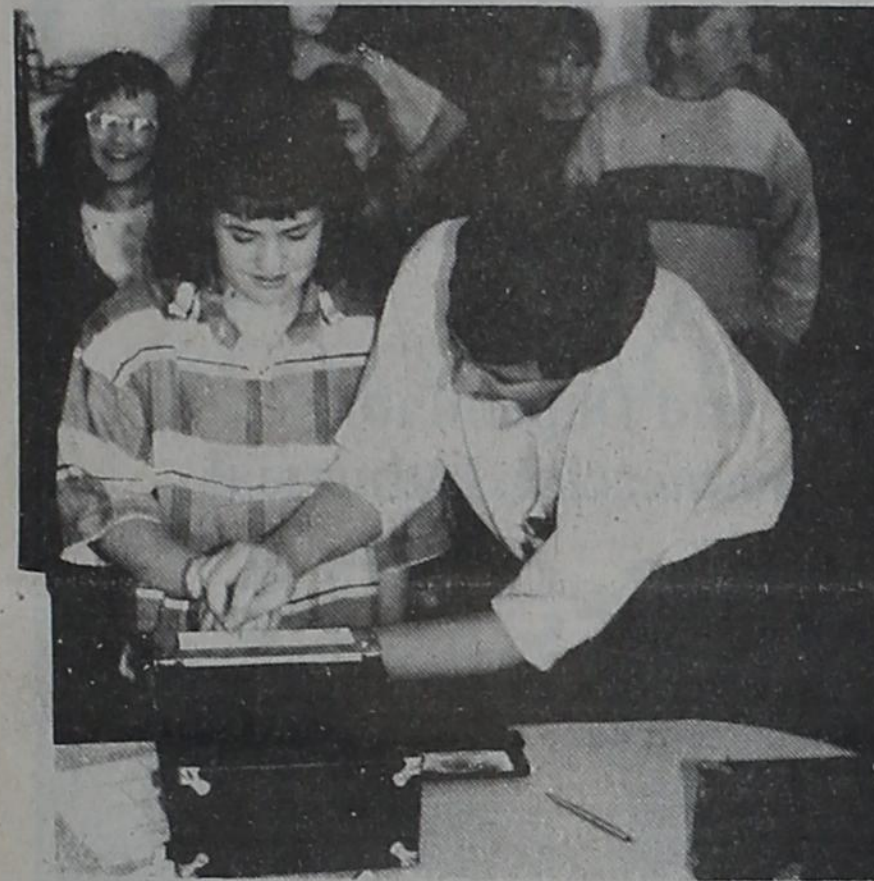
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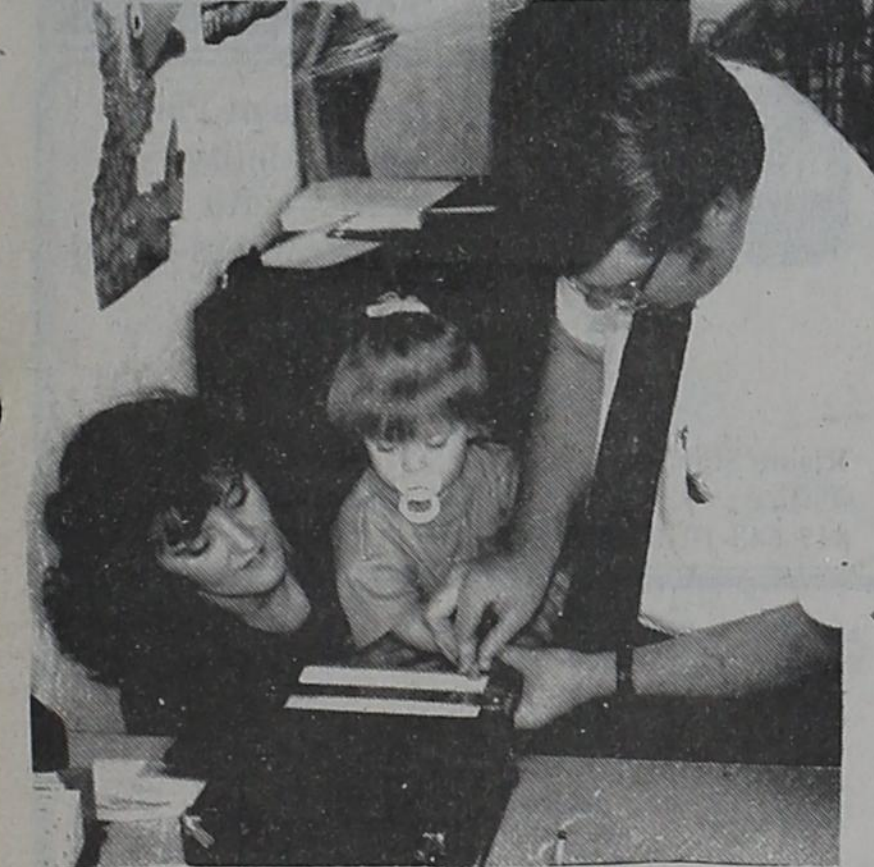
PTO Fingerprinting

