There are monsters at Caddo and dinosaurs at Cross Plains.

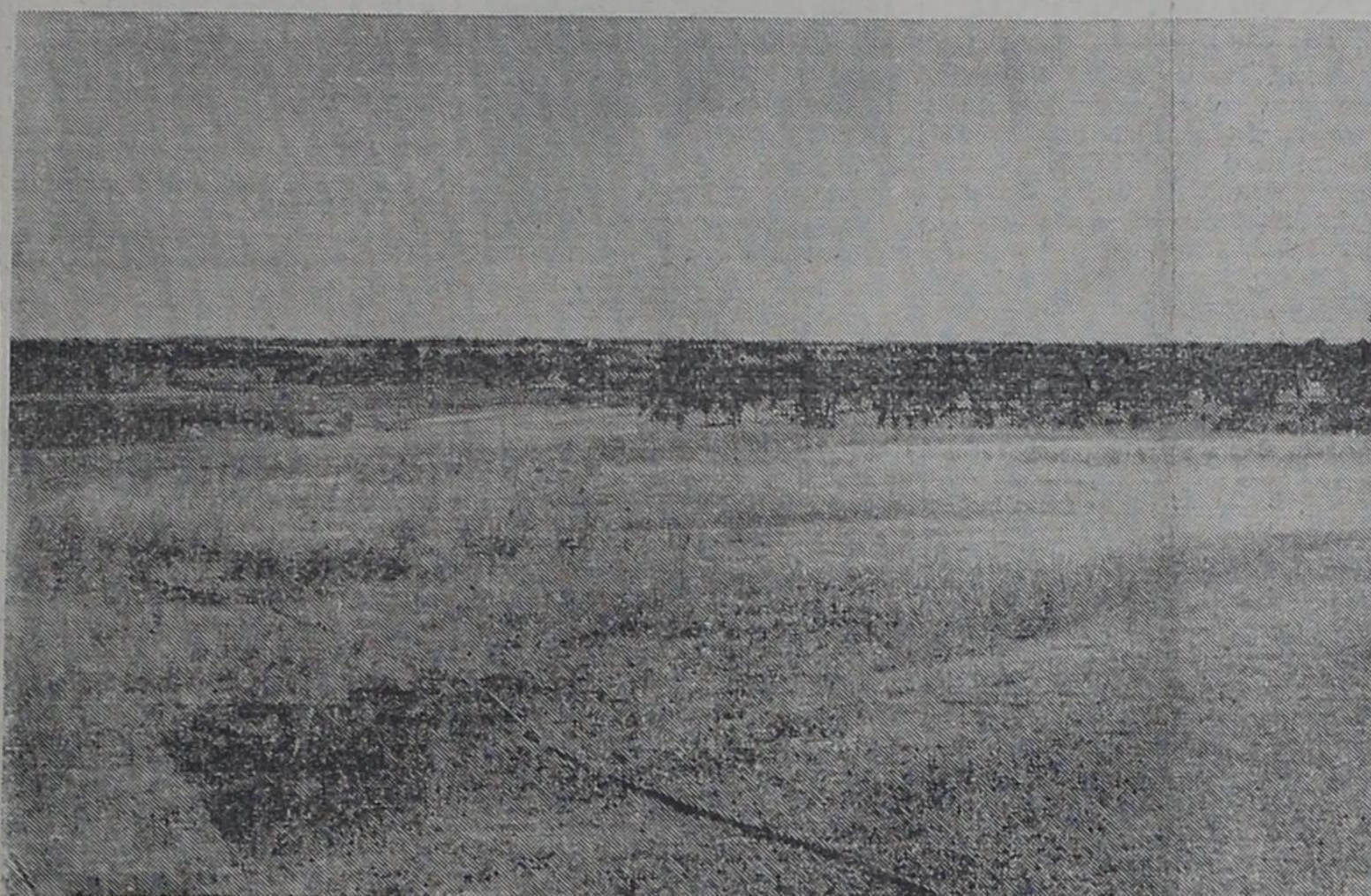

## Site of Proposed Recreation Center At Lakewood Country Club At Pioneer Between Rising Star and Cross Plains



This view from the No. 1 green of the Lakewood Country Club at Pioneer shows a portion of the 70-acre site which would be developed into an all-round recreation center for the people of this section under a program now in planning



by the Lakewood Club. Lake Phil-Pe-Co is to the left and the nine-hole golf course extends northward along its shores. Plans envision an all-family recreation center with swimming pool, picnic facilities, golf, tennis, miniature, golf, etc. Preliminary approval has been given by the Farmers Home Administration under the FHA's rural recreation program. A formal loan application will be submitted as soon as planning and cost estimates can be developed, the committee said.

