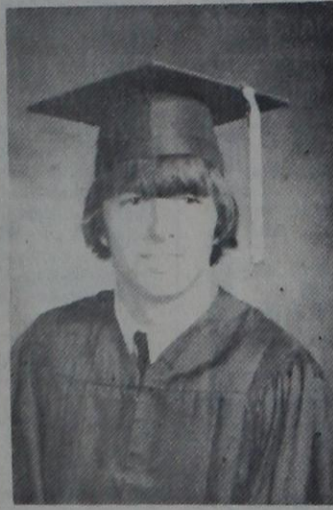

If a small child suddenly dashed out into the street in front of your car, COULD YOU STOP IN TIME? Many people say, "I can stop on a dime."

Students of Rising Star High school will have an opportunity at 1:00 p.m. Friday, May 8, 1981 to see for themselves the distance required to stop a car in an emergency, while participating in a Farm Bureau sponsored traffic safety program, according to Frank Gray, Drivers Education Instructor.

The program, in two parts, will be given under the direction of Ben Bullard, Assistant Safety Director, Texas Farm Bureau.

During the first part of the program Mr. Bullard will discuss Texas traffic safety, in addition to outlining procedures to be

followed during the second part demonstration.

The group will then be directed to Hwy. 183 in front of the school to witness driving tests at 20, 30 and 40 M.P.H.

Mr. Bullard rides in his specially equipped car with each of the drivers. The safety belts are used during each test. During each test, the equipment signals to driver to make a panic stop and marks that exact spot on the street. Two more spots are marked; (1) where the brakes are first applied and (2) where the car comes to an exact and complete stop. Students and teachers will get a "panorama view" from their safety vantage point. Student assistants, using a steel tape, measure the reaction and braking distances in exact feet and inches. Following each stop test and measurement, Mr.

Bullard will announce the results over his auto public address system for each member of the audience to mark their personal card.

This public service traffic safety program, presented before high schools across the state since 1957, is being brought to Rising Star under the sponsorship of the Eastland County Farm Bureau.

CONTROL OF CUT-WORMS

This time of year insect problems seem to come along one right after another. One current problem which is troubling local homeowners is Cutworms. Cutworms are larval forms or caterpillars which develop into a variety of moths. Several species exist in Texas.

Cutworm larvae usually appear as dingy, grayish-black smooth "Worms" that curl into a ball or tight "C-shape" when disturbed. The larvae have chewing mouth parts and damage plants by their feeding activity.

Cutworms attack almost every garden vegetable, fruit tree, lawn grass and ornamental plant in the home garden and landscape. Seeding plants

are particularly vulnerable to Cutworms since the main stem is tender and can be easily severed.

There are four distinct groups of Cutworms based on habitat and feeding habits: 1) Subterranean Cutworms, 2) Tunnel Dwellers, 3) Surface Feeders, and 4) Climbing Cutworms. Subterranean Cutworms feed almost entirely below the soil's surface on roots or underground stems.

Tunnel dwellers build and live in tunnels. This Cutworm cuts tender plants at the soil surface and pulls them into the tunnel to devour them.

Surface feeders are most active during the night when they cut off small plants at or near the soil surface and feed on the plant. During the day the worms either hide in the soil or under mulch or surface trash.

Climbing Cutworms feed on the foliage, stems and fruits of many plants. Like other Cutworms they feed primarily at night and hide in leaf litter or under debris or rocks during the day.

Cutworm control techniques include many cultural practices. Gardens should be turned under and

kept weed-free during the off-season. Because Cutworms seek hiding places during the day, one may take advantage of this by placing boards in the garden as traps. Cutworms congregate beneath the boards and can easily be destroyed by hand.

Check Seeding Rates, Skip-Row Planting

Due to the increased cost of planting seed, peanut growers need to give particular attention to identifying optimum planting rates as well as evaluating skip-row planting.

"Many peanut growers are concerned about the high cost of planting seed," points out Dr. Ashley Lovell, area economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "Planting seed prices at \$1.25 per pound represents 20 percent of the projected total cost of production per acre, assuming a 45-pound per acre planting rate for dryland Spanish peanuts. That's double the percentage cost for seed last year."

