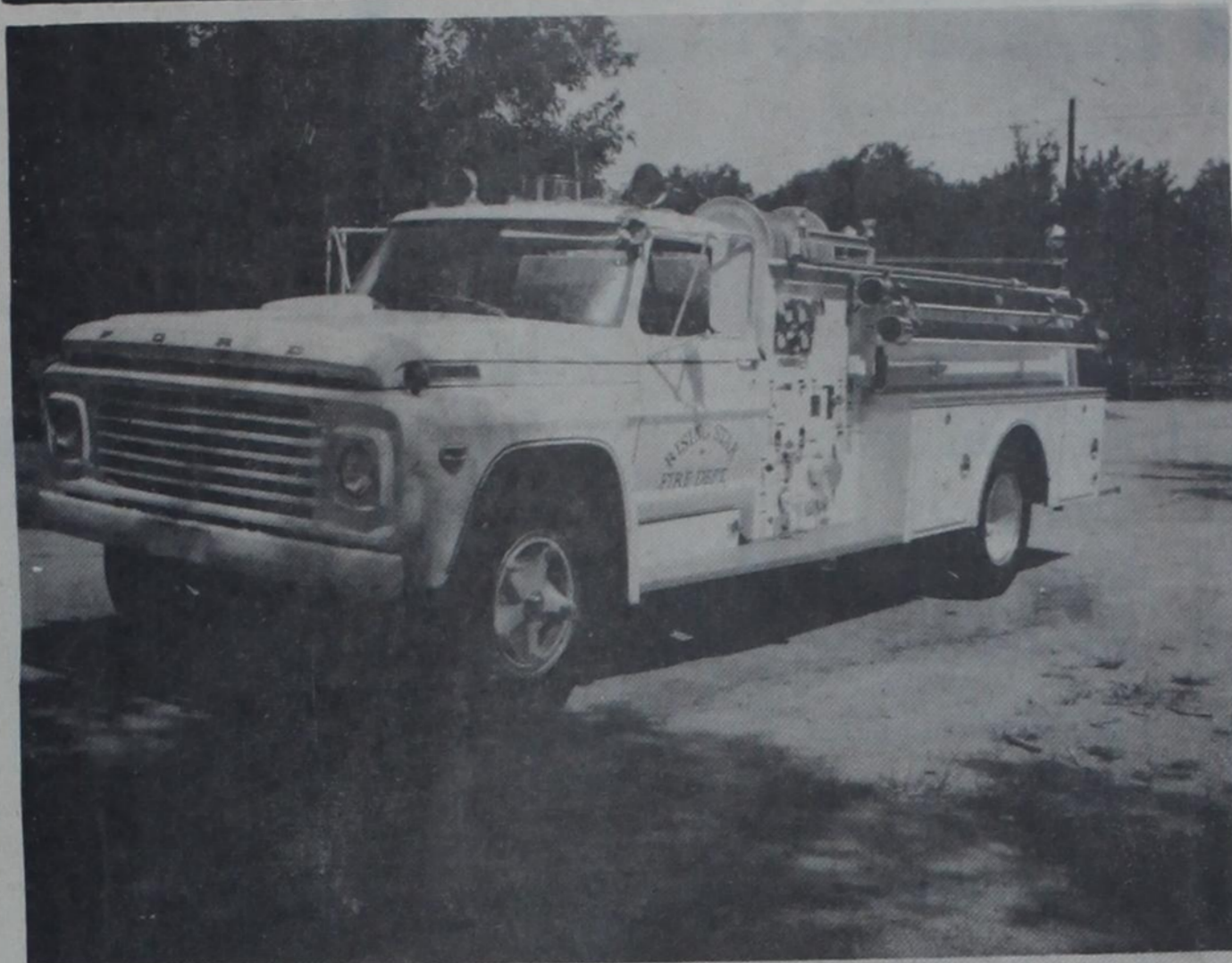

Pictured above is Rising Star's new fire truck. It is a beautiful white enamel color, with red and black outline used in the striping and lettering. The most modern equipment has been installed on it. Some of the features are a red beacon and speaker on the cab top, two electric hose reels with 150 feet of one inch, 800 pound test hose on each reel, 1500 feet of 2 1/2 inch hose and 400 feet of 1 1/2 inch hose, a booster tank with 500 gallon capacity, a PA - 15A Federal Electronics siren with CJ - 184 speaker - light, one 24 foot two section wood extension ladder and one 14 foot wood roof ladder with folding hooks, one 10 foot wood pike pole and one six foot pick head fire department axe, mounted. The fire truck has a 500 gallon per minute pump. The fire apparatus that the truck is equipped with meets state insurance board specifications.

