

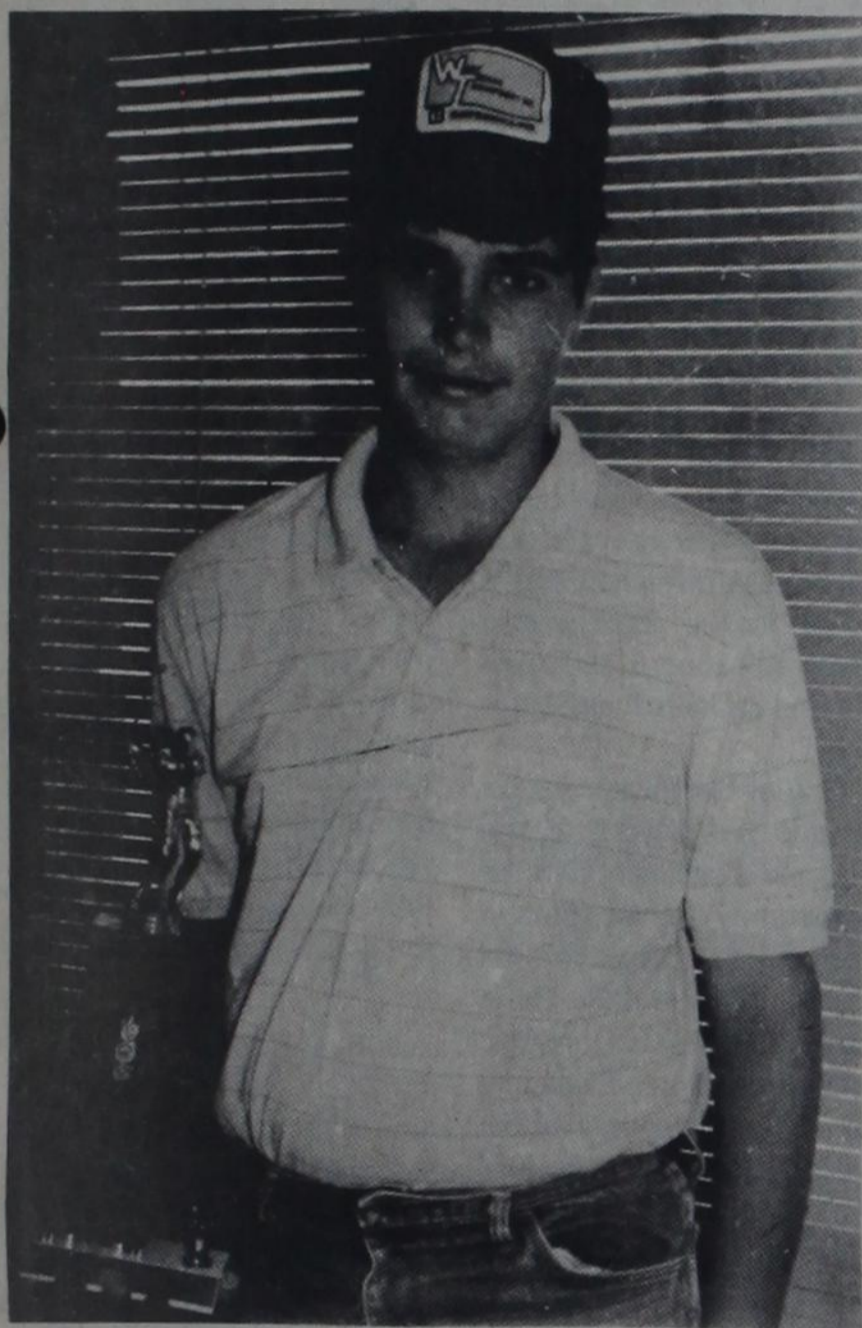

County Commissioners Appoint Election Judges And Discuss Disposal Of Unusable Property

The meeting was called to order with all commissioners and County Judge Scott Bailey present.

Commissioner Bacon gave the jail report and stated that the sewer problems could stem from the discovery of three 90 degree pipes in the system. He told the sheriff to get the problem fixed and report back to the commissioners. There are currently 15 prisoners in the county jail.

The next order of business was the approval of election judges for general and special elections. They are as follows:

The commissioners confirmed the appointment of Mr. Jimmy Hughes to replace Rev. Blaine Clower on the Child Protection Service Agency.

Judge Bailey reported to the commissioners that according to the 1981 Rabies Control Act, the county shall appoint one person from each precinct to control animals. It was decided that the Constables from each precinct will be in charge of animal control.

Mr. Clinton Eaton appeared before the commissioners with his final bill on the clearing of the Lassater Property. Two commissioners reported that the job had been done satisfactorily and they voted to pay the bill.

A motion was made by Bacon and seconded by Owen to extend the coverage of liability on county employees.

A letter was read by Judge Bailey from Ann Richards, state treasurer to the effect that a check for the county road fund would be mailed by October 13th. The money is to be used to improve or build county roads.

Judge Bailey asked for permission to dispose of unusable property that had collected in his office over several months. He also reported that several pillows and blankets, from the days when juries stayed overnight, needed to be disposed of. Local organizations will be notified of these items.

The next order of business was a report from Paul Catoe, city manager of Eastland. He stated that the Rural Fire Contract had expired and invited commissioners to attend the next meeting on August 21, to discuss this matter. It was decided that Commissioner Robinson and Judge Bailey would attend the meeting and report back to commissioners.

Adjustments and amendments to the sheriff's department were discussed and bills were okayed for payment.

