### YOUR PROGRAM

Blood, like miracle drugs, has become vital to the saving of life. Unlike the miracle drugs it cannot be produced in a manufacturing process. It must come from people.

The demand for blood began to soar about fifteen years ago when scientists found a way to store it. Prior to that all blood transfusions were emergency operations, direct from one person to another. Complicated equipment was essential. Now hospitals are able to keep a supply of blood on hand classified by type, ready for instant use. Still another time-saving technique for using blood grew out of further research when plasma came into use. Plasma can be stored for years. During World War II the Red Cross collected more than 13,000,000 pints of blood as the free gift of Americans to their fighting men.

Because of the increasing demand for blood and because there is no manufactured substitute the Red Cross established a national blood program. Besides military requirements it is now taking care of civilian needs throughout the nation. The program when fully developed will furnish whole blood, plasma and other derivatives to all the people of this country irrespective of race, creed, color or financial status. The only charge ever made to the patient will be a fee by the physician for professional services in administering the material. The Red Cross makes no charge.

## Northern Part of Eastland County Is Going in for Big Irrigation Plant

Here are the statistics on the new reservoir being built as a joint effort by residents of Eastland and Ranger. The lake is near Staff Colony Creek and Leon River will be dammed up.

Capacity at spillway, 28,000 acre feet.

Reservoir area at spillway, 1600 acres.

Maximum depth of water at dam, 67 feet.

Maximum height of dam, 87 feet.

Length of main dam, 1,500 feet.

Overall length of dam and spillway, 5,000 feet.

Combined spillway capacity, 206,000 combined feet.

Yield during critical drouth, 7,300 acre feet annually.

Average daily yield in critical drouth, 6.5 million gallons daily.

Capacity of lake pump station, 3.5 million gallons daily.