Loose Dogs Are a Problem

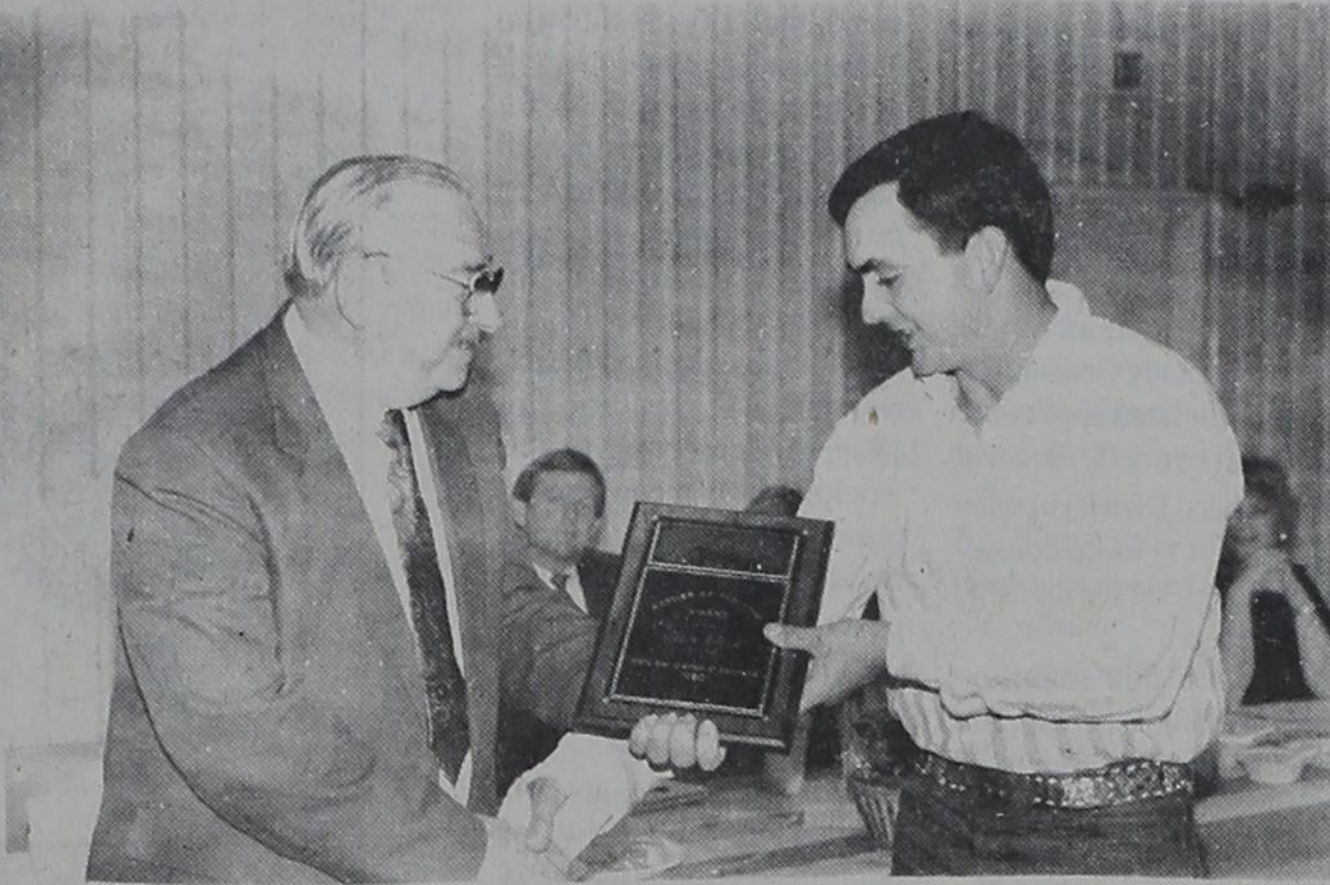

Party Conventions Set

Democratic Precinct Chairmen met at polling places in Eastland and Cisco after the March 13 Primary election. In Eastland 27 delegates were elected to attend the County Convention, with Saul Pullman as Chairman.

Cisco Democrats elected 43 delegates to the County Convention, with June Hicks Chairman. The Cisco Democrats passed this Resolution: That all Democrats will support the elected tickets.

There were no final details of meetings at other Democratic Precincts around the County.

Republicans report that all their Precincts held meetings after the polls closed.

The County Conventions for both parties will be held in the Commissioners Courtroom on Saturday, March 31. The Republicans will meet at 10 a.m. and the Democrats at 2 p.m.

The turnout of voters for the Party Primaries on March 13 was less than half the registered voters in the county. There are around 11,000 registered voters, and the reported total of all votes was 4943.

Absentee Voting Is April 2-9

Political activity still moves along in the County. On Saturday, March 31 both the Democratic and Republican Parties will hold County Conventions in the Court-house.

Then, on Monday, April 2 Absentee voting for the April 10 Run-off elections will begin in the County Clerk's Office, first floor of the Court-house. The Absentee voting will be held daily from 8:30 a.m. - 5 p.m. through Friday, April 6.

Under new laws you do not have to give a reason to cast an Absentee ballot.

A surprise speaker, merry mariachi music, lovely young ladies and presentation of awards were on tap for those attending this year's Rising Star Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture Awards Banquet last Thursday evening.

