## Commissioners Questioned On Ranger Election

### Dee Hogan Tells Plans To Restruct Sheriff's Department Budget



Sheriff-elect Dee Hogan of Eastland (L) was administered the oath of office as Sheriff by Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey during the Monday, Nov. 28 meeting of County Commissioners Court. Hogan's term of office will begin Jan. 1, 1989. Hogan's wife Jo was present in the Courtroom for the ceremony, along with the Commissioners and news media personnel. Under a new state law that took effect Sept. 1, 1987, a Sheriff-elect who does not present his bond and take the oath of office within 20 days of receiving notification of the election leaves his office vacant. Hogan received notice of his election from the county on Nov. 17.

Eastland County Commissioners Monday canvassed the Nov. 19 Ranger local Option election, and also heard Sheriff-elect Dee Hogan tell of plans for restructuring the Sheriff's Department and Jail Management. All four Commissioners were present, and County Judge Scott Bailey presided.

The Commissioners also discussed emergency management and reporting of hazardous materials in the County, and other topics on the agenda.

While canvassing the Local Option Election, the Commissioners verified that only three votes were cast from the annexed area where citizens were permitted to vote. All three were in favor of the sale of alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption.

Several Ranger citizens were in the courtroom, and they told the Commissioners they felt the election was illegal.

Bob Green asked on whose authority the election was called. He also asked about a Court opinion giving the Commissioners authority to define the boundaries of an election.

Judge Bailey replied that proper application had been made and a petition requesting the election had been received. He said the text of the Supreme Court opinion was with the District Attorney.

Green said he was not against the sale of alcohol, but the election "pertains to our town, and we were not allowed to vote."

The Commissioners were also told that two of the three people casting votes moved into the territory Friday night, voted, and moved out Saturday afternoon.

"This is circumventing the law," a Ranger citizen stated. Margaret Ramsey, who was the election Judge, said the petition calling for the election was invalid because the 10 people who signed it did

not live in the annexed territory affected by the election.

The Commissioners then finished their canvassing of the election, saying that what they had looked at appeared to be in order.

In another matter, Sheriff-elect Dee Hogan presented budgetary matters for the remaining budgetary year of 1989. (Jan. 1, 1989 to Sept. 30, 1989.)

Hogan had extensive figures from the auditors office showing expenditures by the Sheriff's Department since 1985. They were broken down into three categories - the Salary Budget, Uncontrollable expenses (such as Social Security, Group Health Ins., Etc.), and Controllable Expenses.

He noted that some of the areas had little funds in the budget for him to make the changeover and begin his year - items such as Dockets and operating supplies, equipment repair, temporary help, new signs, etc....

"I'm not asking for more money," Hogan said. "But I'm asking for the right to restructure the budget."

He also discussed some of the changes he would like to make in the operation of the Sheriff's Department and the Jail. This included better communication, bullet-proof vests for people working at night, exterior locks changed, and some office space for a Court Baliff in the Court-house.

Richard Robinson, Comm. of Pct. 1, said he considered any work on the law enforcement budget "unpredictable until the first of the year," but that Hogan could make plans.

L. T. Owens, Comm. of Pct. 3, said: "Anything to upgrade the Sheriff's Department in Eastland County, I'm for it."

The Commissioners approved Hogan's \$5,000 bond for the office, and also approved his request to attend an administrative school for newly elected Sheriffs. This will be in Austin next week, and the County will pay for driving expenses to and from the school.

Billy Bacon, Comm. of Pct. 4, reported that 17 people were in the County Jail. Two of these were being carried to the Texas Department of Corrections during the morning.

The commissioners discussed updating contracts with the various cities on city prisoners held in the county jail.

On hazardous materials possibly stored in the community, Judge Bailey said he understood that the county had responsibility by law on this matter. He stated that the Commissioners Court needed a mapping system on where such material was stored. They also need to consult with experts in the field.

As the morning session closed, the Commissioners made plans for a brief meeting in the afternoon. This included the swearing in of Hogan as the new Sheriff, with his term of office to begin Jan. 1.

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

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# Fishing Outdoors

**"Where Do You Stand?"**  
If you could envision the "average" Texas freshwater fishermen, he would be fishing in a boat on a lake with a friend or family member.

He or she would be fishing for black bass, as he does about 11 times a year. He would be happier if he caught more fish, but wouldn't necessarily keep them all if he caught more. He considers catching bigger fish an important factor in judging the success of a fishing trip. In general, he believes length and bag limits are beneficial, and favors stocking of both native and non-native fish species to improve fishing success.

This profile was taken from data compiled in the State-wide Freshwater Fishing Survey conducted by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and Texas A&M University. The survey was based on responses from 7,003 fishing license holders who were asked about their attitudes and preferences in freshwater fishing, according to Nick Carter, chief of the TPWD's Inland Fisheries Branch. The survey was conducted under the direction of Dr. Robert Dutton of Texas A&M and Dr. Steve Gutricuter of the TPWD.

