## Hearing Sept. 10 On 36 Routing

A public hearing on the new routing and reconstruction of Highway 36 from Pioneer to the intersection with Highway 183 in Rising Star will be held at the American Legion Hall in Rising Star September 10, it was announced Wednesday by County Resident Engineer Gordon Smith. Mr. Smith said the meeting would be held at 2 p. m. and that any person who might wish route or make suggestion regarding it would be given an opportunity to do so. A tape recording of such testimony will be taken and a transcript sent to Austin for consideration by the Highway Department, he said.

Meanwhile Mr. Smith had good news for the City of Rising Star and property owners along the route of the highway in West Rising Star where it had been planned to take an additional 10 feet of right-of-way on either side—a program which would have required the City to shoulder an impossible burden in pay-damages to property affected. Instead, the Highway Department has accepted a compromise offered by the City under which the Department will use the present width of 60 feet and pave a slab 46 feet wide, the city to build curb and gutter on both sides of the paving. The result will be a thoroughly modern highway in the stead of the present 24-foot paving and at much less cost to the City, it was pointed out.

Mr. Smith said there was possibility Highway 36 would become a federal aid project.

## Longer Day For School Students In Rising Star

School bells will start ringing in Rising Star next Tuesday when classes will be resumed in both High School and the Elementary School for the beginning of a new term.

This year's High School day will be longer — seven 45-minute periods instead of six as in the past, and the day will begin earlier and last longer as a result. The first class will begin at 8:15 at the high school and the last period will end at 4:05. Buses will run 30 minutes earlier.

Registration of High School classes will take place Friday, August 29, at the High School library. Juniors and Seniors will register Friday morning from 10:30 to noon and Freshmen and Sophomores in the afternoon between 1:30 and 3.

A general faculty meeting will be held at the High School beginning at 9 o'clock Friday morning.

Supt. Sam Jones called the attention of parents of first graders just starting to school this year to the fact that a birth certificate must be presented for the child before he can be accepted for enrollment.

There will be no school Monday which will be a Labor Day holiday, but Tuesday the school year will start off with a full schedule of classes.

## Local Group Will Attend Hearing On Rush Creek

A public hearing on the Rush Creek Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention project will be held Thursday night, Sept. 4th, at 7:30 p. m. in the District courtroom in Comanche, it was announced.

The five members of the State Soil Conservation Board and party will be taken on a tour of the Rush Creek Watershed the afternoon of the fourth and the hearing will begin promptly at 7:30 p. m. that night. A great deal of work has already been done on this project, which has been tentatively approved. The Watershed area covers a large part of the Northwestern and Central part of Comanche county, heading up around Rising Star and extending southwest to the Comanche area.

President of the Rush Creek Watershed Association, C. B. Williams, Jr. of Fairview, in commenting on the hearing says, "This is the time to show your interest in this project. We're encouraging each community in the watershed to make plans for every farmer and rancher and their family to attend the hearing."

According to H. M. O'Brien, Jr. Secretary-treasurer of the Association from Soda Springs, "One of the key factors to be given consideration in this hearing is the interest shown by the people living within this watershed. We need everyone of them at the hearing to establish a priority."

Angus Dickson, Jr., Comanche County Agent, was a guest at the Rising Star Chamber of Commerce luncheon Tuesday when he discussed the hearing and requested a large delegation from Rising Star attend it. He pointed out that priority in approval of watershed projects would depend in great measure upon local enthusiasm shown.

He was assured that Rising Star would be well represented at the hearing.

## Contract for Gas Pipe Line to This Area Is Let

Eastland — Contract for a 16-inch pipeline to carry natural gas from nine West-Central Texas counties, including Eastland County, to Austin was let this week by Mid-Texas Gas Co. of Dallas.

Successful bidder was the N. A. Saigh Pipeline Contracting Co. of San Antonio. Gas will be gathered from Eastland, Erath, Stephens, Hamilton, Palo Pinto, Parker, Coleman, Brown and Comanche counties and transported to Austin.

