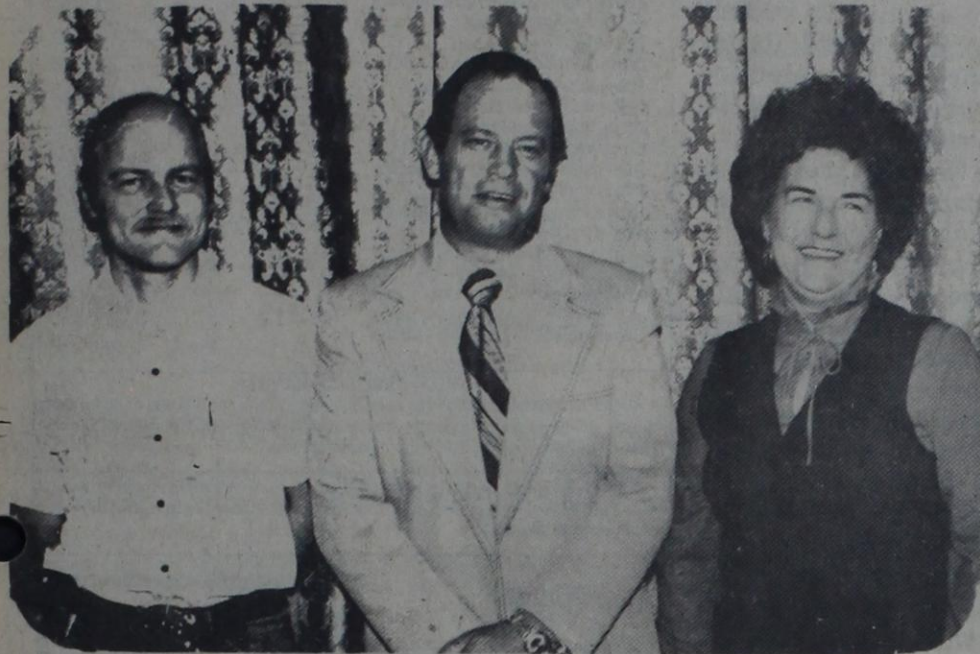


Awards Presented At RS Chamber Banquet

The sun was shining brightly Wednesday morning, but forecasts were for more showers to begin later in the week.

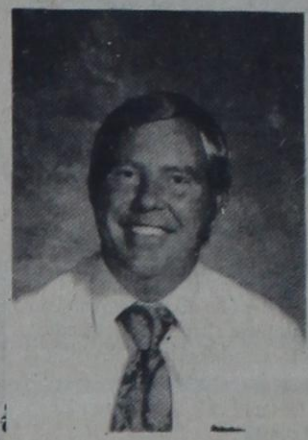

Consumers across the state of Texas will soon be able to visit lumber and building material dealers in their communities to receive an energy audit and analysis of their homes' energy conservation.

The audit program, called Lumbermen's Energy Audit Program (L.E.A.P.), has been developed by Lumbermen's Association of Texas. The Association plans to have the service available to residents of more than 400 cities and towns in Texas through its more than 800 dealer-members.

The L.E.A.P. audit program, developed by Dr. Bill R. Stewart of Texas A&M University, is a simple way for consumers to determine which energy inefficiencies exist in their own homes and what improvements are most cost-effective for them in reducing overall energy expenditures.

The consumer visits a local participating lumber dealer to pick up the audit form and other information. After filling out the form and answering questions dealing with such data as the age of

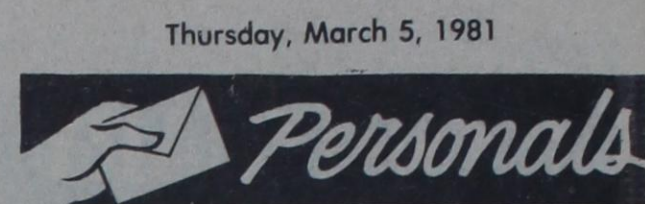
the heating and cooling unit, square footage of the home's living area, the number of people living in the home, the number of windows, etc., the information is then fed into a computer at the dealer's place of business.

A report is then generated which informs the consumer about what steps might be taken to improve efficiency, what materials are needed, and their costs. This information is then analyzed on the basis of energy efficiency achieved and projected "return on the energy conservation investment". The results are customized to each specific consumer's home and based on utility rates in effect in that specific market as well as climatic conditions in that location.

