A big portion of the front page of The Rising Star this week is taken up, and rightly, with pictures of the magnificent new Church of Christ sanctuary. The new church will be formally opened next Sunday.

It is an edifice of which any community can be proud, and Rising Star certainly has reason to be grateful to the members and their minister for the contribution thus made to the civic and religious atmosphere of the community.

The building of a church is a project of the highest idealism, religious primarily, but no less aesthetic or practical. It is one thing in our money-mad society that is not done for money; it is done with no hope of reward except in better people, better living in terms of true living values, and a higher moral and religious atmosphere.

Looking at what happened in Austin this week, and only a few days ago in Chicago—fantastic orgies of mass murdered to which the human mind sometimes and inexplicably escapes in revolt against the tensions of modern living—you are impressed with the need of a becalming influence upon the torturing anxieties of our day.

These violent outburst suggest in startling terms the pressures under which we live and they are more frightening in their warning that the most stable minds are, unknowing, but a step from disintegration.

It is a recognition of this, perhaps, which has inspired the building of so many beautiful and reverent edifices and caused so many people to worship in them in an age when materialism and the far adventures of science would appear to discredit a religious faith. As the horizons of the mind broaden so does the conception and need of God.

When men build a church they look outward; when they worship in it they look into themselves. Each is a healthful and rewarding experience.

The people of the Church of Christ have challenged all of us with a demonstration of the fact that they have faith not only in what they profess but in their community and in themselves.

May Water Plant Given Initial OK

Tentative approval of a \$45,000 loan from the Farmers Home Administration to finance a plant for the May Water Supply Corp., organized to supply water to customers in the community of May, was received this week.

The money would be used to provide a water supply and serve, initially, 44 customers, each of whom will pay a \$50. fee for connection. Total cost of the system, designed by Johnson, Fontaine and Co. of Palestine, will be \$46,000. Fees of the charter customers will make up \$1,500 of this amount.

The money will be used to drill a well, install an overhead storage tank holding a two days' supply, a small treatment plant, and distribution lines and meters.

Although approval of the Washington office of the REA has been received, it will be some time before construction will start since easements must be obtained and final approval given by the state office.

Don Montgomery is the Brown county REA supervisor, and O. A. Burnett, May merchant and stockman, is chairman of the governing committee of the May corporation. Serving with him on the board are W. L. Young, Mrs. Grace Glenn, and Vic McCallie.

The first year the minimum charge will be \$6 per month, but Montgomery said this would be lowered after the first years operation and new customers are added.

The system is designed to accommodate a 20 per cent growth potential before any additional work needs to be done.

Besides water for homes, fire hydrants will also be installed.

