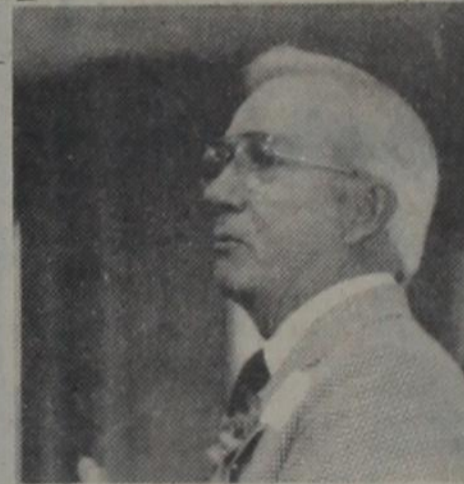

Any registered voter 65 years of age or older or anyone disabled may vote by mail by calling the County Clerk's Office and requesting an application to vote by mail at 629-1583.

Anyone else needing to vote absentee should also call the County Clerk's Office to see if they can qualify to vote absentee.

The last day that an application to vote absentee by mail can be received is November 1, 1988.

Wildcats Beat Lometa 30-0

The Rising Star Wildcats traveled to Lometa Friday, October 14, and defeated the Hornets 30-0.

The Wildcats' opening drive was good for 77 yds. Less than 1:30 had elapsed on the clock when Jimmy Evans hit Reil Barron for a 54 yd. touchdown pass. Stacy Green's PAT was good and the Cats led 7-0.

On Lometa's first offensive play of the game, the Wildcats knocked the ball loose and recovered it on the Hornets' 21. Unfortunately the Cats coughed up the football on their next play and Lometa took over on their own 18 yd. line. The Wildcat defense shut the Hornets out and Lometa was forced to punt on the 4th and 6. This time the Cats started on their own 20. With 3:58 left in the first quarter, Evans hit Barron again. This time for a 30 yd. TD. Green's PAT split the uprights and the Cats increased their lead to 14-0.

Once again Rising Star's defense shut out the Hornets forcing the punt on the 4th & 7. The Cats next drive began on their own 45. Evans hit Derrick White for a 10 yd. TD pass, but there was a flag on the play which called the TD back and the Wildcats settled for a field goal. Green's 25 yd. kick was good and with 9:00 left in the half, the scoreboard read Home 0, Visitors 17.

On the Cats' last offensive series of the first half, Lometa held on 4th & 7 and had the ball on their own 17. The Cats had a roughing the kicker penalty on Lometa's next punt and the Hornets had their second first down of the half.

On the Wildcats next two offensive drives, they were forced to turn the ball over on downs, but the Wildcat defense refused to allow the Hornets a first down in the third quarter. Just as the third quarter buzzer sounded, Derrick White followed good blocking for a 41 yd. gain. With 11:17 left in the game, White ran 3 yds. for the TD. Once again, Green's kick split the uprights moving the score to 24-0 in favor of the Wildcats.

Evans hit Barron for a TD, but the penalty-plagued Cats had it called back on an offensive pass interference. The Hornets followed the penalty with a quarterback sack and the Hornets started their best drive from the Cats' 41 yd. line. The Hornets were in scoring position when Senior Johnny House came up with the interception on the Wildcat 17 yd. line. House read Donnie Alcorn's and Derrick White's blocks and dashed 83 yds. to the end zone. Green's kick was blocked and with 4:00 left in the game, the Wildcats lead 30-0.

On the last Hornet drive, Shawn Morrow sacked the quarterback and Jason Bible recovered a fumble. When time ran out, the scoreboard read Home 0, Visitors 30.

Although, this was not an impressive game for the Wildcats, it was a victory. The Cats are going to have to play much better ball next week when they host Hico. Hico moved down from 2A this year and should challenge the Cats in their quest for district champs. Come cheer for the Wildcats Friday, October 21, at 7:30 in the Wildcat Stadium. Luv That Blue!

