

**A SALUTE TO PROGRESS...**  
Ruth Cowan Smith  
SENIOR CITIZEN OF THE WEEK

Note: The following account was written by Ruth Smith, and, with her permission, I hereby submit it for publication just as she gave it to me. It is my belief that any alterations I might have made in it would simply have detracted from its beauty. I do add a few thoughts at the close of hers.

I was born Ruth Cowan, third in the family of twelve, in 1915. My birthplace was a log cabin in Hays County built by my maternal grandfather for his bride whom he had met on a wagon train from North Carolina soon after the Civil War.

One of my earliest memories is a long purple pencil my father gave me. It was one of the most wonderful gifts I ever received. With this pencil and a Playmates Primer, which had belonged to my oldest sister, who died two months before my birth, I trailed my mother's every step demanding help. I am sure I tried her patience to the limit but I was born with an insatiable desire to learn. Anyway, long before I started to school I could read and write.

My family owned three books: the Bible, a dictionary, and the Primer. I think those are the basis for a good education. With a Bible and a dictionary any one can teach himself if he cares to learn. I have never outgrown my desire to learn. I can't imagine a subject that couldn't interest me. I don't like filth but I'll read anything that is well written and informative. What's more I enjoy it.

During my early school years I attended one and two room schools. My father was a tenant farmer and we moved often so I attended many schools. One of these was the Albert School where President Johnson had attended.

We had little of this world's goods but we had love and we knew it. Growing up with a large family without a lot of money may not sound interesting to some but we never had a dull moment and certainly learned to depend on ourselves for our needs and entertainment. That has served me well throughout my life. The only thing, I think, I never did on the farm

her arms around me and said, "Ruth we've never had a girl to come to Wayland and do what you have done." I didn't do it, of course. It was through the grace of God and the help of many wonderful people.

One of those wonderful people was a young ministerial student by the name of Carl A. Smith who had asked me to share his life. After teaching school one year we were married and continued to try to finish our education and serve in the place we felt we were called.

Smith felt led to start work in unchurched areas and had begun this type of work while in Wayland. There were some rather difficult times. Ministerial students seldom have an easy time going to school but most look back on that time as one of the happiest times of their lives. Our main problem was Smith's health. He had had to drop out of Wayland because of poor health.

He finished his Academy work at San Marcos Baptist Academy six months after our daughter was born. We then went to Hardin Simmons and I taught at Hamlin for two years. I finally was able to get my degree from Hardin Simmons. But after ten years of battling the health problem Smith finally gave up hopes of finishing his education. We took jobs with Buckner Orphans Home in Dallas, Texas I taught and he worked on the dairy.

The work there was a new experience for me. Having never known anything but love and help from those around me my heart melted for the children I taught there. After thirty years I still cry when I think of some of those children. I had never known anyone to abandon their child. I knew it happened, of course, but there I came into close contact with the terrible consequences of sin. I am just glad it is not my responsibility to punish parents who mistreat or neglect their children.

It was that Christmas I received my most expensive gift. The children were given a nickel a week to spend on a treat. Four little boys pooled their nickles one week to buy me a Christmas gift-a little celluloid snow man. The price, nineteen cents, constituted one whole month's income. No one else has ever spent so much on a gift for me.

But Smith was not content with working on a dairy. The Lord had called him to preach and nothing short of that would satisfy him. We resigned our jobs at Buckner and went to the First Baptist Church of Urbandale to start a mission for them. Our Mission was located on Scyenre Road between Dallas and Mesquite. Smith started a visitation program. We held our first meeting in a tent with thirteen people present. He continued visiting. In cooperation with the Urbandale church and the Dallas Baptist Association we were able to erect a building and start a full program. I taught at Irving, to help out with expenses. When we left for Alaska three years later we were having seventy-five people in Sunday School and a stable foundation had been laid for a church. It became a church a few years later.

About our sojourn in Alaska, if I could do it over again the only thing I would do differently is I'd go sooner and stay longer. But then just look at all the blessings I would have missed here.

