LEADING QUESTIONS

Many think that no court will allow a lawyer to ask leading questions.

But under some circumstances leading questions are proper, and it may be a lawyer's duty to ask them—to get the truth

before the court.

For example, in examining a "hostile witness or in cross-examining his opponent's witness, a lawyer may be compelled to "lead" the witness to the critical points at issue.

A leading question is one that suggests the answer. Like: "Isn't it true, Miss Jones, that you saw the defendant beat his wife?"

What makes leading questions sometimes improper?

To a friendly witness they

may well suggest the answer the lawyer was fishing for, instead of getting the witness to tell unaided of the facts as he saw and heard them.

When a lawyer first asks questions of his own witnesses the testimony is given on "direct" examination; when the same witness answers his opponent's questions, the testimony is given on "cross-examination."

So as a rule a leading question is proper on cross-examination but improper on "direct" examination; when it might lead a witness to testify on material or important facts at issue in the trial.

On cross-examination the lawyer may be duty bound to test, by leading questions, the witness' memory or credibility, or to remind him of certain things to correct mistaken testimony.

Of course, to save time the court may also allow leading questions on direct examination to get certain background facts out of the way or to aid a child or certain other witnesses.

The judge may have to stop improper leading questions. He may let the lawyer ask the question again in non-leading form, or come back to the subject later on.

The main thing is to allow questions which will get at the truth for the sake of a just verdict.

processing laboratory, a unique facility in the U. S. Department of Agriculture and, indeed, in the country, has begun on the grounds of the Western Utilization Research Laboratory in Albany, Calif., the Department reports.

The new building will be two stories high and have 18,000 square feet of floor area. It will permit a large expansion of the Department's research on new wool products and processes. Pilot-scale equipment for processing raw wool into finished worsted fabric will be installed. Later, the plant also is to be equipped for production of knitted and soft woolen goods.

Research on improved methods of processing wool, new wool products, and treatments to make wool garments easy to care for will be conducted in the new building. Improved wool properties sought include resistance to yellowing and shrinkage, permanent pleats, and more rapid drying, and less need for pressing.

