Americans Need To Eat More Beef

COLLEGE STATION--Americans are not eating enough beef, and a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has the figures to prove it.

Considering the 116 pounds, this figure must be reduced by about 30 percent for cutting losses, bones and fat because it is stated in terms of carcass beef. Furthermore, since the amount of cooked beef is in question, another weight reduction of 25 percent is necessary due to cooking.

Field Day Set For Texas Peanut Producers

YOAKUM -- Tours of peanut field research, soybean variety tests, and newly established forage grass plots will be among highlights for visitors attending the annual Peanut Field Day at the Texas A&M University Plant Disease Station at Yoakum, Sept. 26.

Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Field Day visitors are invited to bring any problem plant specimens they may have with them for the experts to analyze and discuss.

In charge of the plant diagnostic booth will be Dr. Charles Cole, area entomologist; Dr. Carl Gray, soil chemist; Dr. Wendell Horne, plant pathologist; Don Parks, area economist

Discussions at the soybean field stop will be led by Dr. John Sij, Experiment Station scientist in rice physiology from Beaumont. Leading discussions at the irrigation studies stop will be Dr. Darold L. Ketting, plant physiologist, cooperative, USDA, and Shelby Newman, associate professor in charge of the Experiment Station at Stephenville.

Groups will assemble at the headquarters building of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at 1 p.m. to begin the peanut field tour, according to Dr. Thurman E. Boswell, associate professor in charge.

Discussions of breeding and varieties will be presented by Dr. Olin Smith, Experiment Station scientist in peanut breeding, College Station, and Dr. C.E. Simpson, Station peanut breeder, Stephenville. For the stop on soil borne diseases, discussions will be presented by Dr. R.E. Pettit.

Six field stops are planned, along with educational displays, and a general assembly and discussion program following the field trip. Boswell added.

A popular feature of the afternoon is expected to be a plant problem diagnostic booth, which will be manned by a panel of five experts with the

Ask About S.S.I. For Children

"Children, under age 18, who are totally and permanently disabled may be qualified for the Supplemental Security Income program which went into effect in January 1974, without regard to their parents' entitlement," according to Glyn Hammons, district manager for the Social Security Administration in Abilene.

Several things are considered when an application is taken. Among these is the severity of the disability, the entire regular cash income of the family, and the value of the family's property and other things that can be turned into cash, such as stocks, bonds, etc. Also considered is the number of children in the household.

This part of the Supplemental Security Income program is designed to aid families with little or no cash income and who do not own much in the way of cash assets with the extra expense involved with raising a severely handicapped child.

The Supplemental Security Income program is run by the Social Security Administration, but it is not the same as social security. The money for these monthly payments comes from the general funds of the U.S. Treasury and not from the social security money collected from salary checks and self-employed people.

For more information concerning the SSI program for severely disabled children, contact the Abilene social security office at 142 South Pioneer or telephone 698-1360. Or, if you live outside Abilene, consult the Visit Schedule for social security representatives - one may be coming to a place near where you live. The day, place and time of the visits are all shown on the schedules. They are posted at local post offices.

Governor To Attend White House Conference On Inflation

Governor Dolph Briscoe is scheduled to depart from a busy campaign schedule on Friday, September 27, to go to Washington, D.C., to participate in a White House Conference on inflation.

In a letter to Governor Briscoe, President Ford stated that Conference participants are being asked "to come prepared to discuss the present economic situation, its causes, and the most appropriate policies the government can adopt."

On Wednesday the Governor will continue his campaign activity by attending a rally in Victoria; speaking to the Nueces County Bar Association in Corpus Christi; dedicating a new plant in Point Comfort; and attending a political rally in McAllen.

On Tuesday, the Governor will campaign in San Antonio before flying to Port Arthur to dedicate a new plant. In Beaumont Tuesday evening, the Governor and Mrs. Briscoe will participate in a dinner

honoring the Ambassador of Ireland.

Continuing to emphasize the importance of controlling government spending, the Governor's speeches concentrate on the progress his administration has made during the past two years, and his plans for the future.