**Junior Rodeo
Aug. 10-12**

A Rising Star Junior Rodeo sponsored by the Future Farmers of America Chapter of Rising Star High School, will be held August 10, 11, and 12, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday. The company has thirty days to comply with a written acceptance to the city.

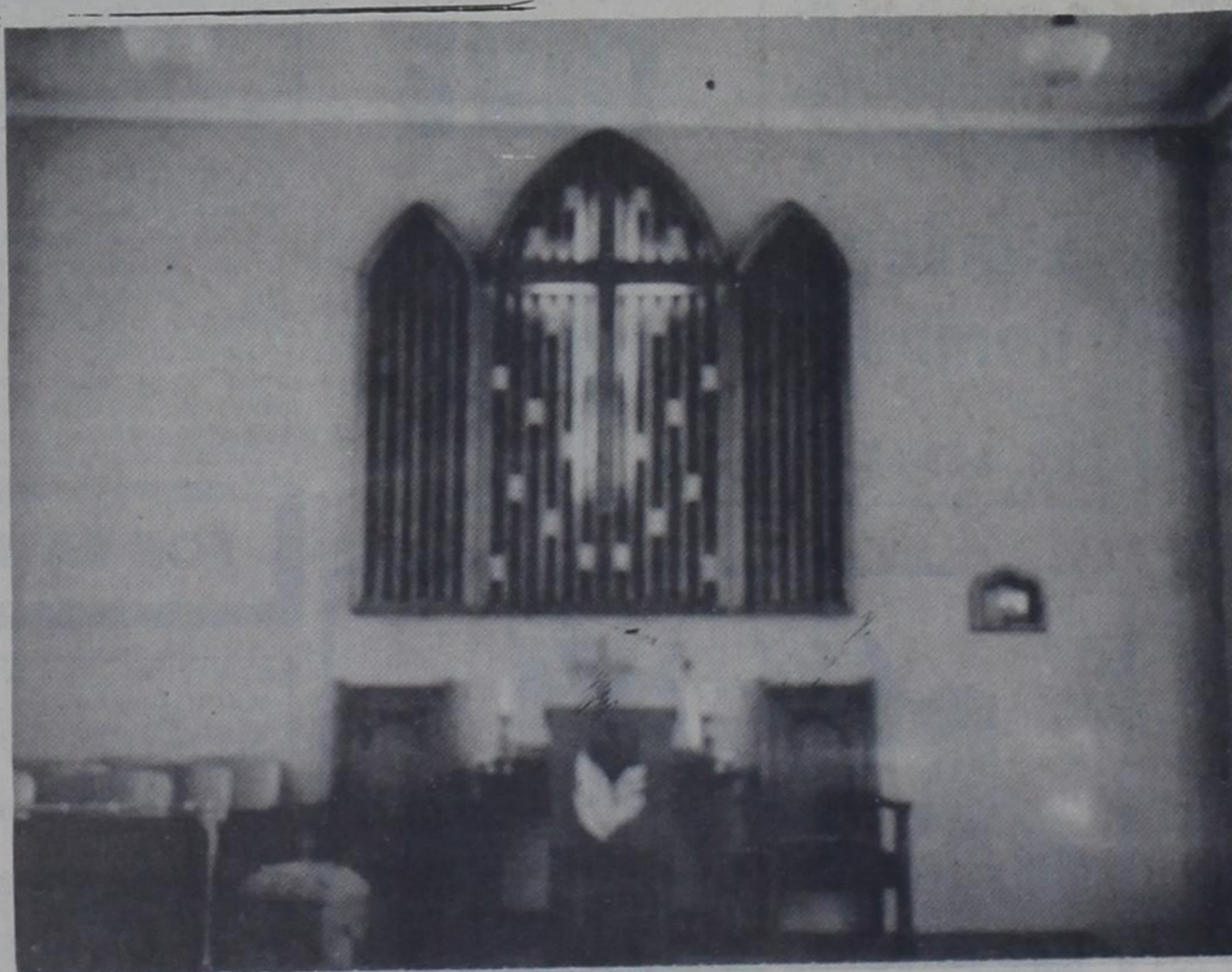

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 12 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 29) General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 33, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 33. The accounting officers in this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant or check on funds of the State of Texas, whether in the treasury or otherwise, to any person for salary or compensation who holds at the same time more than one civil office of emolument, in violation of Section 40."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 11 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 95) General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article IV, Section 17 of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 17. If, during the vacancy in the office of Governor, the Lieutenant Governor should die, resign, refuse to serve, or be unable to serve, or if he shall be impeached or absent from the State, the President of the Senate, for the time being, shall, in like manner, administer the Government until he shall be superseded by a Governor or Lieutenant Governor. During the time the Lieutenant Governor administers the Government, as Governor, he shall receive in like manner the same compensation which the Governor would have received had he been employed in the duties of his office, of the Senate, shall, during the

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 13 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 82) General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 65 to read as follows: "Section 65. Wherever the Constitution authorizes an agency, instrumentality, or subdivision of the State to issue bonds and specifies the maximum rate of interest which may be paid on such bonds issued pursuant to such constitutional authority, such bonds may bear interest at rates not to exceed a weighted average annual interest rate of 6%. All Constitutional provisions specifically setting rates in conflict with this provision are hereby repealed. This amendment shall become effective upon its adoption. Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to vote of the qualified electors of this State at the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "To set a six percent (6%) weighted average annual interest rate for bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority presently having a specified interest ceiling."