Anyone who has had to pay a long-distance charge to call Social Security can now call without cost by using the toll-free number 800-234-SSA (800-234-5772). In addition, the hours people can call have been extended.

With the new toll-free number, anyone can call 24 hours a day. Calls between 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. each business day will be answered by a live operator, and, at other times, a caller can leave a message which will be answered the next business day, or at a convenient time chosen by the caller.

Hammons said that callers should find SSA's new toll-free telephone service especially convenient when they need to change a mailing address, obtain their earnings record, or make an appointment to apply for benefits. All calls in the Rising Star area to conduct Social Security business should now be made using the new telephone number, 800-234-5772.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated

that over 37,000 women die each year as a result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate. (The cost is only \$50.00)

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

The Cisco City Council has approved a resolution for the City to participate in a regional water planning study to be conducted by the West Central Texas Municipal Water District. The study will address all the alternate sources and costs of water for this area, City Manager Mike Moore said. Plans are for an engineer to be working on the study by April 1, 1989, and the study should be completed by Oct. 1, 1989. Moore said that at the present time it seems the best alternate source of water is Lake Hubbard near Breckenridge, and that with this study the City of Cisco can find out what can be done. "Water is a very precious commodity," Moore said. "Attaining the right of water will be the hardest part of the battle." He said that he is pleased to see the city take a positive step to find alternate sources.

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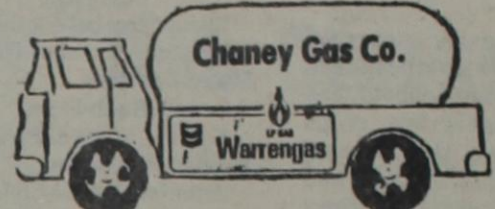

Disaster Assistance Act of 1988: Provisions of the Disaster Assistance Act of 1988 provides payments for losses in excess of 35% of a farm's normal yield. The loss must be due to drought, hail, or excessive moisture.

Applications will be received until March 31, 1989 for disaster conditions occurring in calendar year 1988. Producers should organize their production data and evidence prior to making application for payment at their local ASCS office.

The disaster program covers losses on wheat, feed grains, cotton, peanuts, and other nonprogram crops such as hay, melons, rye, guar, peaches, pecans, and other commercially grown crops. Losses will be recognized for low yield and approved prevented planting.

Producers requesting disaster payments for losses of 65% or more must agree to obtain FCIC multi-peril crop insurance for 1989 if crop insurance is available for the crop.

Producers may file additional request for payment as crops mature or are abandoned.

Abandoned corn, grain sorghum, and cotton must be appraised if the crop will not be harvested. Crop acreages will be certified and late-filed reports will be accepted.

Livestock Feed Program: Application for the livestock feed program are still being accepted by the Eastland office. Eligibility for program benefits begin on the date of application. Producers must decide whether to accept assistance under the disaster program or the livestock feed program since duplication of program benefits are prohibited.

Abandoned or Baled Peanuts: Producers who will not carry their peanut acreage to harvest must file an application for disaster credit on from ASCS-574. In addition, an appraisal of the potential production must be made prior to the time the peanuts are baled.

Peanut Program Changes: Regulations have been amended to allow three workdays after the peanuts are inspected to decide how the peanuts will be marketed. This extension of time will allow producers additional time to obtain quota for the farm under the fall transfer provisions.

A fall transfer of quota from a farm may now be approved without the consent of the farm owner if the quota has been cash leased. Proof of cash leases will be required prior to waiving the owner's signature requirement.

Additional Disaster Information:

The Disaster Assistance Program and Livestock Feed Programs have a combined \$100,000 payment limitation. The Livestock Feed Programs have a \$50,000 limitation for payments that are made in the 1988 calendar year.

Producers may receive forgiveness and not be required to repay advance deficiency payments on the first 35% loss should the final deficiency rate be less than the advance deficiency rate.

Sodbuster and the conservation compliance provisions will apply to all disaster assistance payments, but will not apply to livestock feed assistance.

