older, interested in renting one of these one bedroom apartments may contact any one of the board members. There are 10 regular and one handicap units available and ready to be occupied.

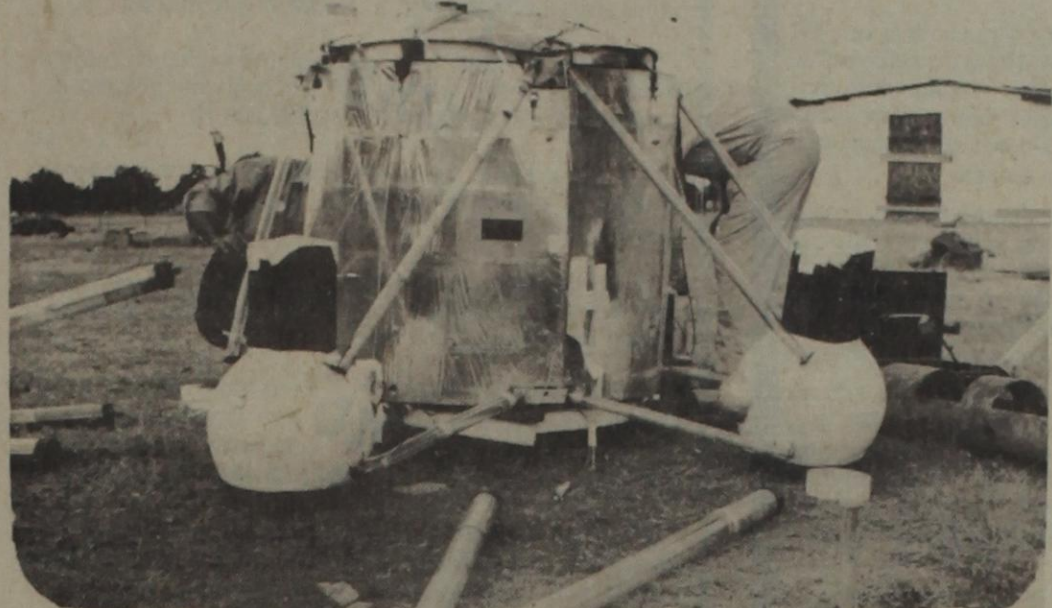
A caretaker and maintenance personnel will be available at all times.

Weather Balloon Lands In Rising Star



If you were looking up in the sky Friday afternoon, you probably noticed a rather odd sight. The National Scientific Balloon Facility, located in Palestine, Texas had released an experiment collecting atmospheric balloon system at approximately 10:06 a.m. and the balloon and its information gathering systems dropped to earth at 4:12 p.m. in a pig pen on the property of Claudie Fox, located in the northeast part of town. It narrowly missed a large hole and a number of sows with baby pigs.

A two man crew was on hand immediately at the site, as they had been following the

course of the balloon since launching early that morning in Palestine, in a pickup. The apparatus took approximately 35 minutes to descend, which was being held by a parachute. It had reached altitudes of 137,000 feet.

This particular experiment was conducted for Dr. James Anderson of Harvard University. The research information will be used for further studies of the atmospheric sciences and measured constituents of the upper atmosphere including studies of the ozone layer. The three module unit was approximately 320 feet in diameter.

Mr. Ralph Harjue with the National Center of Atmospheric Research stated that they have launched a total of 1210 balloons in their fourteen years of operation and have never experienced any damage to houses or other surroundings.

In addition to the Palestine operation, the National Scientific Balloon Facility conducts scientific ballooning operations from various remote sites in the U.S. and several foreign countries. The facility is recognized on the international level as being one of the most advanced organizations of its type in the world.

6. The demerit system will be used.

7. If a student is expelled three points will be deducted from the six weeks grade for each day expelled. Expelled students must bring a parent or guardian to re-enter school.

8. Students who disrupt class will be sent to the Principal's or Superintendents office for disciplinary action. Class time and work lost for discipline will be made up. Students will report to the class for make up time at 3:00 p.m. Failure to report will be considered same as cutting any other class.

9. Dress Code: Boys should have their hair and sideburns well groomed. The hair should be neat and clean with length not over the eyes, ears, or collar. This policy prohibits beards, mustaches and sideburns below the lowest part of the ear. (Documented medical reasons shall be the only exception). Any dress which is determined by the administration to be disruptive is prohibited.

10. Cutting class or leaving school without checking out through the office shall result in disciplinary action.

11. Expelled students will not take part in any U.I.L. or other extra-curricular activity for the week expelled.

The School Board and Administration made a few policy changes at the August Board Meeting. Some new student policies are:

1. Student parking will be across the street in front of the High School. Bus loading zone will be at the south end of the High School (between the High School and the north end of the tennis courts).

