County Commissioners Hire Abilene Architect

One official expressed surprise that the Jail Commission had not been informed "by the Jail Administrator or someone else that we are working on the problems there, and have them all solved except the lighting and Inter-com system."

Judge Bailey said he would personally write a letter to the Jail Commission to inform them that County officials has initiated compliance.

Wheeler said his office would send his plans to the Jail Standards people for approval before any new work was done. He explained how complicated it would be to install the new 20-candle lighting system in the cells arranged for a 12-candle lights. Holes would have to be cut in the 8 in. thick cellular ceilings, and headers built where ceiling joists were cut.

On the Inter-com system, Wheeler said he thought a button in each cell to alert the main panel would meet specifications.

In other business, Judge Bailey informed the Commissioners of plans for the County Court. The first Court session under the new Eastland County Commissioners, in their meeting

Monday, approved the hiring of James Wheeler, Abilene architect, to draw up specifications and plans to bring the County jail up to state standards.

This work will be done before any possible enlargement of the present facility. The needs of the Jail were ruled an "emergency".

The motion to hire Wheeler was made by Billy Bacon, Comm. of Pct. 4, seconded by L.T. Owen, Comm. of Pct. 3, and agreed to by Commissioners Norman Christian of Pct. 2 and Richard Robinson, Pct. 1. County Judge Scott Bailey presided.

Wheeler, from the firm of Boone, Pope, Wheeler and Pullin, was present in the courtroom. He joined in a lengthy discussion of the needs of the jail. The firm he is associated with constructed the present building in 1980.

Judge Bailey reported on a letter he received Monday morning from the Texas Jail Standards Commission. This letter restated all the "deficiencies" an inspector reported he found during the March 16 inspection of the building.

