June 7, this Saturday, the Democratic Primary Run-Off Election will be held.

Polls open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Nine voting boxes are in Eastland County. To be decided are three state judge positions and the county sheriff's department head.

Of greatest local interest, of course, is the sheriff's race. Kenneth Eaves and Johnnie W. Morren go into it with the support of many countians: totaled votes for both in the May primary was 4,331.

Chief of police in Cisco is Kenneth Eaves who has served that position since 1979. For a short time before that he was deputy sheriff for Eastland County. With the Austin Police

Department from '71 to '75 Eaves served as a member of the Special Weapons and Tactics Unit, where he was a fire team leader. Between then and his move to Eastland County Eaves worked for Dow Chemical Co. in Freeport; he moved to Eastland County in 1979. He has attended Tarleton State University and is a graduate of Comanche High School. Kenneth Eaves and his wife have two children.

Morren, filling the unexpired term of Ronnie White, is seeking his first elected term as sheriff. Ten year Eastland's chief of police, Morren has also served as assistant chief. A Kokomo born-Eastland raised man, Morren joined the armed forces in 1941 where he served for 25

years. Retiring in Eastland in 1966, Morren claims 400 hours of law enforcement and training and 13 years of experience. With two children and his wife Bounita, Morren managed to receive a certification by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officer Standards and Education in 1971.

the \$1 million project.

Armstrong says that as circuits are transferred from old lines to the new facilities, temporary interruption of telephone service may occur which is unavoidable.

"The crews try to make these transfers just as fast as they can," he says, "but sometimes splicing every wire in a large cable can take up to four hours. If workmen anticipate a long delay they will notify those telephone users affected before beginning work."

Armstrong says another problem in the changeover is wet weather. "Most of the old cable is protected from water with a lead coating which has become very brittle with age. As we begin rearranging circuits, cracks appear which are too small to be seen, yet allow moisture to seep inside causing noise or out-of-service conditions. Should this occur, we transfer those circuits into the water-tight cable as soon as it is ready. But sometimes major splices must be made on up the road before new cable can be activated," he explained.

When the project is completed late this fall, all telephone customers within Rising Star will have private lines. About 130 telephones in the City are now on party lines.

Telephone users in the rural areas will be able to choose either private line service or a line with no more than three other families sharing it. Now, up to eight parties must sometimes share a line.

Armstrong reports the new switching center that Continental Telephone installed at Rising Star earlier this year has significantly reduced the number of telephone troubles. "When we finish rebuilding the cable network in the fall," he says, "telephone service in Rising Star will be among the best in the nation."

