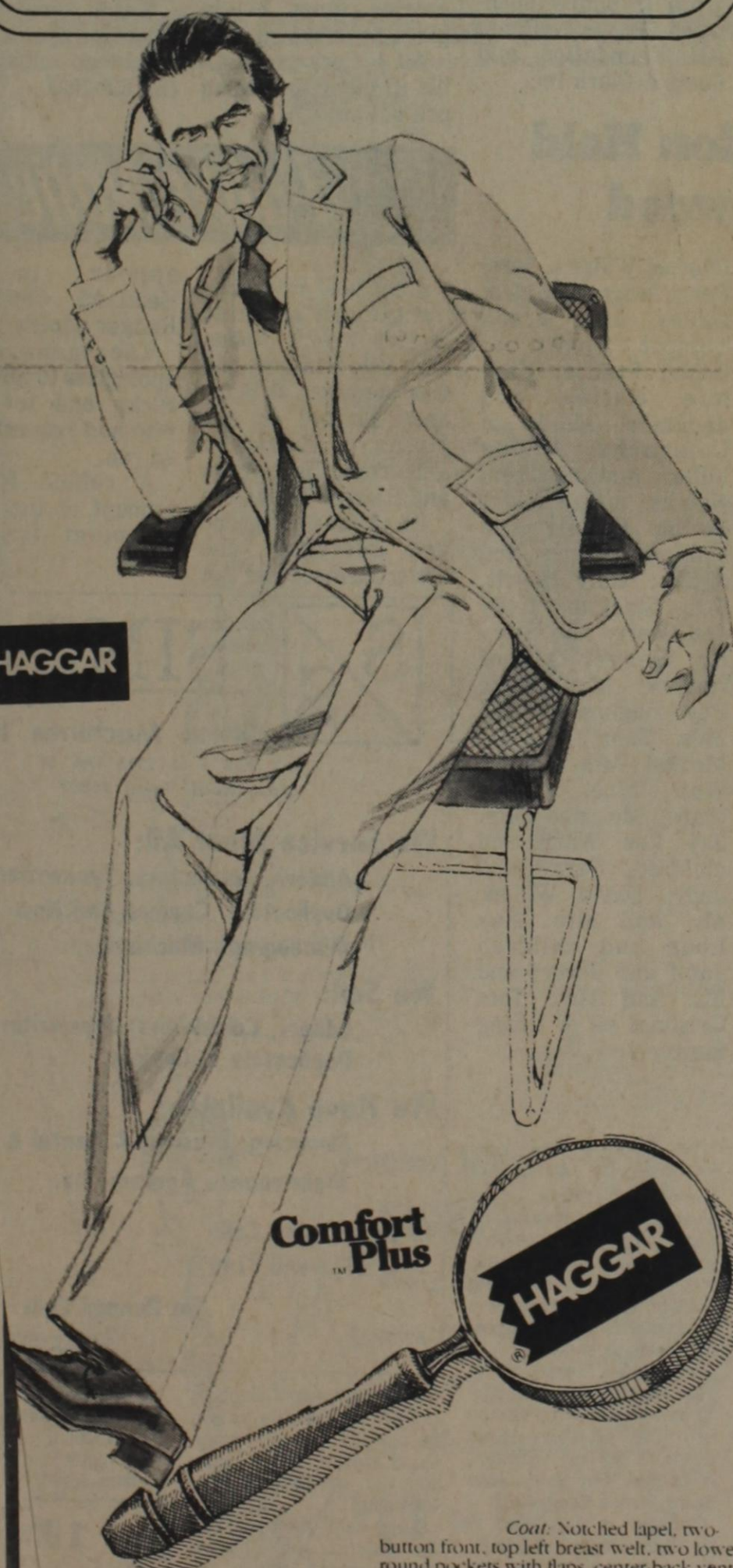

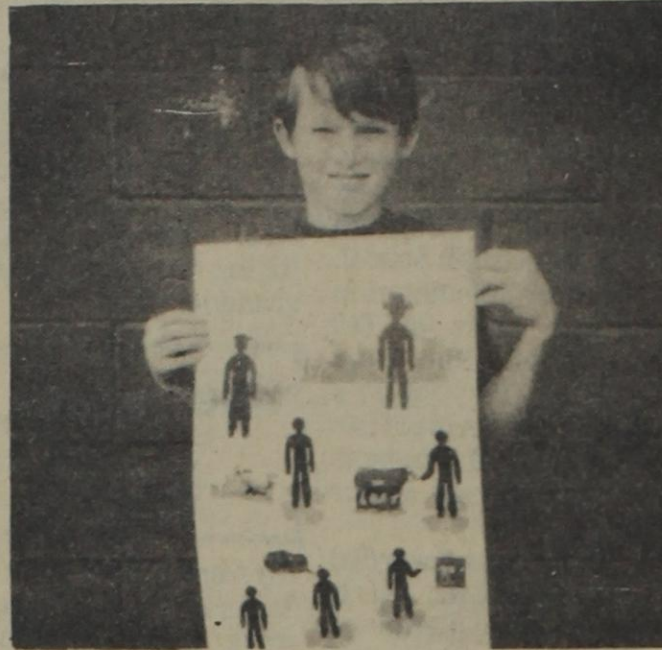

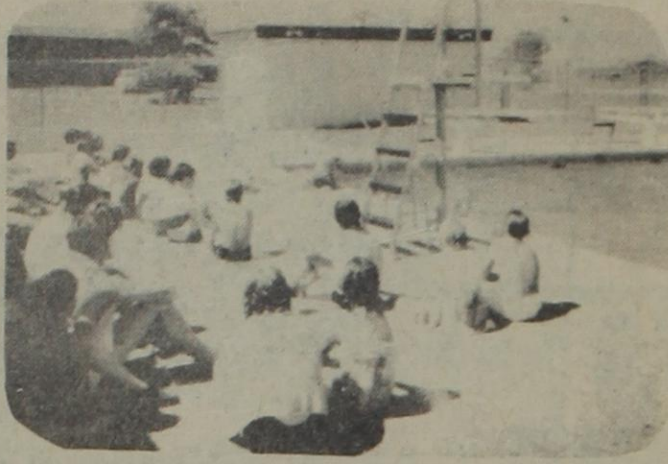

**AT & T Boosts Rates By 5.12**

AT&T received approval from the Federal Communications Commission for a uniform 5.12 percent increase in rates for all out-of-state long distance calls. It is their first general rate increase in more than four years.

According to a Continental Telephone representative, all phone companies concur in AT&T's charges for long distance services so that rates throughout the nation are the same. Therefore the increase approved for AT&T affects all out-of-state phone calls regardless of which company provides the service. To illustrate the new rates, the full weekday direct dialed charge for a one minute call from most Texas points to New York City is now 55 cents, up from 52 cents. That same call dialed at night after 11 p.m. is now 23 cents instead of the previous 22 cents. AT&T estimates that the average household phone bill will rise 15 cents a month.

The increase was effective at 12:01 a.m., June 6, 1980.

