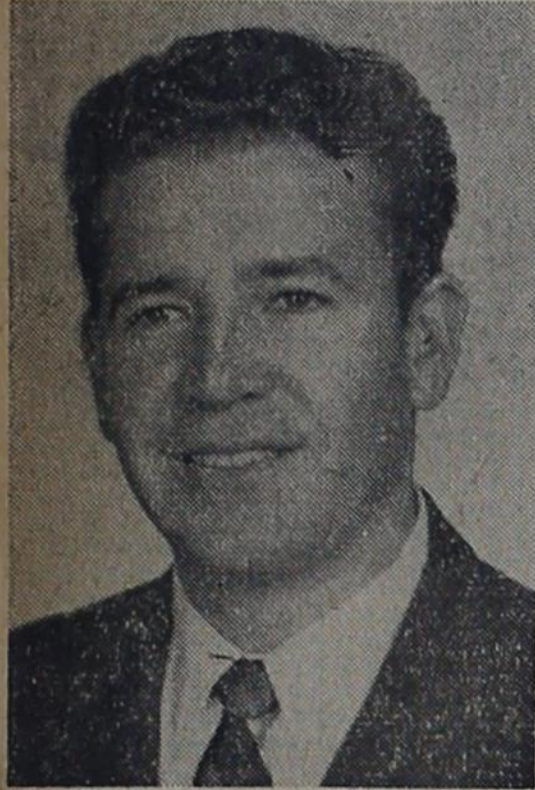

Farm Editor T. C. Richardson Gives Amity Two Prizes

You can't have "security from the cradle to the grave" and if you could it would not be good for you, said T. C. Richardson, editor of Farmer - Stockman, sponsor of Texas Rural progress contest last Saturday night as he presented the Amity community two checks. One was the \$100 amount for winner in rural progress and the \$75 was for being winner in the district. A large crowd heard the farm editor and most of them seemed in agreement with what he had to say.

Mr. Richardson told of coming to Sipe Springs with his father and buying cotton seed at 5 cents a bushel to feed their cattle during the drought in 1887.

The people of the area were complimented for their determination to do something for themselves. If we wait for Uncle Sam to do everything for us what kind of people are we anyway.

At one place in his address he said he was indeed glad to see people eating together for it has been his idea over the years that where people ate together they did not eat each other. One man from the large crowd yelled amen, brother, you are preaching now.

The family unit system is the bulwark of democracy. Where you find all members of the family eating together, playing together, worshipping together and working together, there will never be a dictator he said. And although we came very near to giving everything away in the false hope that foolishisms and ideas could work, we have found out now that only hard work, intelligent thinking and planning are the bulwarks of our civilization.

Koje-do, Korea
5 June, 1953

Dear Mr. Hicks, I have just read, with a great deal of interest, your article about my telephone call home. Loraine sent it to me. I am very glad to know that I am still remembered "back home."

You might be interested to know that I have recently moved, with my battalion, from the mainland of Korea to the small island of Kojedo. We have the mission of securing various prisoners of war enclosures. The P. W.'s we have profess to be died-in-the-wool Communists but we look upon them for the most part as cowed and inert individuals who were coerced into a totalitarian state with promises that their leaders had no intention of keeping. It is difficult to understand their motives. The why, that they would put such fanatic support behind a government with such diametrical ideals of a free man. They have been downtrodden and impoverished peoples over so many centuries that perhaps they too are grasping for a better life and will soon learn that Communism is not what they are looking for. I sincerely hope that that time is not far in the future and we will soon be able to wind this thing up.

Thanks again for remembering me and I hope to see you some time in August.

Continued Dry Weather Is Challenge to Man. ... Is Irrigation Practicable Around Rising Star?