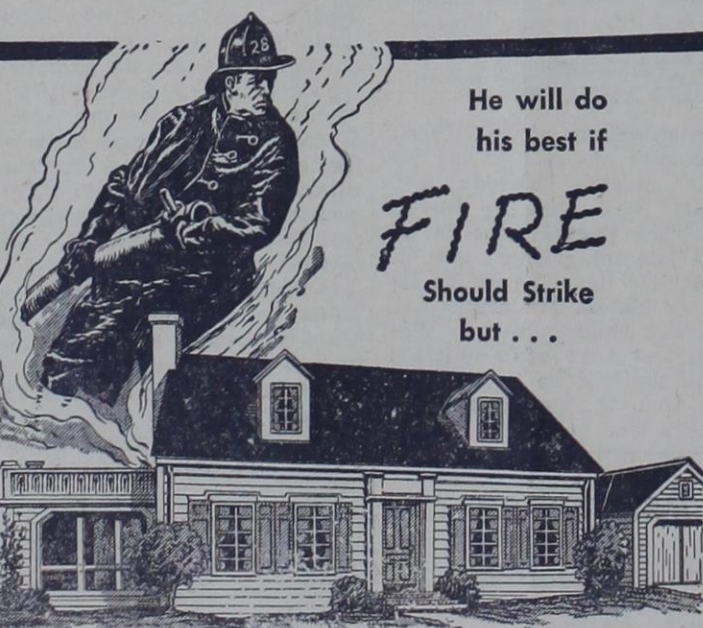

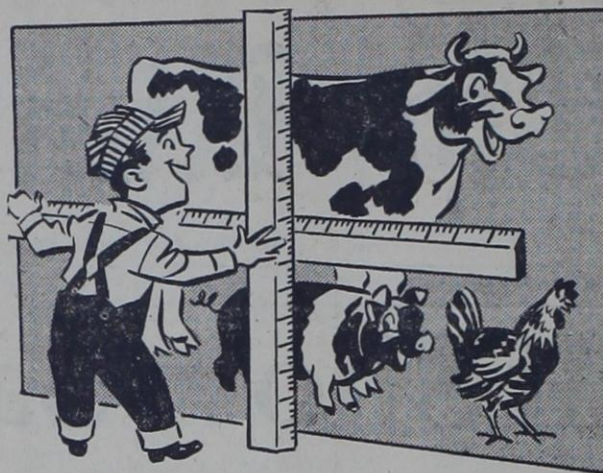

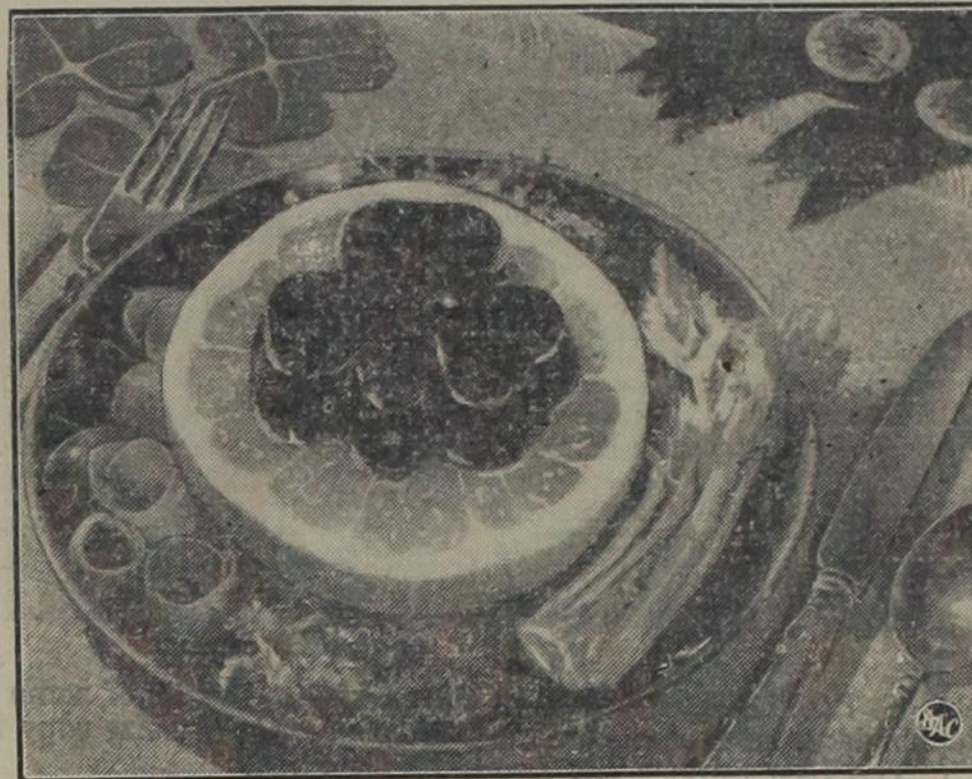

If you insist on the wearin' of the green on March 17, start right at the table, by serving this Erin version of Florida grapefruit as a meal starter. Here a small molded lime gelatine shamrock shimmers atop the golden sections of the fruit. A wonderfully tart half of grapefruit is the best appetizer possible, from the standpoint of whetting your appetite for the rest of the meal, and also being the sort of thing the doctor recommends, high in vitamin C which you need every day to keep in good shape. Your grapefruit itself may even fit into the color scheme for the holiday—this time of year oranges and grapefruit down south some-

times show green on their outer surfaces, just the result of chlorophyll (the substance you're now enthusing about in toothpaste and chewing gum) coming out along with the bloom for next year's crop. Don't be misled if the fruit in your market has green tinges—all fruit shipped from Florida is inspected before it's picked and must be mature before it leaves the groves.

To Prepare Grapefruit Halves Cut fruit in half; remove core if desired. Cut around each section, loosening fruit from membrane. Do not cut around entire outer edge of fruit. Serve plain or with any desired topping.