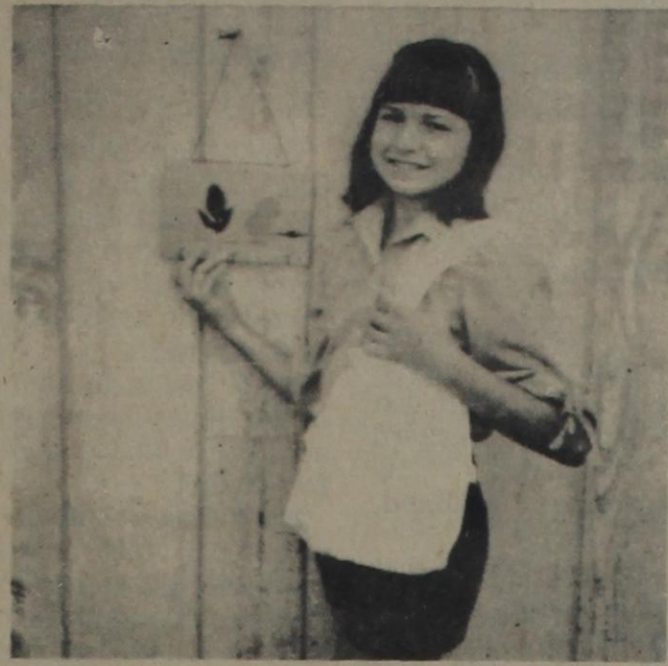

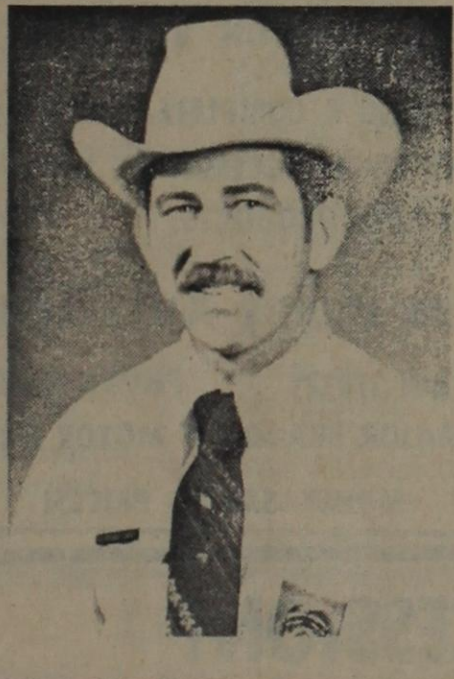

WHAT SAITH THE SCRIPTURES?

Jon N. Bailey

QUESTION: What shall be the destiny of the wicked after death?

ANSWER: Those who die lost in their sins face a tragic eternity. God offers eternal salvation in Jesus Christ, but all who die outside of Christ are destined to eternal punishment.

There shall be a day at the end of time, the "Great Day", the "Last Day", when every man shall be judged (John 12:48; Acts 17:31; Rom. 2:16; Jude 6). Yet, even until that great judgement day, the wicked shall be kept "under punishment unto the day of judgement" (2 Pet. 2:9). Jesus taught of a certain "rich man" who died and found himself "in Hades...in torments" (Luke 16:23). The judgement day had not come, for this man still had brothers alive in the world of the living (16:28). This man, however, was already suffering, for he cried, "I am in anguish in this flame" and described his situation as a "place of torment" (16:24, 28).

When the day of judgement comes, both the righteous and the wicked shall be resurrected, "some to everlasting life, and some to shame and everlasting contempt" (Dan. 12:2). "The hour cometh in which all that are in the tombs shall hear his voice and shall come forth; they that have done good unto the resurrection of life; and they that have done evil unto the resurrection of damnation" (John 5:28-29).

The wicked shall suffer eternal separation from God. They shall "suffer punishment, even eternal destruction from the face of the Lord and from the glory of his might" (2 Thess. 1:9). Even many religious people who were disobedient shall hear the Lord say, "I never knew you, depart from me, ye that work iniquity" (Mt. 7:21-27).

The wicked shall suffer in eternal darkness. For the wicked, "the blackness of darkness hath been reserved forever" (Jude 13). They shall be "cast forth into the outer darkness" (Mt. 8:12; 22:13; 25:30).

The wicked shall suffer in eternal fire. The Lord shall declare to them "Depart from me, ye cursed, into the eternal fire which is prepared for the devil and his angels" (Mt. 25:41). This place into which they shall be "cast" is called "the hell of fire" (Mt. 5:22); "the unquenchable fire" (Mk. 9:43); "the furnace of fire" (Mt. 13:42, 50); and "the lake of fire and brimstone" (Rev. 20:10, 15; 21:8).

The wicked shall suffer eternal torment. They shall be "tormented with fire and brimstone...the smoke of their torment goeth up forever and ever, and they have no rest day and night" (Rev. 14:10-11). In Hell, because of their torment, "there shall be the weeping and the gnashing of teeth" (Mt. 8:12; 13:42; 22:13; 24:51).

Most of the teaching concerning the destiny of the wicked were given by Jesus himself. Let us heed his warnings, for he himself declared that the wicked "shall go away into eternal punishment; but the righteous unto eternal life" (Mt. 25:46).

The truly righteous, who sincerely love and fear God, wear the robe of Christ's righteousness in prosperity and adversity alike. Self-denial, self-

sacrifice, benevolence, kindness, love, patience, fortitude, and Christian trust are the daily fruits borne by those who are truly connected with God. Their acts may not be published to the world, but they themselves are daily wrestling with evil, and gaining precious victories over temptation and wrong.

All who have put the robe of Christ's righteousness will stand before Him as chosen and faithful and true. Satan has no power to pluck them out of the hand of the Savior. Not one soul who in penitence and faith has claimed His protection will Christ permit to pass under the enemy's power.