With these high seed costs, Lovell encourages growers to take a hard look at "Traditional" planting rates to determine if optimum yields could be achieved through adjusting planting rates. "For instance, if 45 pounds of seed per acre is sufficient for optimum dryland yields, then planting the traditional 60 to 70 pounds is economically indefensible," notes the economist. However, the final decision must include numerous factors, such as germination,

which determine the stand of mature peanut plants.

As far as solid vs. skip-row planting (two rows in and one out) is concerned, Lovell says limited research by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Stephenville shows lower yields with skip-row plantings, which also implies lower production costs. These reduced costs result from reduced planting seed rates, foliar fungicides, insecticides, allotment lease, custom drying and interest on operating capital.

"Skip-row Spanish peanuts have a projected preharvest cost of \$158 per acre compared to \$188 for solid plantings. This lower preharvest cost as well as a potentially higher income over variable costs from skip-row peanuts offers possibilities for Central Texas farmers, who may at least wish to evaluate the practices on a small-scale basis," believes Lovell.

Adjusting the economic optimum seeding rate per acre and evaluating the skip-row planting pattern can help growers cut costs without sacrificing profits, contends the economist.

Grain Embargo Lift Good For Texas Farmers

Lifting of the U.S. grain embargo against Russia is good news to Texas farmers, maintains an economist in marketing and policy with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Dr. Ron Knutson pointed out that with the wheat harvest less than two months away, this move should provide added market strength at harvest.

"In the short to intermediate term, it should mean grain

price increases in the range of 5 to 7 percent. The longer term impacts, while more important, are more uncertain," Knutson, who earlier had served as a member of President Reagan's transition team, he said.

"Under the long-term agreement, if the Soviet Union wants to buy over 8 million metric tons of wheat and feedgrains, it must consult with U.S. officials," he added.

This process of consultation or negotiation will now begin, and involves:

1. Additional quantities of wheat and feedgrains that we will allow the Soviets to purchase through Sept. 30.

2. Development of a new long-term trade agreement specifying

minimum purchase by the Soviets over a period of up to five years.

3. The quantities the Soviet Union is advised it can purchase after Sept. 30, over and above the minimums specified in the long-term agreement.

"Another uncertainty is just how much grain the Soviets might want to buy from the U.S. after the embargo experience. Feedgrains and soybeans should be no problem in this regard. World supplies are tight, and we supply about 80 percent of this market," he said.

Wheat is more uncertain. Argentina, Australia and Canada already have trade agreements with Soviets. The French also want to sell. The wheat market will like-

ly be the most difficult to recover--but the most important to Texas since wheat is our largest grain source of income," Knutson added.

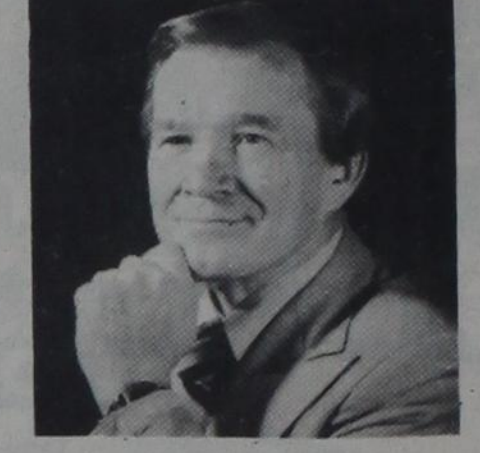

Be Careful of 'Work-at-Home' Offer

COLLEGE STATION-- Tempted by a "work-at-home" offer?

Be careful - or proceed with caution - or create your own "work-at-home" business, advises Linda McCormack, a family resource management specialist.

Mrs. McCormack is on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

In many "work-at-home" cases, the potential "employee" or "investor" (you) is asked to send a membership or registration fee to a company "for more information" or "to obtain the materials necessary to start the job," Mrs. McCormack notes.

Too often, these "job materials" and "investment secrets" turn out to be simply promotional literature - not work, she says.

If you want to make money at home, and if you have an idea of what you want to do, place your own advertisement in the paper, the specialist says.
