The joining election will be held Saturday, April 3, 1982, at City Hall. Election Judge is E.L. Gaines.

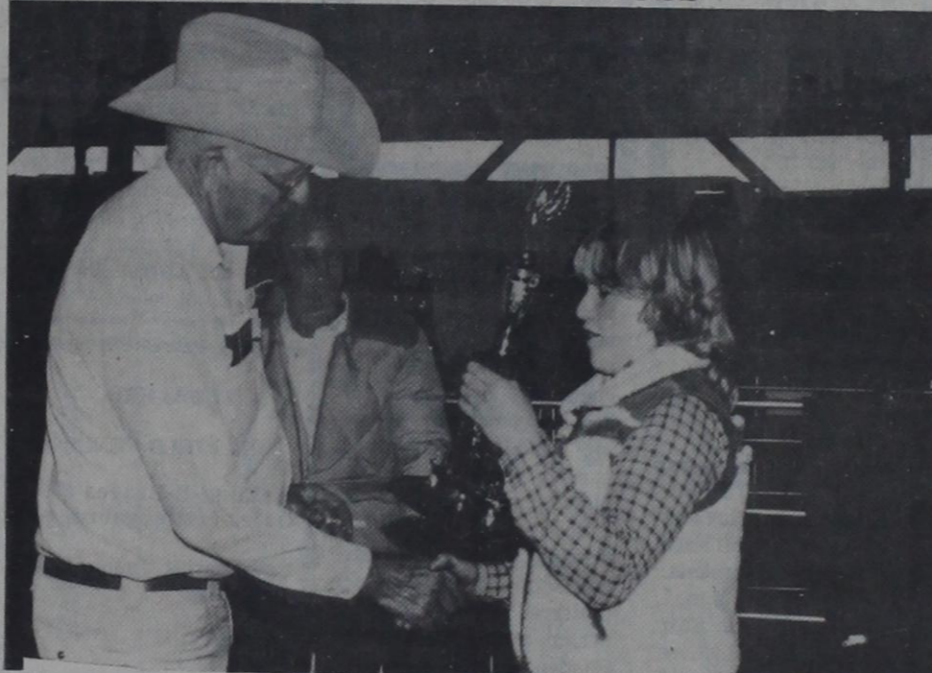
Jack Shults leads in Insurance Sales

City Council Votes Gas Rate Increase

The City Council has discussed the matter for several months. The past rate increase for city gas rates was in 1978. Since that rate increase our suppliers have raised their rates every year following.

After our 1981 audit Farmer and Home Administration advised the City Council in order that we meet our obligation to them that we must have increases across the board which include all utilities furnished by the City of Rising Star.

The City Council, aware of the hardship

it would cause on several citizens, asks that for the time being we increase the gas, then maybe in the future raise the other utilities furnished by the City.

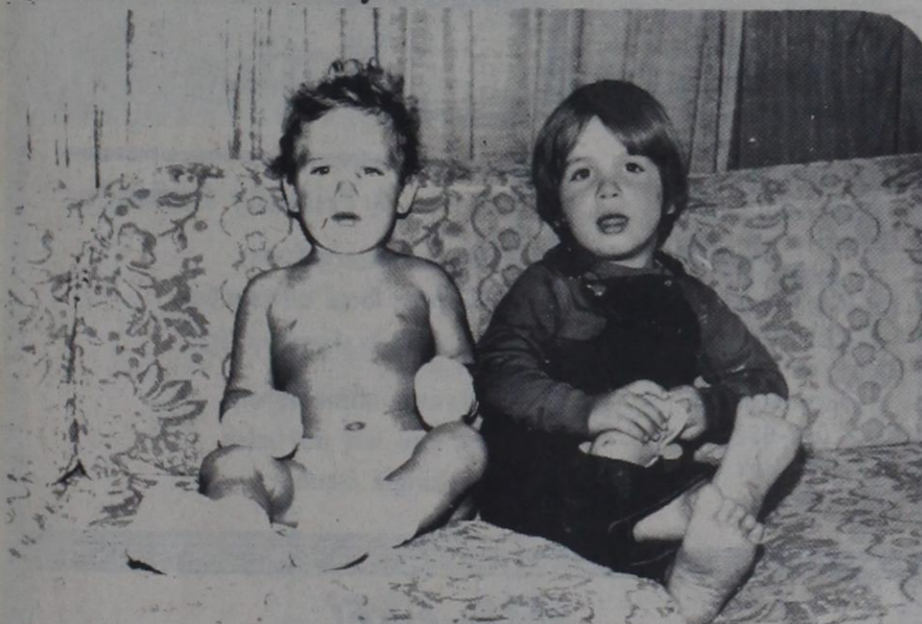
Farmer Home Administration and the City Council agree on a rate increase of gas to a minimum of 2000 cubic feet--\$12.00. Every 1000 thereafter, \$6.00 per 1000 cubic feet. Our present rates were a minimum of 1000 cubic feet at \$5.00. Every thousand thereafter \$4.00 per cubic ft.