Each one will have a close struggle to overcome sin in his own heart. This is at times a very painful and discouraging work; because, as we see the deformities in our character, we keep looking at them, when we should look to Jesus and put on the robe of His righteousness. Everyone who enters the pearly gates of the city of God will enter there as a conqueror.



Agriculture Today

American farmers had a fewer tractors on farms last year, but total tractor horsepower was at a record high. They also had fewer corn pickers and picker shellers last year than they did in 1978. But, they had more grain combines and field forage harvesters and the number of trucks on farms hit a record high.

The number of grain combines on farms also moved up—from 538,000 in 1978 to 540,000 last year. This marked the fourth consecutive year they've increased after more or less bottoming out in 1975. But, the total is little more than half that of the peak in 1959 when there were 1,045,000 on farms.

A department report puts tractor numbers on farms last year at 4,350,000. That's down from 4,370,000 the year before. It also was the twelfth straight year that tractor numbers had declined. The total included 4,210,000 wheel tractors, 138,000 crawler tractors.

At 600,000, corn pickers and picker shellers on farms were off from 602,000 in 1978. It was the nineteenth straight year the number has declined. The total, lowest since 1952, was down 25 percent from the peak of 792,000 recorded in 1960.

The number of pickup balers also declined—from 610,000 in 1978 to 605,000. This was the thirtieth straight year the total has dropped after peaking at 752,000 in 1966. The 1979 total was the lowest since 1958.

But, the number of field forage harvesters increased for the fourth straight year. At 274,000, the total was up only slightly from a year earlier, though well below the 321,000 reported in 1968.

Meanwhile, motor truck numbers moved up only slightly—from 3,045,000 in 1978 to 3,047,000. But, the total was record high for the seventh straight year; double that of 1945.

Pioneer News

Mrs. A.C. Halsell

Each person you meet has an interesting and unique life story, once it is told. So it was with Mrs. Beulah Arvin who lacks only six months being one hundred years old. My interview with her at the Colonial Oaks Nursing Home in Cross Plains revealed only a brief outline of her long and interesting life. More visits would be necessary to get a full story of her life. I became better acquainted when I visited earlier in the week. Her love for singing was shown when she joined me and Mrs. Bell Barr at the piano. Some of her favorite songs were "What A Friend", "Amazing Grace", and Fanny J. Crosby's "Rescue the Perishing". On that visit I inquired as to what she attributed her long life. Her reply was, "The Good Lord."

I made a later appointment to interview her more fully about her life. I found this little brow-eyed lady, with slightly greying hair, dressed in a pretty pinkish dress, all smiles and ready to talk. Her manner of speech brought laughter to us several times.

Mrs. Beulah Arvin was born November 24, 1880 in Lee County, East of Austin. Their trading post was McDade in adjoining Bastrop County. She lived there until she was grown. She began an itinerary which took her into several states before settling at Cottonwood. She and a brother and wife, and a sister and husband started by covered wagon train to Crowell, Texas. They passed through Brannon Wells, Cottonwood and to Turkey Creek where they visited an Uncle Jack Holley. They rested a few days and "the girls got some washing done."

June 5, 1980

On arriving in Baird, they were forced to rent a house and await the eminent birth of her sister's baby. (This son, J.W. Corzine lives in Houston at this time.) After her sister's recovery from unexpected complications, part of the group proceeded to Crowell. She, her sister and children went back to the Holley's place intending to follow the others later.

Mrs. Arvin had a life time scholarship in Bookkeeping to Nixon Clay Commercial College. She remained at Cottonwood for four years, where she spent her time "working, going to school and loafing." All the time she was trying to decide whether to be a nurse, or a school teacher. She decided to go to Houston where she learned the Gregg System of Shorthand. ("I still like that system," she said.)

The link in her story was missing at this time, but it seems she returned to Cottonwood after four years in Houston. She had been promised a job with Lee Automobile Tire Co. within a year. Her intention was to return to Houston. A fortune teller told her she would never go back to Houston. You'll be in a little town in the northwest, and that she would lose some money. She did not go back to Houston. She married Mayjor Arvin on Nov. 17, 1924. She and Mr. Arvin traveled to California, Arkansas, to Rio Grande Valley, always "Prospecting". They bought a home in Cottonwood, but decided to go back to California where they worked in the grape harvest ("two bunches would fill a hamper.") On their return trip they visited an aunt in El Paso, came to Colinsworth Co., where they visited her sister. They were living in Rising Star when Mr.