The above question asked by so many citizens of this area is one that should be given careful consideration by all our people. Especially by farmers, business leaders and the people who earn their living from agriculture. The entire economy of Rising Star depends upon farming, ranching and agriculture in all its different types. Of course we know that oil does play a part... it helps a lot. Several derive money from rentals and leases. That is fine. Still the main economy of this section depends upon rain or water, that has been missing for the past several years. From the way it looks today it will continue to be dry and our people will suffer. There has not been a perfect season for planting and cultivating crops in many years and as one prominent farmer stated to this writer last week "not one year during my 50 years of trying to farm, but that some crop or crops suffer from lack of water."

Here are some facts taken from the Progressive Farmer: In 1939 Texas had under irrigation 843,839 acres; in 1944, 1,358,000 and in 1949 there were 3,480,000. It must have proven good business for those who are practicing irrigation or the increase would not have been three to five times as much.

There are a number of men in this locality who are interested in seeing a program started or a survey made that would give the people interested some facts and figures whereby they would know how much water there is underground. What the depth is and how well suited the water would be for irrigation purposes. Also competent engineers can tell how long the supply will last. This survey can be made if only enough people would take enough interest.

Guyle Greynolds has installed an irrigation system on his place south of Rising Star. Several have taken the time to go out and see the system in operation. While we have not had a recent report from Mr. Greynolds, yet a few weeks back he was well pleased with the showing made and was very much enthused over the prospects of keeping his crops growing.

Jesse B. Hearin of the Production Corporation of New Orleans said "I would like to see our county agents, business leaders and others stress irrigation." "I know of some eight or ten projects that have been financed by the association, and not one of them has been a failure."

The Chamber of Commerce would do well to take up this matter. See how much our underground water supply is. What is the actual cost of ten to twenty acre projects. How many would be interested. In other words have a complete survey made so that our people would know the facts about irrigation in and around Rising Star.

Last December while driving through the desert in Arizona my wife and I came upon a place where there were new houses being built, streets laid off, stores in operation and lots of people busy in making plans for their new homes. When we inquired as to what was going on was told a new irrigation system was being installed.

It takes organization. It takes courage. It takes some taking the lead. But it all adds up to the challenge of man to overcome the many obstacles that now confront the dry weather that has plagued this section for several years.

This writer does not claim to know too much about irrigation. But we do know that through so many parts of Texas, Arizona and New Mexico men have made the desert bloom because they had a mind to try and organized and went to work. It has paid big here. It can be made to pay here. Who will call a meeting, discuss the matter, ask one of our state engineers to come and meet with us. Then we can go from there.

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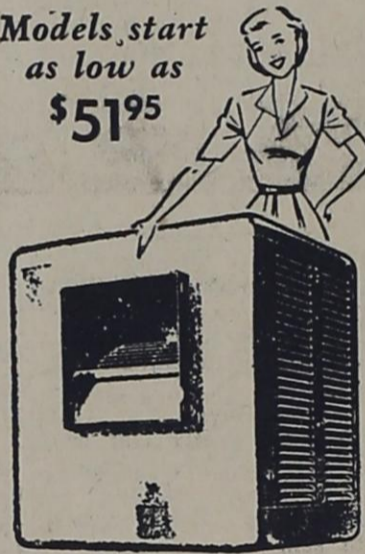
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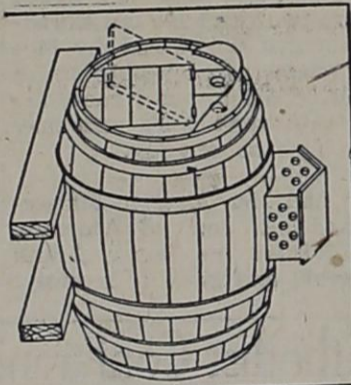
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A BARREL OF FUN WITH PEANUT PETE FROM OVER ON LEON

Cisco Man Jailed Charge Serious Assault

CISCO, June 4.—Bennie Cochran, being held in the county jail at Eastland, and Warren Denton, receiving treatment for gunshot wounds in the Ranger General hospital, Ranger, are the participant in an alleged affray which occurred in the Romney community Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

Cochran is being held in the county jail on charges of assault with intent to murder.

He is a resident of Cisco. The victim, reported in fair condition this morning, resides about three miles south of Cisco.

