## Through The Editor's Specs

If you wish to be popular... promise!

If you wish to be criticized... do!

If you wish to be attacked... be good at something!

You will find there are people who want what you have and are willing to downgrade you in order to get it.

That seems to be something of the situation in the present 17th District congressional race.

For twenty years Omar Burleson has represented the 17th District of Texas in the Congress. Periodically he has been challenged by aspirants whose sole qualifications appear to be such shortcomings as they could seem to find in Mr. Burleson's record.

The current opposition is no exception; it follows the same old discredited pattern. Which is rather impressive, come to think of it, in view of the fact that although Omar's opposition is about the most able of all he has faced in the years he has been the choice of the District his opponent can find no real criticism of him except that Omar has not gotten himself appointed to enough committees in Congress. Which, in fact, is no criticism at all.

It is, if you examine it more than casually, a rather futile argument. The single reason cited by Omar's opposition for getting on committees in Congress is to "get something for the district," quite ignoring the fact that one doesn't have to be on committees in Congress to exercise an effective influence in this respect, as Omar's contributions to the political economy of his district during the twenty years of his service amply testifies.

Were it not so, most of the districts in the nation—those without representatives on the related committees—would go begging in the matter of Federal grants and establishments.

It is to be noted that the opposition does not specify the "missing" benefits. It is not always politically wise to be specific; the incumbent, of course must be so—in the shape of his record; the challenger can hide behind an equivocal generality of leadership.

The fact that Omar has made his record his platform for re-election is proof of his political honesty as the record is proof of his competence.

tence. He is, to use a colloquialism, putting his money where his mouth is."

Another weakness in the opposition's line of attack is the assumption that the district sends a representative to Congress primarily, if not solely, to "get something."

Is there any assurance that Mr. Burleson's opponent can make himself an effective voice of the 17th district in the councils of Government at Washington? Has he dedicated himself to the primary purpose of congressional representation—that the people of the district want a strong voice in the affairs of their government? That they want to be heard with influence and respect?

There are now 250 thousand, more or less, of our sons committed to a bloody issue in Viet Nam where the threat of another World War casts an ominous shadow across the Pacific. At home there are deeply disturbing issues having to do with the freedom and prosperity of our land, and upon the attempted solutions to which the people of the District have convictions they want effectively expressed.

Perhaps Omar's accomplishments in carrying the voice of the District into the deliberations of Congress, his able representation of the

## Marooned Party Finds Goat Meat Excellent for Sustaining Morale

A rapid rise of Holmes Creek, tributary to the Colorado River near Winchell, Saturday marooned a party of four men and three boys from Rising Star who had gone to the river on a fishing trip.

The party was isolated over the week-end but were able to recross the swollen creek Monday and return to town, none the worse for the experience.

The men were J. D. (Skeet) Clark, Wilbur Caudle, D. E. Stewart and Babe Cooper, who went Friday, and the boys, who crossed Holmes Creek Saturday to join the men shortly before the big rise, were Bob Clark, son of Skeet; Doug Fisher, and Mike Donham.

Thanks to a few wild goats which gave their maroonment a Robinson Crusoe-like aspect, they did not go hungry, according to accounts which the party gave of their experience.

For lack of a gun—they had only a small caliber pistol—members of the party chased one of the young goats into a thicket where they secured it with their bare hands, they said.

When concern for the safety of the party developed, Mr. and Mrs. Alton Clark and Mrs. J. D. Clark drove to Winchell where they were able to talk with Skeet and other members of the group across the swollen stream and were assured they were all right.

## 10.17 Inches of Rainfall Recorded Here In April

More than one-third of the annual average of rainfall in this area of the state fell in Rising Star during the past 30 days.

According to the records at the City Hall weather station, an official U. S. Weather Bureau gauging point, a total of 10.17 inches was received from April 23 through May 1.

Heaviest rainfall was received

during the April 30 - May 1 week-end, when a total of 6.96 inches was recorded.

