It's gardening time again and many home gardens in Eastland County are getting a good start. We have noticed a lot of people have already set out onion plants. Some are thinking about weed control. We have had several requests this last week concerning chemical herbicides that may be used effectively in the garden.

Weed control in the home garden depends on garden size, kinds of vegetables being grown, and types of weeds.

Weeds (any unwated plants) compete with vegetables for soil moisture and nutrients. They have extensive root systems and flourish under a variety of conditions.

Effective control of weeds depends on how they spread. Crabgrass and other annual weeds survive by seeds. Perennial weeds such as bermuda grass and johnson grass survive both by seed and underground plant parts.

Seeds are transmitted by wind, water or animals. They may also reach the garden in improperly prepared compost manure or other organic matter added to the soil.

Some weed seeds remain viable in the soil for years. They and underground storage parts contain stored food reserves to support weed seedlings until they emerge or are exposed to sunlight.

Herbicides or chemical weed killers are the least desirable home garden weed control. While they are a necessity in commercial crop production to reduce labor and achieve maximum yield, there are not enough chemicals with a wide enough margin of error to be used safely and successfully in home gardens. Also, most herbicides are effective on specific weeds in specific crops, and most gardens contain a variety of vegetables. Furthermore, herbicides are expensive; a garden can cost \$70 or more.

Homemaker's Tips

The best method is "hoeicide" or using a sharp hoe. Most gardens are small enough to be weeded with a hoe or by hand pulling. This is more effective when done regularly and when weeds are small.

Mulching makes weed control easier. A three inch mulch layer (after it settles) controls annual weeds from seed and preventing many weed seedlings from reaching light. Also, those that do push through are easier to pull.

Several types of mulches can be used. Grass clippings work well, but make sure they do not include weed seeds. Paper can also be used effectively. Black plastic is effective except against nutgrass which readily penetrates it. Clear plastic is ineffective since it allows light to reach soil.

Planting graden crops so as to avoid excessive space between plants also helps control weeds. Open areas readily become infested with weeds.

Good management, prior planning and a little hard work all add up to an effective weed control program. The fewer the weeds, the better the yield!

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Direct Deposit Is Easy Way To Handle Checks

It is easy for people to get social security or supplementary security income checks to arrange to have their payments deposited directly in a checking or savings account, Glyn Hammons Abilene district manager said recently.

All a person has to do is to contact his or her financial institution--bank, savings bank, savings and loan association, or similar institution, or Federal or State chartered credit union--and ask for a direct deposit

form SF-1199. Completing the form only authorizes deposits in the account. Only the beneficiary or his or her authorized representative can make withdrawals.

It is a good idea for the person to ask the financial organization how it will handle and report check deposits and if there is any service charge.

Direct deposit has several advantages, Hammons said. Among them:

No standing in line to cash or deposit checks.

Money is available immediately in the person's account even when he or she is away from home.

No check cashing problems because the money goes directly into an account.

No worry about losing a check or having it stolen.

Drillsite is 1,240 feet from the north and 1,400 feet from the west.