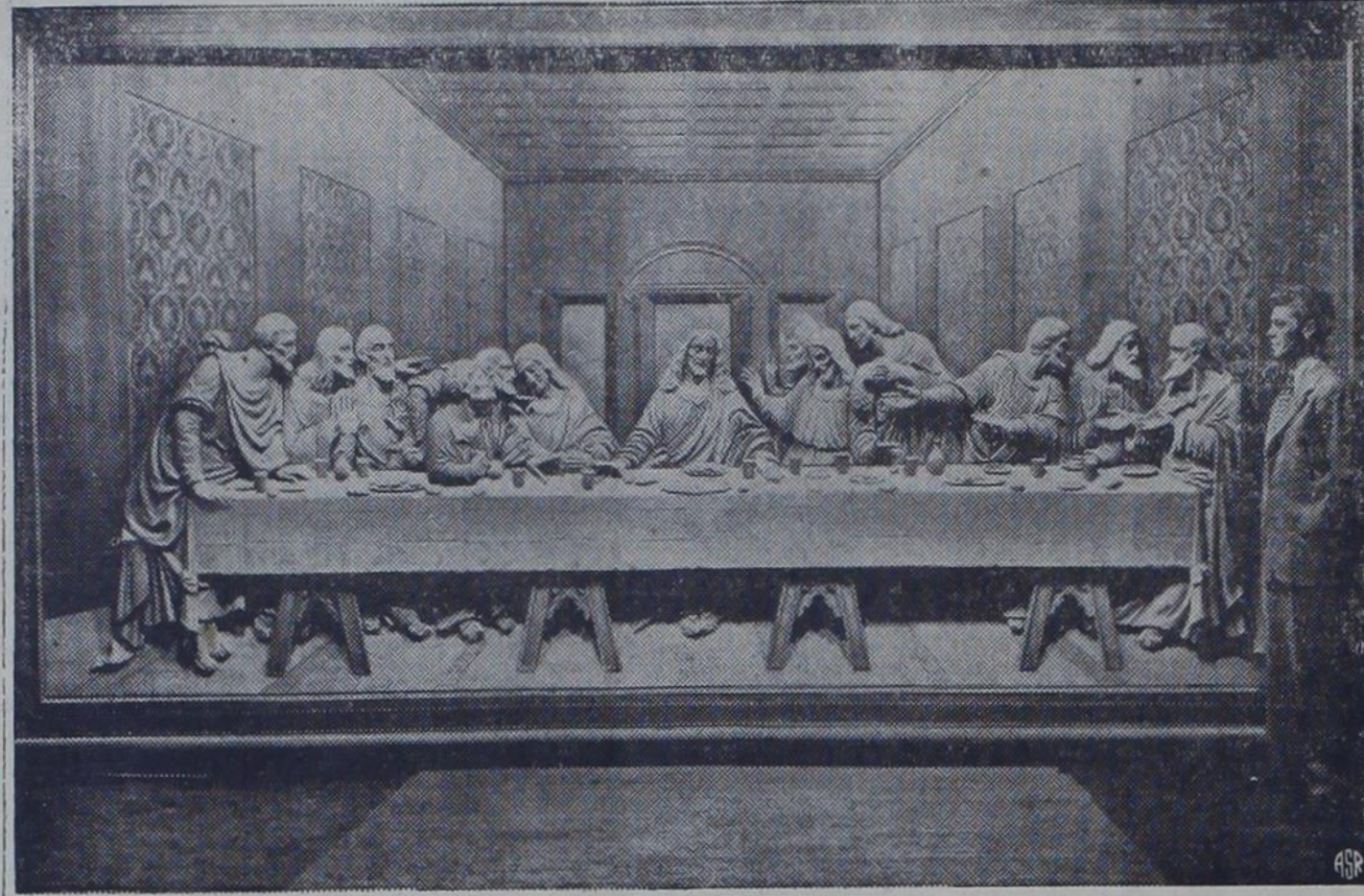

**BOSTON, MASS.**—All the specialized skills of some of the finest craftsmen of New England have been combined to create this life-size copy in wood of the famous painting "The Last Supper" by Leonardo da Vinci.