Surveying for the right-of-way for the line is being done at the present time and construction is due to begin in the immediate future. Delivery of gas at Austin is expected by mid-winter or early spring.

The main line will come into the county from Strawn and will closely follow Highway 80 through Ranger and into Eastland. At Eastland the line will turn southeast, passing near Carbon, to the Comanche County line. This course was revealed by a highly reliable source.

Feeder lines will spread all through the area, bringing gas to the main line. An oilman very familiar with the plan said landowners, producers and consumers will benefit directly from this venture and business and industry over the entire state will benefit indirectly. He predicted Eastland County would see thousands of dollars come into the area as a result of the work.

The line will supply the city of Austin with natural gas on a contract basis. The Mid-Texas Gas Co., a Texas Corporation, is headed by John G. Pundit, R. Jacques T. Dupont, B. J. Wynne, Willing P. Foulke, James P. Roszel and F. D. Thomas are all vice presidents, and Curtis B. Ball is secretary-treasurer.

According to information received here, none of the producers of gas who sell their product to Mid-Tex Gas Co. will come under the jurisdiction of the Federal Power Commission since the company is an intrastate organization, doing business only in Texas.

Several hundred workers are expected to be needed for the job.

## Rains Bring Heat Relief, Crop Promise

Rains, spotted in intensity, but ranging up to two and a half inches or more east of town, brought welcome relief over the week-end from the August heat wave and great benefit to fruiting peanuts, to pastures and waiting grain land.

In Rising Star about two inches of precipitation was recorded. Farmers in the Amity community reported excellent rains over most that territory while northwest and south and southwest there were reports of heavy showers.

Rains Sunday in Rising Star measured 1.16 inches by the city gauge. Saturday's showers measured .70 of an inch and on Friday .04 of an inch was recorded to bring the week-end total to 1.9 inches.

North of town only about half an inch was reported. Earlier, the Nimrod and Sabanno areas received good moisture. Cisco and Eastland each had heavy rains Sunday.

Generally speaking, growers said that the peanut crop was practically assured of a good yield by the late moisture. Great benefit to heat scorched pastures and an opportunity to put grainland in planting conditions were important results of the rains.

## Wildcats Start Rebuilding Around Five Lettermen

Coaches Ray Nunnally and Weldon Hill set out this week to build a new Wildcat football team in a new league with five lettermen, two returning juniors who have experience but were out of play last year because of injuries, and a dozen and a half eager but inexperienced sophomores and freshmen.

The coaches will have a squad of about 25 men, light but not without promise. Nucleus of the team which will compete in the Class B league for the first time this season, will be formed of three lettermen seniors — Don Long, Gary Scott and Kenneth Riden; two junior lettermen — Pat Agnew and Gary Maynard, and two juniors who would have lettered but for injuries they received early in the season. These two — Douglas Walker and Wicky Walker — will give the team a lot of help, Coach Nunnally said.

A cheering fact was the spirit of the boys who seemed to have a real desire to play.

"Over the long term, the outlook is not bad," said Ray. "Whatever team we have this fall, the prospect is we will lose only three players for next year and out of the crop of freshmen and sophomores coming up we have some pretty good material."

The Wildcat team will be given its first test under real playing conditions Friday night of next week when the Blanket team comes here for a non-conference game. After that will follow a series of non-conference contests will Class B opponents until October 10 when May comes here for the first conference game. Following the May game Rising Star will meet Baird, Jim Ned and Gorman in order in conference games.

Two workouts a day are being held at Wildcat field this week as the coaches condition the Rising Star team for the start of the season. Morning workouts are being held at 7:30 and afternoon workouts at 5:30 o'clock. Calisthenics, pass, blocking and signal drills occupy the morning sessions with more serious contact work slated for the afternoon drills.