An energy efficient home can often save the owner thousands of dollars in operating costs over the years of ownership. And, there is little doubt that energy saving devices enhance the resale value of a property. According to recent surveys, energy efficient homes can bring from five to ten percent higher prices.

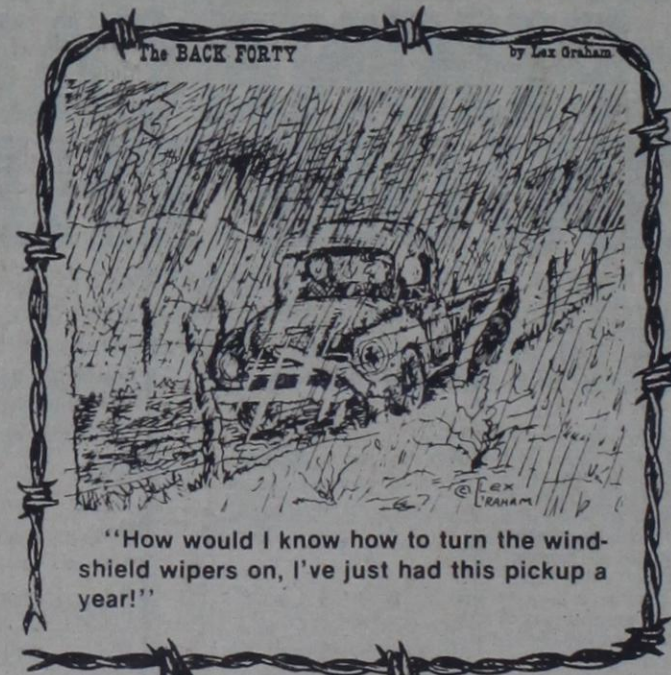

\$455 Set For Peanut Support Level 1981

Secretary of Agriculture John Block has announced national average support levels of \$455 per short ton for 1981 crop quota peanuts, and \$250 per short ton for 1981 crop additional (above quota) peanuts, unchanged from the 1980 support level.

Because of adverse weather conditions during the past growing season, peanut prices have reached record levels, far above the support level for quota peanuts, Block said. Early indications are that 1981 crop peanuts, with carryover stocks almost non-existent, will bring prices above support levels.

The support price for quota peanuts will be reviewed again, Block said. However, for now, the USDA has determined the support levels for peanuts will remain unchanged, he said.

Although legislation does not require announcing the quota support price at this time, Block said he is setting it now, along with the required announcement of the additional support level, since many peanut growers are making plans for the 1981 plan-

ting season.

The quota support level is expected to cover approximately 95 percent of the cost of producing peanuts. This cost is based on a trend yield of 2,569 pounds per planted acre.

Block said the support are those grown within the poundage quota established for the 1981 marketing year. Additional peanuts for the 1981 marketing year are those grown in excess of quota, but produced on allotted acreage.

Approximately 83 percent of the U.S. peanut crop is marketed commercially, with the remaining 17 percent placed under CCC loan.

Quota and additional peanuts placed under loan may be sold by CCC for domestic edible use, including use for seed, at not less than 105 percent of the quota loan rate, plus costs if sold after that date.

The exception to this policy is that sales of additional loan peanuts for domestic edible use—if sold and paid for during the harvest season at the time of delivery by the producer—will be made at no less than 100 percent of the quota loan value, plus costs, Block said.

Farmers stock peanuts will be sold by CCC for export for edible use at no less than the quota support price, plus costs, for quota peanuts and no less than \$20 per ton below the quota support price for additional peanuts.

On export sales of 1981 crop peanuts sold for crushing only, the CCC sales price will be at no less than the quota support price, plus costs on quota peanuts, and no less than \$250 per ton plus costs, for additional peanuts. Peanuts sold for export crushing must be fragmented before export.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday said Social Security and income taxes will eat up most of 5.1 percent pay raise state employees expect in February paychecks.

"There will be a lot of disappointed employees at the end of the month," Bullock said of the emergency pay raise approved by the Legislature.

For most employees, the so called raise amounts to little more than a dollar a day.

The professional people (like auditors) will receive the 5.1 percent raise but it will amount to about \$41.98 gain for Feb. 1980 over Dec. 1980 paycheck.