In retrospect many of the things we have attempted seem foolish and completely outside of the realm of reason and responsibility. My answer to that is: humanly speaking, they were. But the sanest and most secure place to be and the most logical thing to do is to find God's will for your life and do as He leads. We tried that and have found it works. My advice to young people is to find God's will and go ahead. You will never go wrong doing that.

In looking forward my greatest desire is that I shall not grow bitter and critical. I have known old people all my life who yearned for 'the good old days' and deplored that the young people, with things so easy, were going to the dogs. Young people do not have it easy today and they are not going to the dogs. Some individuals are, but they are traveling the road made smooth and paved by their counterparts of my generation.

I have had the great pleasure of counselling with young people in recent weeks who are seeking God's will as diligently as I ever did. And they will find it, too. They will bless this world with their lives in a far greater capacity than I ever dreamed.

Ruth Smith has devoted her entire life to service in the three institutions ordained and established by God: the home, the school, and the church. In fact, the three services have, often, overlapped, for it has been her joy to teach children-the future builders of home, communities and nations-developing both intellectual and spiritual qualities within them.

It is a rare individual who concerns herself so openly, and so constantly, with the well-being of others. Ruth Smith CARES. Her faith in God is a very real trait, which has brought enriched fulfillment in her life. And she has joyously given of herself, as she has pointed others to her Lord, that they, too, might discover that same peace and joy.

Ruth is hospitality chairman of the Senior Citizens' Club; a more able one could not have been selected. She has introduced so many fine speakers, and brought programs many larger clubs would have been happy to boast of. She has plans for much more. Anyone who has been missing these meetings, should resolve, now, to correct that error, and be present for every one of them in the future!

Approximately 75 people assembled for the event which was highlighted by Rex Kiker, Head of Communications at Abilene Christian University. Those who didn't attend, missed one of the best speakers Rising Star has had in the past years. He told a most delightful story about one of his relatives, Mable Wood.

### City Gas Purchases Continue Downward Trend

Rising Star bought 8,615,000 Cubic feet of natural gas in January, 1979. This compares with 13,294,000 Cubic feet of gas bought in January 1978. A fifty four per cent improvement has been made. A result of installation of new gas pipeline and in improved metering.

This outstanding accomplishment is the reduction of gas losses due to leakage in the old system. Only 3 per cent more gas was bought than could be accounted for.

The City billed its customers for 8,091,000 cubic feet of gas in January and 278,000 cubic feet of gas was metered for which no charge was made, (free gas). Only 246,000 cubic feet of gas could not be accounted for, (a three per cent loss).

Natural gas is bought and sold by the thousand cubic feet (MCF). The City paid \$2.01 per MCF in January and sold it to its customers for \$4.11.

The total cost to the City for January was \$17,316.15 and \$33,255.01 was billed to the customers. Free gas was metered and valued at \$1,142.58.