Duplication of program benefits will not be allowed. County office employees will provide information to enable applicants to decide whether the Disaster Assistance Program or the Livestock Feed Program will be more advantageous.

FCIC Extends Closing Date: FCIC has extended the sales closing date for all 1989 winter wheat until October 31, 1988. This action was taken to provide winter wheat producers the opportunity to comply with the intent of the Disaster Assistance Act of 1988. Producers requesting disaster payment for losses of 65% or more must agree to obtain FCIC multi-peril crop insurance for 1989. Wheat producers, with losses, should immediately file an application for disaster assistance in order that FCIC insurance, if required, can be obtained by the October 31 deadline. Wheat that was planted for grazing is not an eligible crop for disaster assistance.

USDA Sets '89 Provisions

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30 - Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng today announced a 10 percent acreage reduction (ARP) for 1989 crop corn, grain sorghum and barley and a 5 percent ARP for 1989 crop oats.

The 1989 crop corn, sorghum and barley ARP's are reduced from the 20 percent ARP set for the 1988 crop while the oats ARP remains the same as the 1988 crop.

Other provisions of the 1989 feed grain program include:

- Target prices established per bushel are \$2.84 for corn, \$2.70 for sorghum (\$4.82 per hundredweight), \$2.43 for barley and \$1.50 for oats.

- Loan and purchase rates per bushel are \$1.65 for corn, \$1.57 for sorghum (\$2.80 per hundredweight), \$1.34 for barley, \$0.85 for oats and \$1.40 for rye.

- No marketing loan program for feed grains will be implemented.

- Malting barley will not be exempt from the acreage limitation requirements established for the 1989 barley program.

-Oats will not be subject to the limited cross compliance provisions.

-There will not be a paid land diversion program.

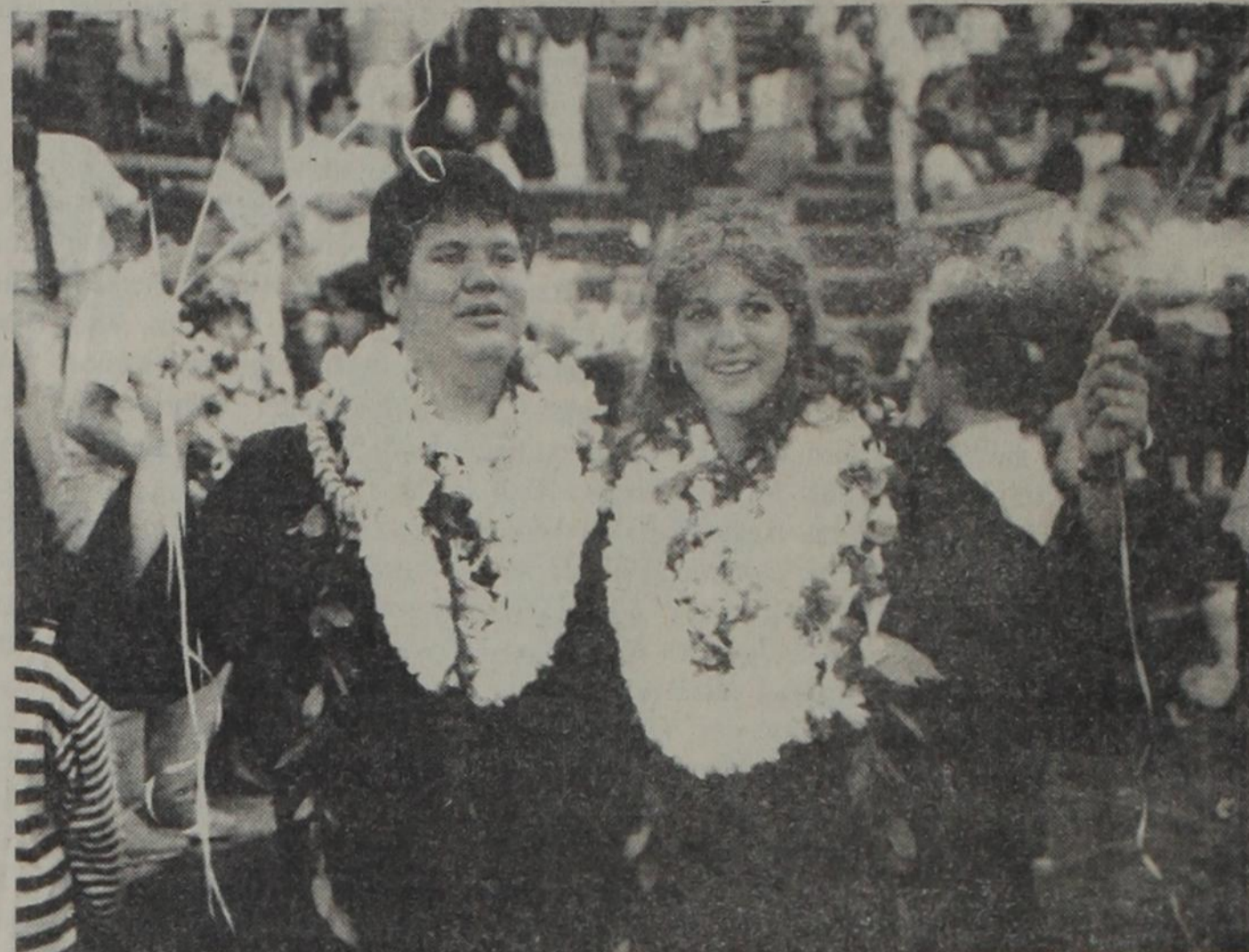
Common program provisions that apply to the 1989 feed grains, wheat, upland cotton and rice programs were announced on June 14.