The situation is even worse for the 60,000 employees who are so lowly paid that they will get a flat \$50.00 raise instead of the 5.1 percent. A typical employee in the \$50.00 category will take home \$1.17 a day more.

Bullock said its a sin that employees will get so little from a pay raise that will cost the state so much—\$86 million for just seven months from February through August, the end of the state's current budget year.

Bullock said, "We spend \$86 million in seven months and the state worker gets \$1.17 a day. That's a disgrace."



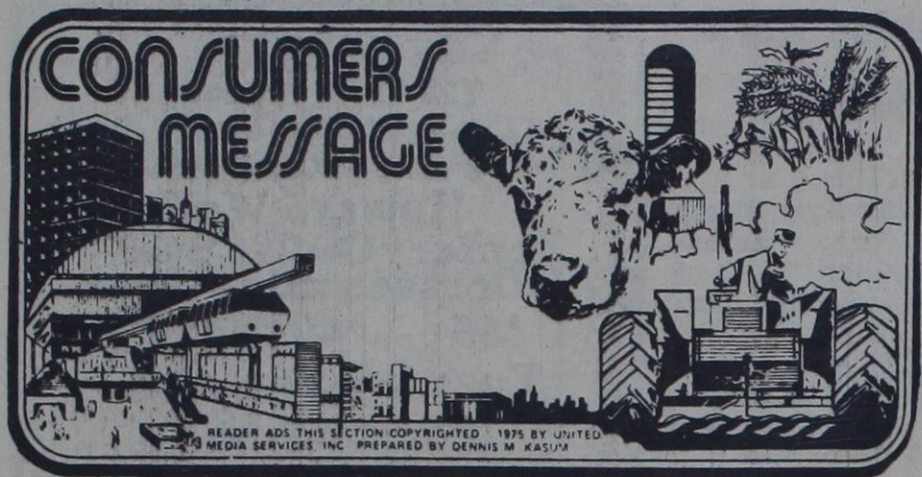

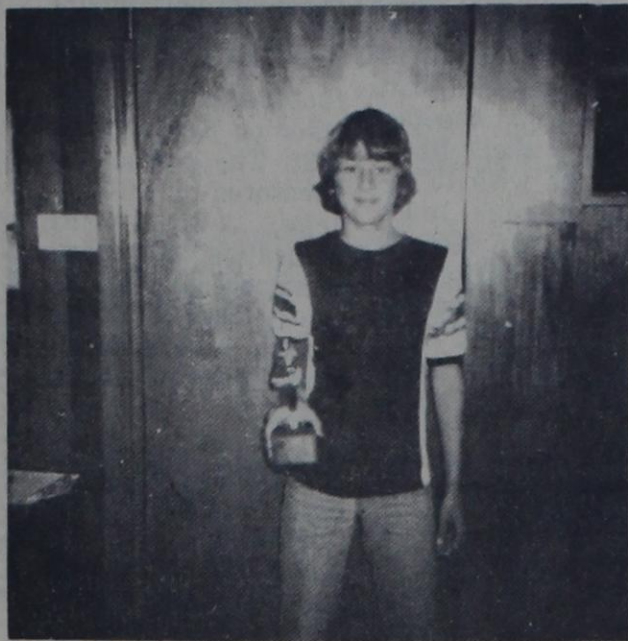

Taxpayers Can File Tax Form 1040 Or 1040A

There are at least 36 million U.S. taxpayers who could be filing the simpler Federal in-

come tax Form 1040A this year instead of the Form 1040, according to the Internal Revenue Service.

Taxpayers who earned \$20,000 or less (\$40,000 or less if married and filing a joint return) during 1980, and whose income is from wages, salaries, tips or unemployment compensation, and who have not earned more than \$400 in interest or \$400 in dividends in 1980, can file a Form 1040A. If a taxpayer is filing only for the purpose of getting a refund of the earned income credit, the interest or dividend income can exceed \$400. A form 1040A may also be used if a taxpayer does not claim credits other than the earned income credit or the political contributions credit.

Filing the Form 1040 can save time, is

easier, and can make errors less likely. However, many taxpayers must file the regular Form 1040.

For example, taxpayers who itemize deductions, claim more exemptions than are shown in the tax table for their filing status, or wish to income average must file the Form 1040. A taxpayer filing as a qualifying widow(er) with a dependent child must file a Form 1040.