Cause of the trouble between the two men remained unknown early today.

The Eastland County sheriff's department was notified immediately after the shooting and a warrant for Cochran's arrest was issued by Justice of Peace Jim Boggus of Eastland.

According to reports the wounded man was taken to Rising Star for first aid treatment, but later was moved to the Ranger hospital. Attending physicians are quoted as saying that his condition is not serious and that he'll recover.

Cisco city police officers arrested Cochran late Friday and he was taken to Eastland and placed in the county jail.

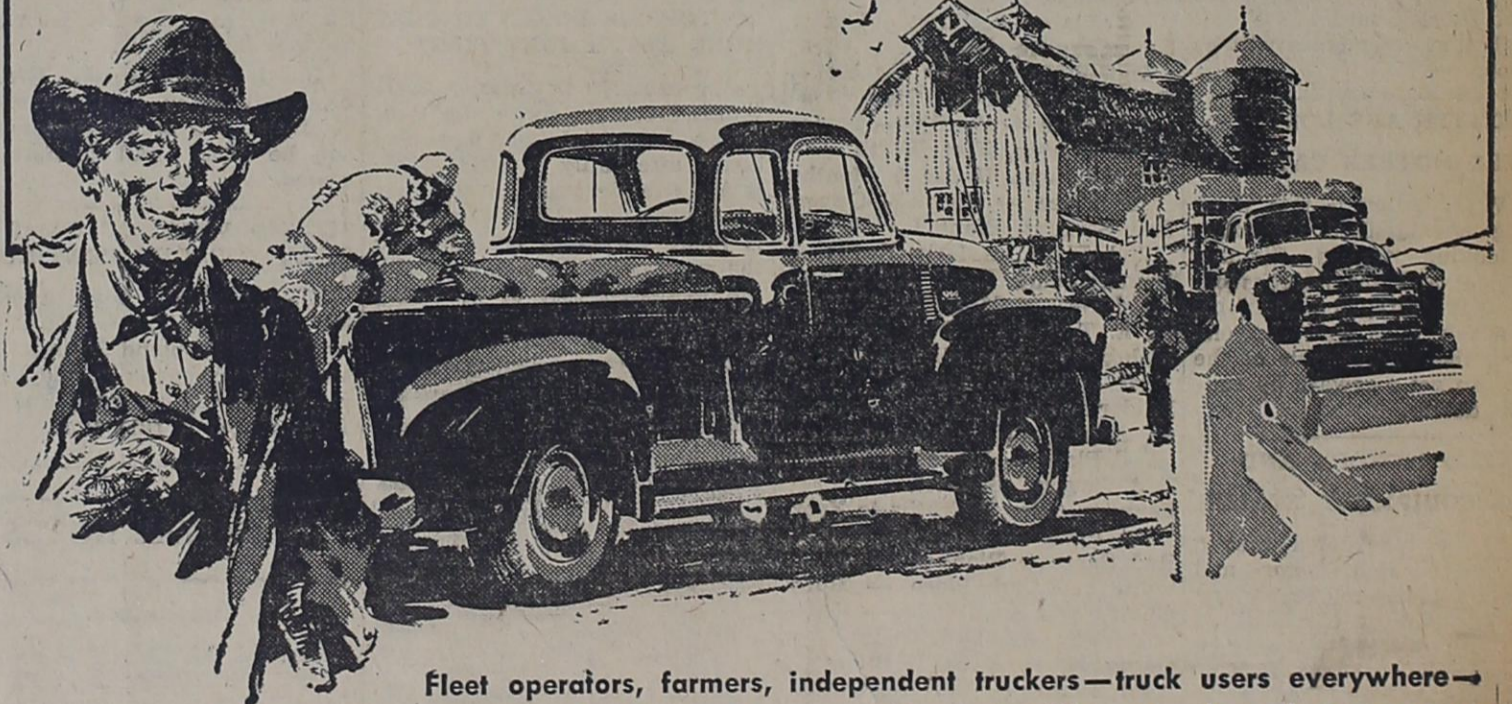

White Says Farmers Are Protected on All Grain Stored

AUSTIN.—The Texas grain farmer now for the first time has adequate protection for his crops held in storage, according to Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White.