### Beverly Nichols To Present Program To NARFE On Energy Conservation

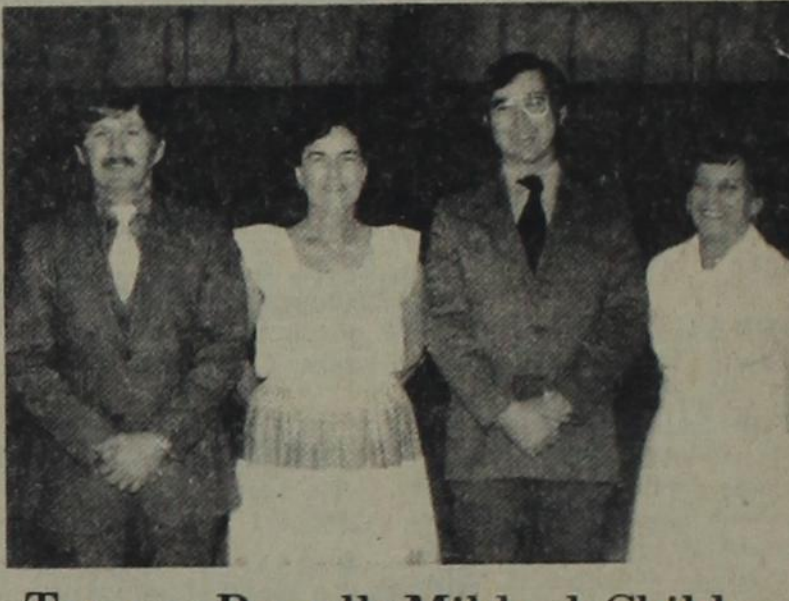

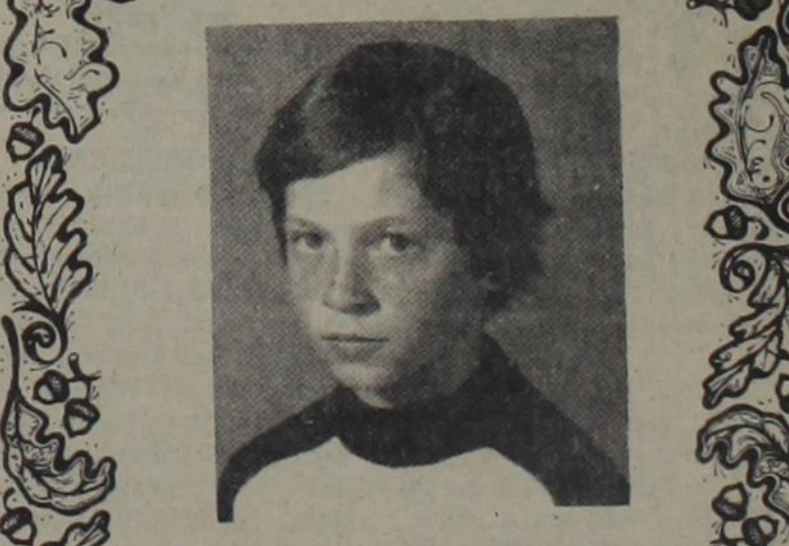
### Mail Service To Iran Suspended

Suspension of civilian mail service to Iran has been extended to covered surface mail, the U. S. Postal Service announced today. The effect is to eliminate all civilian mail service between Iran and the United States.

Airmail service to Iran was suspended January 9, 1979. Postal officials said the latest action was taken because of the lack of reliable air and surface transportation either in or out of that country.

The suspension means no U. S. post office will accept civil mail bound for Iran until further notice. Mail currently in the postal system destined for Iran will be returned because of the suspension of service.

Mrs. Jacki Tischler gave the class a very interesting demonstration on cake decoration.

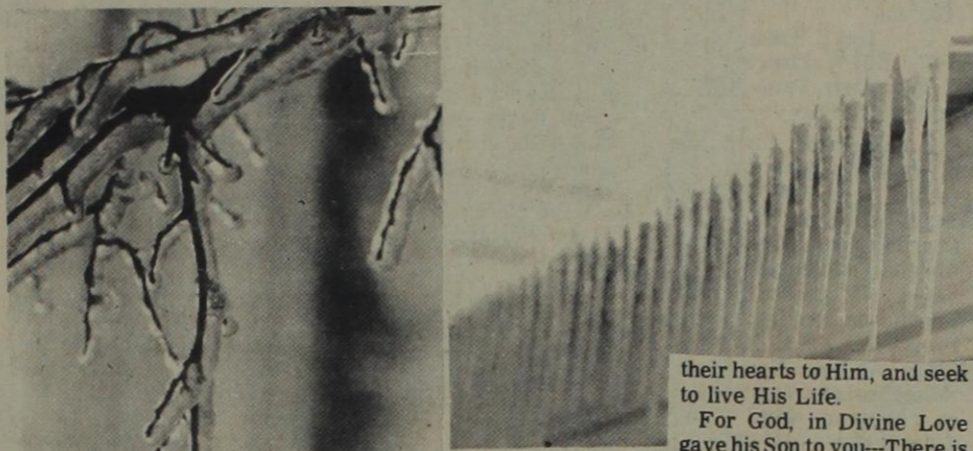

**James Company Gets Contract For Water And Sewer Rising Star To Have Adequate Systems**

The Janes Contracting Co. of Dallas were awarded the contract to build both the water and sewerage system in Rising Star and actual work if to start in a few days. Mayor Childress and the alderman opened bids Tuesday night of this week. They had for consideration bids from a number of construction companies, most of who had representatives here.