Hero, 2½ yrs. old Rescues Brother

Rising Star can boast of a hero only 32 months old, Little Shaun Fox, whose efforts saved his baby brother from more serious burns than those he suffered in an accident here Sunday.

Shaun and Cheyne, the 20-months-old victim, are sons of Brady and Julie Fox of East Pioneer St., Rising Star.

Cheyne had pushed his little red wagon on to hot coals left from the tree and briars his father had burned earlier Sunday morning, apparently had

lost his hold on the wagon and fell, receiving second degree burns on both hands and both feet. Shaun, clasping his hands around Cheyne's neck, pulled his brother from the danger zone.

Older sister, Michelle, 8, had picked up Cheyne and was carrying toward their home when Brady, hearing the alarmed cries of the children, rushed out of the house.

Later in the day, after Cheyne was treated for his burns, his parents began pic-

ing the facts of the event together and learned from Shaun that he had rescued his brother from the area of hot wood coals. Brady and his father, George Fox, then discovered the little wagon, still there, with its wheels melted and burned.

Julie Fox related that, although that Michelle was carrying out her efforts with sobs bordering on hysteria, little Shaun was matter-of-fact about the events and his own part in the drama.

ELECTRIC RATES INCREASED


West Texas Utilities Company has been granted an interim rate increase for power sold to its wholesale customers.

The increase was approved by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, effective February 26, 1982, and will remain in effect until final resolution of a rate application filed last October by WTU. The interim rates granted will result in an increase of \$3.5 million, or 8.1 per cent, annually from 14 rural electric cooperatives, one municipality, and one investor-owned distribution system.

In its application, WTU had asked for a \$4.3 million increase to become effective December 15, 1981. The FERC initially suspended this increase for five months, which would have delayed the effective date of the new rates until May 16, 1982. Granting the interim rates has the effect of shortening the suspension period and allowing lower rates to go into effect subject to refund.

The FERC decision follows closely the increase in retail rates granted by the Public Utility Commission of Texas effective February 12. Together, the increases are expected to provide an additional revenue of \$15.3 million on an annual basis, with \$11.8 coming from retail customers and \$3.5 from wholesale customers. The original cases filed by WTU were designed to produce \$32.2 million in additional revenues.