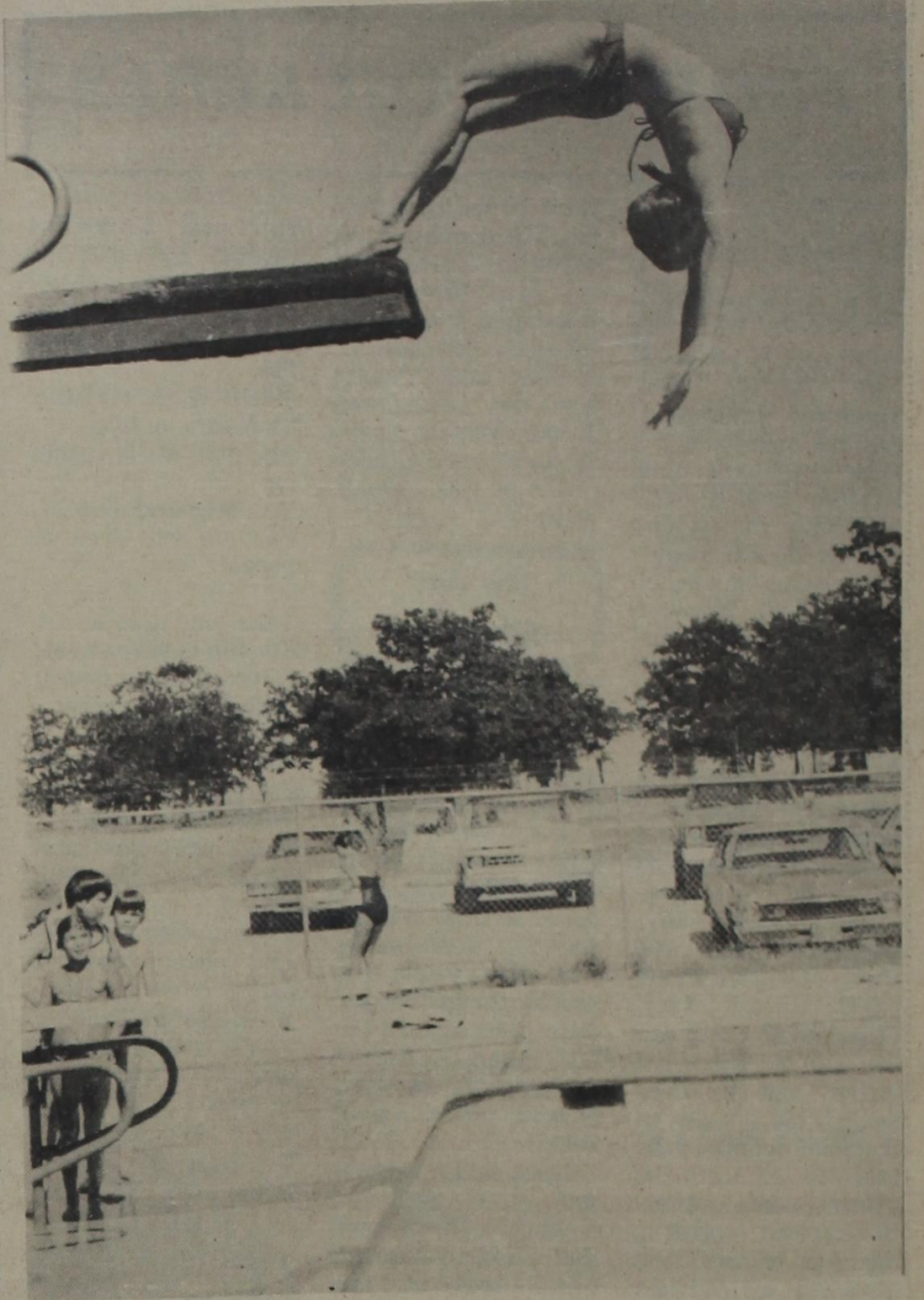

Pioneer News

Mrs. A.C. Halsell

The problem of drought is timely. How thankful we would be if rain would come, bringing cooler weather, as well as an end to the drought.

Politics is timely, also. There is so much rhetoric along that line, what I might say would only add to the hodge podge of opinions. To say the least, I was chagrined, annoyed and angered by the last Convention. The only comfort I get, is that it was only a convention. What really happens, at the polls in November, is the important thing.

Rather, in behalf of the art of reading, I will give a brief book review. Paul Horgan's "The Return of the Weed", impressed me as being semi-classic. By that I mean simple enough to keep a high school pupil reading and classic enough to live.