McDonald to Go To WTCC Seminar

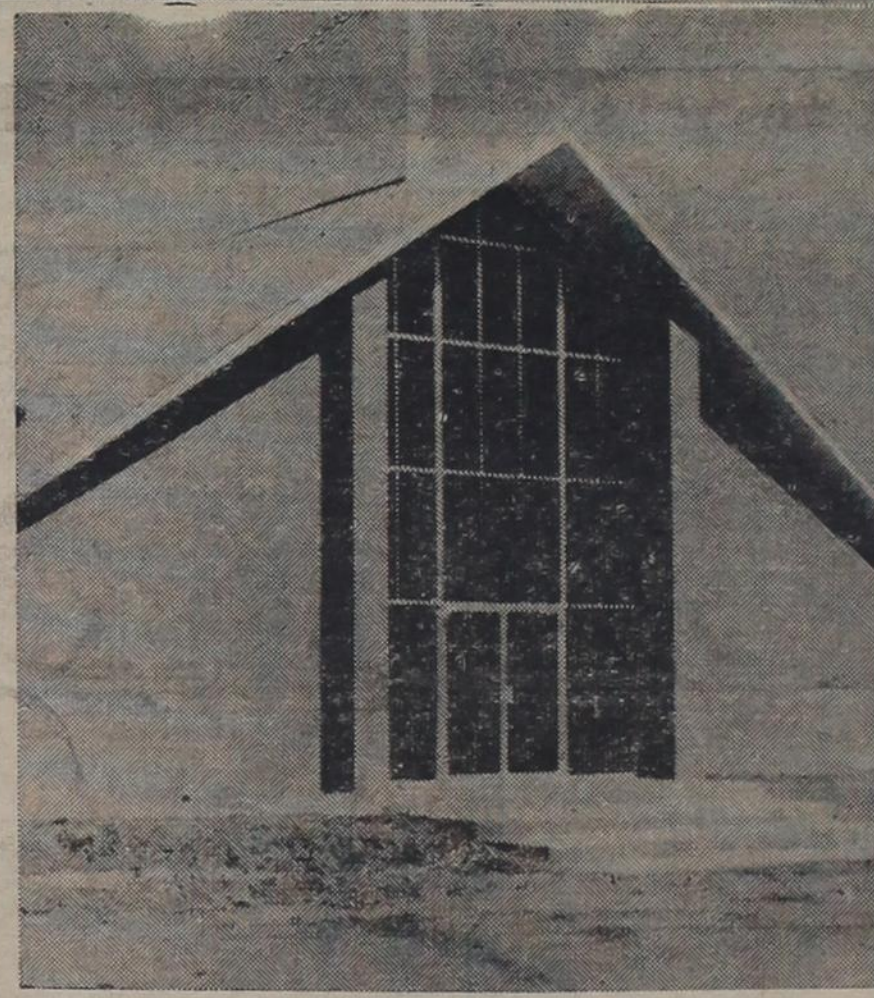