More than a year was used in preparing the great carving—18½ feet long and 8½ feet wide. The figures, of limewood, are delicately tinted to give a feeling of lifelike reality, and a giant frame of coning trasting walnut gives it depth. The carving will be the point of central interest in The Upper Room chapel, now nearing completion in Nashville. It is expected that visitors who view the carving will be moved to spend a few moments in prayer and meditation in keeping with the purpose of The Upper Room—a devotional guide issued in 17 languages and used round the world. The chapel itself is part of the new headquarters building for The Upper Room, the world's most widely used devotional guide. It is believed that it will become a devotional shrine and point of interest for visitors of the Midsouth.

The picture shows W. D. Irving, of Irving and Casson, New York and Boston, who have produced wood carvings for some of America's greatest churches and cathedrals. The wood carving was done from a model created by Earnest Pelligrini.

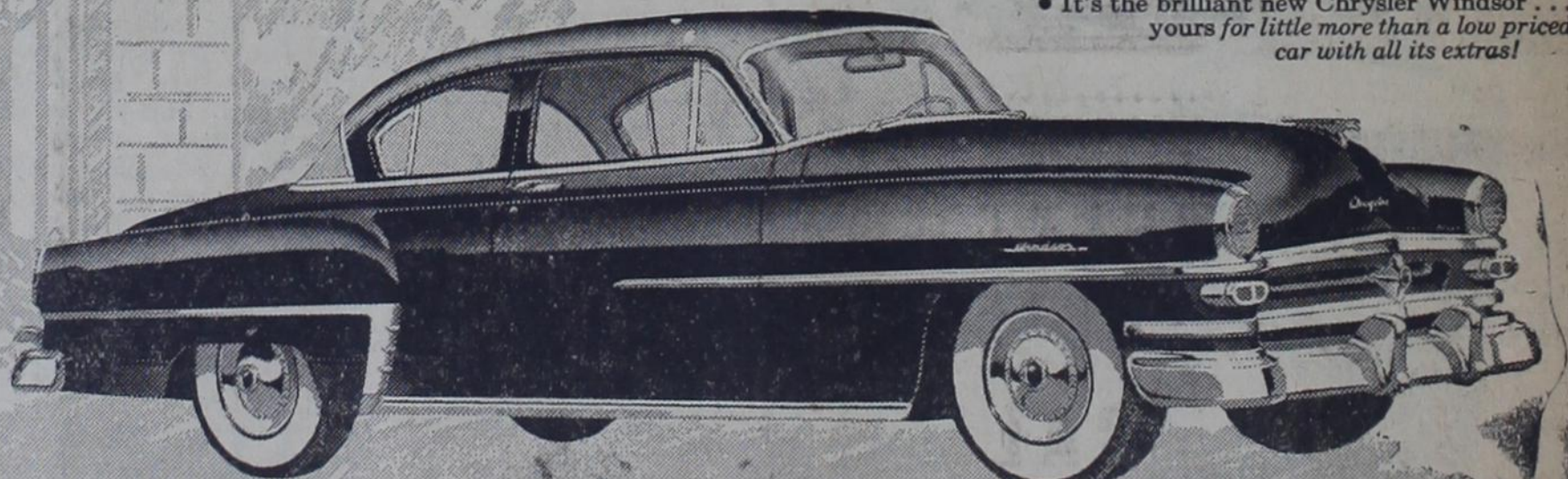

Uncle John's father was a second cousin to the silver-tongued orator, the late William Jennings Bryan. Mr. Inabnet said Bryan was a frequent visitor in their home when he was a lad growing up.

tough for a man of his age. He said he began looking around for something "easy to do", so decided to buy his present farm and go into the orchard business.

As far as having less work to do, he erred, "There is more hard work in the orchard business than there is in drilling oil wells, but growing fruit is much more fun."

Inabnet is approaching his 77th birthday and he has no plans for "retiring".

"I intend to continue to settling out young fruit trees until I'm 90 years old."

He, as well as numbers of other fruit growers at the meeting, bemoan the fact that there are no young men among the area's orchardist.