One response from the survey said some may find interesting is that only nine percent of the respondents fished in a tournament during the previous year, and only eight percent indicated they were members of a fishing club or organization.

These figures show me that only a small percentage of anglers are attempting to help improve the overall fisheries for everyone. Most are content to allow a few to do the

work while they reap the benefits. And as usual when the small working percentage don't get just what the majority want, it's "Hell to

pay". Black bass were sought by 52 percent of the fishermen polled, while catfish were the favorite of 22 percent.

A total of 62 percent said they were happier if they caught more fish, but only 18 percent said they wanted to keep all the fish they land. Almost half (47%) said they were just as happy if they did

not keep all of the fish they caught.

That anglers value big fish was reflected in 46 percent of the respondents agreeing that catching bigger fish meant a better fishing trip, with only 28% disagreeing.

When asked to describe their most memorable fishing trip, the four most often mentioned factors were fishing at a particular place (20%), catching a particular kind of

fish (20%), catching a number of fish (13%) and the size of fish (12%).

A total of 83 percent of the respondents favored the use of minimum length limits, and 73 percent supported creel limits. Slot limits were supported by 34 percent, opposed by 24 percent. Gutricuter said slot limits are used on only seven Texas reservoirs, so some of the respondents may have been unfamiliar with this

regulation.

Stocking native freshwater fish was supported by 91 percent of the anglers interviewed. Stocking saltwater fish in freshwater lakes was supported by 30% of the anglers, and stocking fish that are not native to Texas water was supported by 54 percent.

Carter said the department will use the results of the survey to guide fishery management programs.

This survey could easily have originated right here in Eastland County. Only a small number of anglers in our area are members of a fishing organization. Many of the ones who are have little or no desire to improve the quality of fishing, but are usually heard the loudest with complaints. However most of the anglers involved in a local organization do work year after year, some years achiev-

ing more than others. Many important items have been addressed head on by these individuals. With the support of larger numbers in club

affiliation more good can be done for the preservation of our future in fishing here and statewide.

in the African country since 1970.

Ugandan Baptist pastors in the area, at considerable personal risk, continue to travel by foot or bicycle from their homes to the town of Soroti and back, transporting Bibles and relief goods to thousands of people, reported Garvin, who was pastor of Union Baptist Church, Rising Star, in 1957 and 1958.

Garvin has managed to maintain personal contact with only two of the 45 Baptist churches in Teso District because anti-government rebels roam the area. But the pastors report churches are full.

More than 600,000 Iteso and Kuman people live in the Teso District, with membership in Baptist churches

estimated at 7,000. Since mid-1986 district residents have been the victims of rebels seeking to overthrow the government and of raiders (mostly from their traditional enemies, the Karamojong, but also outlaws from their own ethnic groups).

"Raiders have taken most of the cattle," Garvin explained. "The planting and harvesting of crops have been eliminated in the worst-hit areas and drastically reduced in most others."

"Hunger is a gripping thing, infant mortality is staggering, malnutrition is horrifying and robbing and vandalism have taken a debilitating toll on nearly the entire population."

The violence claimed the assistant pastor of one Baptist church during the summer. Rebels chose a site near the church to ambush three government ministers enroute to a peace conference with a different rebel group. The government officials survived, but during a gunbattle, the assistant pastor and two of his brothers were killed.

Government efforts to meet the needs of the people are producing gradual improvement, Garvin pointed out, but progress is slow in the face of so many problems.

Government cooperation, and the bravery of the Ugandan pastors, have enabled more than \$65,000 in relief aid from the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board to flow into the area.

Several thousand people have received blankets, food, powdered milk, seed and hoes. The pastors distribute the goods to the Christians and non-Christians.

## Children Need Evidence For Number

Everyone who applies for a Social Security number must provide evidence of age, identity, and U.S. citizenship or lawful alien status, including young children, Glyn Hammons

Social Security manager in Abilene said recently.

Parents sometimes have difficulty finding the required evidence of identity.

Proof of age is relatively easy, an official U.S. public birth certificate recorded before age 5 is preferred. This document will also establish citizenship.

Documents which will establish a young child's identity, and which are usually available to most families, include a report card, school identification card, newspaper birth announcement, court order for name change, church membership or confirmation record, doctor or hospital record, vaccination certificate, day care or nursery school record, or child's membership in youth organization, such as scouts. This is not an exclusive

list, Hammons said. Any document providing enough identifying data can be used.

Foreign born applicants will also need the appropriate Immigration and Naturalization Service documents.

Only original documents

or copies certified by the issuing agency can be used.