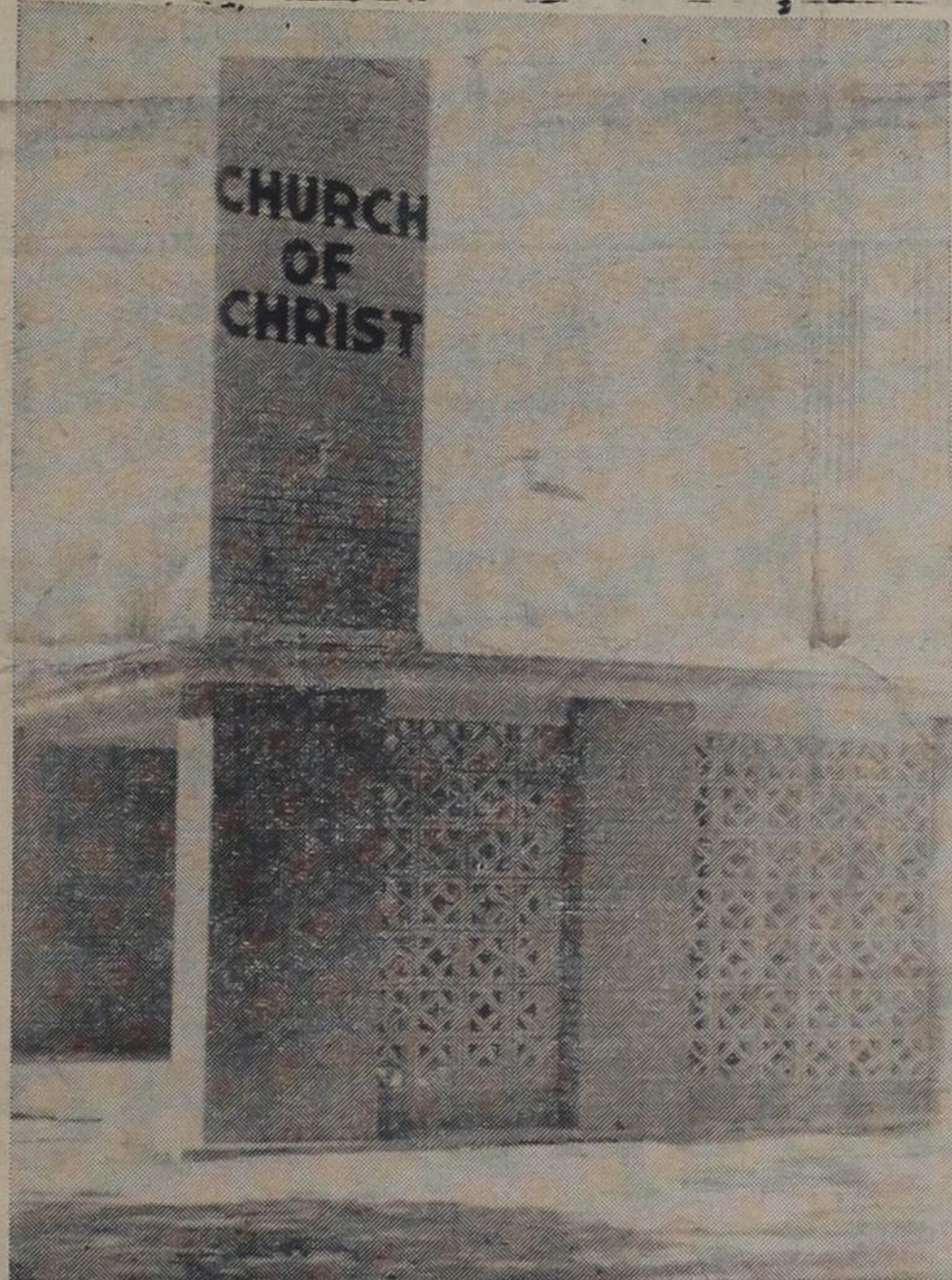
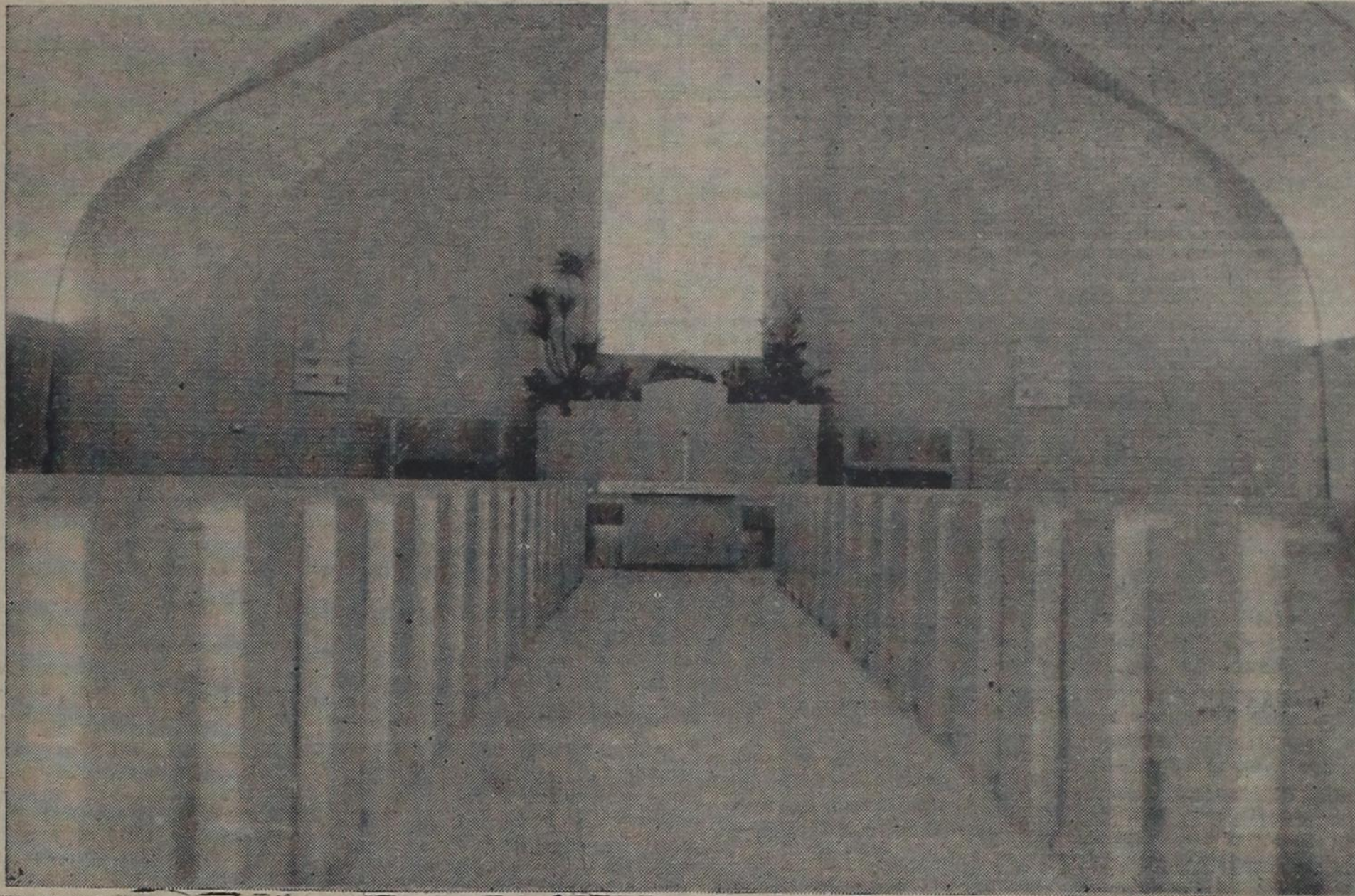