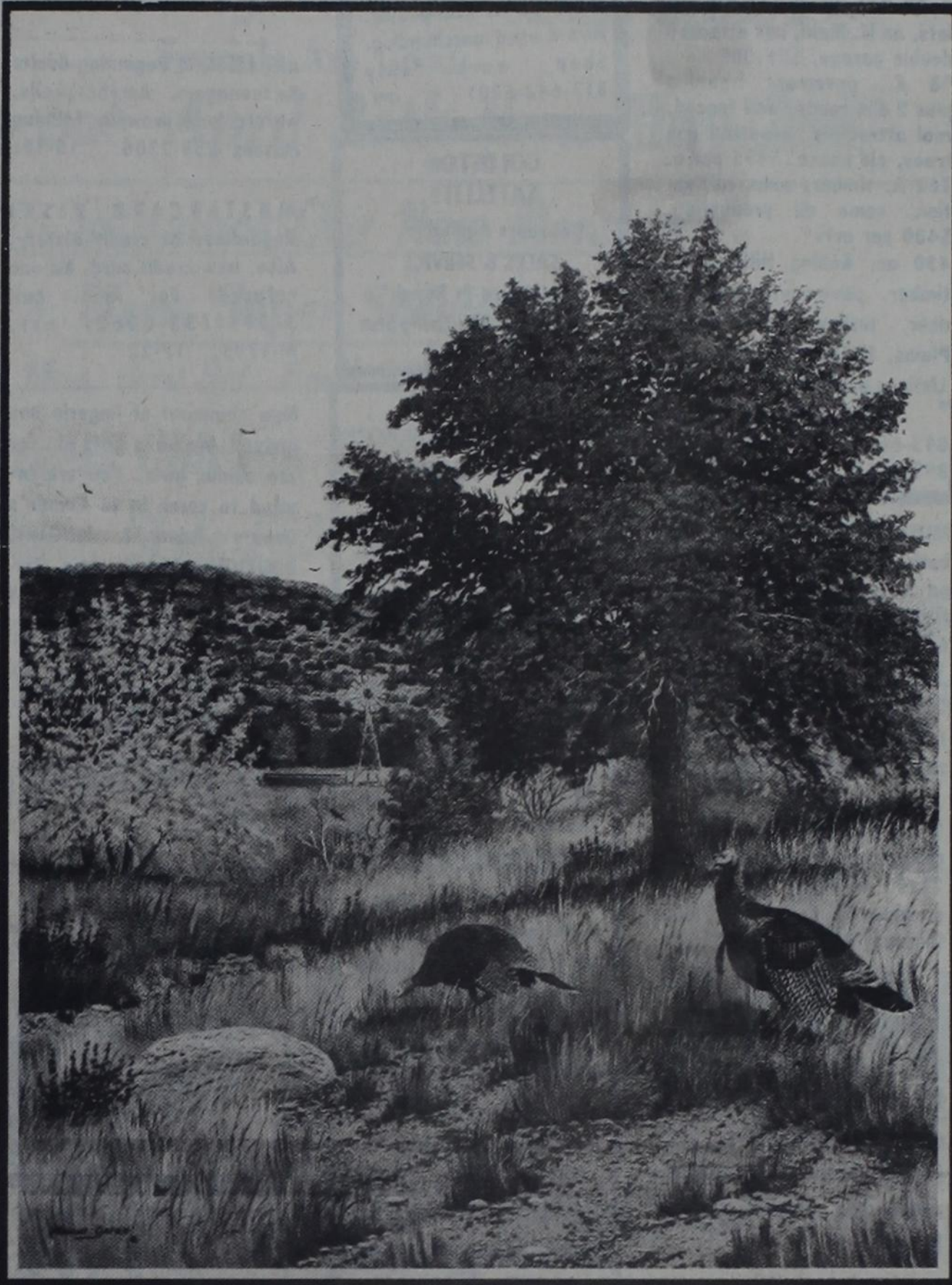

David White also placed first in pole vault in district with a vault of 13-6, earning him a place on Cen-Tex

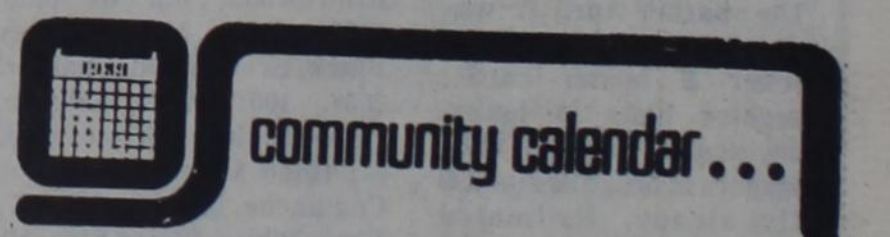

In visiting with officials of other counties she learned of their problems, she said, and came back grateful for the cooperation among officials here in Eastland County. HOW TO WALK WITH GOD: HOW DO WE WALK?

Courts Given Concurrent Jurisdiction

Concurrent jurisdiction between the Eastland County Court and the 91st District Court has been established by law and will be implemented soon, local officials report.

Bills carried by State Sen. Bob Glasgow and State Rep. Jim Parker have passed both houses and have been signed into law by Gov. Bill Clements, it is reported here.

Because the bills were carried as emergency measures, the law became effective immediately, meaning that jurisdiction was returned to the County Clerk concurrently with the district court on April 14.

District Judge Jim Wright and County Judge Scott Bailey had testified in Austin in regard to the bills, stating that returning concurrent jurisdiction would enable the local courts to work together on clearing a backlog of misdemeanor cases, and permitting the local courts to work hand in hand in expediting cases in Eastland County.

Next step likely will be the preparations necessary to initiate the program between Judge Bailey and Judge Wright. The County Commissioners Court had included funding in the current budget in anticipation of passing of the measures.

For a number of years the County Court has only been permitted to accept pleas of guilty and all contested misdemeanor cases were

automatically transferred to the district court for trial.

Dockets for disposition of the cases will be announced

as details for the implementation are worked out.

