

- Literary Notes On The Southwest By James P. White

Most writers, probably at one point or another, think that perhaps the best way to publish their work and have the end result what they want is to publish it themselves- - jthat is, vanity printing. In Europe vanity printing is legitimate and is not looked down upon as it is in the United States. But givebn the current

deflated market for serious fiction and poetry- - and particularly poetry- - vanity publishing in the United States is prospjering and perhaps should be reevalued. Publications from vanity presses include selections from dictionaries to history books to very personal poetry. One answer is always clear about whether or not you should publich the book yourself. If it means enough to you personally and you want the book to print and are willing to print it and for distribution give it to people that you particularly then you probably should try it. This is of course after you have tried other publishers.

There are a number of works of sentimental value to families and individuals which are well worth printing for this reason. But what abut literary merit in vanity publishing? I recently received a book of poems for a Texas poet named Maxine Negley. The book is entitled Dreaming to Sleep. It includes uneven work, but has a number

of well honed poems. Take for Example the short poem Himalayas: I looked at the show covered Himalays: The sun was shining


Brownwood Services For Sister Of Mrs. Maynard