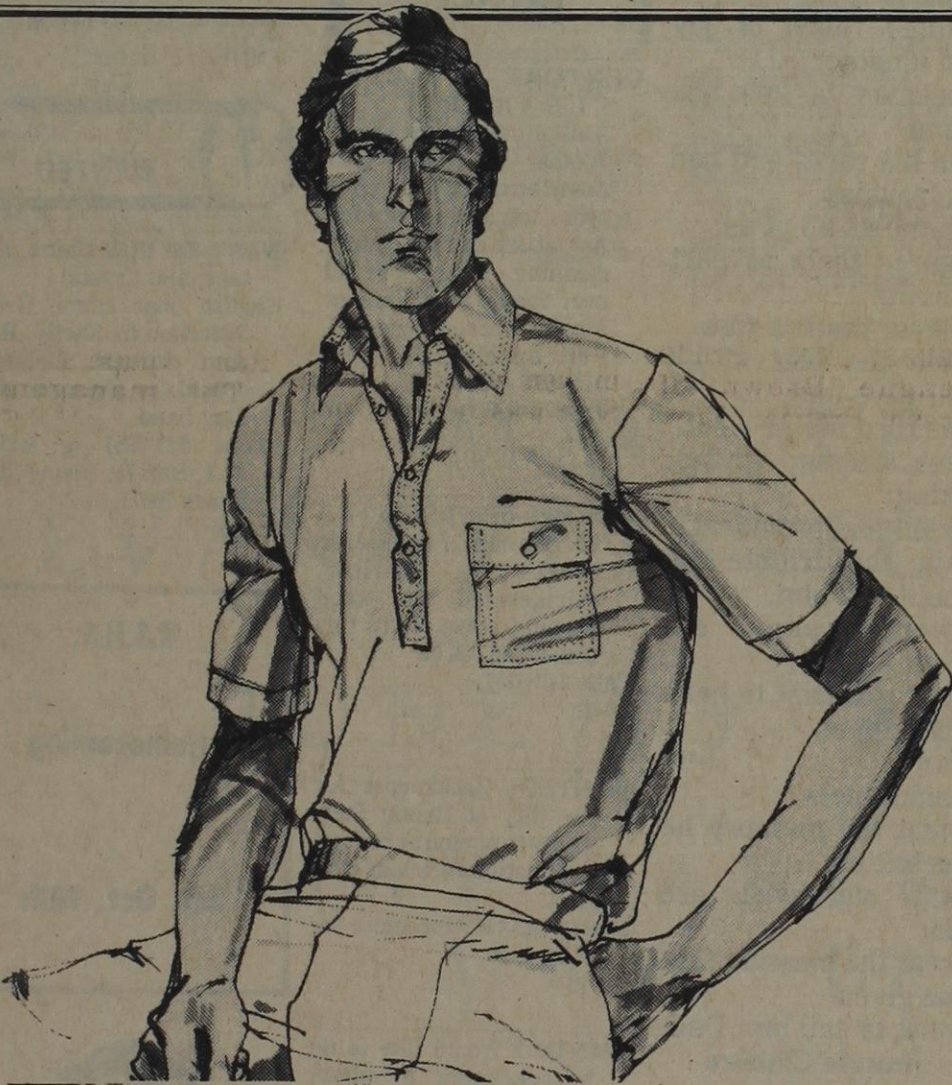

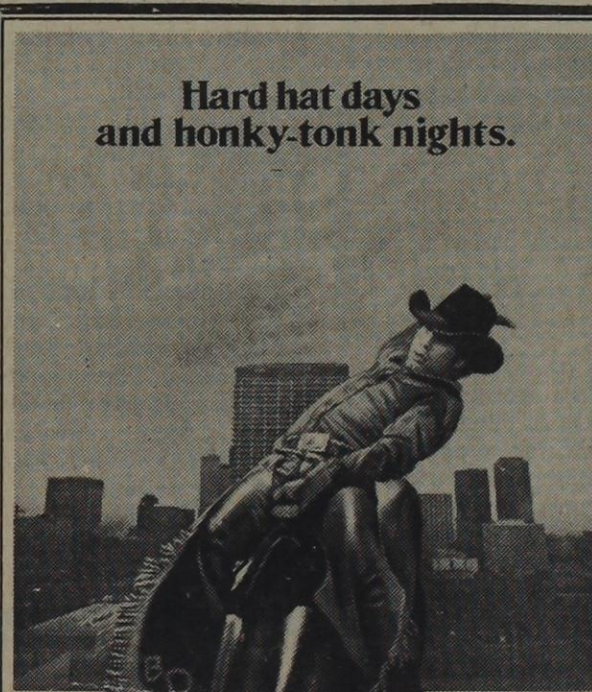

### WHAT SAITH THE SCRIPTURES?

QUESTION: Will our bodies be resurrected from the grave?

ANSWER: The scriptures teach that all of the dead shall be resurrected. Although the thought of the resurrection is difficult for us to comprehend, Jesus himself taught, "Marvel not at this: for the hour cometh, in which all that are in the graves shall hear his voice, and shall come forth; they that have done good, unto the resurrection of life; and they that have done evil, unto the resurrection of damnation" (John 5:28-29). The apostle Paul taught, "there shall be

a resurrection both of the just and unjust" (Acts 24:15).

"It is true that some will say 'How are the dead raised? and with what manner of body do they come?'" (1 Cor. 15:35). Although our bodies completely decay and decompose, God by his almighty power shall resurrect us. The resurrected body shall be a changed body, far different from the body that dies and is buried. Our resurrected body shall be glorious (1 Cor. 15:43), powerful (15:43), spiritual (15:48), incorruptible (15:53), and immortal (15:53). This resurrected body shall be like the body which Jesus Christ now has, for when Jesus returns, he shall "fashion anew the body of our humiliation, that it may be conformed to the body of his glory" (Phil. 3:21).