Those taxpayers who choose to claim certain credits such as the child care credit, residential energy credit, credit for the elderly, investment credit, foreign tax credit, or work incentive credit, should file the Form 1040.

The course was sponsored by TRI College Continuing Education and meets standards set by the State Department of Health Nursing Home and Hospital Standards.

The training course consists of units related to nutrition, modified diets, personal hygiene, sanitation, safety, menu planning, purchasing, storage of food supplies, supervision and management skills, recipe development, use and care of equipment, and food preparation methods. Students must complete numerous on-the-job assignments

related to each topic studied. A grade of 70 or above is required on each unit test.

The class which began in July, 1980 is taught by Jane Jones, Registered Dietitian. Each student also has a sponsoring dietitian

who works with them in applying class work to on-the-job activities. Only limited numbers of these courses are taught throughout the state.

This Camp's Fun, And I'm Not Kidding

Jimmy Riddle of Cleburne, District Representative of the Christian Record Braille Foundation, is back in Eastland County at this time visiting a number of the blind persons whose lives are enriched by his group.

"There are about 40 legally blind persons in the Eastland County area," states Mr. Riddle. "At this time, one of the things I would like to do is to locate any more young people of adults who wish to attend one of our week-long summer camps. The Adult Camp in Texas will be held at Lone Star Camp in Athens, June 28th, July 5th. The Youth Camp will be July 19-26 at Nameless Valley Ranch, Leander, Texas, in the hills north of Austin. The Youth Camp includes ages 9 through 19, and the Adult Camp ages 20 and over. There is no cost to blind persons for the week's camping, and insurance is carried for each camper.

"There will be different activities at each camp, depend-

ing on facilities and equipment. There will be horseback riding, beeper baseball for the children, hiking, crafts, swimming, and a talent program.

"These camps are operated by a well qualified staff. Special safety precautions are taken in all areas of the program. Before the camp, counselors and the staff are trained to deal properly with blind persons safety and enjoyment of the program, can be assured. One counselor is assigned to each four campers, and a Medical staff is on duty 24 hrs. each day."

Mr. Riddle worked with the Youth Camp last summer and stated that he really enjoyed it. "It's really a thrill to see the youngsters having so much fun. Some of their comments were: 'It's the best camp in the world!' 'I like swimming and I love desserts!', and: 'This camp's fun and I'm not kidding!'"

National camps for blind children began in 1967 with one camp and 23 visually impaired campers. During the

past 14 years over 14,400 campers have attended 266 camps. This program, which has found such favor, is designed to place emphasis on the ability rather than the disability of visually impaired individuals. An attempt is made to increase the self-confidence of the camper, and develop an appreciation of God's love and care for him.

The work of the Camps is supported by contributions from public-minded individuals and organizations. Wills, trusts and annuities have provided some of the funds. No tax money or Government aid is received for this program. The USA office of the Foundation is in Lincoln, Nebraska, with a Canadian Office in Victoria, B.C. There are now 29 locations for the Blind Camps operating in the United States, with 2 in Canada.

Others services of the Christian Record Braille Foundation include personal visitation, a lending library, full-vision books, magazine

service, and Nu-Vision camps with modified programs for disabled blind youth. At these camps, counseling is often on a one-to-one basis.

Mr. Riddle, a personable young man with children of his own, explains that he was a teacher before going into this kind of work.

"It grows on you," he says. "You become terribly interested in doing what you can."

He makes periodic trips through a large area of North Texas to contact any blind person who wishes the services of the Foundation. The materials he supplies are available in Braille, large print, and records. There are no charges for any of these supplies. One of the special services is the Bible in Braille to anyone wishing it. Most people are startled at their first glimpse of the Braille "Bible" - it consists of a number of volumes which, if stacked together, reaches higher than six feet.