## Lakewood Planned As Family Play Area

What was for many years one of the most popular resort areas in this section, with an excellent golf course, will be restored and broadened into a varied recreation center for thousands of people in Eastland, Callahan and Brown Counties under a project now being developed by the Lakewood Country Club. It covers the old Phil-Pe-Co site between Rising Star and Cross Plains.

The program, made possible by the policy of the Farmers Home Administration of making long term loans for the development of rural recreational facilities, has already passed its first hurdle. An application has been approved by the county FHA committee, composed of Oscar Schaefer of Rising Star; Olen B. Rone, chairman, Gorman, and Frank H. Parks, Star Route, Carbon.

This approval, Mr. Schaefer explained, means that the club has been given the green light to go ahead with planning and cost estimates for submission of a formal loan application. Included in this planning will be an inspection by the FHA. When the committee approves the application the loan will become available and actual development can take place.

Administrator of the county FHA program is Homer S. Cole of Eastland under whose supervision the project, if approved, will be developed.

The preliminary planning and application was announced this week by the Lakewood directors.

Details of the proposed development, while they are not yet firmed up, envision an all-around recreational area appealing to all members of the family and involving golf, swimming, fishing, hunting, picnicking, tennis miniature golf and similar sports.

A large swimming pool designed and equipped to conform to the highest standards would be built utilizing water from Phil-Pe-Co Lake which borders the club property and to which the club has full access and easement for fishing and other recreational activities so long as the resort is maintained as a non-profit organization.

Docking facilities for fishing and boating would be constructed. In addition a new club house and lounge would be built, tennis courts and a miniature golf range installed and a large picnic area equipped with tables, barbecue pits and other facilities for outdoor cooking and eating.

The primary improvement would be in the golf course, which would be entirely rebuilt and landscaped. The 70 acres owned by the club would be transformed into a golfer's paradise, the fairways shaped into rolling avenues of wide green, cleared of weeds and brush and irrigated from a new water system laid to bring lake water under strong pressure to all parts of the course.

The nine greens and tees, likewise would be rebuilt to plans to be designed by golf architects, and the equipment of the course would be brought up to the standards required by the modern day sport.

Wooded areas of the 70 acres would be landscaped, brush cut, trees trimmed and the whole large tract so developed and landscaped that it can be mowed from boundary to boundary.

If completed within the design developed by the club committee, the Lakewood club would be one of the most attractive and best equipped family recreation areas in this part of the state, providing recreation opportunities to Cross Plains, Rising Star, Pioneer, May Sipe Springs, Williams, Burkett, Okra, Nimrod and other rural communities in this section — facilities available only at this week. The public is invited.

## Non-Planted Peanuts Won't Lose Acreage

Farmers who have not planted at least 75 per cent of their 1964 cotton and peanut allotments due to extreme drought conditions or other conditions beyond their control may file written requests that the allotment provisions be waived, according to an announcement by Jesse G. Meredith, Eastland County office manager of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Requests concerning cotton allotments must be filed not later than Sept. 15, and peanut farmers must file by Nov. 1, Mr. Meredith said. Questions about the provision can be answered at his office.

Feed grain farmers were reminded that in order to qualify for price support and diverted acreage payments, the feed grain base or permitted acreage may not be exceeded on any farm in which they have an interest. They must also be within their conserving base on participating farms, Mr. Meredith added.

Substitution between wheat and feed grain will be permitted for 1965 in order to give greater planting flexibility. Mr. Meredith said that it would be necessary to establish an oat-rye base for farms requesting substitution.

The 1965 Community Committee election will be held on Sept. 8. Nominations by petition are now being accepted through Aug. 19, it was reported.

The Saturday evening program was planned by Walter Henderson, and Earnest Whitaker showed that he has lost none of his ability at "playing, singing, picking and fiddling."