This change shall be universal, for all the dead, as well as all those who are still alive at Christ's return, shall be changed. "We all shall not sleep, but we shall be changed, in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet: for the trumpet shall sound, and the dead shall be raised incorruptible, and we shall be changed. For this corruptible must put on incorruption, and this mortal must put on immortality" (1 Cor. 15:51-53).

The resurrection shall be a day of terror for the wicked. Their

resurrection shall be unto "Shame and everlasting contempt" (Dan. 12:2), and "damnation" (John 5:29). The wicked shall then be sent "into the eternal fire which is prepared for the devil and his angels" where they shall suffer "eternal punishment" (Mt. 25:41, 46).

The resurrection shall be a day of joy for the righteous. "The Lord himself shall descend from heaven, with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God: and the dead in Christ shall rise first; then we that are alive, that are left, shall together with them be caught up in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air and so shall we ever be with the Lord" (1 Thess. 4:16-17).

Every faithful Christian should be able to say, "The Lord will deliver me from every evil work, and will save me unto his heavenly kingdom: to whom be the glory for ever and ever. Amen" (2 Tim. 4:18).

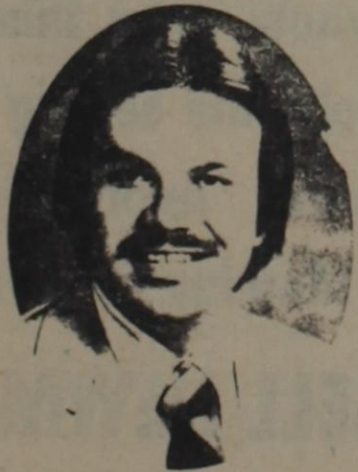

The calf was a little heavier than a calf normally is, Dr. Patrick said. The cow, who has had several calves previously, was doing nicely. This was the first calf with two heads that Dr. Patrick has delivered or seen in 22 years as a practicing veterinarian, he said. He planned to turn the unusual calf over to a taxidermist in Brownwood to be preserved.