"Nearly every orchard in Eastland County are those belonging to men who are getting up in years," Inabnet said. "In normal years, fruit growing is good business. With all of today's new varieties and all the new chemicals with which to fight insects and diseases, it should be a breeze for the young man," he said.

Many years, Inabnet's orchard has produced a fair income when other crops were complete failures, he said. Ranger Times

### Coyotes Eat Vegetables When Meat Unavailable

Austin.—South Texas coyotes, sissy or not, are turning from raw meat to garden vegetables, according to a report from John E. Hearn of Cotulla, predator control supervisor for the Game and Fish Commission.

Hearn, quoted in the January issue of the Texas Game and Fish Magazine, says the coyotes' vegetarian habits have been cultivated in keeping with revolutionary land utilization trends.

"The once tractless brush area are being gradually cleared and converted to agriculture", states the magazine. "The shrinkage of the wilderness has shunk the natural prey of the coyotes and they have turned to farm products.

"The new diet may not be too good for the coyote for his numbers have dropped in recent years," according to Hearn.

The Predator Control Supervisor points that the coyote still relish fresh meat and that this characteristic craving has been used to help curb their depredations.

The magazine article goes on: "Hearne said that after one rancher complained that coyotes were raiding his 70-acre melon patch, and, incidentally were choosing the largest melons, they shot two jackrabbits. They made 16 baits, poisoned them and left them around the melon patch.

"The coyotes ate every one of the baits. Three dead animals attested to the effectiveness of the system. Hearn suspected that others had died after escaping from the scene."

# it's the Law

## Criminal Trial Procedure Has Conflicting Aims

How many of the technicalities and so-called "loopholes" in our laws governing conduct of criminal trials could be eliminated without danger to innocent citizens? Some critics of our criminal trial system feel that certain safeguards in our system could be abolished without such danger. But many believe the danger to the innocent to be quite substantial.

While most everyone is in favor of more efficient law enforcement, a relative few would accomplish this aim at the expense of individual rights. A democratic society pursues conflicting aims in its criminal procedure—to convict the guilty without endangering the innocent.

The protection provided by our laws for the rights of those accused of crime form a primary distinction between our way of life and that existing behind the iron curtain. We start out with the premise that every individual is presumed to be innocent until proven beyond a reasonable doubt. Then we rely upon various safeguards to insure that those actually innocent will not be wrongfully convicted.

If these safeguards are to be effecting in protecting the innocent, our courts must insist upon their strict observance. This means that cases must be reversed and new trials must be granted in instances where the accused has not been afforded every protection guaranteed by our laws.

Many of these cases must involve persons who are actually guilty. And sometimes the delays occasioned by mistrials and new trials will allow the guilty to escape punishment. Witnesses disappear and memories grow dim as the case moves from one appeal to another.

Admittedly, the guilty should be punished. But how far dare we go in reforming and speeding up the processes of criminal justice? Our judges and lawyers believe that any criminal procedure constructed solely with professional offenders in mind, or on the supposition that "the rogues have too many chances to escape" would result in a ritual whose efficiency would be equaled only by its terror.

So, while Bar committees are constantly working on plans for increasing the efficiency of our criminal trial machinery, progress must necessarily be gradual and orderly. Human rights and the individual are too important in our society to take a chance on any overnight upheaval of procedures and safeguards which have evolved over a period of several hundred years.

Our safeguards include the right not to be detained without being advised of the nature of the accusation against us, the right not to be coerced into a confession, the right to be represented by counsel, the right to a fair and prompt jury trial, and many others.

How many of these can we afford to give up in the interests of improving our criminal trial system? How many would you waive if you should become an innocent suspect in a criminal case?