A request was made by Mayor Hoffman to recom-

mend to the Texas Highway Department some sort of traffic control on Highway 6 and I-20 and Highway 6 and Seaman. Both intersections have reported accidents with the Hwy 6 and I-20 having fatalities. Bacon made a motion and Owens seconded that the commissioners join with Eastland and request some traffic control.

Mrs. Livingston, from Rising Star, requested some assistance with traffic control at a cross roads by her

property. Several accidents had occurred here. Commissioner Owens stated that he would find out who leased or owned the property and request that he be allowed to clear brush away, where intersection would be safe.

Mayor Hoffman wrote a letter to the commissioners requesting information as to when the jail contracts were rescinded and minutes to that meeting. Commissioner Bacon asked why Eastland was having trouble signing

the contract and Commissioner Robinson stated that the town was upset that the contract kept changing. Bacon reiterated that Ranger had signed and Cisco Police Chief Raines reported that he should have a signed copy for the next meeting. After a short discussion, the commissioners decided to let Eastland continue under their old contract.

Bills, budgets and claims were discussed and handled accordingly.

The Rising Star All-Stars made a fine showing in the tournament after losing their first game to the Gorman All-Stars. Rising Star played Cross Plains a gutsy game, losing by only one point with a score of 6-5.

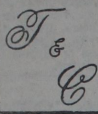

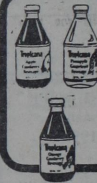

In addition, the veteran must be a resident of Texas when filing an application.

The veteran must have served at least 90 consecutive days of active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, or Coast Guard, unless discharged sooner due to a service-connected disability. Service must have been after

September 16, 1940, and the veteran must not have been dishonorably discharged.

Fishing Outdoors

With the increased popularity of sport fishing today, anglers are faced with increasingly long lines at boat ramps. And then even after launching may run for miles to fish shallow water they spotted from their tow truck. And we all know the great expense involved in operating, purchasing, and keeping up these high powered boats.

Well your "Big Boat Blues" have been answered. Thanks to the folks at Quitaque Plastics Inc. in Quitaque, Texas. "The Fish N Pal", the new one man fishing boat is here. Made of moldable polyethylene this fishing rig weighs in at under 25 pounds. But don't let this light weight fool you. Thanks to modern construction processes the Fish N Pal has a maximum weight rating

of 275 lbs. And all this weight is available in a 40 inch wide by 70" long by 12" high fish catching machine.

Fitted with an aluminum carry bar this lightweight rig can be easily loaded and unloaded by one person. The Fish N Pal can be maneuvered with a set of swim fins or has an optional factory bolt on motor mount rated for a 1.5 H.P. gas motor or a electric trolling motor.

Many of you may remember a small styrofoam one man boat called the Water Wagon. The Fish N Pal takes this principal into the future of one man boat fishing. One feature I feel for was the molded in storage compartment, with snap on lids to avoid spillage. And this deletes the need for that bulky tackle box that

always seems to end up in the dip net.

I have fished many hours in a variety of small one man boats and I must confess the new Fish N Pal scores high in easy to load and carry and fishability. For more information you can call 806-455-1201 and tell them Fishing Outdoors sent you.

Forty six two man teams meet at Possum Kingdom Lake this weekend for some tough Texas summer fishing. The team of Gibson and Gibson took first place honors with 4 fish weighing 9.14 pounds. This crew included 2 real nice small mouth bass. And anglers Bobby and Tommy Maynard finished the day in 33rd place. Most of the top finishers reported crankbaits, top water and tube baits turning the fish on.

Lake Leon's black bass are back folks after a short dry spell. Anglers are reporting some good fishing in the mid lake region on top water and jigs. That's right, the forgotten summer bait, the jig is alive and well. During a short outing Sunday I was able to catch and live release 3 healthy blacks up to 3 1/2 pounds. And this was in less than 2 hours of angling. Black rubber with green trailers seemed to work best. But the fish would hit black and white.

Forfeited Land Tracts Bidding

Texas Veterans have approximately one month to get in bids on more than 270 tracts of state land being offered through the Texas Veterans Land Board. The deadline to receive bids is August 23 at 1 p.m.

Located in 115 counties throughout the state, the tracts are offered exclusively to Texas veterans who are eligible to participate in the Texas Veterans Land Program. The interest rate will be 8.75 percent on a 30-year, assumable, fixed-rate loan.

Tracts range in size from five to 100 acres. No down payment is required and the VLB will finance the full amount of all winning bids. There is no limit on the amount loaned on winning bids. The buyer will be responsible for the current year's taxes only.


"I'd like to encourage Texas veterans who have been looking for quality land to take advantage of this sale," said Garry Mauro, who chairs the VLB.

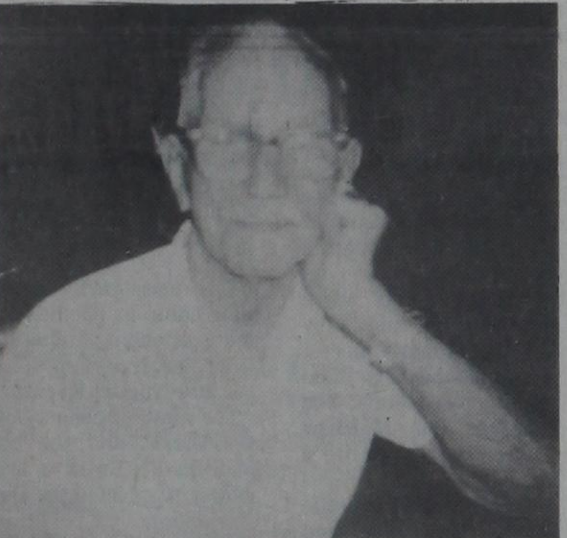