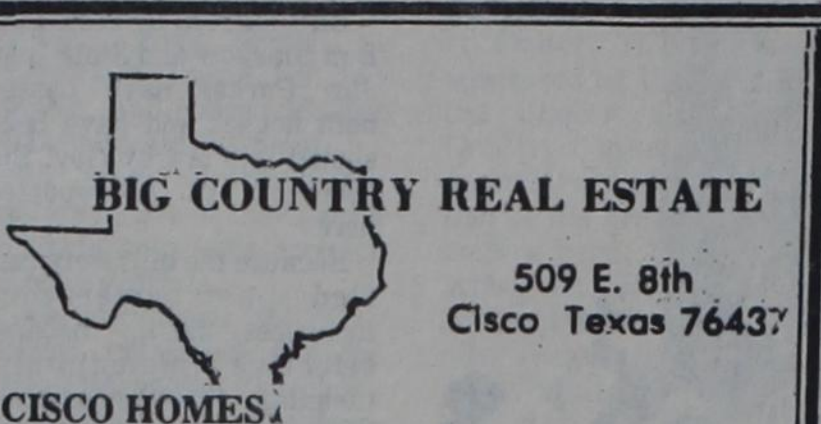

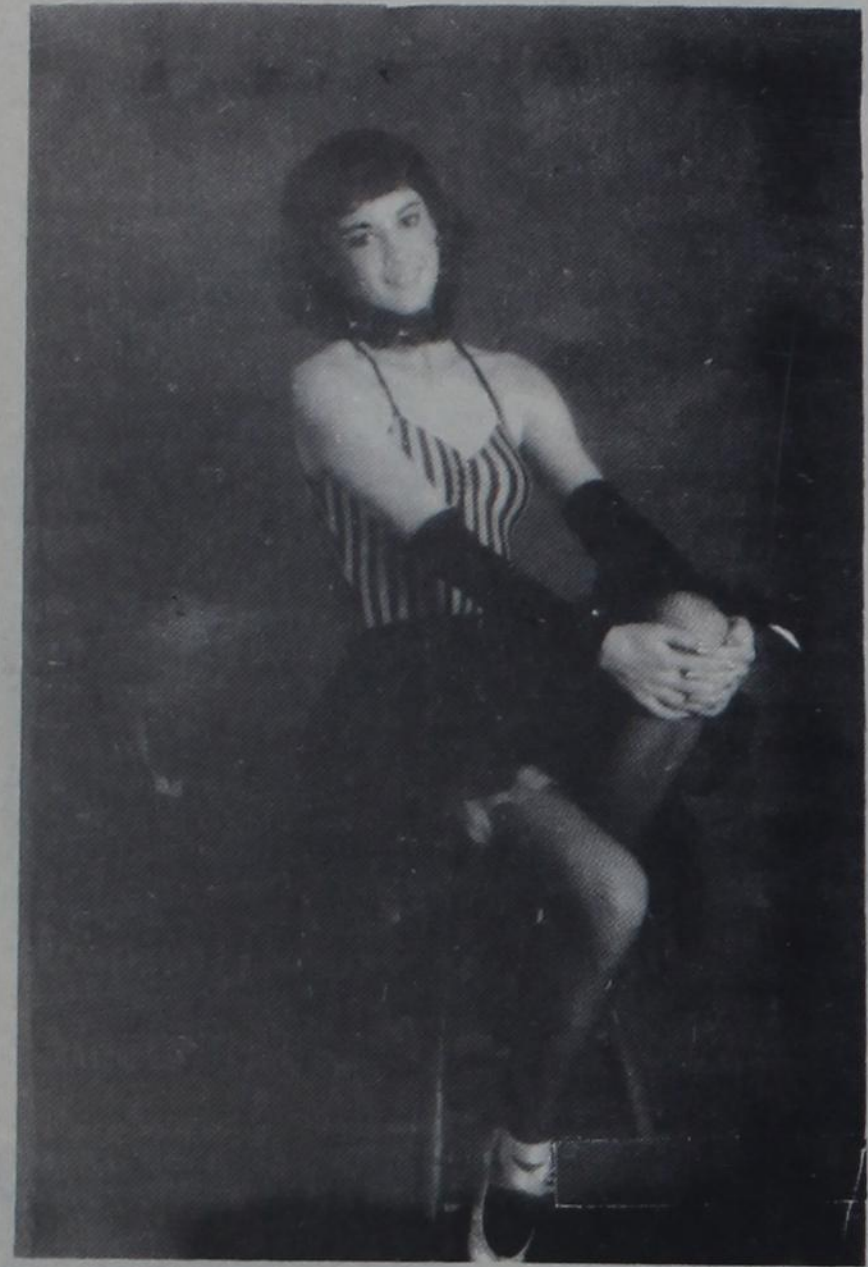

Sybrinna is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H.L. Killion of Rising Star.