Because of the Public Grain Warehouse Bill, passed during the recent 53rd legislative session, a depositor of grain in a public warehouse has his commodities insured against fire, theft, misappropriation, damage due to careless handling, or acts of God. White stated.

Also, for the first time, the farmer may use his stored grain receipts from state bonded warehouses as negotiable security.

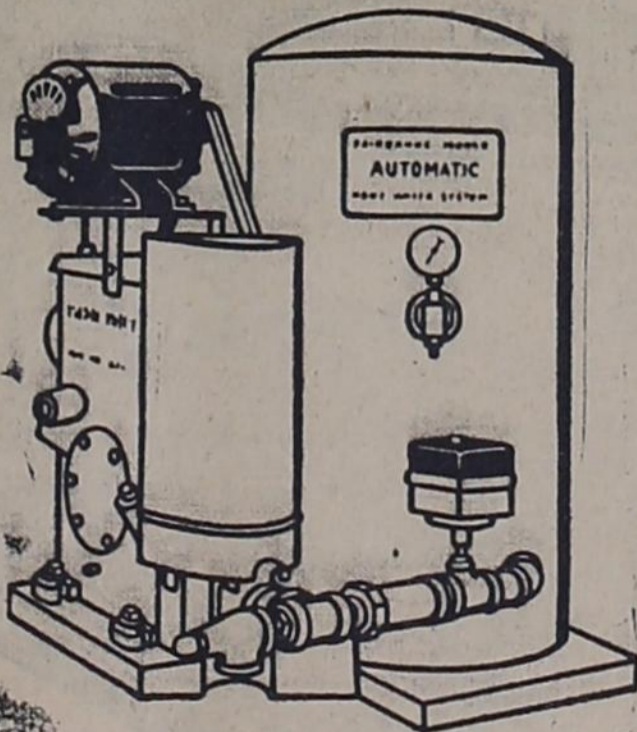

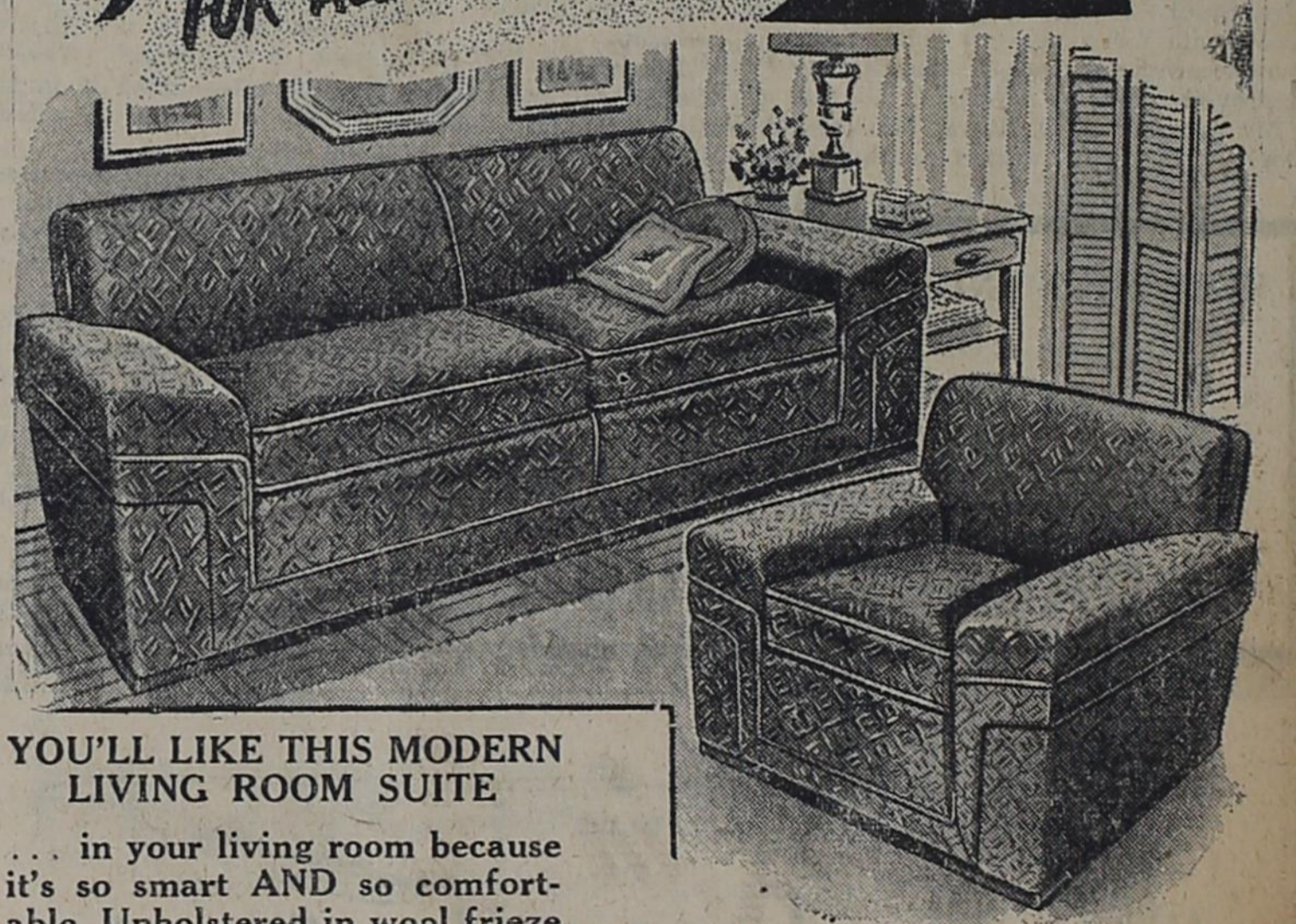

Work on a Leon River dam that will provide lake water for the Cities of Eastland and Ranger is progressing on schedule, the Eastland County Water District reported this week. The lake is being built by a \$1,500,000 bond issue. It is near Staff.

Plans call for the dam to be completed in the fall. The recent heavy rains delayed the work slightly, washing away a small portion of the dam. Workers are now pouring dirt and completing carpentry work.

While the lake will begin filling in the fall with adequate rainfall, use of the water will await completion of a filtration plant and pipelines to the two cities. Work on these projects is due to be started this summer.

With good luck, the two cities may be drinking water from the new lake before the close of the year, water district spokesman reported.

Bag Worms Destroy Much of Greenery

Bag worms excel in the art of camouflaging. Usually confined to Arbovitae and other similar cedar like trees and shrubs they sometimes attack broad leaved plants according to word from the county agent's office.

According to information now is the time to destroy the bag worms. When first hatched the bag worms are so well covered it is difficult to see them. They spin a cone shape water proof, silk cover and conceal the bag with bark and bits of green leaves. As they grow the worms stick only their head out to feed as they move up and down the limb. Both the worm and the bag grow until by August the bag is from three to four inches long.

A lead arsenate spray composed of three tablespoonfuls per gallon of water will kill the bag worms. Usually two sprays, a week apart are sufficient to give excellent control it is said. The pests die slowly sometimes taking ten to twelve days after having received a lethal dose. When dead the bags will continue to cling to the limbs for several months. The lead arsenate is a deadly poison should be handled with care it was warned.