The surprise for audience was that Rick Perry, Representative for the 64th District, was not the speaker. Last Tuesday's Republican Primary election results put Perry in the April 10 run-off election and he was asked to take part in a debate on Thursday night, the time of Rising Star banquet.

Perry called on his friend, Fred Gough who is running for Perry's place as State Representative, to stand in for him. Although our neighbors in Callahan County are in the 64th District, no one attending the banquet could cast a vote for or against Gough.

A successful businessman and past president of Graham's school board, Gough spoke on some of the major problems facing the Texas Legislature and outlined steps to take to alleviate them using a common sense approach. He felt a good start had been made toward the workers compensation problem with the proposals made by the committee on which Perry had served. Education problems facing the State need more changes than those being considered on the financial level, he said. Too much paperwork for teachers, the complexity of rules for administration and the quality of education are also areas of concern. He feels Texas schools can improve the quality of education and do it in a more efficient manner so that taxpayers can afford it. Gough also spoke against the forced consolidation of rural school districts.

Recognized for outstanding scholastic achievement were freshman Duane Schawb, son of Cynthia and Lynn Clark; sophomore Gherda Williams, daughter of Wanda and Travis Williams; junior Wendy Green, daughter of Debbie and Ronnie Green; and senior Becky Walker, daughter of Carolyn and Douglas Walker.

Outstanding business award went to Buddy Cook

and James Cook who, with their wives, own and operate Buddy's Plumbing & Appliances. The Cooks have expanded their merchandise and services offered since they opened the store in downtown Rising Star several years ago.

Outstanding farmer award went to Steve White. He, too, has expanded in the several years he has been farming.

Outstanding citizen award went to Dr. Charles M. Barnes. A veterinarian formerly associated with NASA and interested in agriculture in his retirement here, Dr. Barnes not only served Rising Star, but the entire county, last year when he so diligently worked up a proposal for a state prison to be built in Eastland County.

Wendy Green was crowned Miss Rising Star by Becky Walker, whose reign is ending. Tami Vandivere, daughter of Sue and Willie Vandivere, was named runner-up. Other candidates were Clarissia Atwood, Racheal Coleman, Pamela Hollis and Patricia Pavon.

Officers for the upcoming year are Gene Lyon, president; Barbara Kanady, vice president; and Carol Cook, secretary and treasurer.

Serving on the board of directors are Barbara Kanady, Lottie Mae Roach, Evelyn Donham, Sue

Landess, Gene Hicks, Frank Agnew and ex-officio members James Ramsay, Dr. Donald Bryan and Carolyn Ratliff.

Emcee for the banquet was the Rev. Darrell Dossey. James Ramsay welcomed those attending. Gene Lyon introduced the officers and directors and Dr. Bryan introduced the speaker. The Rev. Dossey made the announcements for the awards and the plaques and certificates were presented by Lyon. The invocation was given by Gary Adams and the Rev. Dr. Andy Fowler gave the benediction.

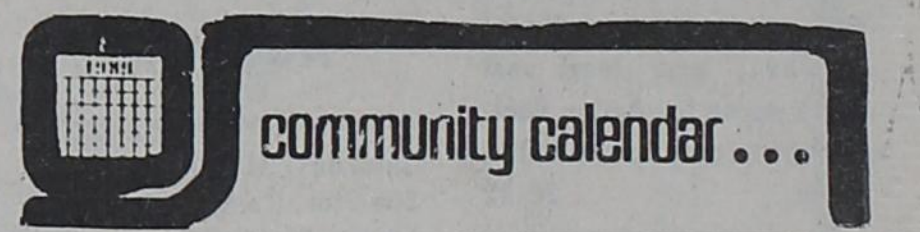

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Eastland County property owners wishing to sign up for 1990 property tax exemptions and/or special land valuations may obtain the necessary application forms at the office of the Eastland County Appraisal District in Eastland, Texas. The office is located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse. The completed application form must be timely filed with the Appraisal District by May 1, 1990 if it is to be considered timely filed for the 1990 year.

There are numerous exemptions and/or special valuations available through the State Property Tax Code. A partial list of these is shown at the end of this article. If a property owner has a question as to his or her eligibility, they should contact the Eastland County Appraisal District for assistance. Homeowners can take advantage of the partial homestead exemption which is available to this exemption

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must be applied for before May 1, 1990. It is emphasized that this residential homestead exemption does not have to be applied for every year. If the residential homestead owner still resides in the same house for 1990 that he or she lived in for 1989; they would have to file again if they received the exemption on the residence for 1989. An exception to this would be the homeowner who turned 65 years of age during the 1989 year or who had never signed up for the additional exemption which is available to Over-65 homeowners.

If you have any doubt as to whether you are receiving a homestead exemption or as to your eligibility; please contact the Eastland County Appraisal District for assistance. The telephone number is 629-8597.