New Sanctuary Will Be Opened Sunday

The magnificent new house of worship of the Church of Christ in Rising Star will be formally opened in services at 11 a. m. Sunday, August 7.

There will be a singing at 3 p. m. and during the afternoon the new church will be open to all who may wish to inspect it, H. McDonald, minister, has announced.

Built at a cost of \$40,000—and even that figure was made possible only by contributions of labor on the part of many members of the congregation—the new sanctuary conforms in style and appointments to the most advanced principles in modern church architecture.

The cathedral styled roof, supported on exposed interior arches, is indirectly lighted, air conditioned in summer with Frigidaire cooling, centrally heated, carpeted and equipped with cushioned pews to seat more than 400 worshippers in comfort.

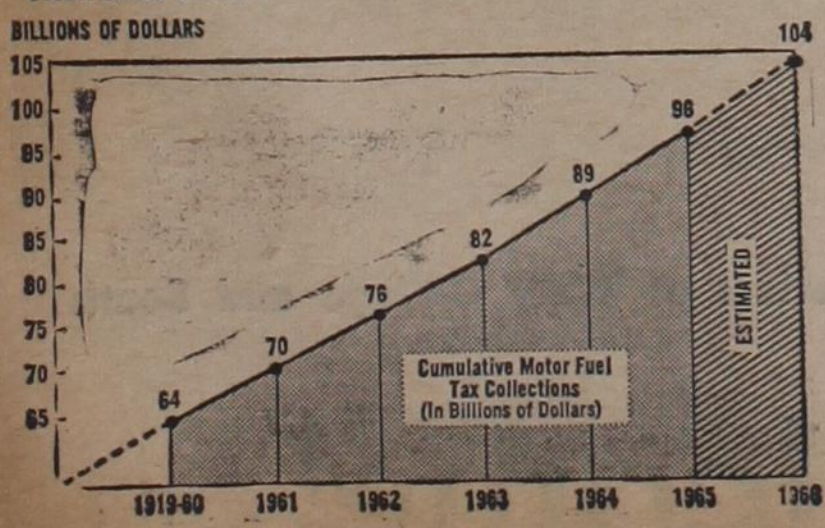

MOTOR FUEL TAX COLLECTIONS HIT \$100 BILLION MARK

State and federal governments have collected an estimated \$100 billion in motor fuel taxes since the first levy was enacted in 1919. By the end of 1966, the total will be about \$104 billion. Collections are running \$20.5 million per day. The graph shows how rapidly the cumulative total has risen since 1960.



As It Looks From Here

WASHINGTON, D. C. —THE VICE PRESIDENT of the United States was recently quoted as saying in New Orleans that if he lived in conditions such as some of those he saw, he would be in revolt, too.

IN PHOENIX, ARIZONA A Mr. John Binkley, Deputy Director for Field Services of the U. S. Civil Rights Commission, said that the Commission "not only sanctioned civil disobedience, but encourage it."

HE SAID THE COMMISSION responded to pressure and that the squeaking wheel got the grease. This is a neat summing up of morality surrounding some of the present programs. The implication is clear. What is being said is that conscience or fairness has nothing to do with their activities, but only politics, power, and pressure.

ANOTHER FEDERAL EMPLOYEE lends his encouragement to riots and protests by saying, "Nothing ever came about in the Civil Rights movement by being nice. It takes direct and militant action. I have little patience for diplomats."

REMARKS BY HIGHEST officials in our government seem to give encouragement and promise to marches, riots and boycotts. They are saying, in substance, that unless the Federal Government continues with its direct handouts, riots and looting can be expected. What is taken to be a suggestion is followed in a great many places.

EVEN SECRETARY OF DEFENSE McNamara in a recent speech in Canada, which had nothing to do with Defense, suggested that poverty drove people into the arms of the Communist. He suggested that, to head off social upheaval which provides Communism with its entree into undeveloped nations, requires an extensive Foreign Aid Program.

THIS HAS BEEN the central theme of our extensive and far-flung Foreign Aid since its inception. The results are not supported by the record. It is a curious fact that some of the poorest countries in the Western Hemisphere have the smallest internal Communist movement. Contrarily, some countries best off, such as Italy and France, have the largest. According to

to the logic followed by Mr. McNAMARA, Cuba, the first Latin American nation to go Communist should also have been the poorest. It was, in fact, the richest.

IT HAS BEEN related time and again that there is an "irrefutable relationship" between poverty and social disorder, paving the way to Communism.

FROM STATISTICS AN ATTEMPT is constantly being made to show that since 1958 almost all the national violence in the world has occurred in the "very poor" nations of the Southern Hemisphere. Statistics neglect however, to show that these same are also areas where the political system has been thrown open to violence by the abrupt withdrawal of Western power in obedience to the Liberal Anti-Colonialism concept; where the populace has been relentlessly subjected to the influence of revolutionary leaders, some developed under the very program we advocate; and the ideal that their brand of democracy should be exactly as our own.

THE RECORD IS MORE clear that Communist successes profit but indirectly, if at all, from material causes. Evidence is abundant that the leading modern revolutionaries are not of the poor, but are intellectuals plotting Utopia.

THE CORE OF THE left wing in our country is not made up of the poor and downtrodden, but those of considerable intellectual standing and of material means, who make over our institutions.

BACK TO THE disturbances in this country, we can be sure that they are a vehicle for every dissident group and individual, including the Communist. In fact there is evidence that Moscow and other Communist captious

In the last two years, the winning car in the Indianapolis 500 has finished the race without changing tires.

When tires will stand up for 500 miles at a 150 mile-an-hour average on the Speedway, it's a real tribute to their staying qualities.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section, Section 51-d, so as to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of the performance of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen.

