## 1989 Homecoming Speaker Is Bob Cox



Bob Cox, vocational education teacher at Pottsboro High School, has been named speaker for the 1989 Homecoming Assembly which is scheduled to convene in the Rising Star High School gymnasium on Saturday, Sept. 16, at 9 p.m. Cox will speak from a varied background of experiences. He is a 1949 graduate of Rising Star High School where he actively participated in football, tennis, drama and journalism. He holds degrees from both Baylor University and Golden Gate Seminary and had additional training at West Texas State University. He has served as pastor of Baptist churches in California, taught at both college and high school levels and at various times been a salesman, referee, coach, lumberjack, actor, model and public speaker. Cox's acting career includes character parts on "Dallas" and other television shows, plus a number of television commercials. For the past five years he and his wife, Betty, have been active

in theater groups in which Bob's credits include a number of major character roles. He often models for advertisements, posters, etc. as Santa Claus and once appeared as a traffic cop on a Dallas Cowboy Cheerleader calendar. Highly acclaimed for his speaking ability, Cox's experience has been mostly at civic affairs, banquets and church functions. One listener hailed him as "definitely having something going for him as a public speaker. Bob's wit, intellect, voice tone and self confidence make for a very interesting and delightful (time of entertainment)." Bob Cox was born and reared in Rising Star. He was the youngest child and the only son of Claude and May (Jones) Cox, descendants of original settlers of the community. He has two sisters: Florine Forbes, 1940 RSHS graduate and 1988 homecoming speaker, and Sara Alice Roebuck, 1945 RSHS graduate. Bob and his wife, Betty, have three sons, two daughters-in-law, and three grandchildren.


## Fire School Lessons Will Be Shared

The six members of the Rising Star Rural Fire Department sent to Abilene Area Fire Prevention School last week plan to share what they learned with other members of the department at upcoming training sessions. Those attending the training school, sponsored by Abilene Fire Department, State Firemen & Fire Marshals Association of Texas and Midwest Texas Firemen & Fire Marshals Association, were Ted Murphree, Willie Vandivere, Donnett Nall, Bruce Rivers, David Curtis and Billy Nall. The local firefighters attended three-hour courses for four nights last week. Studies and training included hose handling, incident command, airplane crash

and rescue and extinguishing pit, transport tanker, butane, liquified petroleum gas, natural gas, Christmas tree, car and house fires. They were told how to deal with accidents involving hazardous materials being transported and learned to operate and work with beathing apparatus. Both firefighters interviewed felt that the school was well worth the time they volunteered. They agreed they learned much that could be shared at the monthly training sessions here. The local department thanks Gorman and Cross Plains fire departments for the loan of the bunker gear; it was an invaluable aid in the training segments of the school. The Rising Star Rural Fire

Department welcomes anyone who wishes to attend the monthly meetings each first Thursday at the fire station about 6 p.m. Manpower, equipment and donations are always needed to keep a volunteer organization going. Equipment needed includes such items as feed sacks, chains, shovels and axes. Volunteers who may not be physically able to fight fires but who can drive are also welcome to participate. Of course those physically able are welcome. Citizens throughout the area can help by taking precautions against fire, by staying out of the way of firefighters and by offering cold drinks and coffee to those who are volunteering to fight fires in this area.

The Wildcats went head to head against the number four team in the state, the Baird Bears, in a scrimmage at Baird Sept. 1. In my opinion the Wildcats played a remarkable game considering that this was the second scrimmage prior to the opening of regular season play. The final score was 4 to 1 but it should have been 0 to 0. The scoring came for Baird from a few long passes and a Wildcat fumble. An interception by the Wildcats produced their only touchdown. The Wildcat defense did very well, shutting down Baird's ground game. The second team did exceptionally well. Baird's offense could hardly keep things going. They had to resort to long passes and, even then, their quarterback was pressured to throw soon or suffer being sacked. The Wildcat offense had some trouble against a good Bear defense. Junior quarterback Jimmy Evans surmised, "We did fair but we didn't execute like we should have." The offense gained over 100 yards total. Senior Cody Wilson summed up the scrimmage by saying, "We did a good job considering the team we played. We had too many mistakes and we have some things to work on, but overall we played fairly well." Assistant Coach Doyle Browning thought the 'Cats improved from last week but they still have a ways to go. After the scrimmage head coach Nathan Allen told the team, "This game doesn't count, but it matters that we got after them."