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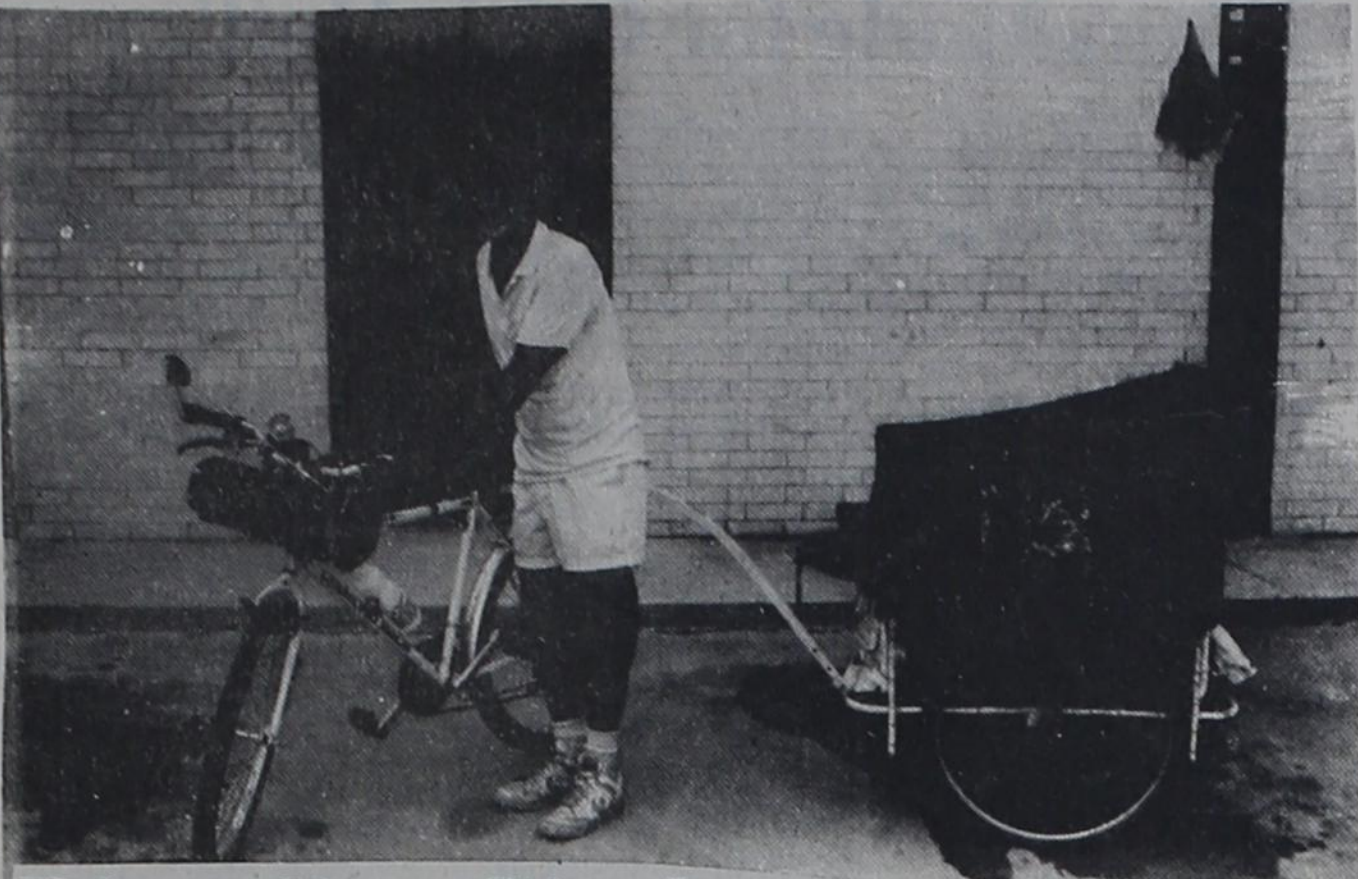

Bicyclist Circles Country For M.S.

There is a lack of understanding about multiple sclerosis, says cabinet maker Robert Carney, who is traveling around the United States by bicycle encouraging people to donate to the Rhode Island Chapter, National Multiple Sclerosis Society, 1255 Oaklawn Ave., Cranston, RI, 02920.

Better known as Captain Bob as he is qualified to sail boats and ships, and has his own boat, the "very young" 64 year old was reared in Florida.

multiple sclerosis, Carney wanted to do something to help. So he left Providence, Rhode Island, on September 23, 1989, to circle the nation by bicycle. He passes out literature about the disease and suggests donations.

On the first leg of his trip, Carney bicycled from Providence to Key West, Florida. He spent the Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's holidays in Florida, and was taken on a side trip to the Bahamas by some people he met.

second leg of the trip running from Key West to San Diego, California, Carney ran into storms in the deep south. Rain and high winds soaked and shook the tent he usually sleeps in at night and his equipment.

A smaller trailer pulled by the bicycle hauls a tent, sleeping bag, something to drink, and other essentials, along with literature.

In Dallas, Carney's bicycle was stolen when he stopped for the night. But after his fate was broadcast in the city, a businessman sent him a new bicycle, which he is now using.

Arriving in Eastland County Tuesday, March 13, he camped in Cisco before continuing on to Abilene.

A veteran of World War II who has six daughters, Carney was longing for the flat areas of West Texas as he made his way up local hills. He is hoping to make it across the desert Southwest before the heat of summer.

The third leg of the trip is to take Carney from San Diego to Seattle, Washington, and the final leg is across the northern states back to Rhode

Island. Due to cold winter weather and steep mountains on the last leg, Carney doesn't expect to complete his journey before 1991.

After completing the long and hard trip, Carney suggests that he would like to retire and sail his boat from Australia to Greece. But the longest part of the trip is still ahead, about 15,000 miles.