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of the performance of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen."

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 51-d to read as follows:

"Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of the performance of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November,

1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or full-paid firemen who suffer violent death in the course of the performance of their duties as law enforcement officers, custodial personnel of the Texas Department of Corrections or as full-paid firemen."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties using voting machines, the above provision for voting, for and against this Constitutional Amendment, shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machines for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

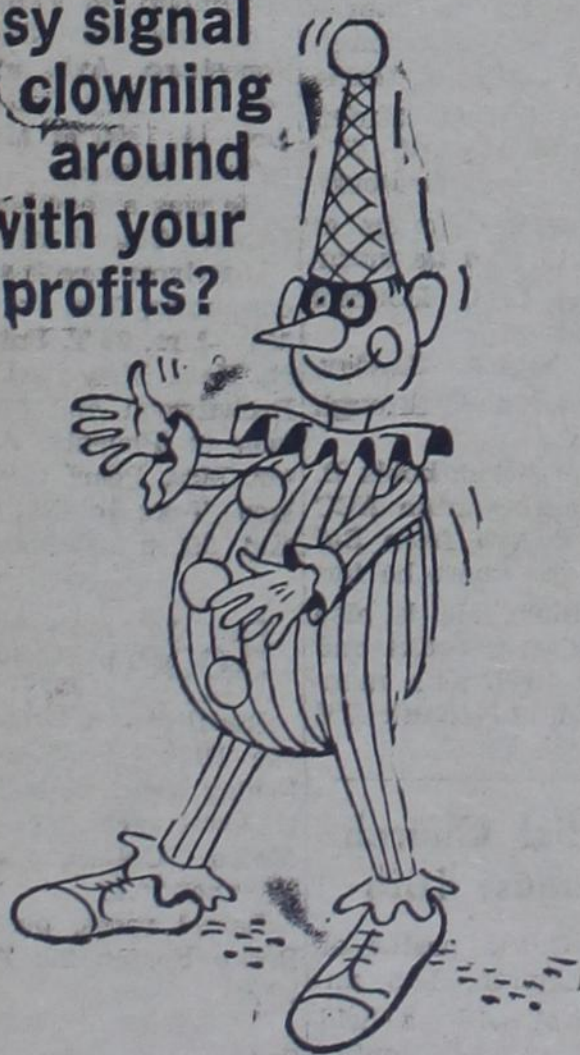

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24 proposing an amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section thereto, Section 2a, to provide for voting on electors for President and Vice President, and on all state-wide offices, questions or propositions by persons qualified to vote in this State except for meeting county or district residence requirements, and to provide for voting on electors for President and Vice President by otherwise qualified United States citizens who have moved into or out of the State preceding a presidential election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding a new Section thereto, Section 2a, to read:

"Section 2a. (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide a method of registration, including the time of such registration, permitting any person who is qualified to vote in this State except for the residence requirements within a county or district, as set forth in Section 2 of this Article, to vote for (1) electors for President and Vice President of the United States and (2) all offices, questions

or propositions to be voted on by all electors throughout this State.

"(b) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide for a method of registration, including the time for such registration, permitting any person (1) who is qualified to vote in this State except for the residence requirements of Section 2 of this Article, and (2) who shall have resided anywhere within this State at least thirty (30) days next preceding a General Election in a presidential election year, and (3) who shall have been a qualified elector in another state immediately prior to his removal to this State or would have been eligible to vote in such other state had he remained there until such election, to vote for electors for President and Vice President of the United States in that election.

"(c) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Constitution, the Legislature may enact laws and provide for a method of registration, including the time for such registration, permitting absentee voting for electors for President and Vice President of the United States in this State by former residents of this State (1) who have removed to another state, and (2) who meet all qualifications, except residence requirements, for voting for electors for President and Vice President in this State at the time of the election, but the privileges of suffrage so granted shall be only for

such period of time as would permit a former resident of this State to meet the residence requirements for voting in his new state of residence, and in no case for more than twenty-four (24) months."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment permitting persons qualified to vote in this State except for the residence requirements in a county or district to vote for Presidential and Vice Presidential Electors and for all state-wide offices, questions or propositions, and permitting citizens of the United States recently arrived or departed from the State to vote for Presidential and Vice Presidential Electors."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment permitting persons qualified to vote in this State except for the residence requirements in a county or district to vote for Presidential and Vice Presidential Electors and for all state-wide offices, questions or propositions, and permitting citizens of the United States recently arrived or departed from the State to vote for Presidential and Vice Presidential Electors."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