Arvin died suddenly. At the time of his death, she was thrown into a state of shock which lasted for several days. Mrs. Arvin could tell me no more of the chain of events. She came to the Cross Plains Rest Home in 1977.

After a brief rest for her, I asked, "Is there any special event in your life you would like to tell me?" She thought a minute and said, "Yes, I attended Abilene Christian University when it was called, 'The Children's Classical Institute.'" Also, "I was baptized into the Church of Christ, in Milam Lake, when I was a young lady."

At this point, I told her and her roommate goodbye, with a promise of visiting her again. I left her with that same smile she greeted me with.

Advance Filing

"File for Social Security benefits early," is the advice given to potential beneficiaries by Glyn Hammons, manager of the Social Security office in Abilene.

Filing in advance allows the claimant and the Social Security office to resolve any problems that might arise quickly, thus insuring that checks will start on time. Hammons points out that a person may file as early as three months before benefits are to start.

Processing of the claim can also be speeded along by having the necessary documents with you when you file. This includes your Social Security card, your birth certificate, and your latest W-2 form or self-employment tax return. An applicant for widow's benefits would also need to provide her marriage certificate and the death

certificate. Disability applicants should have the names and addresses of all doctors and facilities treating them for their disability.

As an added convenience to the public, Social Security also provides teleservice, Hammons states. A person can file an application for any type benefit by simply calling the Social Security office collect at 698-2815. If you already receive benefits or just have a question, you can call our special toll free number. Just dial 1-800-392-1603. Teleservice saves the person gasoline, prevents the search for a parking place, and eliminates waiting to be interviewed.

"By having his records together, filing by telephone and in advance, the applicant has helped us serve him as smoothly and efficiently as possible," Hammons concluded.

Oil Production Announced In Brown & Eastland Counties

The eighth consecutive year of production at the maximum efficient recovery rate in nearly all of Texas' fields once again pushed the state's output of crude oil and condensate above the one-billion barrel mark. The total of 1,006,845,138 barrels included almost 980 million barrels of crude oil and just over 28 million barrels of condensate, according to figures compiled by Texas Mid-Continent & Gas Association.

The billion-barrel level of crude and condensate production is one that has been achieved each year since 1965. However, a downward production trend continued for the seventh consecutive year since Texas production peaked in 1972.

Last year's production level showed a drop of more than 60.1 million barrels from the 1978 figure. Nevertheless, production in 1979 pushed the all-time cumulative total since 1889 to more than 44.7 billion barrels of crude oil and condensate.

Edwin L. Cox, president of the Dallas-based Association, notes that the decline in production in 1979 corresponds to a drop of nearly 54 million barrels in Texas's reserves of crude oil. The decline to 7,636,084,000 barrels compares with proved reserves of more than 10.1 billion barrels as recently as 1975.

Although not pessimistic about the future of the Texas petroleum industry, Cox is concerned about impediments to production, most of them the result of policies of the federal government. The Dallas independent producer cited environmental overskill and the "regulatory and tax burdens" of the so-called windfall profit tax as problems the industry is having a tough time overcoming.

"The Texas oil and gas industry supports the goal of a healthy environment. But, at the same time, we have to pursue a national goal of adequate energy supplies," Cox says.

Cox said the \$227 billion excise tax on producers' income resulting from crude price decontrol could have been used better for enhanced recovery projects and deep drilling.

"The oil and gas industry in Texas will contribute a sizeable portion of this transfer of capital from private industry to the federal government," he warned.

Eastland County, which has had production since 1917, last year produced 960,594 barrels of crude oil and condensate at the rate of 2632 barrels per day. Production in 1979 boosted Brown County's production total through the end of the year to 127,049,841 barrels.

Brown County, which has had production since 1917 also, last year produced 415,660 barrels of crude oil and condensate at the rate of 1139 barrels per day. Production in 1979 boosted Brown County's production total through the end of the year to 44,929,952 barrels.

In 1979, 22 counties produced more than 10 million barrels of crude oil, a decrease of two counties from 1978; a decrease of four from 1977, and five from 1976.

