left to do is sit back, relax, and let the fish come to you.

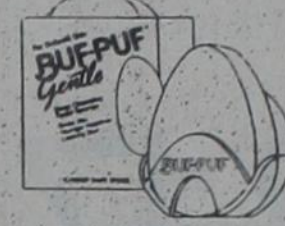

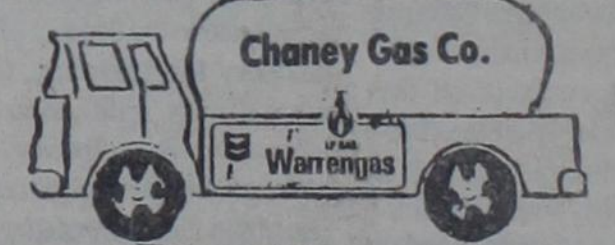
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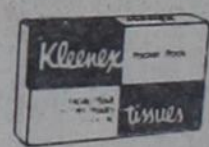
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Fishing Outdoors

Top 50 Texas Largemouths

A few teams of area anglers are fishing the Anglers Choice Team Circuit this year and after the first event one team is setting pretty. Bud Wood and Joe Bob Moore of Cisco made an excellent showing at the seasons opening event on Lake E.V. Spence last month. Joe and Bud finished 10th place which also gives them some excellent points towards the classic to be held in October. Also the team of Steve Pennington and Chuck Burgess rose to the occasion by placing 21st. Chuck and Steve reported having been in the fish but couldn't get those lunkers to bite. Bobby and Tommy Maynard also were present at Lake Spence but were unable to connect with but one fish. This place these gentlemen in 35th place out of a field of 69 teams. Congratulations to these area anglers and good luck in March at Twin Buttes near San Angelo.

The Eastland County Bass Club will be hosting its March club tourney at Lake Leon March 25, 1989. Fishing hours will be 7 a.m. until 4 p.m. Headquarters will be at the State's public boat ramp at Chock-O-Block. For more information contact Chuck Burgess in Olden.

A quarter-century ago, there seemed little hope that anyone would ever break the state record for largemouth bass. H.R. Magee's 13-pound, eight-ounce monster caught in 1943 appeared to be, in fact, unbeatable.

That theory was shot in February 1980 when Jim Kimbell of Pittsburgh set a new state record with a 14-pound, 1 1/2-ounce bass caught from Lake Monticello.

This week another milestone occurred, one that is even more remarkable than Kimbell's feat. Richard McCarty caught a 13-pound, nine-ounce bass from Lake Fork near Quitman on Saturday. McCarty's fish in effect bumped H.R. Magee's fish off the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's list of the state's 50 biggest bass.

As seasoned bass fishermen know, this avalanche of big-bass records is a result of introductions of Florida-strain bass into Texas waters. Although the Florida fish look virtually identical to native (northern) largemouths found in Texas, they have faster growth rates and can achieve larger sizes at maturity.

McCarty's catch, plus three more big bass caught during the past week, bring the TPWD's "Operation Share A Lone Star Lunker" program up to speed, according to Bill Rutledge, chief of the agency's Hatchery Branch.