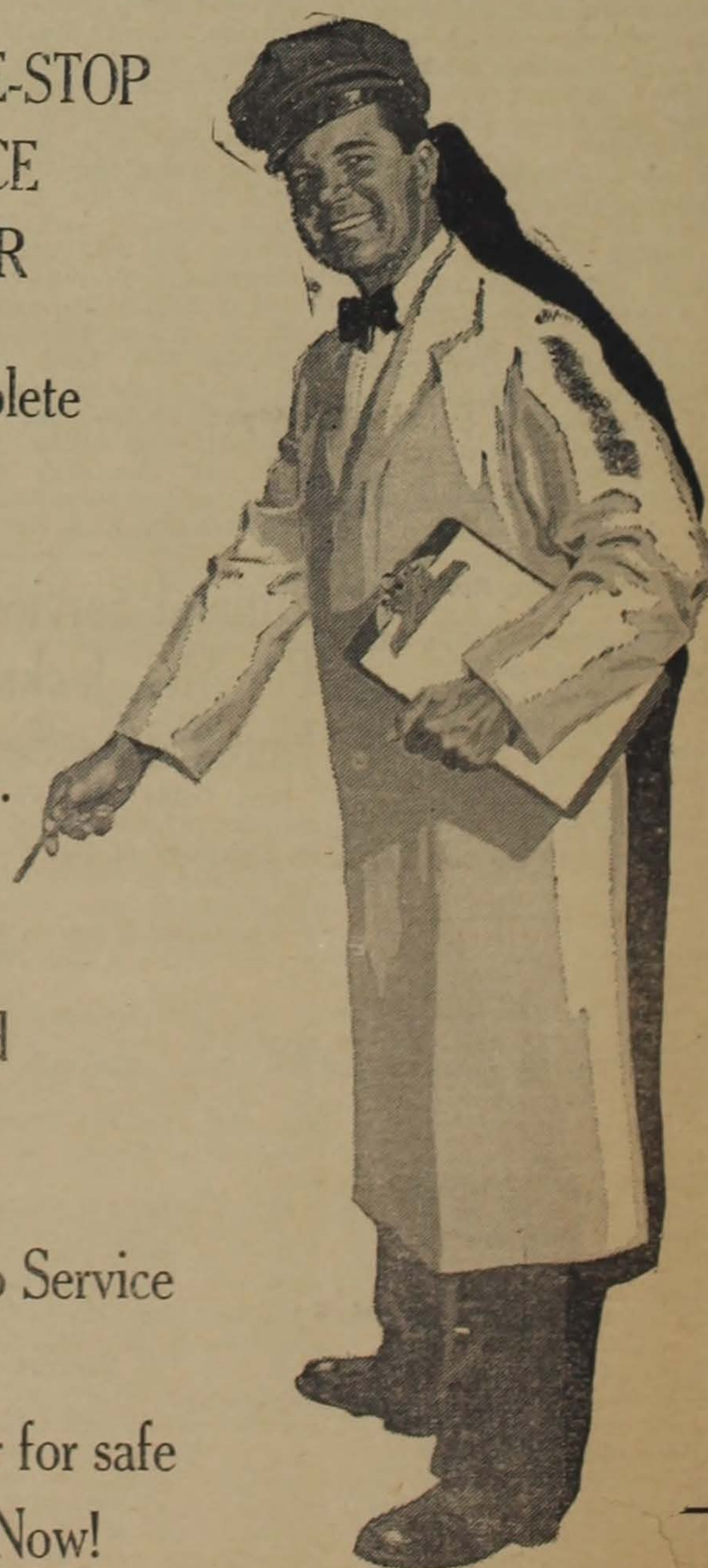

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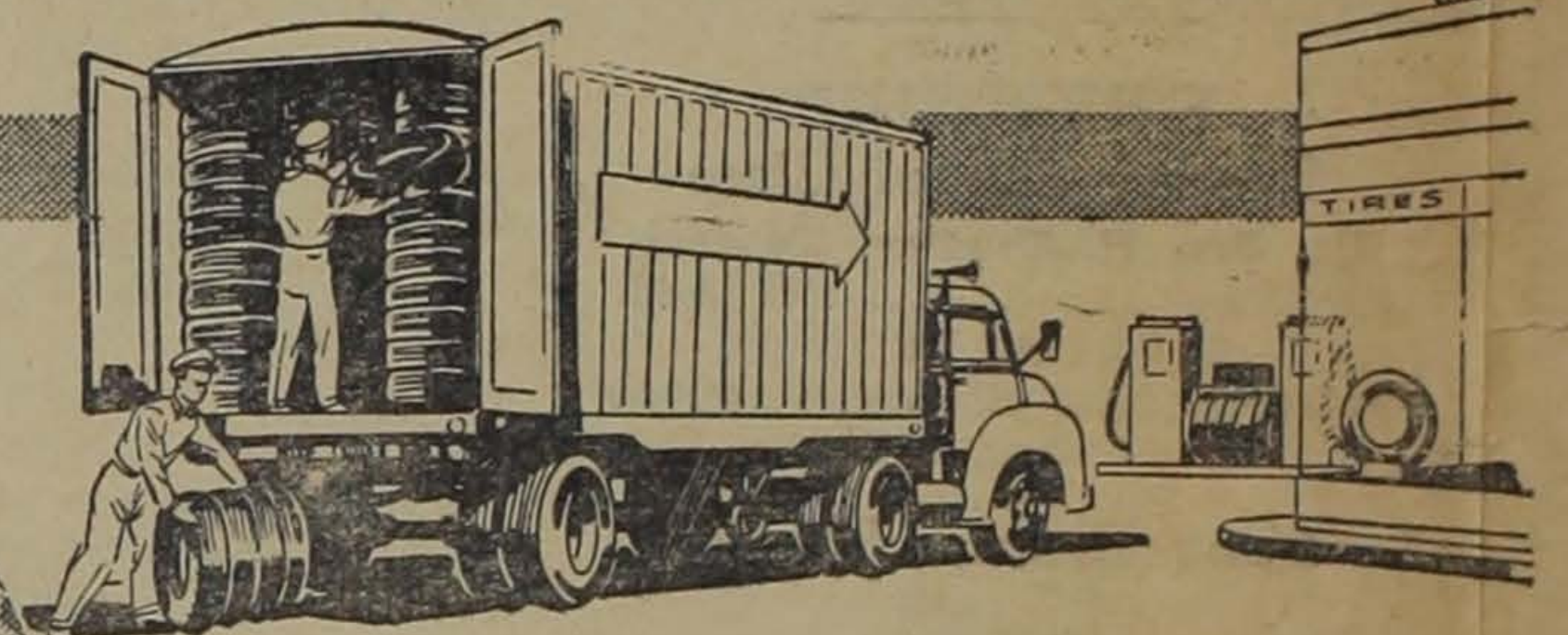
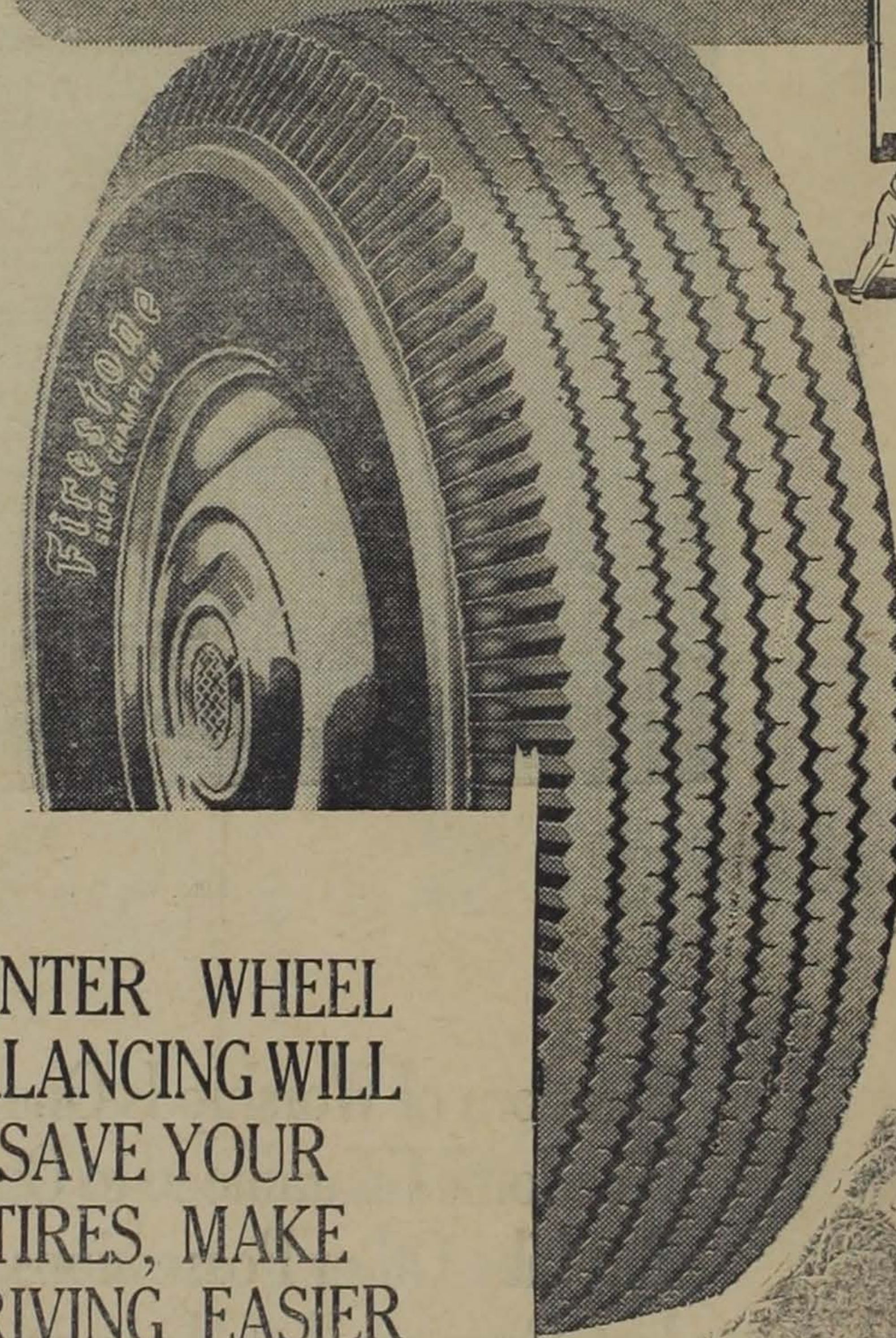