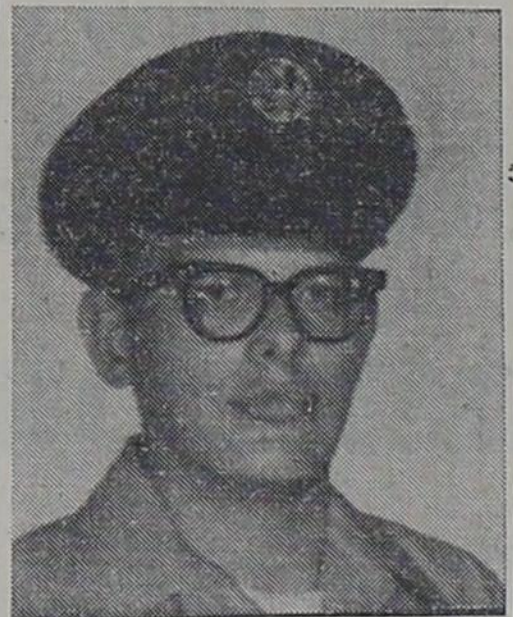

## Editorials

## Vital State Right Destroyed by Supreme Court

The following remarks of Cong. Omar Burleson before the committee on the judiciary of the House of Representatives, speaking on the proposed amendment to the Constitution of the United States to guarantee the right of any State to apportion one house of its Legislature on factors other than population, appear to us extremely pertinent in view of the arrogant usurpation by the United States Supreme Court of powers to which it is not entitled:

"Mr. Chairman, Members of the Judiciary Committee, I wholeheartedly associate myself with the able presentations made by the Dean, Mr. Patman, and other senior members of our Congressional delegation from Texas.

"Mr. Chairman, it is my personal feeling that it was not the business of the Supreme Court to assume jurisdiction over Congressional redistricting, and especially over apportionment of State Legislatures. More specifically, their decision that both houses of a bicameral State Legislature should be apportioned on population only is unthinkable. Be this as it may, such was their decision and the question as to their assumption of this constitutional power becomes academic.

"The point now is to try to get the 'half loaf' relief, yet that which is perhaps the most fundamental portion of the overall issue.

"The resolution before you, authored by Cong. Patton, is the most reassuring approach, since

it seemingly is the opinion of most who are informed on the subject, that a statutory provision would also be vitiated by the United States Supreme Court. To do less, Mr. Chairman, leaves a condition inimical to the orderly operation of State government and, in fact, to the orderly operation of our entire system of government from the court house in any county in these United States to the United States Capitol. Intemperate statements will not avail us anything other than to give expression and relief of ones feelings. I restrain myself from doing so, but it is not easy.

"This appears to be the best remedy and the one which can restore a vital right to the States, taken away by the Supreme Court's decision. I need not reiterate the able arguments of my distinguished and able colleagues who have already spoken. I would simply re-emphasize that time is of the essence and the seriousness of the situation demands expedient action. I cannot believe that the Congress will permit the decision of the court to go unchallenged and the the necessary number of State legislatures will fail to ratify at their earliest opportunity this amendment, if presented to them.

"I trust, Mr. Chairman and Members of the committee, that you feel the urgency and the exigencies of the situation to act promptly and judiciously in this which in my opinion, is the most important effort now before the Congress."

## It's the Law in Texas

Court actions fall into two classes — civil and criminal. In the civil case which takes up most of our court time, a person or a business, for example, may seek damages or "relief."

A car accident may give rise to a civil suit when you sue for damages claiming that the driver of the other car is to blame for the harm you suffer. The same accident could become a criminal action if an officer picked up the driver, for example, for driving while intoxicated. he civil suit covers private offenses or "torts"; the criminal action, public offenses or crimes.

Centuries ago the courts sought to limit court actions. If the facts failed to fit exactly into well-worn pigeon holes, the courts could do nothing for the party who was wronged, no matter how much he suffered or how much property he lost.

As against this old common law system, a new system — equity — came about a few centuries later. "Equity" gave a remedy where the "law" gave none. Under the law generally you could not sue to prevent somebody from continuing to harm you; equity gave you the right to an "injunction" — a court order, halting the wrong on penalty of court punishment.

It could prevent someone from trespassing on your property.

Under the "law" you could not compel a person to carry out exact terms of his contract. You could merely sue him for the money it cost you. But under "equity" you can get "specific performance," that is, the court can order a contractor, for example, to sell you the exact piece of land you contracted for, or old master painting you paid for — and not something "just as good."

And so now private court actions are civil suits — which come under the law or under equity, or criminal actions which the public, through the district attorney is a main party.

Centuries ago two kinds of courts heard law and equity cases respectively, but in Texas today our District Courts can try both kinds. In fact they may also hear felony criminal cases. By cutting down on the number of cases, our system of justice has simplified court

machinery and made it that much more useful to the people.