## Rising Star ISD Board Meeting

The Rising Star Independent School District board members and personnel met Aug. 14 at 8 p.m. at the board room. Present were President Larry Wilson, Vice-President Tony Long, Secretary David Harris, Ronnie Green, Gary Wilson, and Larry Chambers. Dr. Charles Barnes was absent. School personnel present were Dr. Donald E. Bryan, Weldon Hill, Robby Stuteville, Nathan Allen and Kathy Herring. Also present was Betty Meiron. Minutes of the July 6 meeting were read and approved, as were the minutes of the special meeting (budget workshop) on July 24. Supt. Bryan reported that the district was in receipt of an official notification from the State Board of Insurance stating that the district has corrected all fire safety projects and that they were closing their files on the Rising Star ISD facility. Roanen Barron addressed the board as the Rising Star High School Student Council President. A statement of cash in bank was given by Bryan. The resignation of Eve Landers, effective July 20, was accepted. Board members voted to give reasonable assurance of employment to Shelly Bailey as bus driver. The low milk bid from Borden Milk for the school year was accepted. A resolution was made to amend the budget for the

past school year to reflect actual expenditures. A motion by G. Wilson, seconded by Green, to make an addition to the Board Policy EIA (Local) carried. The addition: "RSISD District-wide Reteach Policy: The grade book will be the source used for identifying students that have not mastered the essential elements. Daily work and test grades will be used. Reteach will not be required more than twice but must be documented in lesson plan book and in grade book. Leave the failing grade in the grade book and a / through it and show the new grade when retaught. This new grade cannot be more than a 70." The management plan addressing the corrective actions cited by the TEA Accreditation Monitoring Team as submitted by the administration was accepted

in a motion by Long, seconded by Harris. Stuteville, high school principal, gave a report concerning the possible increase in enrollment and availability of classroom space. Hill, principal, gave a report concerning construction improvements and computer capabilities on the elementary campus. Allen, Athletic Director, gave a report concerning the start of football practice and the number of athletes and reported the fall billing for athletic expenditures. Members of the board thanked the administration for an excellent job of controlling expenditures for the past school year. They also commended both principals for excellence in their roles as teachers and administrators during the last school year. The meeting adjourned at 9:42 p.m.

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## State Treasurer Ann W. Richards Turns Over \$40 Million To State Agencies

State Treasurer Ann W. Richards Friday turned over \$40 million in unclaimed money to state agencies to pay for schools, highways and other general state government services.

The money is from abandoned checking accounts, uncashed cashier's checks, unclaimed utility deposits and the like for which no owners could be found.

"This is one of the best sources of non-tax revenue for the state," Treasurer Richards said. "It has grown from virtually nothing in 1982 to \$40 million this year and each new dollar we collect is a dollar that we don't have to collect from our taxpayers."

The state received a large amount of unclaimed property earlier this week after the Treasury sold its unclaimed stock certificates for more than \$4 million.

In addition, auditors from the Treasury found \$11 million in heretofore unreported unclaimed property from various businesses in the state.

Based on their job performance, the Texas State Auditor has prepared a report that shows Treasury Unclaimed Property auditors had the highest per audit hour return of any revenue collecting agency in state government.

Richards said that while she was proud of the amount of unclaimed property collected and turned over to the state, she was even more proud of the fact that the State Treasury had been able to find

owners of \$30 million in lost property during the last year.

"We have found more lost property for the citizens of Texas this year than the total found for all previous years prior to 1983, the first year I was in office," Richards said.

"So far this year we have written checks returning lost property to more than 16,000 Texans and we are finding more each day."

The Richards Administration has collected \$273.5 million in unclaimed property in the past six years, or 86 percent of all unclaimed property collected since the unclaimed property law was passed in 1962.

Of the \$114 million returned to owners during the past 27 years, the Richards Administration returned \$110 million or 96 percent.