Carney says that he has also had some radios and tapes stolen along the route while some people have taken him out to dinner and rented him a motel room. But he insists that you donate to multiple sclerosis, not him, and he gives God the credit for taking care of him on the trip.

Texas Education

Dr. W.F. Kirby, Texas Commissioner of Education, addressed some 300 newspaper publishers Feb. 3 in Dallas for the 109th Texas Press Association Mid-Winter Convention and said, "We must improve the quality of education in Texas...we are in a crisis."

Kirby began his address by informing those present of his early start in the education field. He served as janitor in Medina while attending college and also served as chief of the local volunteer fire department. Those two jobs, "putting out fires and cleaning up messes," said Kirby, helped prepare him for the Commissioner of Education post.

Kirby reported on a few major differences between Texas children and children in Japan and China with respect to education. He has visited those countries' schools exclusively.

The two major differences are the attitude of the people toward education and the teaching of values in school." Kirby said the parents of school children in Japan and China set extremely high expectations and standards for their children. They expect mental perspiration and don't make excuses for children. If children fall short of goals parents inform the children that they didn't work hard enough. Kirby also indicated that schools in Japan and China stress values—honesty, integrity and good work ethics.

He called the commitment in Texas to education "mediocre" and indicated that the pay teachers were receiving was sub-par. He pointed out that Texas would have to increase funds spent in education by three billion dollars to get where the state of Florida is today.

Kirby said those critical of education in Texas, "were all right, we must improve the quality of education." With respect to the Edgewood vs Kirby decision, the commissioner said one of two things must happen - "We either have to come up with more money to bring poor school districts up or resort to the 'Robin Hood' effect and take more money from wealthy school districts and give to poor districts." Kirby said he couldn't count enough votes needed to redistribute funds. He indicated that Fort Worth was receiving \$70 million in state aid; Austin and Dallas \$50 million and Houston \$167 million. "Where is the quality of education in Houston if \$167 million is pulled from that state district when 80 percent of the funds are spent in personnel areas," said Kirby.

Kirby felt the additional revenues to bring poor school districts up would need to come from a tax at the state level, broad based across the state, not putting any additional tax burdens on the backs of local taxpayers.

The Rising Star Independent School District is a school that would substantially benefit from any type of equity plan. According to the superintendent, Dr. Donald E. Bryan, approximately \$1,998 per student, or \$449,548 for the 225 Rising Star students, comes to Rising Star from the state.

In the case of the state mandated teacher pay hike

of \$1,800, Bryan said the formula for computing the funding did not change from the previous year, so he said the local district absorbed the increase to the tune of \$37,800 for the district's 21 teachers.

The entire issue of school funding will be heavily discussed over the next few months. Numerous politicians, special interest groups and organizations have plans each feels will work toward making Texas comply with the court order to equalize. The Big Country School Administrators Association is coordinating a high-powered program involving some half-dozen speakers to present their school finance program at the association's meeting in Abilene on Feb. 22. Supt. Bryan, other RSISD administrators and several school board members will be attending this meeting.

The Edgewood vs. Kirby Texas Supreme Court ruling that children deserve equal opportunity has spanned 21 years and two lawsuits. The Texas Supreme Court, in a unanimous decision, has given the Texas Legislature until May 1, to put together a school finance system that puts an end to some wealthy school districts providing olympic-size swimming pools for students while students in some poor districts lack the funds to be able to take chemistry or a foreign language. The state comptroller's office estimates that 730 of Texas' 1,100 school districts and 1.8 million of its 3 million public school children will benefit from the Texas Supreme Court ruling in Edgewood vs Kirby.

Kirby feels it will take a five-year plan to reach full compliance with the court order. He indicated that pumping \$200 million into the system was only a drop in the bucket. He felt that \$500 to \$600 million this year and a plan to improve equity by five percent a year until 1995 may be acceptable to the court.

Kirby pleaded with publishers present to make an attempt to get people to

understand and inform legislators that "the way to solve the problem was not to redistribute money."

He called Governor Clements' hard stand on no new taxes a big hurdle and felt it was going to be hard to get the Texas legislators to pass a tax bill before the May 1 showdown.

Kirby touched on rollback elections, pointing out that the Blanket school district taxpayers, after seeing their taxes go from 67 cents per \$100 valuation to \$1.40 voted a rollback. "Taxpayers aren't going to put any more money into the system," he said.

Kirby said Texas legislators "needed to take a remedial math course," after voting the \$1,800 raise for 200,000 teachers which amounts to \$360 million and only providing \$200 million in funds for the program.

Kirby closed his talk by saying that schools were reflective of society. "Sixty percent of all students in Texas live in a one parent household and one third of all students in Texas are on free lunches.

One Texas publisher asked if Commissioner Kirby could support a state income tax if the property tax were abolished. "I could support a revised system," said Kirby. Indicating that rolling back the sales tax to possibly four percent and implementing a state income tax would give the local property tax payers some relief.

In other business, data on the up-dated Directory of County Resources is now being put on a computer. The Association is still trying to add information on Community Services offered in Gorman and Ranger. Please call Resources Director Corrie Cowley at 629-1813 if you wish to add information.