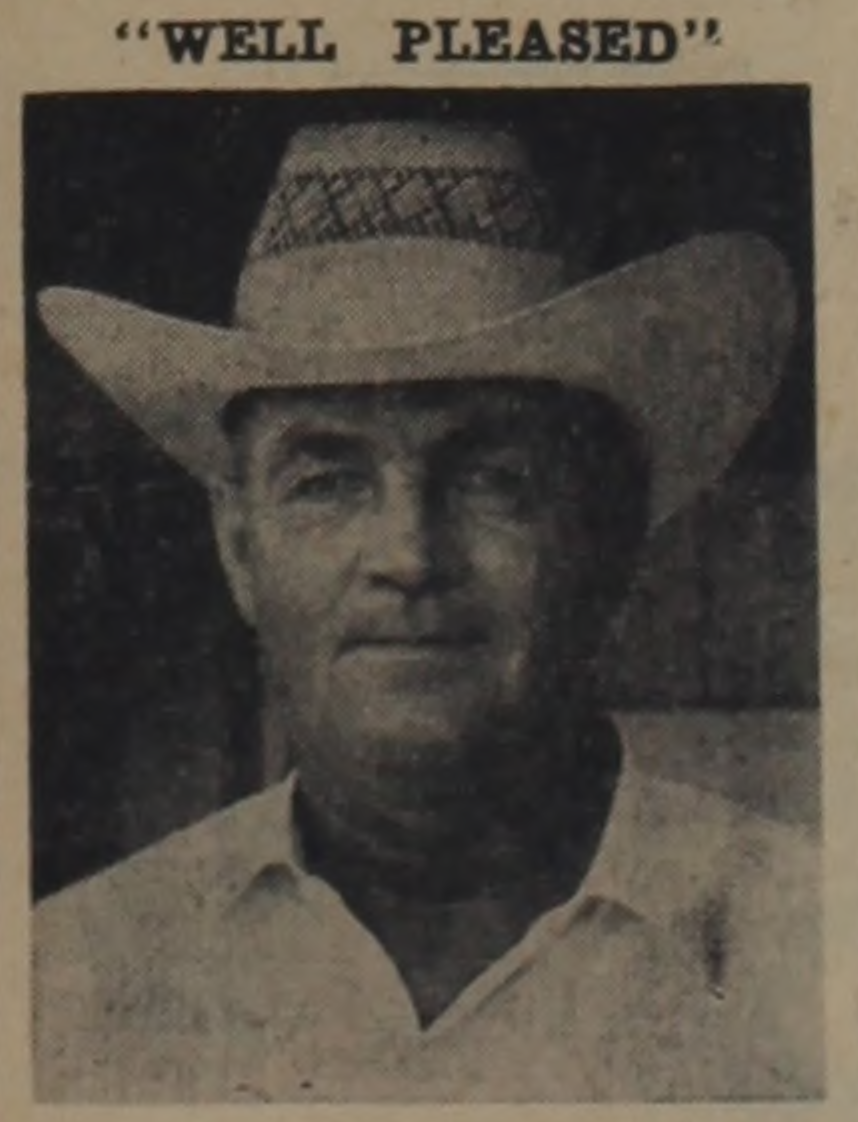

### FACTS NEEDED TO PLAN WILL

In planning your will, your lawyer will want to know your true wishes; and then, to help realize them, he will want to

know a few vital facts.

Are you married? Any children or grandchildren? Previously married? Widowed? Your age and those of your beneficiaries? Legal residence? Health?

Why these questions?

You'll have to work out your plan in view of the laws governing death taxes, property laws, and, if you are married, separate and community prop-

erty. Age? If you wish to set up trusts in the will, your age and those of your beneficiaries may help you to decide whether, for example, to use capital of the trust fund as well as its income for the beneficiaries.

Your residence? Most important, since state laws govern many items of personal property.

Do you plan to move to another state? If so, consult its laws. Many people who come to Texas from other states should see that their wills conform to and take advantage of our laws.