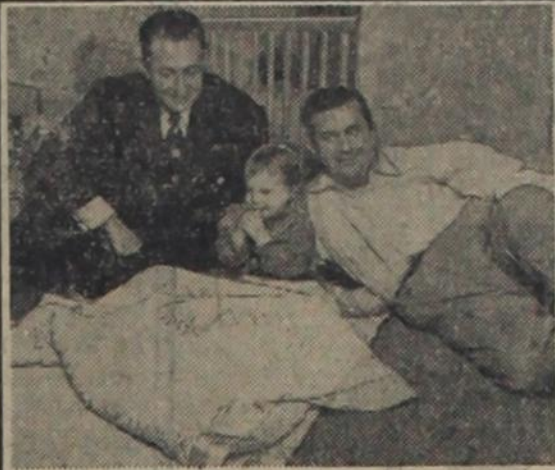

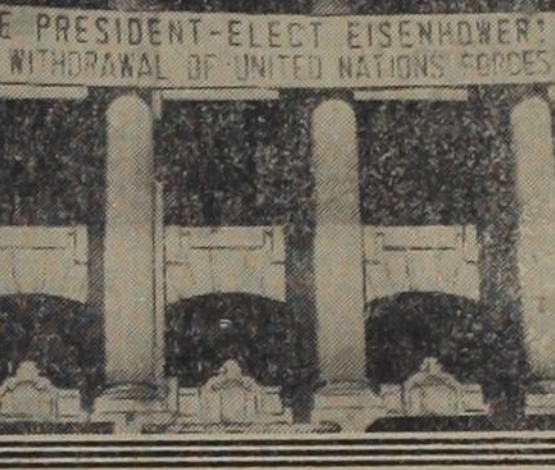

## 9-Point Program for

### Eastland Co. Gardeners

(Robert K. Williams)  
 A nine point program for East-  
 land County gardeners was of-  
 fered by the County Agent's of-  
 fice today.

It was suggested that the fol-  
 lowing points be observed in  
 order to get more food and fun  
 from the garden in '53:

- (1) Plan the garden in advance.
- (2) Keep it small.
- (3) Make a succession of plant-  
 ings (for top quality over a long-  
 er period of time).
- (4) Plant several kinds of vege-  
 tables (12 to 14 kinds as a mini-  
 mum).
- (5) Have the right tools such  
 as spade, hoe, rake, yardstick,  
 twine, 2 stakes, dibble, trowel,  
 dust gun, garden hose and push  
 plow.
- (6) Have necessary materials  
 such as fertilizer, insecticide seed  
 treating chemicals and inoculants  
 for beans and peas.
- (7) Use good soil management  
 (plenty of organic matter suppli-  
 mental commercial fertilizer, sup-  
 plemental watering, mulches and  
 rotation.)
- (8) Plant adapted kinds of vege-  
 tables (See gardening Bulletin  
 B-70 in County Agent office.)
- (9) Harvest at peak of quality.

## County Attorney Makes Report to County Citizens

Gentlemen:  
This office wishes to report that the recent activities in the District and the County Courts of Eastland County have resulted in the following convictions:

Coe Owen Garrett, tried in the 91st District Court on plea of not guilty to driving while intoxicated, on the 9th day of March, 1953, was convicted and his punishment was affixed at a fine of \$100.00 and ten days in jail, and suspension of driver's license for a period of six months. Doyle Gilmore, of Cisco, was tried in the same court on March 11th on a plea of not guilty to the charge of possessing whisky for the purpose of sale. He was convicted and assessed a fine of \$400.00 and sixty days in jail. The attorney for both Garrett and Gilmore has notified the court that motions for new trials will be filed in each case.

The case of the State of Texas vs. Mae King was reaffirmed on March 11, 1953, by the Court of Criminal Appeals, at Austin. The King case was tried on September 17, 1952, before a jury in the 91st District Court and the defendant found guilty of the sale of beer in a dry area and her punishment affixed at a fine of \$500.00 and six months in jail and costs.

Recent court activities include the conviction of Charlie Matthew Bush, of Abilene, for driving while intoxicated and his punishment was affixed at a fine of \$100.00 and costs of court. Also Arlander Jess Byrd, of Eastland, was convicted of a similar offense and was assessed a fine of \$50.00 and costs. Driver's license of both defendants were suspended for six months.

Several convictions for minor offenses have been had in the county and justice courts. The Grand Jury was in session two days, March 9 and 10, and have recessed until March 30.