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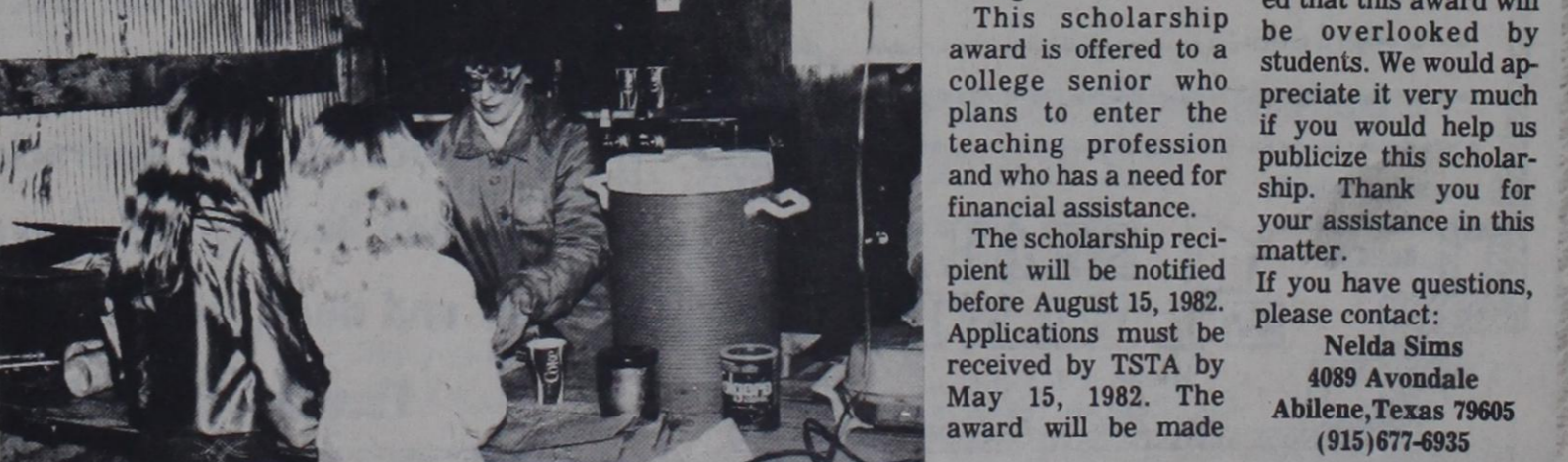
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Scholarship Will Be Given by TSTA

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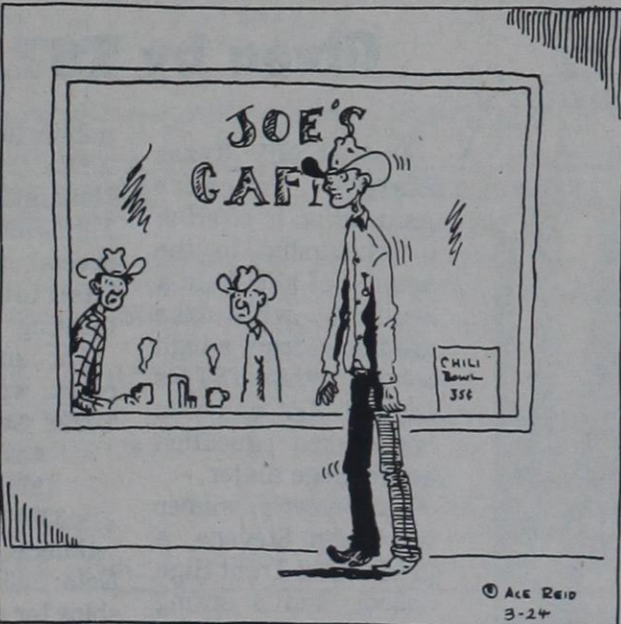

Strokes: What to Watch for

Usually it occurs in people in their 50's and 60's, but children and even infants can suffer a stroke.

Regardless of the different causes that lead to the various types of stroke, all result ultimately from a change in the blood supply reaching the brain, according to the Texas Medical Association.

Sometimes a clot forms in the artery leading to the brain and blocks the blood's passage. Or the walls of the arteries begin to harden with deposits of calcium or fat that narrow the passageway and reduce blood flow.

At other times, a piece of clot breaks loose and travels to the brain, plugging a vessel. Or during cerebral hemorrhage, a stroke occurs when the wall of an artery ruptures, flooding the brain with excess blood.

Older people are more susceptible to strokes because the network of arteries and veins becomes less flexible with age. They harden and become less able to handle blood being pumped faster during sudden movements.

For this reason, doctors constantly warn older patients to slow down their movements, particularly if they awaken to use the bathroom at night. Statistically, more strokes occur than at any other time. The person's blood pressure is at its lowest point, and suddenly he begins to move.

Major strokes result in paralysis of one or both sides of the body, depending on the side of the brain injured during the stroke. Loss of vision and speech can result. Still, 75 percent of those surviving

a stroke eventually regain most of their lost abilities through rehabilitation. But this can take a year or two.

The main factor contributing to the majority of strokes is high blood pressure. Doctors say that more than 50 percent of stroke cases could be prevented with early treatment of high blood pressure. Other factors contributing to stroke are obesity and smoking.