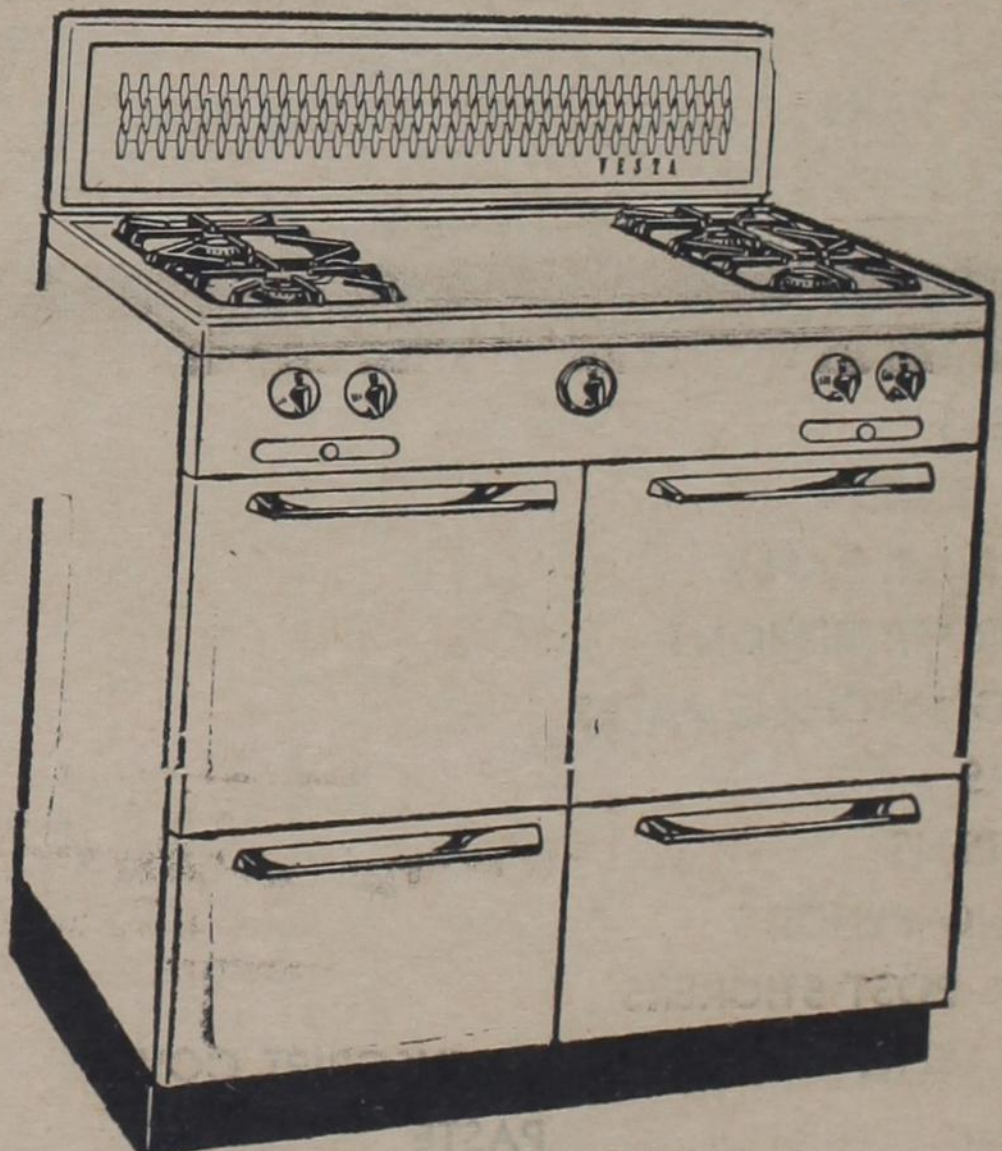

Miss Jennie Alford has the measles, and Leslie Boase, who has been in a tussle with the measles for several days, was able to come to own Monday.

A number of Rising Star young folks were seen passing through the "Cockle Burr Flat" community last Sunday, driving.

Tom Deens drove around here for several days with his buggy wheels on backward, that is the hind wheels were on the front and the reverse.

We don't know whether Tom had "wheels in his head or not" that caused the trouble.

Ernest Adams was lucky enough to get to accompany Miss Virgie Sheffey to Okra to Sunday school at that place Sunday evening. Keep staying, old boy; all indications are that your prayers will be answered.

Sid Smith left Wednesday of this week for Victoria, Texas, to see his sister at that place, he having received a telegram that she was sick and crazy as the result of the death of her child.

Mrs. Ida Ingram got poisoned on carbolic acid the other day, but she is better now.

Will Tyler from De Leon is the Macedonia school teacher this fall. School opened up Dec. 17th, the latest for a good while, in fact in a good many years. Attendance will be small for the first two or three weeks on account of the cotton that has not been picked yet.

To the late Levi McCollum, father of E. B. (Bulis) McCollum of Rising Star, goes the honor of naming the community of Okra.

Mr. McCollum and his neighbors in the area felt the need of a post office in their settlement.