Some people live half the year in Texas and half elsewhere. If you do, take steps to nail down your claim to reside in one state or another, to avoid needless litigation and possible claims to taxes in both states.

Your health? If possible, have your will drafted while you are in good health and clear minded.

Contests, though relatively rare in Texas, still do take place. In some cases, for example where non-relatives inherit, it may be a good idea to give reasons for these bequests in your will and to tell why you may have left some relatives out (for instance, where a child has been taken care of by gifts or in other ways.

### Check Home for Lurking "Killers"

COLLEGE STATION.—If you made a list of the "killers" around your home, you would be amazed. Insecticides and other poisonous chemicals stored within a child's reach can bring tragedy. Statistics prove this point. Two out of every 100 persons die each year from accidental poisoning. Of this number, every fourth person is between the age of 1 and 5 years.

Check your home now to make sure that all "killers" are stored well out of reach of the children. Extension home management specialists suggest some important check points:

Start with the medicine chest. Keep it locked or make certain that it is high enough to keep children out. Label all bottles and material stored there.

Keep cosmetics, soaps, bleaches, polishes and cleaning agents out of reach of small children.

Avoid throwing partially filled containers into wastebaskets or trash barrels where children could test for taste.

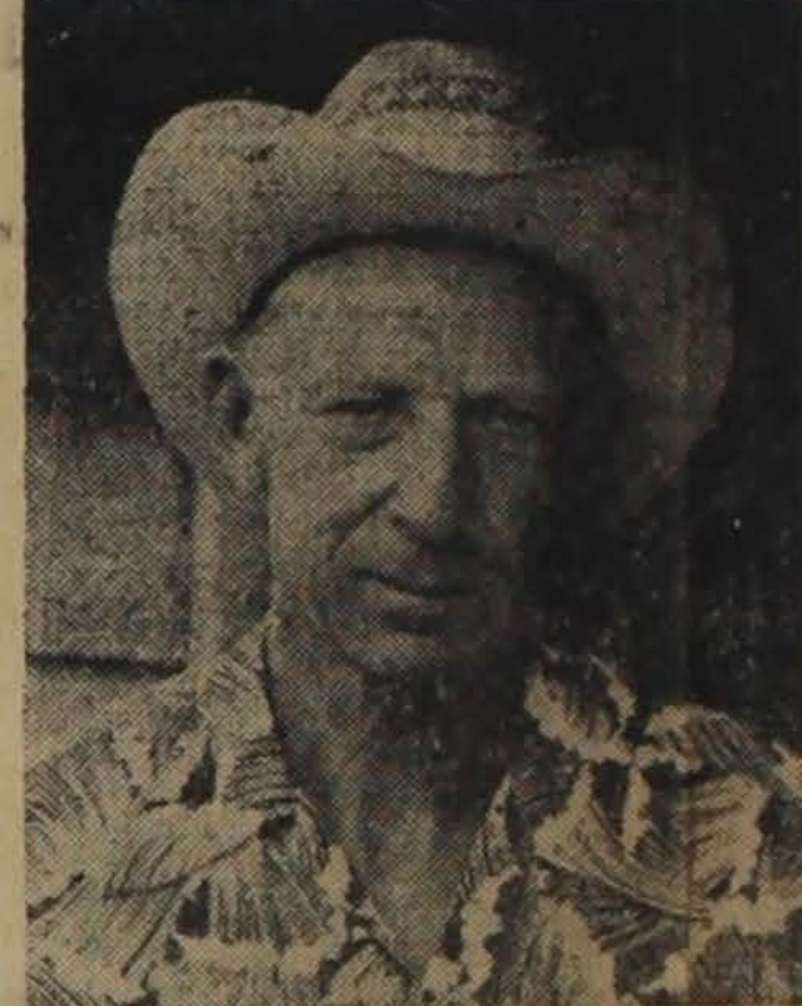
### Clubs Formed to Provide Activities For Older People