The Governor's campaign schedule included the keynote address to the State Democratic Convention on Tuesday, September 17. "If the Federal Government had managed its spending as well as we have managed ours here in Texas during the past two years," the Governor told delegates, "we wouldn't be in the mess we're in now." The Governor also told delegates he would recommend that the next session of the Texas legislature eliminate the state sales tax from utility bills.

The Governor's campaign schedule also calls for stops in Marshall on September 19, in Fort Worth at the Riverside Lions Club, and in Diboll on September 21.

Nosy Nurse

Agatha, a registered nurse, believed in taking lots of initiative in her work. Among other things she meddled in the private affairs of patients, overruled medical instructions from doctors, and denounced doctors and patients to each other with fine abandon.

Finally, on the basis of repeated complaints, a state board revoked Agatha's license. She carried a protest into court, but the board's action was upheld.



Nursing, like the other healing arts, is usually subject to supervision by a state board set up to safeguard the public. Although regulations vary, they generally impose a high standard of conduct in keeping with a nurse's responsibilities.

But the courts also recognize that revocation of a nurse's license is a drastic punishment, not to be imposed lightly.

Thus: The night nurse in an obstetrics case, asked by the patient to call a doctor, decided it wasn't necessary. Was this adequate grounds, as alleged afterward, for revoking her license?

A court said no, pointing out that the patient 1) had gotten good care from the nurse, and 2) had not really needed the doctor after all. The complaint was too minor, said the court, to justify such a penalty on the nurse.

Of course nurses, like doctors, may be held liable for malpractice—such as carelessly giving a patient the wrong medicine.

But there is no malpractice if there is no negligence. In another case, a woman patient who had fallen out of her hospital bed sued the nurse for failing to put up bed rails. However, there had been no instructions from the doctor about bed rails, nor any advance indications that they were needed.

Finding no malpractice, the court said a nurse could not be held liable merely because something happened to go wrong.



The peanut outlook is much brighter than it was in July here in Eastland County. Some are predicting good yields, but all agree THAT PRODUCTION WILL NOT BE AS GOOD AS IT WAS LAST YEAR. Too many fields have poor stands. These poor stands were caused by Dry weather and blowing sand. It is estimated that over 2,000 acres of peanut allotment were never planted because of the weather conditions.

Leaf spot has not been a problem this year but conditions are now ideal for the disease to invade peanut fields. Growers are already applying fungicides to protect the leaves from this costly disease.

The lesser cornstalk borer has been a big problem in peanuts, but with moisture in the soil this problem has lessened.

Seven Eastland County pecan growers received ribbons at the Texas Pecanshow held in el Paso last month. James Alexander whose orchard is at Pioneer, won three state ribbons. They include third place, John Garner, second place Texas Prolific, and third place Kincaid. The first place Kincaid ribbon was awarded to Terry Stacy of Carbon.

Dale Carlile of Cisco won second and third place ribbons on variety seedlings. Warren Carlile of Cisco won first place in the state show with his entry of Texas Prolific.

Mrs. D.C.E. Smith of Rising Star won first place in the state show was exhibited by Le Roy Livingston of Rising Star.

The biggest honor won by an Eastland County grower was Reserve Champion Native. It was won by Jack Seter of Rising Star.

Many people are asking why their pecans are falling ever since the good rains. During the periods of extreme drought, pecan nutlets begin to form an abscission layer at their point of attachment. This attachment layer is activated by moisture moving in the stems, which builds up internal turgor pressure and consequently, causing the nuts to fall following a rain. Shedding is the delayed effect of the drought.

The Texas Pecan Producers Board will hold its first biennial election on September 23, 1974.

The current terms of four board members will expire at that time. Any person living in the state of Texas who is engaged in the business of producing pecans for commercial purposes, is eligible to vote.

This board is dedicated to using grower funds for research, education, promotion and insect control designed to encourage production, marketing and use of Texas pecans.

Any person qualifying to vote in the election may place his name in nomination for membership on the Texas Pecan Producers