"We are happy that we are able to provide so much material and so many services," says Jimmy Riddle. "We are especially thankful to the Eastland County peo-

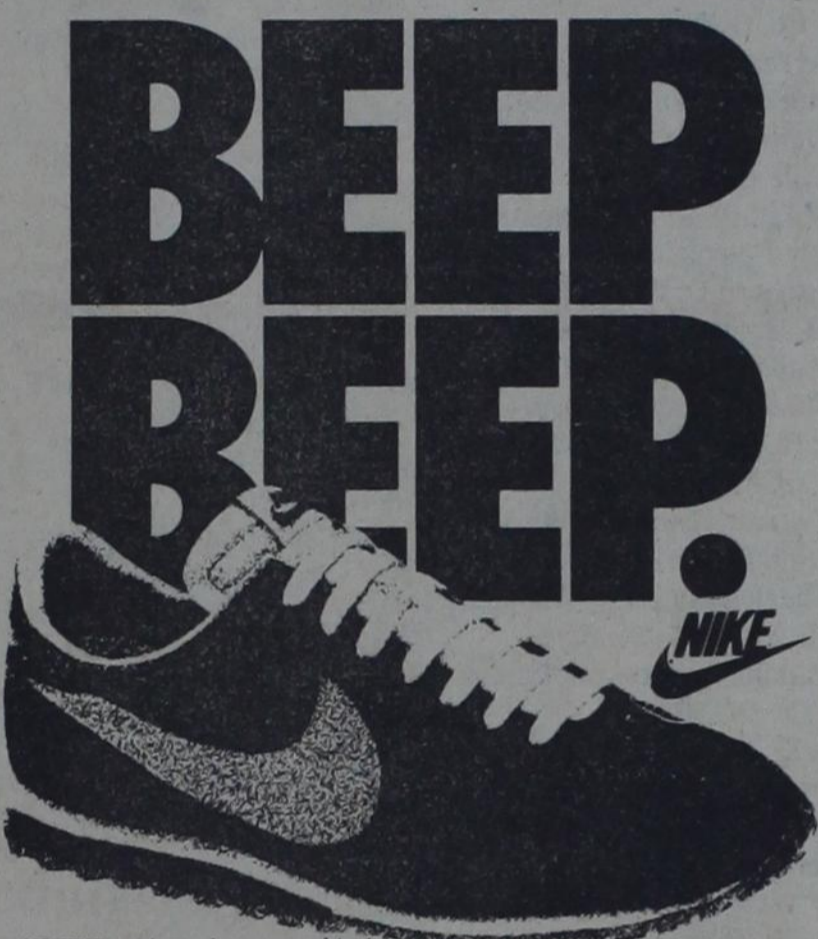

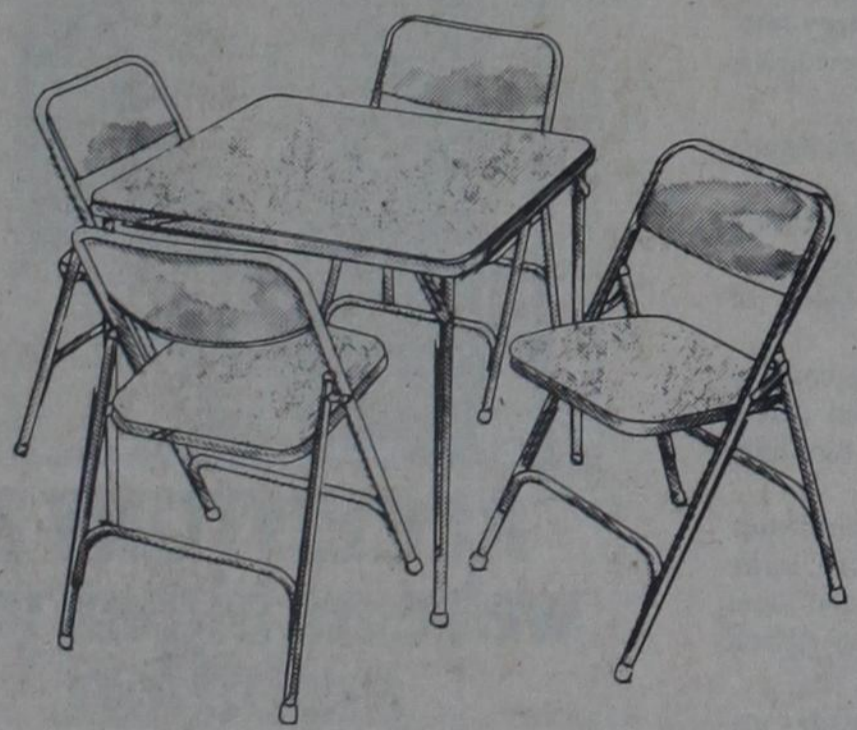