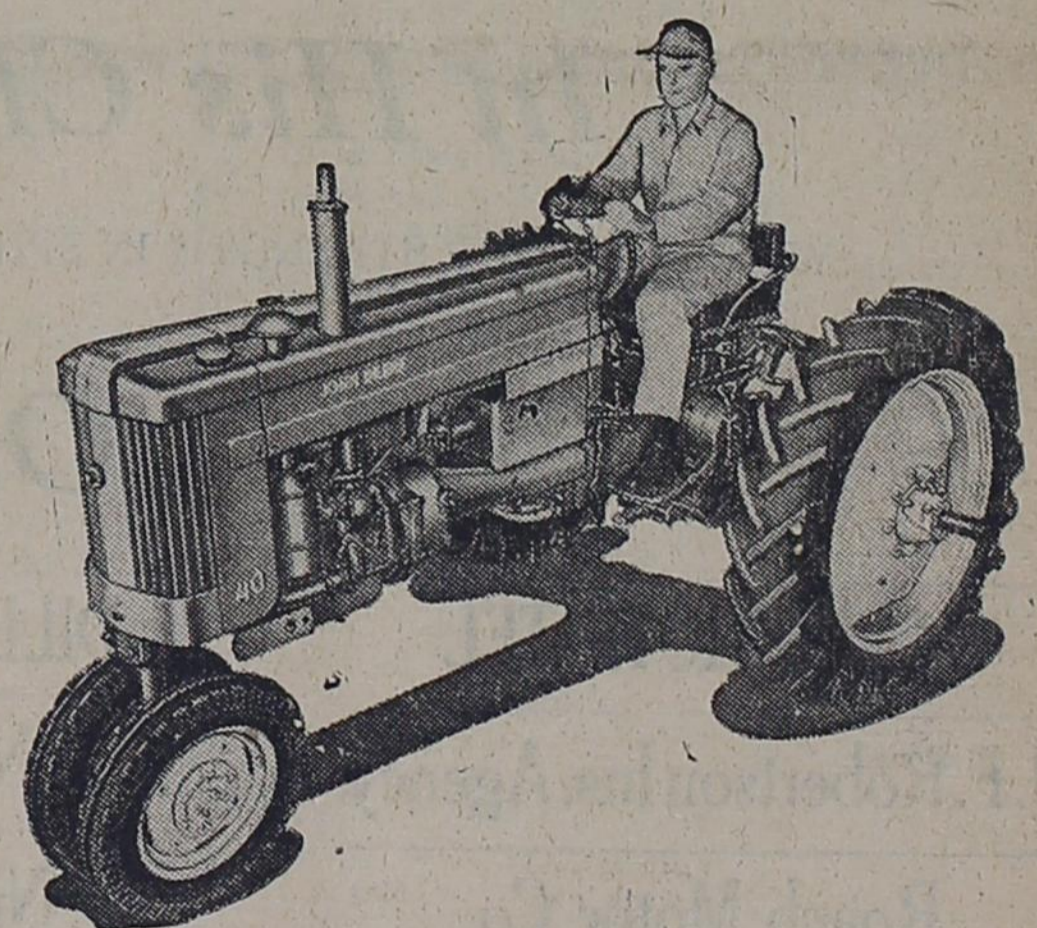

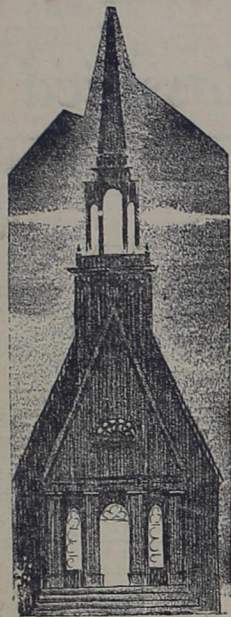

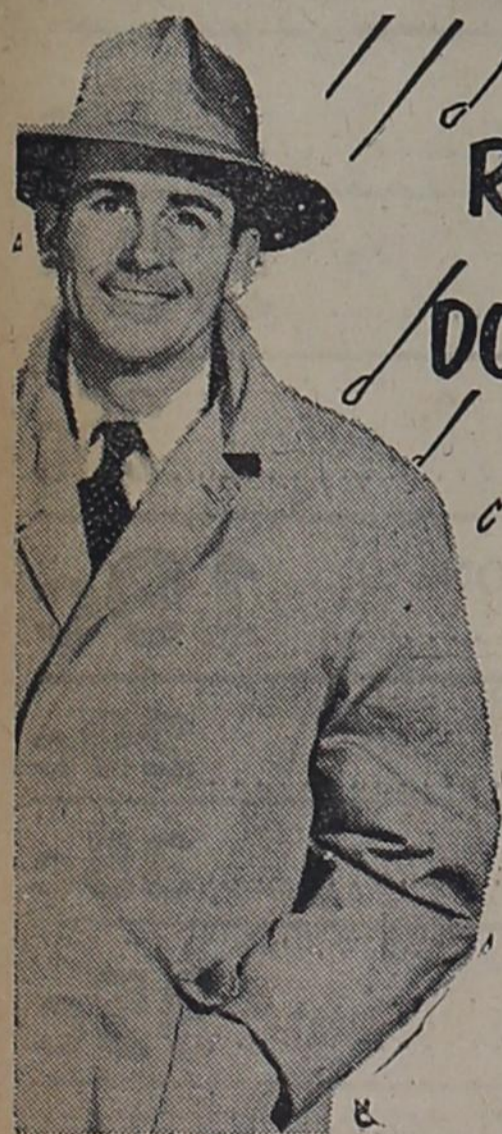

The work sheet followed by families:

- 1—Increasing and managing family income, 4,000 votes.
- 2—Improving health conditions and services, 4,000 votes.
- 3—Improving the farm home, 4,000 votes.
- 4—Encouraging social participation, 8,000 votes.

All these divisions were broken down and worked by chairman of each division, in cooperation with each family.

In the pasture improvement program, won by Hazeldell the same rules applied and each division was handled separately.

The entire community cooperated 100 per cent in their effort to win first place. Because of the extreme dry weather and many other obstacles that entered into following through on each detail a better showing will be made in the contest the coming year.

The contest was well worth everything we put into it said chairman Jenkins and in the coming year we feel sure we will be able to make a better grade than last year. While we may not win first place we have set our sights high and our goal is hard work and close cooperation with each and every family.

The chairman stated further that each and every family had done an excellent job last year—we had splendid cooperation all the way. For the coming contest we know all our people, and there are many more families who are entered this time, will work still harder to make our dreams come true.

A new feature of the 1952-53 program was a separate division for Negro communities. Winner of top honor in the eastern division is the Sunnyside Civic Club of Harris County, \$50; the Neylandville Community of Hunt County was first, \$75, and Pine Springs Community of Smith County, second, \$50 in the northern division and Zion Hill Community of Guadalupe County was first, \$75 and Pleasant Grove Community of Victoria County, second, \$50 in the southern division.