In order to find owners of lost property, state law requires the Treasury to publish a statewide listing of those persons with \$50 or more of unclaimed property each March.

This year, the Treasury published a list of 110,000 names of persons with more than \$60 million in lost money.

The state can use any money that remains unclaimed for general state expenses and for education. This year \$20 million went to the General Revenue Fund and \$20 million to the Foundation School Fund.

While the state may use money while it remains unclaimed, the owners or the owners' heirs may claim their property at any time in the future.

## Lifestyle Change In Fire Ant Colonies Makes A Tough Job

Fire ants are increasingly difficult to eliminate because of a change in the life histories of fire ant colonies. They are appearing with multiple queens instead of single queens, according to a study conducted by the University of Florida's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences and the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture.

These new colonies house as many as 200 queens per mound compared to single-queen mounds. When the queen in a single-queen nest dies, the entire nest dies; but when of the multiple queens die, the workers scatter. In

multiple-queen nests, fire ant workers have no loyalty to a single queen. This makes eliminating the colonies even more difficult.

The study, which found 30 to 40 fire ant mounds per acre back in the days of single queens, now reports that there are up to 5,000 mounds per acre. Entomologists are still trying to determine whether the multiple-queen ants are a hybrid or a different species altogether from single-queen ants. They hope that with more research, they'll be better able to understand — and control — fire ants.





**Drug Investigation Results In Arrest**

Some Eastland County citizens were questioning why there were no arrests when three drug labs were seized near Ranger earlier in the year. The answer was that the local people involved were already facing charges, for which they are yet to be tried, and the officers wanted to bring about the arrest and conviction of the "syndicate" people outside of Eastland County who were financing and setting up the labs.  
A man described as the "drug cook" or "the drug boss" second in command was arrested near the motels and restaurants in Eastland by Sheriff's Dept. officers as a result of an ongoing investigation.  
The armed man, who reported had served time in a federal prison and had threatened to shoot it out to keep from being arrested again, offered no resistance to be arrested by Sheriff Dee Hogan and several of his deputies, who were also armed with shotguns.  
A bag in the motel room rented by the suspect contained illegal drug paraphernalia, papers belonging to the suspect, and what was believed to be illegal drugs, according to deputies.  
The suspect, who report-

edly uses different names, was identified as a man wanted by federal authorities on two felony warrants.

In order to spare Eastland County the expense of an expensive trial, Sheriff Hogan planned to release the prisoner to federal authorities in Fort Worth for trial there in federal court. A federal judge has already ordered that he be held without bond.

If the federal court fails to get a conviction, charges could then be filed in Eastland County.

Local officers say that the F.B.I., which has more resources than the local department, should eventually arrest other people involved in the illegal drug operation.

The suspect was reportedly from the Lewisville and Mesquite area.

## ASCS News

Highly erodible cropland that was planted to an annual crop in prior years is exempt from the CONSERVATION COMPLIANCE provisions. This exemption expires on Jan. 1, 1990. It is the producer's responsibility to make sure that all land he operates that has highly erodible cropland has a conservation plan developed prior to Jan. 1, 1990. Failure to follow these provisions will cause the farm on which the plan is not obtained and all other farms in which the producer has an interest to be ineligible for any USDA benefits.

Provisions of the 1990 WHEAT PROGRAM include: target price of \$4.00 per bushel; weighted national loan rate before reduction of \$2.44 and \$1.95 after reduction; 5% acreage reduction requirement and an ACR requirement of 5.26% of the planted and CU payment acreage; The 0/92 provisions will apply; No paid land diversion; Signup will begin Jan. 16, 1990.

Transferring Farm: A FALL PEANUT QUOTA TRANSFER can be approved only if the transferring farm planted a sufficient quota on the farm.

Receiving Farm: The amount of quota pounds that can be received is limited to the estimated ungraded pounds yet to be marketed plus the graded Seg. 1 peanuts less the quota balance on the marketing card for the receiving farm. A fall transfer to cover peanuts that grade Seg. 2 or 3 may never be made after the peanuts are graded.

County Office Listing: We are maintaining a list for producers to indicate their need to transfer quota or receive quota under the fall transfer provisions.