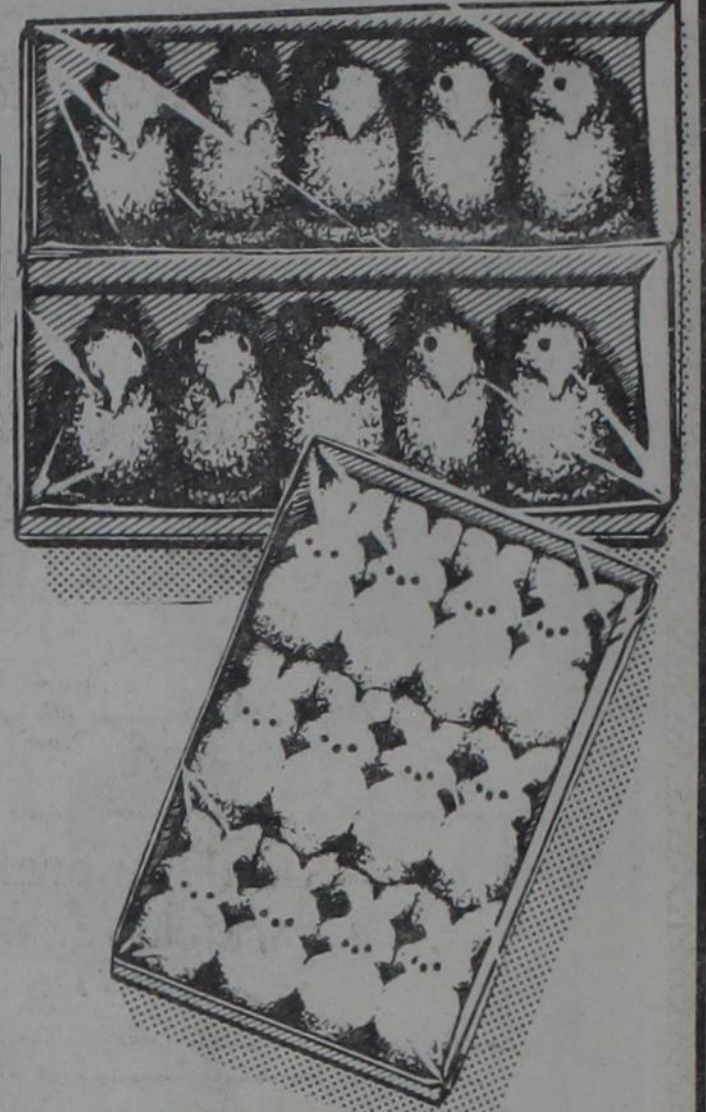
Rutledge said one of the new entries is a 13-pound, 13 ounce bass caught by Richard Todd of Hurst Sunday at 1,500-acre Lake Athens near Athens. Todd's fish was impressive not only in weight, but also because of its length. At 27.75 inches, the fish was a quarter-inch longer than the current state record fish when it was certified in 1986.

The state record bass, caught by fishing guide Mark Stevenson at Lake Fork, weighed 17 pounds, 10.7 ounces.

The other three new lunker bass were caught from Lake Fork near Quitman, which has produced six of the seven bass in the lunker program this year. They are a 13-1 caught Friday by Paul Robinson of Shreveport, La. on a spinner-bait; a 13-9 caught Saturday by Richard McCarty of Alba on a jig and pork rind, and a 13-1 caught by Rick Gore of Arlington, also Saturday on a jig and pork rind.

All four new lunker fish arrived in the Tyler Fish Hatchery in good condition, according to David Campbell, superintendent. Under the Lone Star Lunker program, 13-pound-plus largemouths are loaned to the department's hatchery for spawning, then normally are returned to the lake alive. Participating anglers get free fiberglass replicas of the fish, donated by the Texas Taxidermy Association.

Section 33.06 of the State Property Tax Code requires the following information concerning the Deferral of Certain Property Taxes to be publicized.

Property taxes on the residence homestead property of those persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older may be deferred or abated if they satisfy the requirements of the State Property Tax Code.

The property owner must occupy the residence homestead on which the tax is being levied or on which a suit has been filed for collection of delinquent taxes.

To obtain a deferral, the individual must file with the Chief Appraiser for the Appraisal District in which the property is located an affidavit; stating that they are sixty-five (65) years of age or older and that they do own and reside in the house that the tax is being levied on.

If a suit has already been filed by a tax unit, the individual must file with the court in which the suit was filed the same type of affidavit.

By filing the affidavit with the property authority, the payment of taxes or forced collections through suit is postponed until the person filing the affidavit no longer owns and occupies the property as a residence homestead. Although the tax is deferred; it is not cancelled. A tax lien remains on the property and penalties and interest continue to accrue during the period that the collect of taxes is deferred.

For information concerning the tax deferral or abatement, contact the Eastland County Appraisal District. The office is located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse and the telephone number is 629-8597.

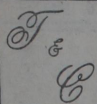

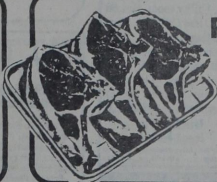