LEGAL NOTICES

AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING OPERATION OF A SALES BARN; THE ASSEMBLING AND/OR THE PENNING OF LIVESTOCK, CATTLE, OR HOGS; OPERATING A HOG FEEDING LOT; DEFINING THE AREA; EXEMPTING THEREFROM THE FAMILY MILK COW, FAMILY MEAT HOGS; FIXING PENALTIES OR PENALTY AND OUTLINING EVIDENCE FOR VIOLATION THEREOF; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

Sec. 1:

It is hereby ordered that hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person, persons, firm or corporation to own or operate within the area described in Section 2 hereof any livestock sales barn where livestock is assembled and offered for sale by auction or otherwise; to assemble or pen or cause to be assembled or penned any cows, calves, hogs or other animals; to feed or permit to be fed any hogs, goats, sheep, cattle or other animals in a feed lot.

Sec. 2:

The area to which this ordinance applies shall be all of the property located within the limits of the City of Rising Star, Texas, save and except property or lots not located within three hundred feet (300 ft.) of any property on which a residence is located.

Sec. 3:

All milk cows kept for the production of necessary dairy products kept for the purpose of ducts for family use and/or meat production for family consumption shall be exempt from this ordinance.

Sec. 4:

Any person, persons, firm or corporation found guilty of violation of any part of this ordinance shall be fined in any sum not less than twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) and each day that such violation shall continue may be considered a separate offense; all the evidence necessary for conviction hereunder shall be a written complaint or protest by two resident citizens of the town of Rising Star; said complaint may be signed jointly or separately and be delivered to the Mayor or the Secretary of the City of Rising Star, Texas.

Sec. 5:

Since there is now no ordinance governing the operation of sales barns and/or the congregating or assembling or penning of livestock, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and the rule requiring the reading at three separate meetings is hereby revoked and this ordinance shall become valid after its passage and publication.