The following are the top five counties:

1. Yoakum—67,345,328;
2. Gaines—62,097,067;
3. Ector—55,890,070;
4. Pecos—51,338,440;
5. Scurry—48,187,208.

In addition to the top five, 17 counties topped 10 million barrels of crude oil output last year. They are: Hockley, Gregg, Andrews, Crane, Refugio, Wood, Brazoria, Montgomery, Rusk, Harris, Howard, Kent, Terry, Cochran, Chambers, Jackson and Upton.

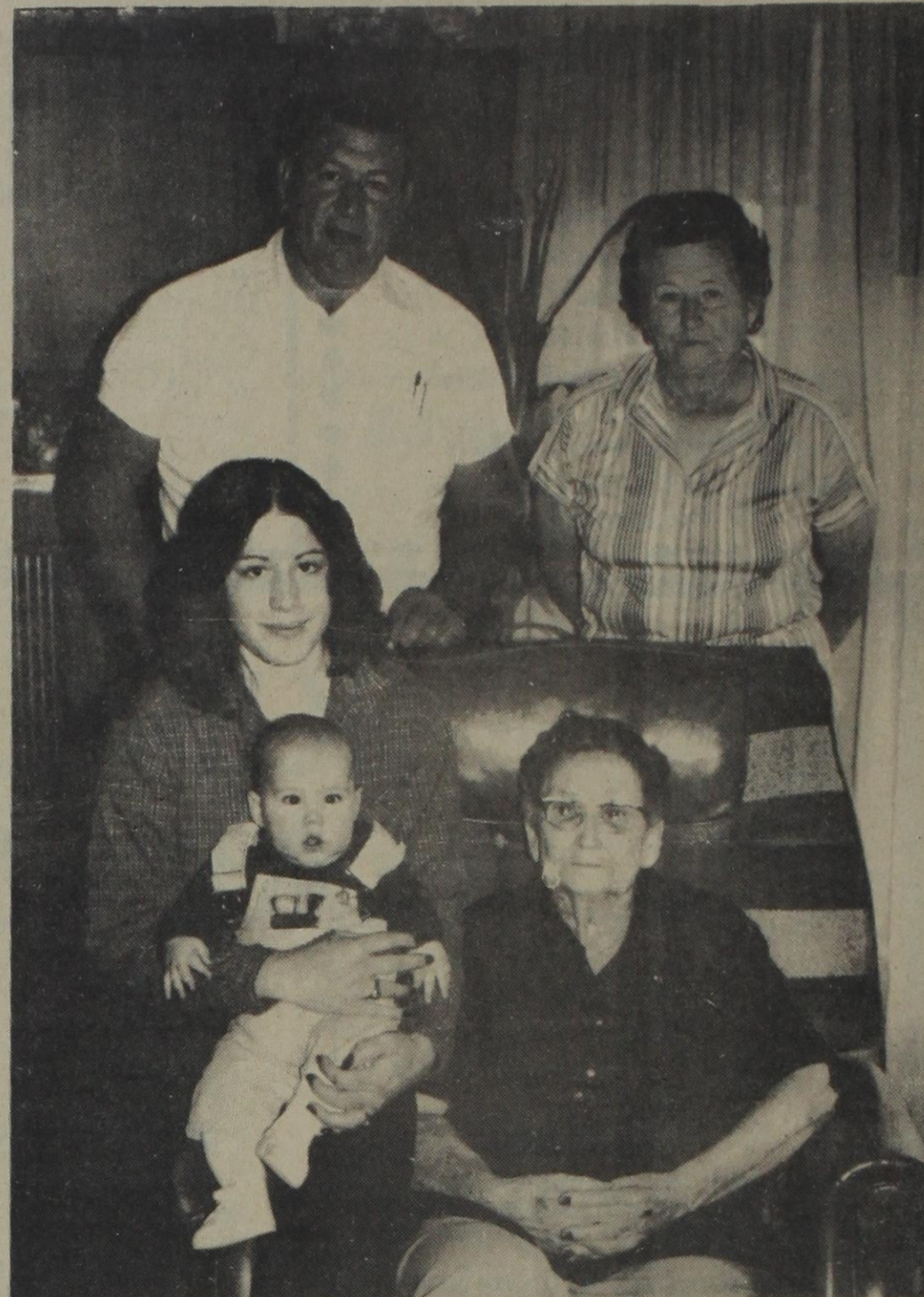