All have observed how the weed soon replaces anything that man may have built, or tended, once he ceases to care for it. That, with man's freedom of choice, with its favorable result, or its unfavorable result, is the theme of all six stories in the book;

stories of the Southwest, timed in the sixteenth and seventeenth and eighteenth centuries. The first story, "The Mission" is timed, 1650; place New Spain, (Southwest America); Father Puig-y-Castan's thirty year endeavor to bring the Christian religion to Indians; amid the havoc caused by the destructive raids among the Indians; of soldiers; the subconscious fear for his own life, these and other negative forces were overcome by his abiding faith and an undaunted determination to build a church, to work in the fields and to succeed as a missionary among them.

The church was finished, worship was established. This and his new love for the Indian, all came to naught, when the Indians shot him full of arrows and burned the two-towered church. As were the walls of Jerusalem when Nehemiah came to rebuild them, so did it become with the church. The buttresses remained only to be covered with the weed.

A story of vivid characterization, Time 1878; Place, a ranch in New Mexico, owned by one of "The Brothers," rich and growing richer from cattle-stealing. That is the second story. With Warren Boyer on a cattle drive to market, the brother, Perce, was challenged for thievery by a newcomer, in a gunbattle assault. Perce was killed. Warren never returned; perhaps living somewhere on his brother's money. The house and grounds became grown over with vines and weeds and was looked upon with suspicion, by people who came neat it.

In "The Hacienda", the author's most memorable story, Don Eliazoria reveals his weakness in losing the Hacienda, all other things he had owned, as well as becoming addicted to drink, by dropping a tear, as he said, to a less lovable human failure, "Do you know there is just a little hill there where it was, my house. The old trees are still there.....The house is just dirt, like the ground.....When I was ten years old, I was on my birthday, I planted a tree in the patio."

The other stories are "The Mansion", "The Tank", "The Star". You read these stories for the interest you, will find if not to see

and I quote, "But if the battle between man and nature is unequal, if the weed will return sooner or later, when its master has dropped his knife, we must yet admit that to do battle with the luxuriant forces of his destiny, gives him the strange authority of daring; some whip of the spirit whose crack is a sound later men can hear and sometimes envy and often obey; taking the past with them, the great stream of man's memory, rising in a source as mysterious and common as all life, and flowing forever outward to nourish time."

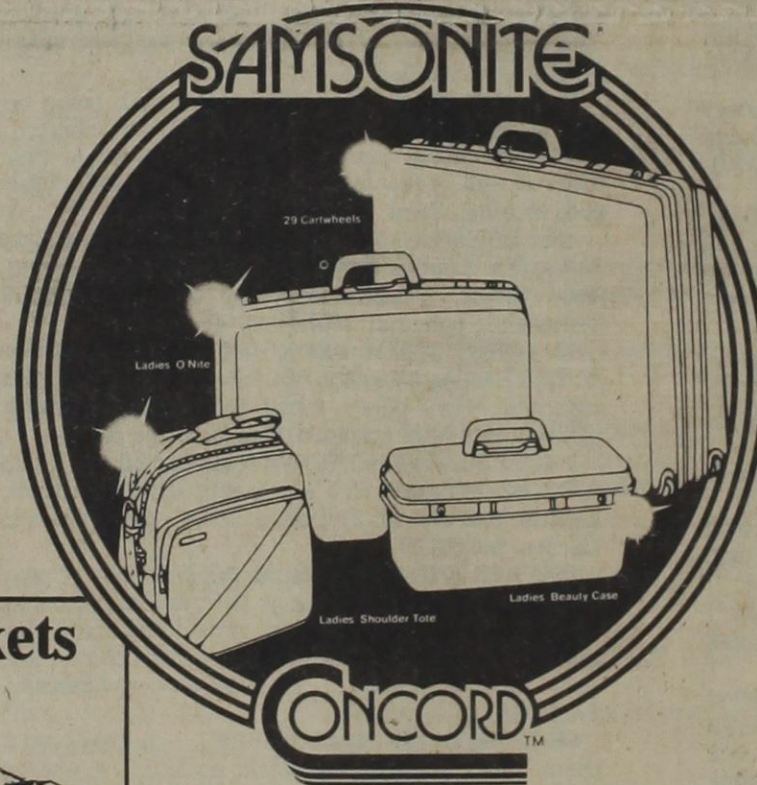

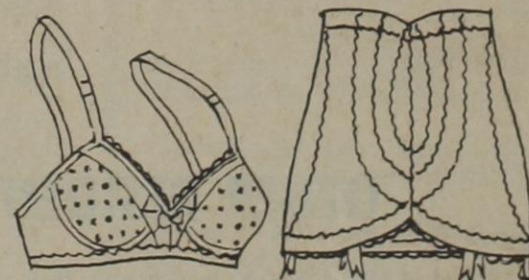