## Three Year Check Of Social Security Records Advised

All persons who have not checked their social security earnings record since July 1961 are reminded that now would be a good time to do so, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager of social security in Abilene.

He went on that there is an initial accuracy of 93 per cent in crediting the wages and self-employment income each year of over 75,000 persons. Many of the remaining two per cent have their earnings credited as a result of correspondence, but Tuley feels the individual's being interested enough to check his own record at least every three years is a big help in reaching the current 99.6 per cent accuracy figures.

The most common error that delays or prevents proper crediting is the omission of the social security account number on employers' tax returns, followed closely by the error of entering the number incorrectly or incompletely on such tax returns. Some self-employed persons fail to reply to letters requesting account numbers omitted from their individual tax returns. Tuley said that his office was at this time investigating some 300 errors in both types of tax returns for 1962 and 1963, ranging from items of small amounts to those of several hundred dollars.

Since all retirement survivor, and disability benefits are computed from the individual's earnings record, uncredited earnings could lower, or even prevent, payments on claims, he added. A special post card designed for speedy checking of one's social security account will be sent to all inquirers who write or call Social Security Administration in Abilene.

tances of 20 to 30 miles now.

The project, said the Lakewood committee — headed by R. D. Needham as chairman — is made possible through a program of the Farmers Home Administration designed to improve recreational facilities in the rural areas and thus increase the attraction of rural living as compared to urban life, develop the economic opportunities existing in potential rural areas, and add to the value of small town property and living. Loans are made for long terms at a low rate of interest.

The program is available only to communities of less than 2,500 population.

Recreation, it was pointed out, is rapidly becoming one of America's most important and profitable industries as millions of Americans, released from long hours of drudgery by modern technology, turn to the outdoors and to various sports and hobbies to occupy their leisure.

By making it possible for small rural communities to develop their potentials in this respect, the FHA is not only adding to living, and property and business values in the small communities, but it is helping to resist an urban trend in which much of the real values in the American way of life are being lost, it was said.

There is no better location for the development of a resort area as contemplated than the Lakewood Club property, it was said. Such a development would add immeasurably to the appeal of Rising Star and Cross Plains as communities of homes where families may live and children be raised in an atmosphere of healthful, wholesome recreation.

"If we can put our program through as planned it will help to take our boys and girls off the highways, keep them at home and provide them with the kind of recreation they want," said Mr. Needham. "More than that it will give our older people opportunity to enjoy themselves in a healthful and happy way and increase the living appeal of this section for families in retirement. Besides it will bring in a great deal of new business which we need so badly."