In October, 1898, Mr. McCollum went to Sipe Springs and called on the postmaster, E. B. Dewey and mentioned the fact that his community needed a post office badly.

Mr. Dewey, a very accommodating man, said he would draw up a petition for the hoped-for post office. Mr. McCollum accepted the offer. After the necessary papers were drawn up, Mr. Dewey said, "What are you going to name it?" He was asked to leave the name blank until Mr. McCollum could go home and talk to the neighbors. "No, we've got to have a name on these papers before they can be sent in," said Mr. Dewey.

The men proceeded to select a name. The Postal Guide with all names of the post offices in the State listed, was used as a guide to make sure the name

selected had not already been used as a post office name.

The matter was left up to Mr. McCollum. The first thought was to name it for one of his children, and he suggested Bessie, the name of his oldest daughter, but after looking in the guide there was a Bessie listed. Then Vera was mentioned. On looking again, Mr. Dewey said, "Nothing doing. There's a Vera, too."

That about settled the idea and while looking through the list of names in the Guide, Mr. McCollum noticed an office named 'Beet' and that directed his thoughts to the names of vegetables and as Mr. Dewey old him to select as short name as possible, he happened to think of the name of a vegetable that had only four letters, and he asked, "How about Okra?" The postmaster immediately wrote the name and remarked, "That would be the sickest name you could give your post office."

The name was submitted for approval and granted. The post office was called Okra.

The post office was discontinued several years ago but the community still goes by the name of Okra, and is one of the most prosperous communities in the county.

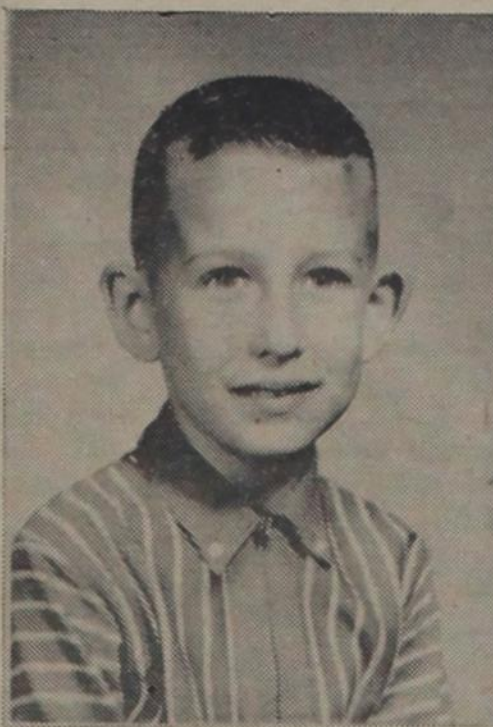

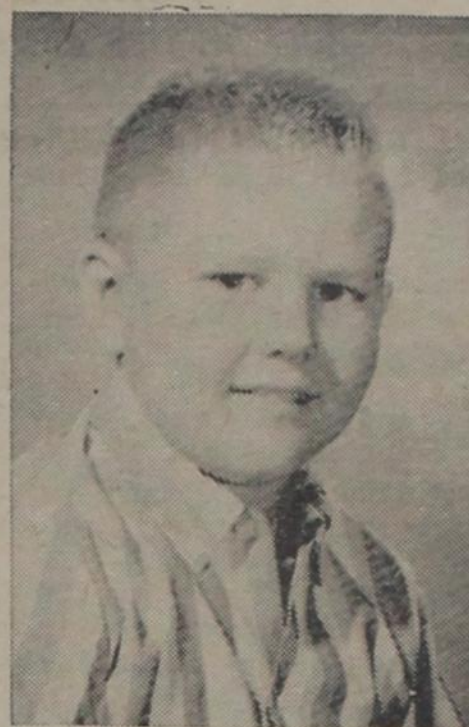

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER ELEVEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-d, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, declaring state policy regarding optimum development of water reservoirs; providing for the use of the Texas Water Development Fund under such conditions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law in the acquisition and development of storage facilities and any system of works properly appurtenant thereto; providing for the sale, lease or transfer of such facilities under General Laws; providing for long-term contracts for water storage facilities; authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds by the Texas Water Development Board upon a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected members of each house; providing that anticipatory legislation shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory character; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot; and proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 49-d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 49-d. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the State of Texas to encourage the optimum development of the limited number of feasible sites available for the construction or enlargement of dams and reservoirs for conservation of the public waters of the state, which waters are held in trust for the use and benefit of the public. The proceeds from the sale of the additional bonds authorized hereunder deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund and the proceeds of bonds previously authorized by Article III, Section 49-c of this Constitution, may be used by the Texas Water Development Board, under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law, including the requirement of a permit for storage or beneficial use, for the additional purposes of acquiring and developing storage facilities, and any system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment and transportation of water from storage to points of treatment, filtration and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods; provided, however, the Texas Water Development Fund or any other state fund provided for water development, transmission, transfer or filtration shall not be used to finance any project which contemplates or results in the removal from the basin of origin of any surface water necessary to supply the reasonably foreseeable future water requirements for the next ensuing fifty-year period within the river basin of origin, except on a temporary, interim basis.