The bonds which were recently voted are \$35,000.00 for the water system and \$30,000.00 for the sewerage systems. At the same time bonds for \$35,000.00 were voted for street paving, contract for which will be let before the completion of the pipe laying of the other two jobs.

Paving cannot be started anyway while the other work is going on. The Janes Contracting Co. is equipped both financially and otherwise to handle the work in a satisfactory manner. We learn they propose to buy the bonds at par, so the question of finance is settled. Only a short time is needed to finish the legal proceedings of the bond issue and by that time material will be on the ground to start the work.

Only forty days is needed for pipe laying after the work starts, but it may take a little longer to get the standpipe here and erected.

Rising Star in her rapid growth is building permanently and also getting all the modern conveniences. We have already a modern light and power plant and an ice plant. A franchise has been granted for a gas system in the town and the pipe is to be laid before the street paving begins. When the water and sewerage systems are completed and the streets paved we will then have a town of modern conveniences.

## WHAT'S COOKIN' IN EASTLAND COUNTY

By Gay Nell O'Brien

Several people have requested the sourdough bread or rolls recipe that was referred to in the Tidbits column a few issues back so we are sharing it with you. I have only made rolls from the recipe so far.

The recipe will make three large cookie sheets full. Keep hands greased well when shaping to keep from sticking. Store in baggies when cool.

We prefer to butter all of them while still warm. You can wrap in foil and warm in conventional oven or heat one at a time in microwave for 15 seconds. They are delicious served with honey and have the best crust ever!

### SOURDOUGH ROLLS OR BREAD

In mixing bowl let one cup of sour dough set at room temperature for one hour. Dissolve two packages yeast in one cup of warm water. Let stand 10 minutes.

To sourdough add 1 egg, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 1/2 tsp. salt, 1 cup warm water. Beat well. Add yeast mixture. Add 5-6 cups flour. Do not make too stiff for lighter rolls. Can be mixed mostly with mixer but last two cups may have to be stirred by hand.

Put in greased bowl and let rise, punch down and let rise again.

Make into rolls, loaves, etc., greasing pans well. Let rise.

Bake at 375 degrees for 10-15 minutes for rolls, until well browned, and 25-35 minutes for loaves.

### SOURDOUGH STARTER

2 cups flour  
1 pkg. dry yeast  
2 cups warm water  
1 Tbsp. sugar

Mix thoroughly and let stand about 48 hours until bubbly.

Use all of starter for cooking except for one cup which is used to keep you supplied with starter. To the one cup reserved and 2 1/2 cups flour and two cups warm water and allow to stand about 12 hours in warm place.

Again use all starter except one cup and repeat. If not used every 12 hours it can be kept in refrigerator up to three weeks.

## City Receives \$1392.37 In Sales Tax

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said rebates to Texas cities of the local option one percent sales tax are up a whopping 36 percent this month over the same period last year.

Bullock said Texas cities will receive a rebate of some \$25.5 million this month, compared to a net payment of about \$13.7 for February last year.

The 1979 year-to-date payments for city sales tax rebates have climbed to \$43.7 million, compared to a two-month figure last year of

\$32.2 million, an increase of \$11.5 million.

Houston will receive \$5.4 million for this reporting period, compared to a payment \$2.8 million during February of 1978, or an increase of about 30 percent.

For Worth's check for February will be \$954,490 compared to \$542,741 received by the city during February last year.

Dallas will get a check for \$2.4 million, which is 25 percent more than the amount paid during the same period in 1978.