- 1/2 Cup Sugar

- 1 cup luke warm water.

No doubt you have heard the words "Permanent Care Labeling". The term refers to a regulation of the Federal Trade Commission that became effective on July 3 of this year.

What it means is this: any domestic or imported item of wearing apparel manufactured after the above date must be permanently labelled with care instructions. No longer will you have to keep track of those paper labels to be sure whether or not that blue dress is washable. BUT! do not expect everything you buy to be labelled just yet! Finished goods that were in retail, wholesale or manufacturers' inventory before July 3, 1972, are exempt from the rule. So you will still be buying some unlabelled apparel until it is all sold off of the retail merchant's shelves.

The products that are covered by the regulation include all finished articles of textile wearing apparel that require care and piece goods made for the purpose of conversion by the ultimate consumer into finished articles of wearing apparel. Each finished article of clothing that requires care must have a tag or label permanently attached to it which gives clear instructions for the care and maintenance of the article. When you buy a piece of fabric, Higginbothams and the other stores at which you shop are required to supply you with a permanent type label that you can attach to the finished item of clothing yourself.

As with all regulations, some things will be exempt from the rule! The Commission has allowed to exempt articles where utility or appearance would be substantially impaired by the attachment of a permanent label and articles sold at retail for \$3 or less and which are completely washable under all normal and foreseeable circumstances. Footwear and items used exclusively to cover or protect the head or hands are not included in the Commission's definition of wearing apparel.

You will be seeing all kinds of labels, but whatever the shape or the place of attachment, the label must be legible for the reasonable life of the article and must be readily accessible to you, the consumer, at the time of the sale.

Animal Lovers Everywhere

Hunters, trappers, and hobbyists - it's that time again. Yes, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Departments has just contacted us that it is time to renew our permits for the 1972-73 season.

They also advised that we tell our suppliers that this up-

coming season they too will be required to have a permit to legally sell their animals.