The prolonged rainy period broke a winter-long drought that had severely restricted the production of small grain, reduced pasturage and threatened stock water supplies.

There has been considerable improvement in the outlook for grains although the yield will be moderate as compared to the normal crop, while pasture grasses are flourishing and water supplies are at a maximum level as a result of the prolonged downpours.

Needless to say, the rains have given peanut farmers assurance of a wonderful season for planting.

## Larry McKinnerney In Navy Basic Training

SAN DIEGO, CALIF. (FHTNC) April 20 — Seaman Recruit Larry D. McKinnerney, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jessie R. McKinnerney of Route 2, Rising Star, Texas, is undergoing seven weeks of basic training at the Naval Training Center here.

Under the supervision of veteran Navy petty officers, he is receiving instructions in naval history and organization, customs and courtesies, ordnance and gunnery, seamanship, damage control, first aid, swimming and survival, shipboard drills and safety duty.

Military drills are emphasized during recruit training, and with various inspections and a planned physical fitness program, keep the recruits mentally and physically alert.

Upon completion of recruit training, he will be assigned to a school, shore station or ship, according to the results of his Navy classification tests, his own desires and the needs of the Navy.

## Light Vote In Primary Here Next Saturday Is Indicated

Rising Star democrats will go to the polls here Saturday—May 7—to register their choices for candidates for State, Congressional, district and county offices at stake in the general election to be held next November.

Judging from a pre-election

apathy, a heavy vote was not expected, although the tempo of campaigning stepped up in three of the races during the final week.

These were the race for nomination for congressman from the 17th Texas District in which veteran Omar Burleson is opposed by Eldon Mahon, Abilene attorney; the State representative race in the 63rd District, and the race between incumbent

County Judge Scott Bailey and his challenger, John Hart.

In the race for State representative, four are seeking the nomination—Burke Musgrove of Breckenridge; Saul Pullman and McGough of Eastland and John Musselman, Jr., of Albany.

Elsewhere in the election scene the field was quiet. None of the county offices other than the county judgeship, offers a contest.

The ballot as it will appear for the Rising Star box has been reproduced on Page Two of this issue of the Star.

The election in Precinct 8, which includes Rising Star, will be held at the City Hall box. The polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

G. A. Dunn, Jr., democratic precinct chairman, will preside. Assisting him will be Ike Hickman, Mrs. Love Shults, Mrs. Joe White, Mrs. Janell McCutchen, Mrs. G. A. Dunn, Mrs. East- er Gray, Mrs. Ollie Burns and Mrs. Joe Butler.

Under new election regulations following upon a Federal court ruling outlawing the poll tax as a prerequisite for voting, all who paid poll taxes or registered during an emergency registration early this year, as well as citizens exempt from such payment or registration by reason of age, are eligible to vote.

The democratic precinct convention will be held at the American Legion Hall at 2 p. m., Chairman Dunn announced.

County Judge Scott Bailey issues the following formal statement in connection with his candidacy for a second term as County Judge of Eastland County.

Bailey, born and reared in Eastland County, is one of seven children of Mrs. M. D. Bailey and the late Mr. Bailey of Cisco. He is married to the former Mary Nicholas of Carbon. His education includes: graduation from Cisco High School in 1948, from Cisco Junior College in 1951 and received a B. S. Degree from North Texas State University in 1953. Since that time, Judge Bailey has done post-graduate study at the University of Texas in Austin.

After graduation from North Texas State University, Bailey entered the U. S. Army at Fort Bliss, Texas. Upon completion of basic training, he was assigned to overseas duty in Korea. His overseas action includes duty with the 17th Infantry Regiment.

Judge Bailey's work experience includes school teaching in High School and Junior College, service in the Texas Legislature and being elected County Judge of Eastland County.

In making his formal statement, Bailey said, "I do not intend to make a lot of promises or commitments that would be impractical or impossible to fulfill. ## It Has Been

The annual Free Fall Fair of September, 1934, drew a record crowd of 5,000 to 7,000 people. It was said to "be the best in history."

