Texas DPS Reminds Motorists to Stop for School Buses

Griggs School Reunion

Summer vacation is over for thousands of youngsters who have started back to school, many of those for the first time. Captain G.J. Matthews of the Texas Hilghway Patrol said, "Last year in Texas, the pedestrian death accounted for approximately 16/ of our total traffic fatalities with many of those being school age children."

"The Texas Depart-

ment of Public Safety wants to remind all motorists that with the start of school, you will be seeing those big yellow school buses where they have not been all summer," said Captain Matthews. He said that all drivers are reuired to stop for school buses when the bus is stopped to load or unload school children and has its overhead red lilghts activated. Captain Matthews pointed out that the law concerning stopping for a school bus applies to drivers in the city limits as well as out in the rural areas. He

also stated that drivers must stop from either direction before passing the bus.

The only time a driver can legally pass a stopped school bus is for the flashing red lights to be turned off, the bus driver to motion a vehicle by or for the bus to resume motion. Captain Matthews was careful to point out that in either of these situations, a driver needs to remain alert for school students. They couls still dart into the path of your vehicle, he

Captain Matthews said, "With the start of school, all drivers need to be extra cautious around our schools." He said, "The children will be excited about a new school year and might not be thinking about all the safety rules in bike riding and crossing streets so it will be left up to the motorist to protect them." "Drive as if you have a child attending that school," he said.

LeFlore Pleads Guilty To Garcia Murder

In a surprising development, Charles Allen LeFlore 20, pled guilty to murder as his trial for the murder of Debra Jo Garcia, 29, was beginning Monday in 91st District Court.

Prosecuting attorney Emory Walton said LeFlore and his court appointed attorney Don Wilson approached him Sunday evening. Wilson said LeFlore decided "it was the best thing to do."

Judge Jim Wright questioned LeFlore about his understanding of what he had agreed to. LeFlore stated he had not been forced to make this decision and that his attorney had represented "well" and he was satisfied.

District Attorney Emory Walton questioned him about his treatment while he was jailed and LeFlore stated he had been treated well. Mr. Walton introduced two pieces of evidence. One was a statement signed by LeFlore that he had used a gun to kill Debra Jo Garcia.

The second was an autopsy report that showed Mrs. Garcia died from a gunshot wound.

asked LeFlore if he understood he had given up his right to appeal or for a new trial. LeFlore said he did. Then, Judge Wright sentenced him to serve sixty-five years in the state penitentiary.

The gag order was lifted as LeFlore was sentenced, but District Attorney Emory Walton said he could not discuss the case until the other defendent, Brenda Gail Andrews 20, has been tried for capital murder in the same offense. He said LeFlore might testify

in that trial. Security was tight as people attempted to enter the courtroom Monday morning. Women's purses were opened and searched and men were

Judge Wright then "frisked." Spectators had settled down for a long day, and the jury had gathered to be brought into the courtroom, when the "plea bargain" was announced.

LeFlore, dressed in a white western shirt, ieans and jogging shoes, was free of the ankle shackles he had worn during jury selection. He chewed gum and showed no remorse as he pled guilty to murder.

The dead girl's mother, Mrs. L.E. "Slim" Booth, cried as LeFlore was sentenc-

Because LeFlore used a gun to kill Mrs. Garcia, he will have to serve at least one third of his sixty five year sentence before he can be considered for pro-

Pest Alert

LEAFMINERS

Do you still have tomatoes or peppers in production? Have you planted any fall beans of peas? If you have then you may notice a particular insect problem - the serpentine leafminer.

This insect pest eats the leaf tissue between the upper and lower leaf surfaces, leaving slender, white winding tunnels through the leaf's interior. This pest is the larval stage of a small shiny black fly with yellow markings. The larval maggot is 1/8 inch long, white, legless and wedge shaped. The maggots are not readily observed because of the tunneling habit.

The adult fly lays pale white eggs into plant tissues. The eggs hatch in about 4 days. The maggot mines the leaves for about 5 days. The entire life cycle of the fly averages about 23

Gordon Woolam days. Several overlapping generations occur

each year. Damage from this pest often does not produce levels which warrant control. Many natural enemies attack this pest. However, if tunneling becomes excessive, photosynthesis can be impaired and yield reduced. If chemical control is elected, diazinon is the most recommended insecticide. Allow at least three days between application and

harvest. Another insect curattacking rently tomatoes are tomato pin worms. These are the larval stage of a small gray moth. Larvae invade the stems and fruits. The larvae tunnel through the fruit spoiling it. Sevin is the recommended insecticide. This pest may be difficult to con-



Under the old law, these students could receive Social Security benefits as long as they full-time were students, unmarried, and under age 22. The new law is gradually phasing out these benefits. By April, 1985, the only students eligible for benefits

19 in a high school, junior high school or elementary school. Children under age 18 will continue to receive benefits regardless of their student status.

beneficiaries who were entitled to a check for August 1981 and who were in full-time attendance before May 1982 in a post-secondary school will continue to receive benefits until they marry, reach 22 or are no longer in fulltime attendance. However, beginning in 1982, no benefits will be paid for May, June, July or August and these students will not receive any cost-ofliving increase. In addition, these students' benefits will be reduced by 25% each September when the checks resume.

A student 18 or over who did not receive a Social Security check for August 1981 or who was not in full-time attendance at a college other postsecondary school before May 1982 will not be entitled to student benefits after July 1982 unless that student is under age 19 and in full-time attendance at a high school, junior high or elementary school. These students will be paid under the old law through July 1982.





moisture will be more effective than waiting until afer the rain to fertilize.

Second, fertilizer will not lose its effectiveness if applied on dry soil during prolonged dry weather except for urea, which undergoes some hydrolysis reactions that can result in a moderate loss of nitrogen.

Phosphorus and potash needed for next year's perennial grasses can be applied this fall. This is a special advantage if cool season grasses or legumes are to be planted.

Late summer or fall fertilization of summer grasses with nitrogen also can produce additional hay and fall grazing once rains come. This can mean improved grazing and less hay needed to get livestock through the winter.

With fertilizer getting more expensive due to rising costs, producers must continue to pay more attention to getting the most out of the fertilizer they apply. Everyone must assess his own situation regarding topdressing of summer grasses for additional forage to get the most from his fertilizer dollar.

Just how "good" is the hay you harvested this year?

It's really hard to tell without a forage test. The forage test is the only way that a definite feed value can be assigned to a particular lot of hay.

While forage test may cost a few dollars, it can save you dollars supplemental feed or livestock condition.

Feeding low quality hay without supplementation can result in livestock weight losses and reduced rebreeding percentages. At the same time, feeding supplement with top quality hay may not always be necessary.

Only when your hay's feeding value is known can you make a useful decision on the necessity of a protein or energy supplement. The hay's feeding value might be such that no supplement is needed or it might be such that the animal is starving slowly

without a supplement. A forage test can

give a positive value on which to base a feeding program, and with the high cost of feed, that's essential for a sound management program.

Anyone interested in getting hay tests for protein, fiber, nutrient and mineral content can bring samples to the county Extension office where information forms and mailing containers available. Forage samples will be sent to the Extension Forage Testing Laboratory, Soil and Crop Sciences Dept., Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843.



Today, I would like to present to you a recipe which is a favorite of Stella Hill's. She often brings it to the Center, and is is always a hit.