The rebate check for San Antonio will total \$1.3 million or an increase of 35 percent over the 1978 allocation for February.

Over 909 Texas cities will receive rebates as their share of the city sales tax.

The sales tax is collected by merchants and other sales tax permit holders along with the state sales tax and is rebated monthly to cities in which it is collected by the Comptroller's Office.

The City of Rising Star will receive \$1,392.37 for the period ending 2-01-79.

## March 6th Deadline For SBA Applications

WASHINGTON, D.C.--Congressman Charles W. Stenholm advises of the March 6, 1979, deadline for submitting applications for the Physical Disaster Loan Program through the Small Business Administration. This program is available to farmers and ranchers who suffered financial hardship due to drought losses on 1978

crops. The disaster loans may be used to pay outstanding obligations and operating expenses and for production costs in the new crop year. However, they may not be used to refinance a Farmers Home Administration or other USDA loan.

Interest rate on SBA physical disaster loans are 3

percent on the first \$250,000 and 6.58 percent on remaining amounts. 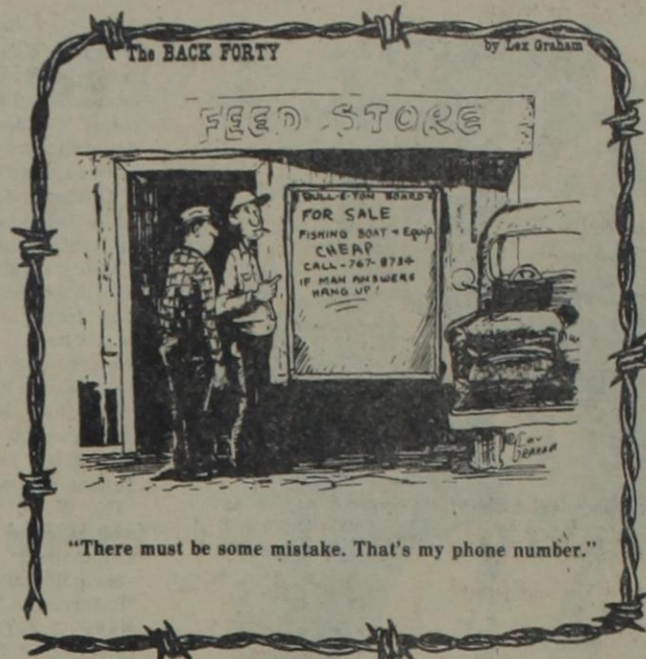
## STRAIGHT FROM THE CHEF

## Summer Food Program

Information also may be obtained or registration application made by calling the Department at 512-475-3027.

The food service provided under the summer program is intended to serve as a substitute for the National School Lunch and School Breakfast programs, for children who are on school vacation, except that it is primarily directed toward children from needy areas.