At Wednesday's meeting Margaret Corbell reported that all the free garden seed had been distributed. There had been a lot of interest in the project this year, with more than 40 families taking the seed for beautification and the raising of food.

Special Tax Advice For Older Americans

If you're an older American, be sure you're not missing out on some important tax benefits, says the American Association of retired persons (AARP).

For example, there's the credit for the elderly or disabled. This credit could reduce the taxes you pay if you are age 65 or older, or if you are disabled. The credit is based on the taxpayer's income, filing status, age, and spouse's age (if the taxpayer is married). To figure this credit, use schedule R.

If you're 65 or older or blind and do not itemize deductions, the internal revenue service says you may be entitled to take a standard deduction amount

on your tax return for 1989 that is higher than the amount available to other taxpayers. The standard deduction table in the 1040 instruction booklet can help you determine your deduction.

As an older American you may not have to file a return. If you are single and age 65 or older, you generally need

not file a 1989 return if your gross total income was less than \$5,850. If you would ordinarily file a joint return, and both you and your spouse are 65 or older, usually no return is required unless your joint income for 1989 was at least \$10,400.

Are you thinking of selling your home? If you are age 55 or older, you may be able to take advantage of a once-in-a-lifetime \$25,000 exclusion on the gain from the sale.

Free tax assistance is available to low and moderate income older people through AARP's tax-aid program. Tax-aid volunteers are trained in cooperation with the IRS, and provide assistance from February 1 to April 15 each year. They can help you complete the necessary Federal, State and Local Tax Forms. To locate the tax-aid site nearest you, contact WALTER Knowlden, telephone (817) 442-1715.

Though youngsters need cholesterol to grow, many are at risk for heart disease. The American Academy of Pediatrics now recommends cholesterol screening of children over age two in families with a history of heart disease or high blood cholesterol.

In a study in Bologna, Italy, children with eczema were given capsules of evening primrose oil—3 gr. a day. Marked improvement was noted with in four weeks.

Canker sores of the mouth seem to heal faster with applications of a strong solution of tetracycline—one 250mg. capsule in 2 tablespoons water—applied directly to the ulcer, according to reports in the journal Emergency Medicine.

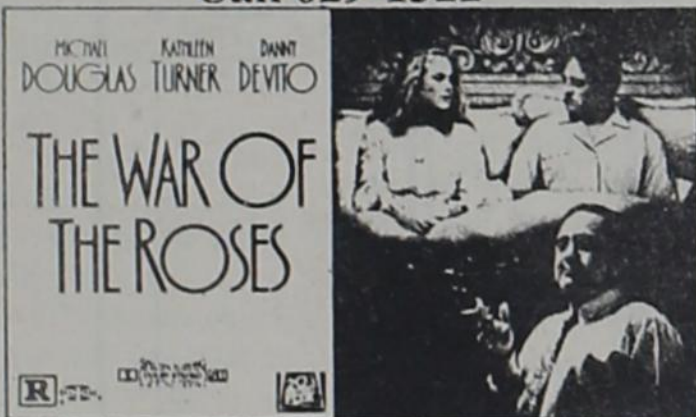

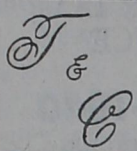

HELP FOR MIL-DEWED ANTIQUES

You love antiques, but when you bring them into your home they sometimes bring a musty smell. You may be able to enjoy your antiques without the smell. Here's how.

To remove musty odors in enclosed parts of the furniture - inside drawers or cabinet doors, for example - first open drawers and doors to air. Next, with a mild soap and hot water, wash and scrub the insides thoroughly, including the backs of doors and, if drawers can be removed, the surfaces behind and beneath the drawers. Take care not to soak the wood. Quickly dry damp surface with a towel and leave doors and drawers open for a day or two to allow air to circulate. Enclosing washed areas while they are still damp could create a mildew problem. When thoroughly dried and aired, spray with a cedar deodorizer or place your favorite sachet of potpourri scented to keep it smelling beautiful.

To rid old wicker of mildew, rub the mildewed spots with a cloth dipped in a mixture of ammonia and water. The cleaning cloth should be well squeezed so as not to saturate the wood, which could discolor from too much solution. Give cleaned areas a mild salt water bath and dry in the sun.

To clean a mildewed rug or piece of tapestry, take it outside the house and brush away any loose mold. If you do this indoors, you could inadvertently spread mold spores throughout the house. Vacuum away loosened mold and dispose of vacuum bags immediately in an outdoor trash can. Use a fan to dry damp spots. Remove mildew stains with a rug shampoo. If an item is badly stained or too delicate to treat, take it to a professional antique restorer.

To clean dirty, mildewed leatherbound books, use saddle soap. Work a damp sponge into a lather by rubbing it on the soap, then apply the sponge on the leather covers in gentle circular motions. Pass a clean, damp sponge over soaped areas until soap is gone, then dry. Buff with a shoe cream in a matching color to restore the leather's suppleness.