"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law the Texas Water Development Fund may be used for the conservation and development of water for useful purposes by construction or reconstruction or enlargement of reservoirs constructed or to be constructed within the State of Texas or on any stream constituting a boundary of the State of Texas, together with any system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment and/or transportation of water, by any one or more of the following governmental agencies: by the United States of America or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by the State of Texas or any agency, department or instrumentality thereof; by political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the state; by interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party; and by municipal corporations. The Legislature shall provide terms and conditions under which the Texas Water Development Board may sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any reservoir and associated system or works

which the Texas Water Development Board has financed in whole or in part.

"Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe by General Law, the Texas Water Development Board may also execute long-term contracts with the United States or any of its agencies for the acquisition and development of storage facilities in reservoirs constructed or to be constructed by the Federal Government. Such contracts when executed shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as state bonds issued under the authority of the preceding Section 49-c of this Constitution, and the provisions in said Section 49-c with respect to payment of principal and interest on state bonds issued shall likewise apply with respect to payment of principal and interest required to be paid by such contracts. If storage facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment.

"The aggregate of the bonds authorized hereunder shall not exceed \$200,000,000 and shall be in addition to the aggregate of the bonds previously authorized by said Section 49-c of Article III of this Constitution. The Legislature upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue all or any portion of such \$200,000,000 in additional bonds herein authorized.

"The Legislature shall provide terms and conditions for the Texas Water Development Board to sell, transfer or lease, in whole or in part, any acquired storage facilities or the right to use such storage facilities together with any associated system or works necessary for the filtration, treatment or transportation of water at a price not less than the direct cost of the Board in acquiring same; and the Legislature may provide terms and conditions for the Board to sell any unappropriated public waters of the state that might be stored in such facilities. As a prerequisite to the purchase of such storage or water, the applicant therefor shall have secured a valid permit from the Texas Water Commission or its successor authorizing the

acquisition of such storage facilities or the water impounded therein. The money received from any sale, transfer or lease of storage facilities or associated system or works shall be used to pay principal and interest on state bonds issued or contractual obligations incurred by the Texas Water Development Board, provided that when moneys are sufficient to pay the full amount of indebtedness then outstanding and the full amount of interest to accrue thereon, any further sums received from the sale, transfer or lease of such storage facilities or associated system or works may be used for the acquisition of additional storage facilities or associated system or works or for providing financial assistance as authorized by said Section 49-c. Money received from the sale of water, which shall include standby service, may be used for the operation and maintenance of acquired facilities, and for the payment of principal and interest on debt incurred.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the issuance of an additional \$200,000,000 in Texas Water Development Bonds and providing for further investment of the Texas Water Development Fund in reservoirs and associated facilities."

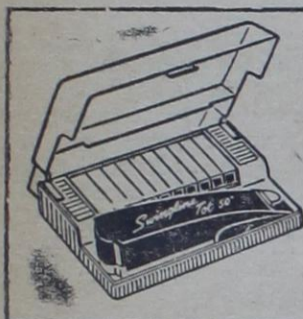

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

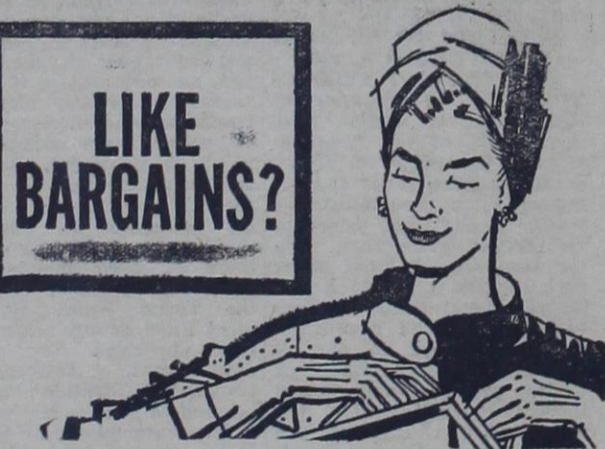

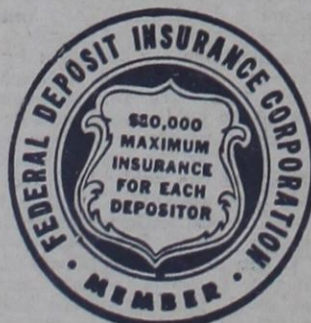