The rodeo feature of the Fair was very popular with the crowd.

Unable to appropriate the money for this feature, the Fair committee said "the rodeo must be ruled out," but a few public spirited and enterprising citizens took hold of the project and went to work. Lumber was secured, pens built and adequate chutes constructed. Ira Swift, Lee Burkhead, J. C. Trammel, Duke Madison, Curt Butler, Ed Bucy and Hubert H. Jones were among the promoters of the rodeo.

The livestock exhibit was the best ever shown at a Rising Star Fair. Cecil Shults was chairman of the Livestock committee. Many visiting stockmen said "the exhibit would compare favorably with those at the State Fair in Dallas."

The agriculture display was one of the best shown here. "Grandma" Bell's spinning show, was the outstanding enter-

tainment feature of the Fair. On the last day, Saturday, September 22, "Grandma Bell", 86, who made her home in the Sabanno community, arrived at the Fair building shortly after noon with her 100-year-old spinning wheel. The old wheel showed its age plainly, but worked perfectly, and drew the biggest crowd of anything on exhibit.

The spinning wheel was mounted on two tables and "Grandma" spun away all afternoon. There was a chair placed on the table where she rested for a few minutes at intervals.

Many who had never seen a spinning wheel in operation and others who remembered them from childhood were charmed with the performance.

From a basket of freshly picked cotton Mrs. Bell did her own "ginning," picking the lint from the seed. She worked rapidly and did a very neat job.

She was as happy as a lark at her work and stayed with it until well after dark, before she could get away from the admiring crowd.

In saying goodbye to her friends and onlookers she said "I'd love to do this every year if someone would bring me to the fair."

During the week following the Fair, plans were completed and advertising literature distributed for the first of a series of free rodeos. One performance a month

to be given throughout the fall season.

The first rodeo show was held Saturday, September 29, at 10 a. m. and an afternoon show at 2:30 p. m.

Officers of the show were President, Ira Swift, and Hubert H. Jones, Secretary-Treasurer. The committee on arrangements, headed by Lee Burkhead, was Perry Burns, E. A. Whiteside and others. Among business managers were Cecil Shults, W. E. Tyler, W. P. Small, Jr., and C. E. Walker.

The show, sponsored by the business men of Rising Star, was entirely free to the public. Each performance drew a large crowd.

Horses were few in this section at that time, but the free rodeo, spurred interest in buying and raising good horses. Today no finer horses can be found than in the Rising Star area.

The Free Fall Rodeo laid the foundation of one of the best weekly rodeos in the state, "The Rising Star Rodeo," and one that draws large crowds from the time it starts in May until the closing performance in September.

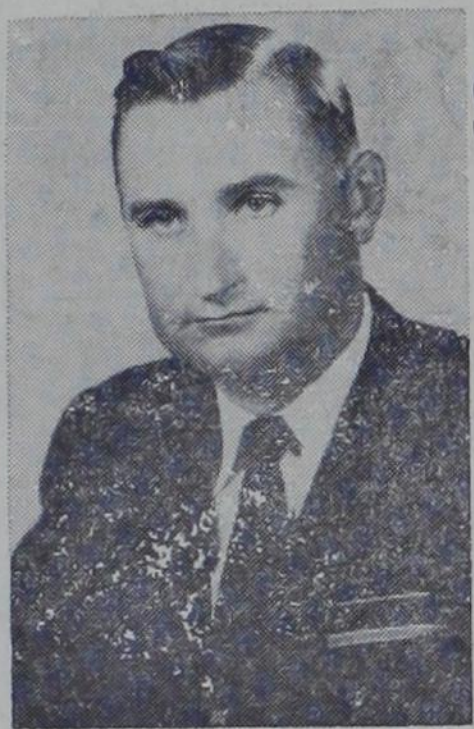