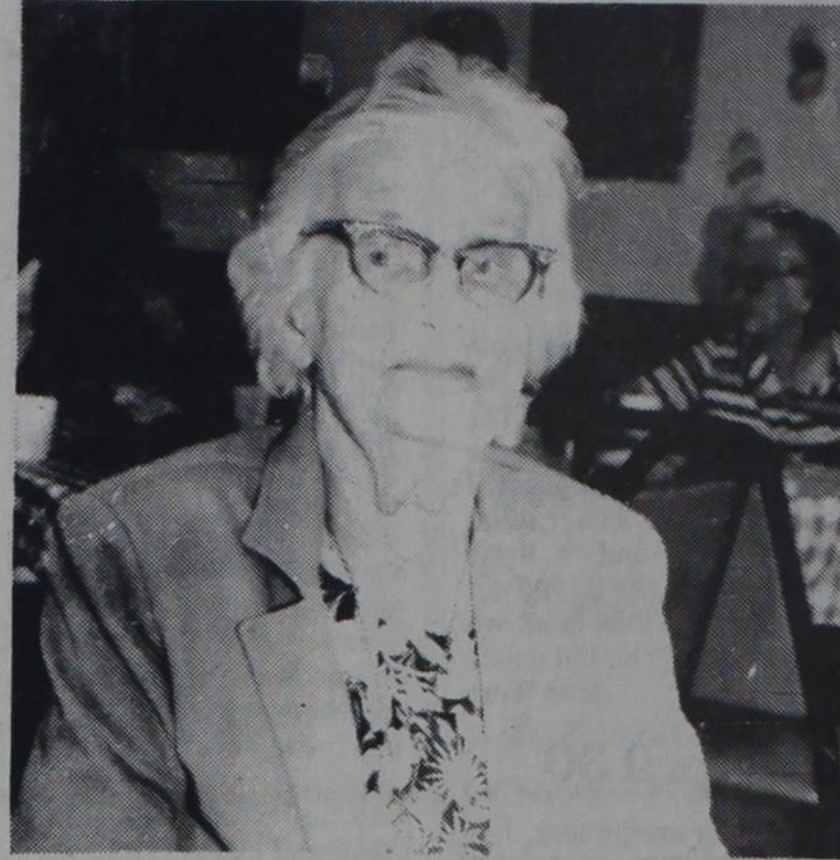

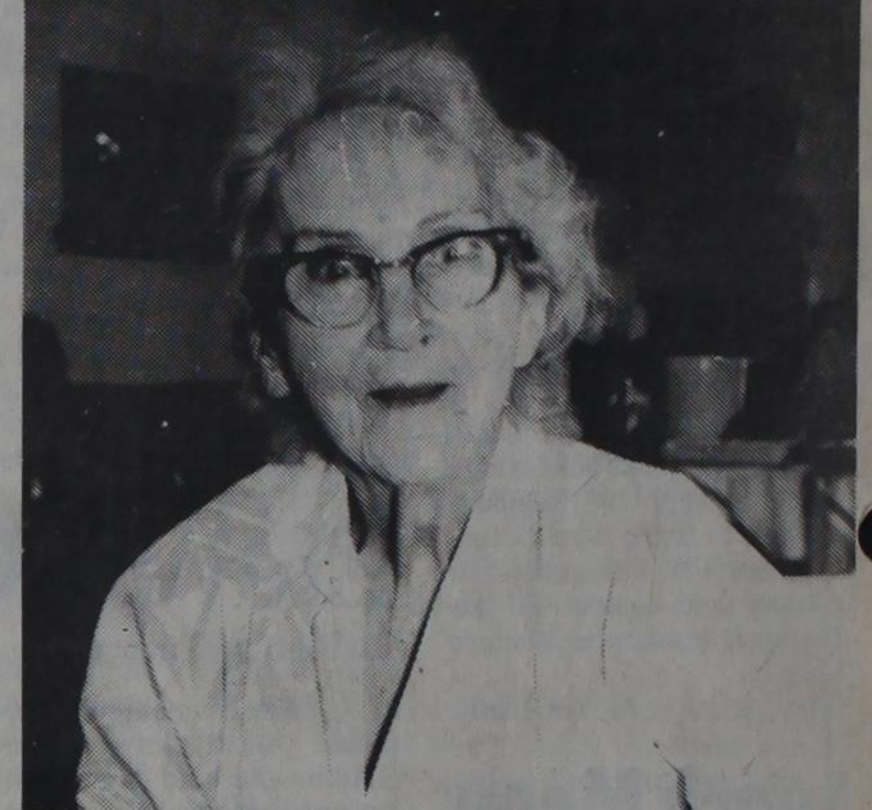

Pre-Register Kindergarten Children Here May 14

Parents are asked to pre-register their children who will be in kindergarten next fall. All children who will be five on or before September 1, 1987 may attend kindergarten.

The scheduled time for the screening process will be Thursday, May 14, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. This process will take about 60 minutes for each child and school officials hold the pre-registration to avoid delay at the beginning of the next term.

Each student's hearing, vision, speech, motor skills and developmental growth will be evaluated at this time.

Parents are reminded that

to enter school in Texas a student must have a state approved birth certificate and a current immunization record. Immunization records must include three-in-a-series DPT and/or a booster after age four, polio, measles, mumps and rubella.

Please bring birth certificate and immunization record at time of registration.

The school committee will also evaluate children between three and four whom the parents suspect have a handicap, learning or developmental delay. The Rising Star Independent School District offers an early childhood program to handicapped children.

Screening for Pre-Schoolers Is May 22

A developmental screening will be held for young children ages zero to five (0-5) from 9 to 11 a.m. May 22 at the Eastland County MHRM Center in Eastland.

The screening, which takes about 20 minutes to complete, tests a young child in four areas: personal/social skills (playing, eating, dressing, etc.), fine motor skills (ability to manipulate small objects), gross motor skills (running, jumping, etc.) and language development (speech, following instructions, etc.).

If a child is found to have two or more delays in one area, there is further testing available or referral to the appropriate agency.

The purpose of Early Childhood Intervention is to identify and correct as many problems as possible for young children. Early detection of young children's delays have proven beneficial to the child, parents and teachers.