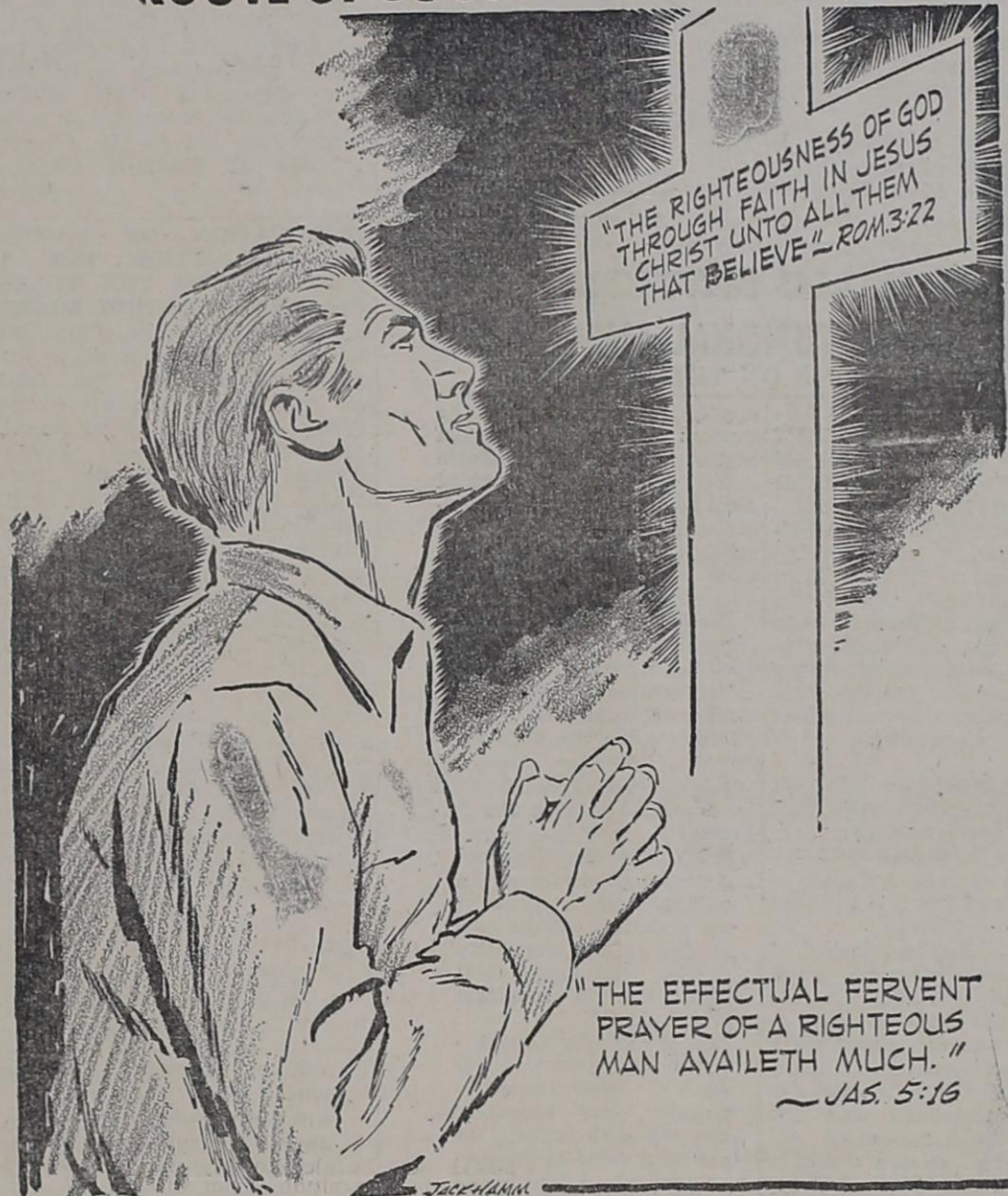

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT, NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT**

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.**  
**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6** proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.  
**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:  
"Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties according to their scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."  
Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:  
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."  
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."  
Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

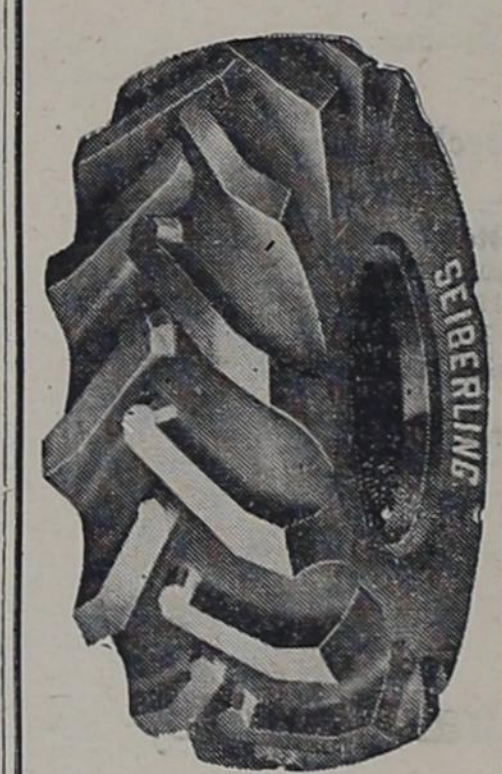

"Silly Putty," a new play item for children, is causing serious concern for parents and the National Institute of Textile Dyeing and Finishing. The institute of Drycleaning indicates that parents are finding the soft plastic smeared on lamp shades, ground into rugs and left in pockets. Some youngsters can't bear to part with the stuff and even take it to bed with them. So it becomes attached to the sheets. But the Drycleaning Institute has come up with a remedy and has advised member drycleaners how to cope with silly putty problems. The solution: See your dry-

cleaner. He can dissolve silly putty from a fabric. He used the same method with which he removes nail polish stains.

Preparation stains that have yellowed and set by aging frequently cannot be removed by simple methods such as rubbing a detergent into the spot and washing or by using a mild bleach. On washable white or color-fast fabrics these stains can usually be removed with a stronger bleach treatment. One good method is to sprinkle sodium perborate, or a powdered bleach containing it, directly on the stain, then dip in very hot or boiling water. The stain should be removed in a few minutes. Then rinse well. Do not use this method on wool or silk.

One caution: Do not use a chlorine bleach on your wash and wear garments — this causes them to "yellow."
