Next week is Graduation Week, as most of you are aware. Another class of Rising Star High School will have completed its courses of study and gone on to various pursuits — more education, to jobs, marriage and the responsibilities of adult citizenship.

The Record extends them congratulations and best wishes.

Texas is rapidly becoming a land of man-made lakes. When the pioneers came to this part of "the Great American Desert" as the school books used to call the Southwest, there was hardly a body of water worthy of being called a tank. About all they found for water supply were inconstant creeks and wells laboriously hand-dug.

Two or three rainless months often left them in desperate condition and many of them returned to the poverty of the old states where they could at least depend upon drinking regularly.

Now you cannot count upon the fingers of your two hands all the lakes—and I mean big ones — within an hour's drive or so of Rising Star.

One of the latest is Lake Proctor, the big reservoir built by the U. S. Army Engineers as a flood control project on the Leon between De Leon and Comanche. We went to the dam Friday of last week. Fishing below the big barrier, where cool water from the bottom of the lake swirls among two rows of concrete pilings set to break the current, we found the fishing good. Crappie, drum and even yellow cat, not to speak of pestiferous schools of bait-thieving perch, were in a happy biting mood and we came away with about 60 pounds of keepers.

It was refreshing and reassuring, while waiting for a fish to bite, to watch the chastened flow of the river and to reflect upon its meaning to the future of this land. Much more than a sportsman's paradise, surely, as profitable as that may be.

There is a lot of water in this country for dry times, if it is controlled. Water, the vital element in all civilization — water in abundance to support more population and growing industry.

Dublin, De Leon and their sister towns in the Proctor area, have moved to take advantage of the treasure that that big lake provides. They have approved a water district for the purchase of water from the big reservoir to nourish their economies and insure them an almost inexhaustible supply for any reasonable growth.

Rising Star, still tied to wells, could hope for a similar advantage.

Perhaps we may have one. I understand that the Army Engineers are studying similar floor control projects at sites on Pecan Bayou and other streams within a practical distance of this community.

If one should materialize, we could well afford to think with Cross Plains and other nearby towns on the organization of a water district to supply us with plenty of the catalyst of civilization.

Constitution for United Fund

Following is the Constitution of the United Fund now being organized in Rising Star.

ARTICLE I — NAME — The name "United Fund of Rising Star, Texas".

ARTICLE II — PURPOSE. Our purpose shall be to develop teamwork among the social agencies serving Rising Star, Texas, and their constituencies, in the interest of the financial support of such agencies and the effective planning and execution of the social service program of this community. This organization may extend its activities to include the coordination of appeals for special State and local projects and for national and international relief and service agencies.

ARTICLE III — MEMBERS: Members may be individuals or institutions.

INDIVIDUAL MEMBERS: Each contributor to the United Fund shall be a member of this organization.

INSTITUTIONAL MEMBERS: (a) Any organization or agency interested in the object of this organization and desiring to participate in the combined campaign may, upon approval of the Board of Directors of this organization, become an institutional member. Each institutional member may appoint one (1) delegate and one (1) alternate to represent the organization at meetings of the membership. (b) Agencies asking application for institutional membership shall submit such historical, financial, service and other service data as the Board of Directors of this organization shall request and shall certify that its governing board has read and voted to accept the Constitution and By-laws of this organization. (c) Such application papers shall be referred to the Budget and Admissions Committee which shall, after proper investigation, report its recommendations to the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IV — BOARD OF DIRECTORS: Section 1. The management and administration of the affairs of this organization shall be by a Board of Directors consisting of 12 members. The following persons shall constitute the Board of Directors whose term of office shall begin immediately: Four (4) of these members shall serve for a term of one (1) year and four (4) for two (2) years and four for three (3) years. Hereafter, at the annual meeting of the members, four (4) shall be elected for a term of three (3) years. Chairmen of constitutional committees

who who are not already serving on the Board of Directors shall be ex officio members of the Board of Directors in addition to the twelve (12) provided for above.

NOMINATION AND ELECTION: Section 2. Not later than December of each year the Board of Directors shall appoint a nominating committee consisting of five (5) persons of whom three (3) shall be from the Board of Directors and two (2) from the individual membership. This committee shall nominate one person for each place with a view of keeping the Board of Directors representative of the important geographic, economic, cultural and other interests of the community. This committee shall report to the membership at the annual meeting for election by the membership. Any member may nominate further. Section 3. Any vacancies may or may not be filled, according to the decision of the Board of Directors, the same Nominating Committee working and reporting to a called meeting of the membership.