Certain signals commonly precede a stroke: dizziness, numbness, tingling or burning sensation in toes and fingers, weakness in hand, arm or leg on one or both sides, slurred speech, low tolerance to alcohol, vision disorders, and a personality change, such as decreased irritability.

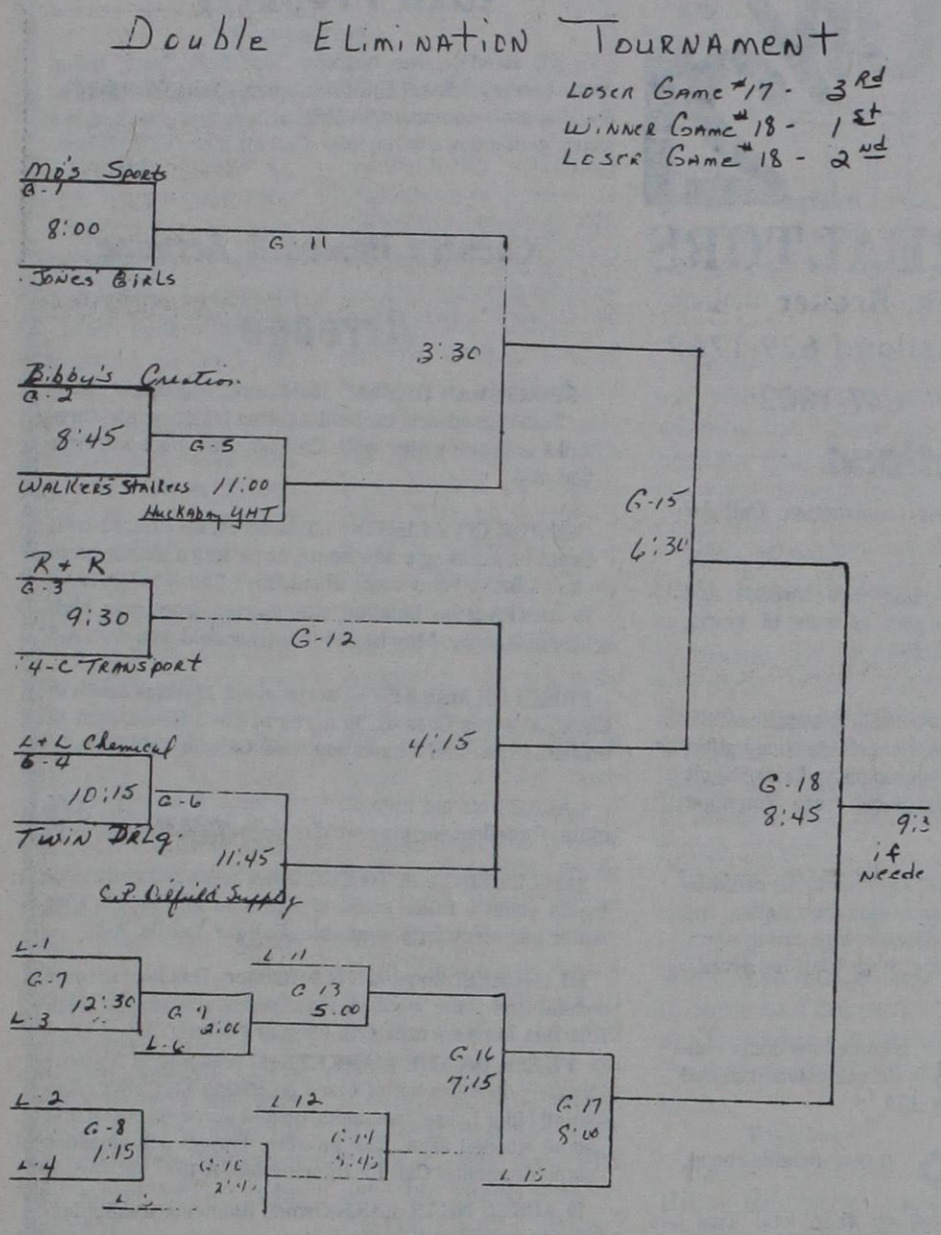