This year any person who desires to take alive any of the furbearing animals of this state for purposes for sale must apply to the Game, Fish, and Oyster Commission at Austin

for a propagation permit. He shall pay the sum of \$5.00 and the permit shall be available on and after the first day of September of each year. It shall be valid until August 31 of the following year. Any person holding a propagation permit may take and hold fur-

bearing animals held in captivity and giving the commission the number of each kind of animal and pelts disposed of during the previous year.

We will be required to have your permit number on our records this year. A penalty will be enforced if you are caught with animals in possession or selling them without this permit. If you happen to be selling to us at the time, we also can be fined for buying from you.

So, boys, go now and send your \$5.00 in form of a cashier's check or postal money order - payable to the Parks and Wildlife Department for your Furbearing Animal Propagation Permit. Send this to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, John H. Reagan Building, Austin, Texas 78701.

Don't forget to purchase your trapper's license at \$1.00. This permit gives a trapper the right to take and sell the pelt or pelts of any of the fur-bearing animals of this state.

You must have this license to legally sell furs - again we will be required to have your permit

number if we buy your furs. While you are purchasing these - don't forget your fishing license and hunting license to cover deer and game birds. Don't put this off until tomorrow - do it today.

4-H'ers Think... Drink Milk



Milk, cheese and other dairy products are among the most popular and basic foods in our diet. We use dairy products as beverages and appetizers, in baked foods and desserts; in entrees and salads. Yet many people don't get the three or four servings of milk or their equivalent, that nutritionists of the Extension Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, say is the minimum amount of milk or milk products needed daily.

However, there are some people, young people, who not only eat and drink more than a minimum amount of dairy products, but who go into their communities and spread the good word about dairy foods. They are the 655,000 boys and girls enrolled in the National 4-H dairy foods program, sponsored for 25 years by the Carnation Company.

The 4-H members enrolled in the program learn how milk and milk products are produced and a lot more about their nutritional value.

They demonstrate many appetizing ways to enjoy an unlimited variety of dairy products ranging from milk, fresh, powdered, fat-free and evaporated; to cheeses, sour cream, yogurt and ice cream. The 4-H'ers also hit hard for good nutrition.

1040 U.S. Individual Income Tax Return Taxpayers Ask IRS

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q) Is damage from a flood or hurricane considered a casualty loss for Federal income tax purposes?

A) Yes. Damage from a hurricane, flood or storm is considered a casualty loss if you actually sustained a loss. A personal casualty loss may be deductible to the extent that each loss exceeds \$100. A casualty loss on business property or property held for the production of income is deductible in full, without regard to the \$100 limitation. However, in both cases, the loss must be reduced by any insurance proceeds received or expected to be received. For further information, IRS Publication 547, "Tax Information on Disasters, Casualty Losses and Thefts," may be obtained free by sending a postcard to your Internal Revenue district office.

a taxpayer be prepared to show in order to justify a casualty loss deduction?

A) To establish a casualty loss deduction, you should be prepared to show: 1) the nature of the casualty and when it occurred; 2) that the loss was the direct result of the casualty; 3) that you were the owner of the property; 4) the cost or other basis of the property, evidenced by purchase contract, deed, etc. (improvements should be supported by checks, receipts, etc.); 5) depreciation allowed or allowable, if any; 6) value before and after the casualty; and 7) the amount of insurance or other compensation received or recoverable, including the value of repairs, restoration, and cleanup provided without cost by disaster relief agencies.

Photographs of your property before it was damaged,

after the casualty and after it is repaired may be helpful in proving loss.

Q) I filed my Federal income tax return in March and still have not received my refund. What should I do?

A) Write the Internal Revenue Service Center where your return was filed. Be sure to give your name, current address, social security number and the approximate date your return was filed.

Q) I'm making the down payment on a home as a wedding gift for my son. Will he have to pay tax on it?

A) No. A gift is not taxable to the recipient. However, depending upon the size of the gift, the donor may have to file a quarterly gift tax return, Form 709, and pay a gift tax. A return must be filed for the calendar quarter in which an individual's gifts to any one person for the year exceed \$3,000.

The next due date for the quarterly return is Aug. 15, 1972. Forms are available at IRS offices.