No Antlerless Deer Permits Required For Eastland County

1988 RECOMMENDED EITHER-SEX DEER HARVEST



Landowners and hunters are reminded that no antlerless deer permits issued by the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department will be required for taking antlerless deer in Eastland County for the regular deer season for 1988-89. Antlerless deer taken in Eastland County will only require being tagged with the

appropriate tag from the hunter's valid hunting license. Please refer to the 1988-89 Texas Hunting Guide for all season's, bag limits, and means and methods of taking animals. The regular gun season for white-tailed deer is November 5 through January 1, 1989, with a bag limit of 4 deer; no more than 1

buck in Eastland County. A total of 138 counties statewide have been placed under the either-sex harvest regulation during the last two years, including Eastland County. Deer populations vary from area to area and ranch to ranch. The either-sex regulation allows for flexibility of the landowner and hunter to harvest deer on his property at the proper rate. It does not automatically mean that a heavy harvest of

antlerless deer is needed. Recommended buck and antlerless deer harvest rates provided by the Department should be used as a guideline for landowners and hunters for harvesting deer in Eastland County.

Recommended harvest rates for bucks and antlerless deer, based on recently completed population surveys in Eastland County, is indicated on the county map (see map).

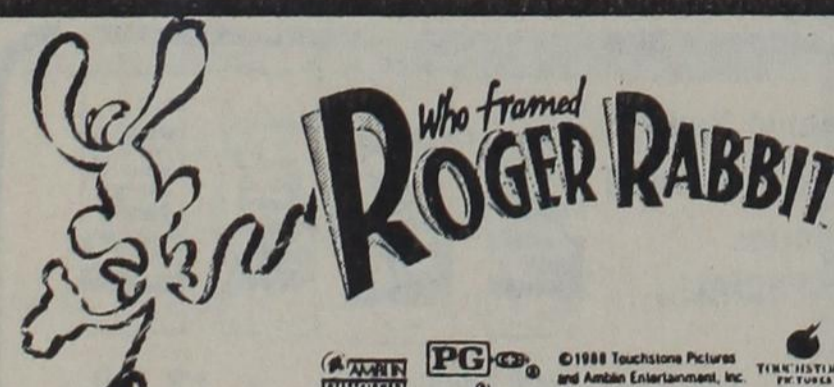