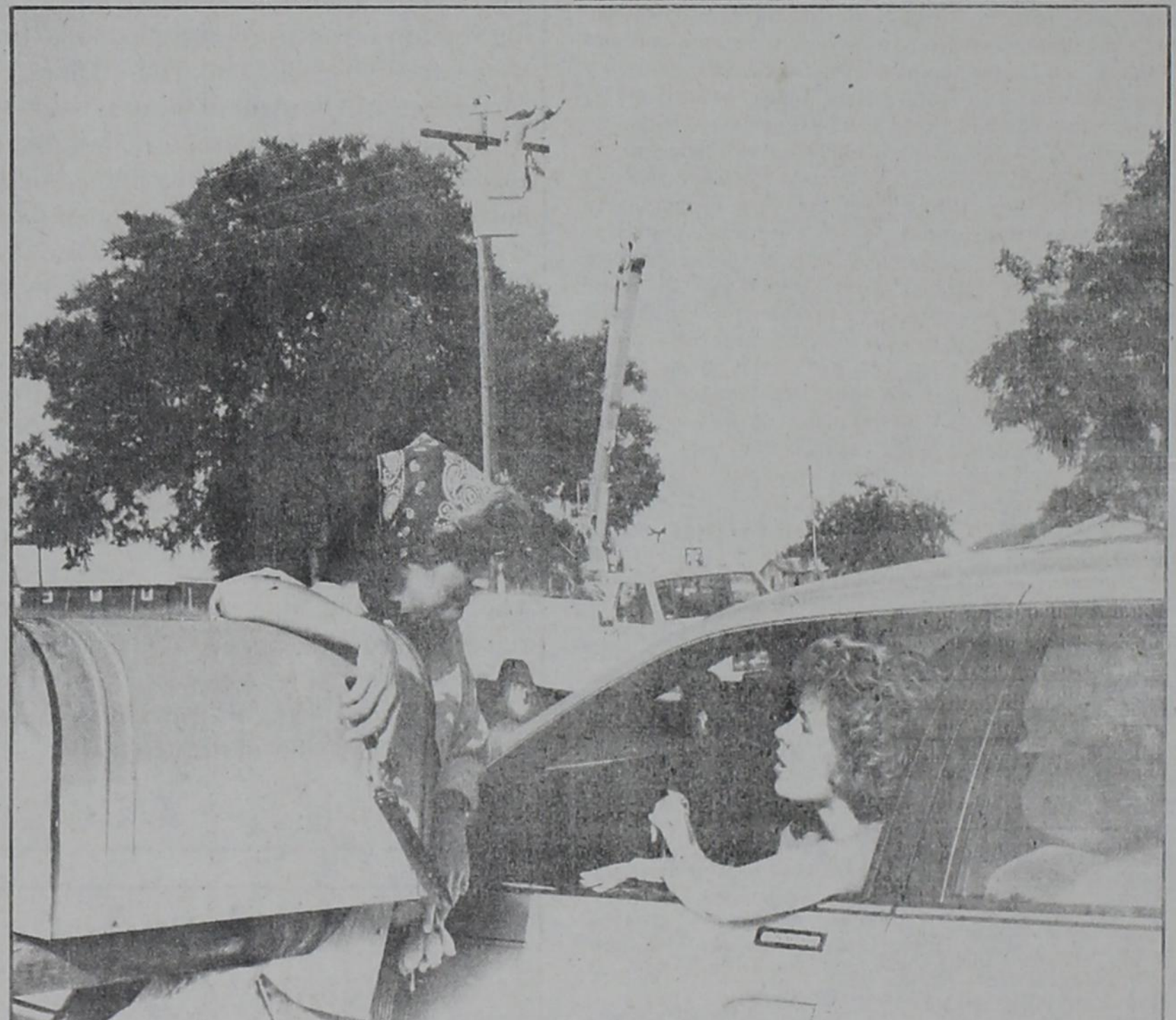

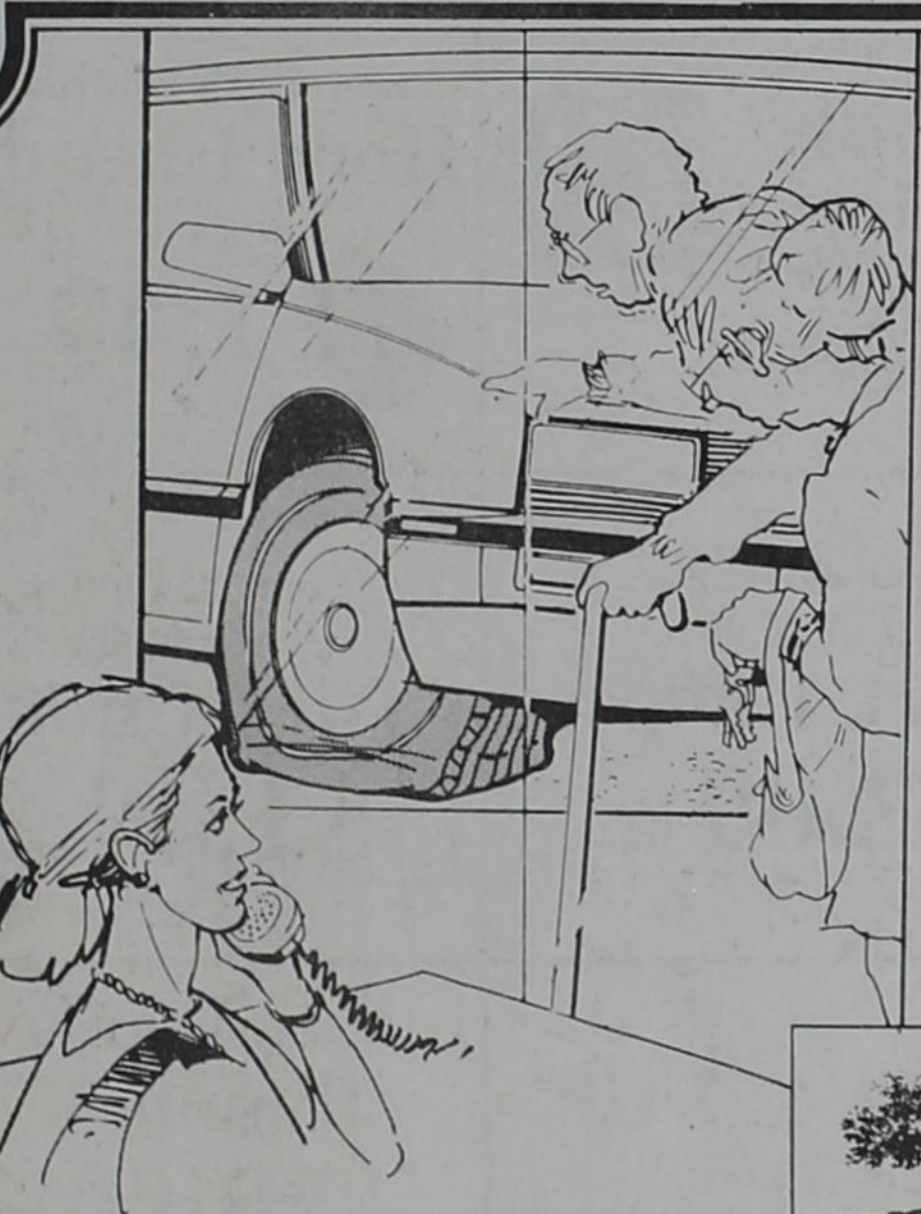

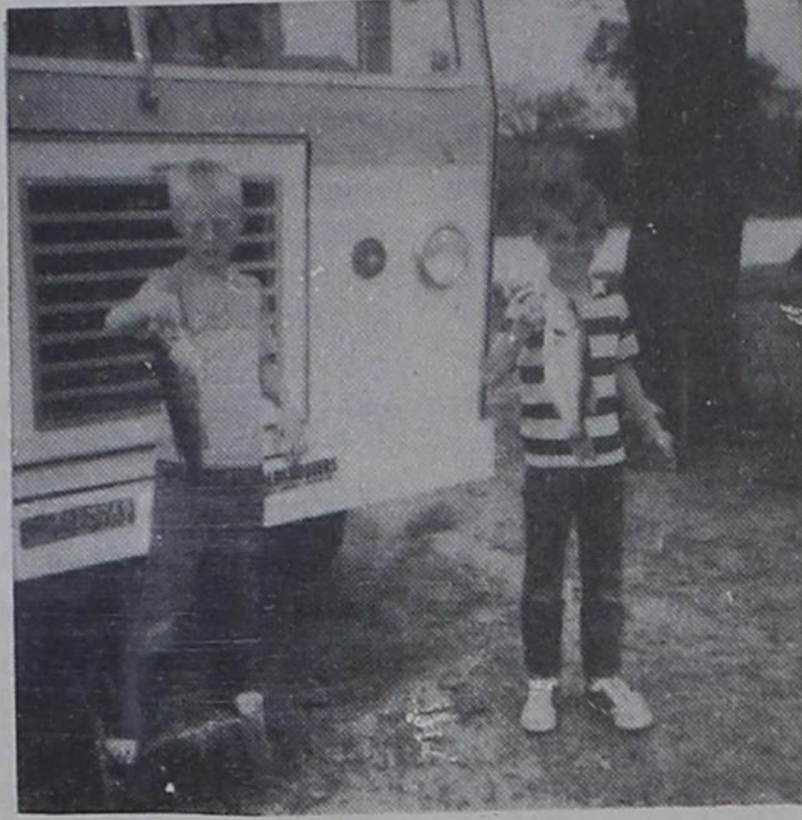

Rebate Received

AUSTIN - State Comptroller Bob Bullock said that sales tax rebates to Texas cities are up almost 5 percent so far this year as compared to last year. The March rebate checks sent to cities totaled \$69 million, an increase of nearly 13 percent over last March's payments.

"The increase for the first three months of the year is right in line with our forecast of 5 to 6 percent growth in taxable sales this year," Bullock said.

Payments to counties totaled \$7.3 million this month, compared to \$5.9

million last March. The 23 percent jump over last March's payments is partly due to the increased number of counties collecting sales tax now, Bullock said.

This month's checks include taxes collected on January sales and reported in February by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

Liability Insurance Guide

The liability insurance crisis of the mid-1980s prompted Congress to create new mechanisms for coverage of businesses and professional people.

These mechanisms are called purchasing groups and risk retention groups. Under federal law, they are subject to less state regulation than ordinary insurance companies.

At present, 199 purchasing groups and 46 risk retention groups operate in Texas.

The State Board of Insurance has published a new booklet to assist purchasers of general liability insurance as they decide whether to buy coverage through purchasing groups.

The 20-page booklet, "A Consumer Guide: Understanding Purchasing