DUTIES: Section 4. The duties of the Board of Directors shall be: (a) to manage the affairs of the organization between meetings of the members. (b) to adopt such policies and procedures for the operation of this organization as may be consistent with this Constitution and By-laws and designed to accomplish the objects of this organization. (c) To appoint such committees as it may deem expedient for accomplishing the objects of the organization. All members of the organization are eligible for membership on committees. (d) to arrange for the raising of funds. (e) To control the distribution of funds collected. (f) To employ such persons as it may deem necessary for the successful prosecution of the objects of this organization. (g) To give at least once a year a full and complete report of its activities to a meeting of the members of the organization.

ARTICLE V — OFFICERS: Section 1 (a) The officers shall be a president, a first and a second vice-president and a treasurer. These will be elected from among its members by the Board of Directors immediately following the annual election of Directors. (b) In addition thereto, the Board of Directors may employ an executive secretary who shall serve as secretary to the Board of Directors but shall not be a member of that body. He may be salaried if so voted by the membership (not the board). If it does not so employ an Executive Secretary, the Board of Directors shall

elect a secretary from its own number. Section 2. All officers are elected for terms of one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. Section 3. The duties of the officers shall be: President, To preside at all meetings of the members and the Board of Directors, to appoint all committees unless otherwise provided, to call special meetings as deemed necessary, and to do such other duties as usually pertain to this office. Vice-presidents, In their order, to perform the duties of the president in the event of his absence, resignation or inability. Treasurer, To have custody of all funds of the organization and to pay out the same Board of Directors. Treasurer shall give bond with approved surety for the faithful performance of duties, in such amounts as shall be fixed by the Board of Directors. The cost of such bond shall be paid by this organization. Executive Secretary or Secretary, The Executive Secretary is to serve as executive officer, give notice of all meetings, keep the minutes and records of this organization and its Board of Directors and of its official committees, and to perform such other duties as the Board of Directors shall decide. He shall give bond with approved surety for the faithful performance of his duties in such amounts as shall be fixed by the Board of Directors. Cost, if any, of such bond shall be paid by this organization. When there is no Executive Secretary the Secretary is to do the above, but without bond.

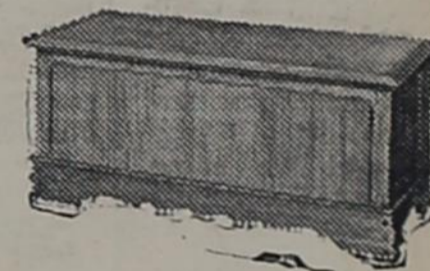

acts of the budget and admissions committee shall be subject to the final approval of the Board of Directors. Publicity Committee. Section 3. (t) The Publicity Committee shall consist of at least two persons elected by the Board of Directors. (b) The duties of the Publicity Committee shall be to supervise and direct a continuous educational and publicity program subject to the supervision and direction of the Board of Directors. This program shall be designed to inform the community regarding the social needs and services of the United Fund and its member agencies and thus to encourage sound and intelligent support for the United Fund and its services.

ARTICLE VII - AGREEMENT WITH INSTITUTIONAL. Section 1. For the purpose of sharing the joint fund to be raised by the United Fund, each member organization so sharing shall agree: (a) To conduct no benefits, campaigns or solicitations for financial assistance for ordinary routine purposes, or for any similar campaigns for special financial purposes within the geographic area included in the campaign of this organization except when consent is obtained in writing from the Board of Directors of this organization. (b) After being given full consideration and hearing, to accept the apportionment of funds made to it by the budget and admissions committee, also approved by the Board of Directors. (c) To cooperate with other special agencies in preventing duplication of effort and in promoting effective service and efficiency and economy of administration. (d) To undertake no new line of work or substantial expansion of service in this community except with the consent first obtained in writing from the Board of Directors of the United Fund. (e) To keep complete and regular books of account open to inspection by a representative of the Board of Directors of the United Fund. (f) To file with the United Fund, at the end of each fiscal year and otherwise upon request, a certified copy of a complete and satisfactory audit of all accounts and holdings of the organization, to submit to United Fund such other reasonable information concerning finances, etc., and in such form as the Board of Directors or budget and admissions committee may require. (g) To abide by the rules and regulations made by the Board of Directors of the United Fund. Section 2. This agreement shall be binding from year to year unless the institutional member or the United Fund gives written notice to the contrary to the other party at least three months prior to the opening date of the current financial campaign.

ARTICLE VIII - GENERAL PROVISIONS. Designations. Section 1. Any donor may designate the member organization or organizations to which he desires his gift to be credited, but in case the total designated to any organization shall exceed the budget allowance, the Board of Directors shall determine whether an adjustment in the allowance will be made.

ARTICLE IX - MEETINGS. Members. There shall be an annual meeting of the membership in the month of February each year at such time and place as the Board of Directors shall determine for the purpose of electing members of the Board of Directors, receiving reports and transacting any business presented to it. Additional meetings of members may be held on call by the Board of Directors and must be called when there is a petition in writing signed by fifteen (15) or more members.