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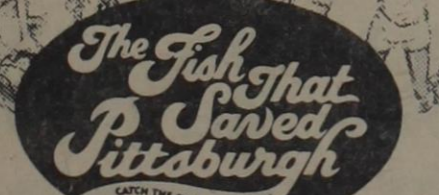
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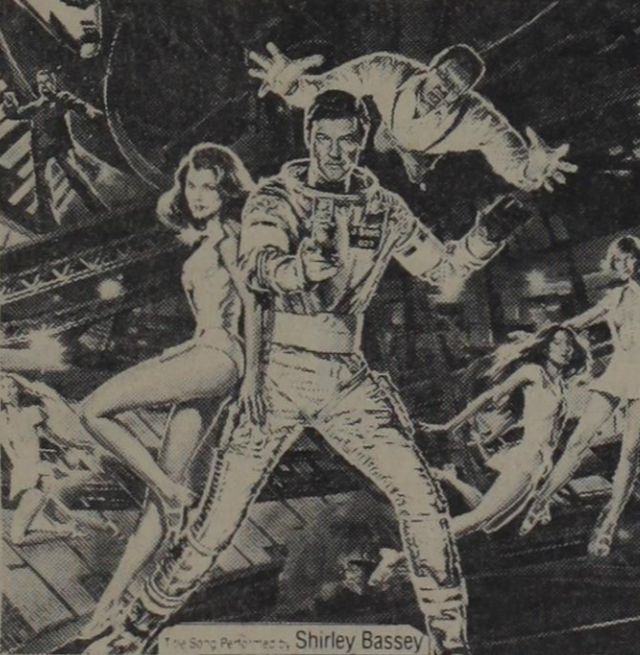
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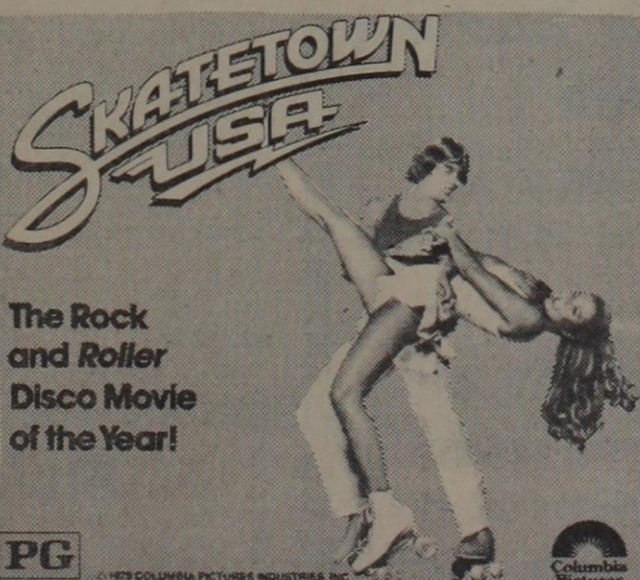

Bob Glasgow Running For 22nd District Senate



Stephenville District Attorney Bob Glasgow today announced his candidacy for the 22nd Senatorial District.

Glasgow, 38, will seek the Democratic nomination to fill the Senate seat vacated by Tom Creighton.

"It's a new year...a new decade...but we still face the same old problems of higher taxes and constant government intrusion in our lives and work," the Stephenville native told an audience of friends and supporters, "I am asking the people of the 22nd Senatorial District for the opportunity to find new solutions to those problems."

Glasgow cited his seven years as District Attorney as evidence of his dedication to serving the people of the area. "Our office has striven to insure that the guilty were punished; our lives and property protected; and that the people of the district were well served," he said. He stated he would use the same energy and dedication to serve his people in the State Senate.

Glasgow graduated from Stephenville High School, Tarleton State University, and the University of Texas School of Law. He served as an administrative assistant to Governor Smith for two years before enter-

ing private practice in Stephenville.

In October, 1972 Glasgow was appointed District Attorney for the 29th Judicial District. He was elected to that post in November 1972 and reelected in 1976.

Bob Glasgow, 38, is a native of Stephenville and has spent most of his life in North-Central Texas. He was raised in Stephenville and graduated from Stephenville High School in 1960. He served three years in the United States Army before returning to attend Tarleton State University.

During his college career, Glasgow served as class president, student body president and twice was named to Who Who's in American Colleges and Universities. He received a bachelor of arts degree in 1967 and earned a degree from The University of Texas School of Law in 1970.

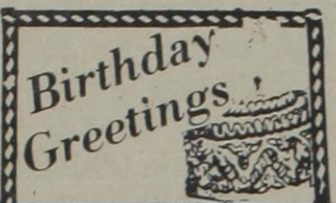
Glasgow served as administrative assistant to Governor Preston Smith until December 1970 when he returned to Stephenville to open the law firm of Glasgow and Jones.

In October 1972 Glasgow was appointed District Attorney for the 29th Judicial District which serves Hood, Palo Pinto and Erath Counties. In November 1972, he was elected to the post. Voters reelected him in 1976.

Glasgow has long been an active member of the Democratic Party, the Stephenville Chamber of Commerce, the Erath County Livestock Association, the Stephenville Optimist Club and the Board of Directors of the Tarleton State University Extension Students Association. He has named to Who's Who in American Politics, Who's Who in

American Law and Who's Who in the Southwest.

Glasgow and his wife, Deanna, have three children: Delaina, 13; Holli, 10; and Jody, 6.