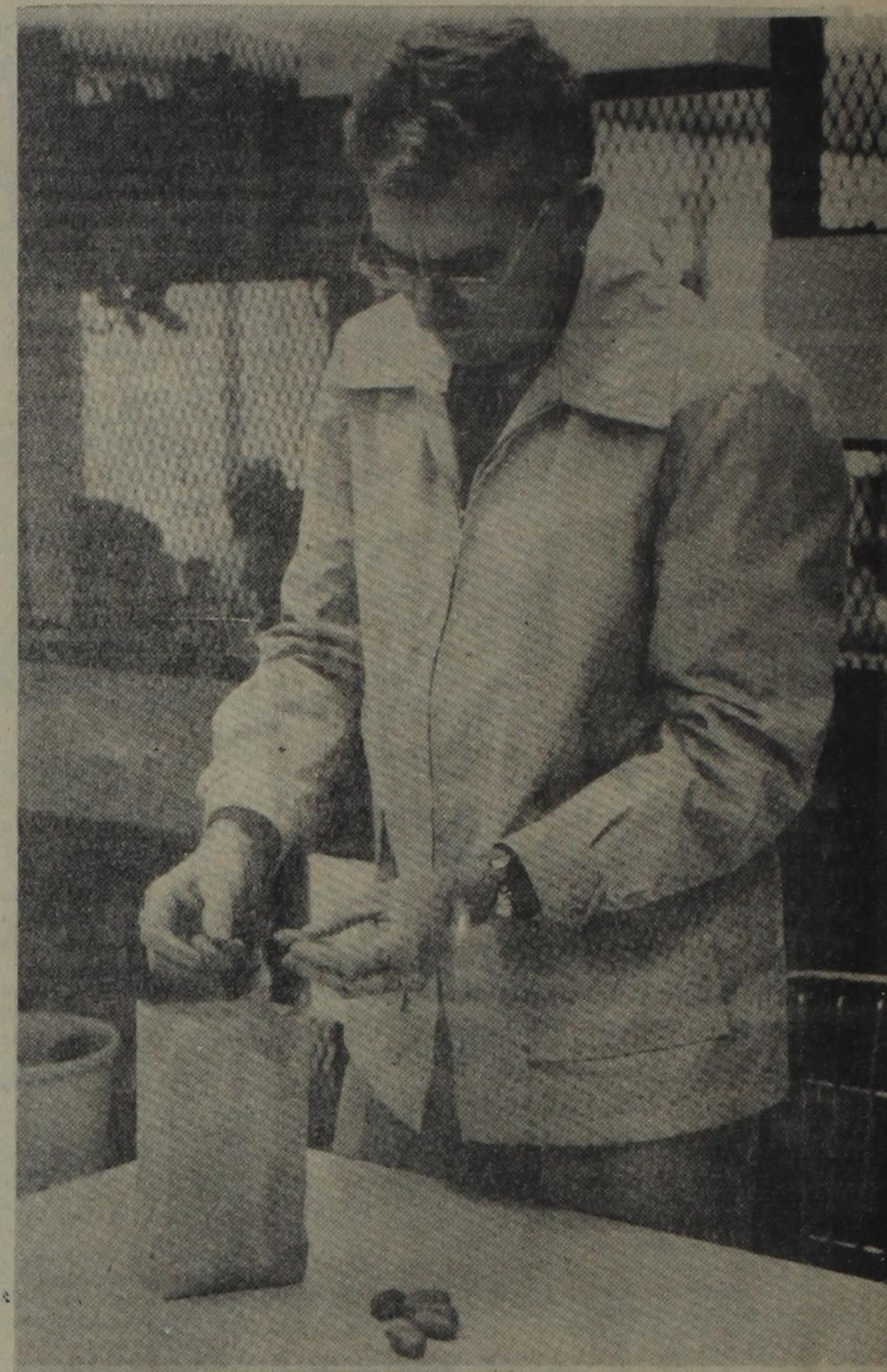

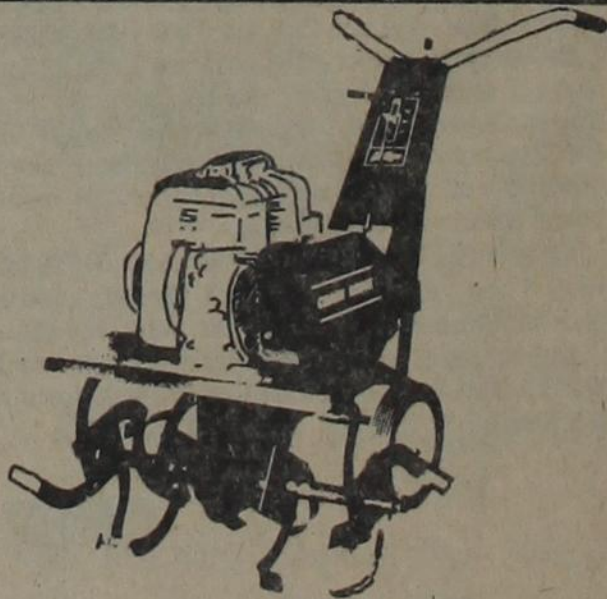