One hundred fifty-seven Texas communities in 68 counties participated in the program. The cash awards will be presented at special meetings in each community in the near future and will be used for further improvements. The contest is judged on the basis of records and visits to the communities. Blackleg Deadly Disease to Cattle; No Known Cure

(Special to Record.)

COLLEGE STATION, May 21. —Blackleg, one of the really deadly diseases of cattle, affects mostly young 6 to 18 months of age says William M. Mohler, Bureau of Animal Industry. The organism that causes it enters the body through small wounds in the skin or the mucous membranes of the mouth and quickly causes extreme symptoms, including rapidly swelling tumors, high fever, great depression, and violent convulsions. Death usually occurs within 36 hours, and the carcass rapidly becomes bloated by gas.

There is no cure for blackleg, but Mohler points out the five kinds of vaccine have been developed, any one of which will make animals immune for 12 to 18 months, the period depending on the vaccine used. There is also an antiblackleg serum for treating calves already affected, but it cannot be relied upon to stop the progress of the disease.

When an animal dies of blackleg, the carcass should at once be completely burned or deeply buried and covered with quicklime.

Any place where the animal has lain should be disinfected with a strong disinfectant. Since the organism is very resistant to destruction and may linger in pastures for a long time, annual vaccination is the only way to conquer the disease.
