## Some SSI Checks Affected by SSA Increase

Low-income aged, blind and disabled people who get a federal Supplemental Security Income (SSI) check and who also get Social Security, actually have received more than this year's 7.4 percent cost-of-living increase for July and August. But, Social Security officials say, the September SSI checks will be reduced for these "dualy-entitled" persons, so that both checks combined will be no more than 7.4 percent higher than the combined checks in June.

According to Glyn Hammons, manager of

the Abilene Social Security office, the two month bonus came about because a 1981 law provides that changes in an SSI check in most cases for two months after the Social Security benefit increased, the SSI check must be adjusted.

"I would like to assure those people who are getting both Social Security and SSI that, although the September SSI check will be reduced somewhat, the total of both checks will be 7.4 percent higher than what they were getting in June," Hammons said.

## Glasgow Urges Voters To Get Involved



**STATE SEN. BOB GLASGOW** came to Eastland County Friday to visit the people — and the people turned out to visit Sen. Glasgow. Here County Criminal District Attorney Emory Walton is among the many who turned out to shake hands with the senator and to exchange ideas and views. "Get involved," Sen. Glasgow repeated over and over as he urged his listeners to "watch who you send to Austin, and then watch what they do when they get there." We've got the ideal state. Our finances are in good shape, and the thing we've got to do is to "keep it that way." The special session will hopefully correct the problems of the state unemployment insurance program without penalizing the small businesses who cannot afford to have their unemployment taxes increased. Concerned with education on every level, Sen. Glasgow emphasized several areas where he is seeing improved conditions in the state's educational systems without increasing the burden of taxation. Visiting in Cisco, he was hosted by Dick Wooley and Gene Abbott, Sen. Glasgow moved on to Eastland where he was guest of honor at a coffee hosted by James Wright; and then into Ranger where he met the public at Ranger Savings and Loan as Jerry Richardson and Jerry Edwards were hosts. Sen. Glasgow emphasized the importance of the citizens staying in touch, and generously shared his Stephenville address (P.O. Box 1250), and telephone number (817 965-3135) for all who might like to contact his office for information and/or suggestions. He spoke repeatedly of the drug abuse problem and stated that we're going to have to get serious with the sellers and not worry as much about the young users. He credited the wire-tap bill, which he helped sponsor, as being responsible for helping slow down the traffic at the source. One thing we need to be ashamed of, he said, is our low voter turnout record. "It's a national disgrace."

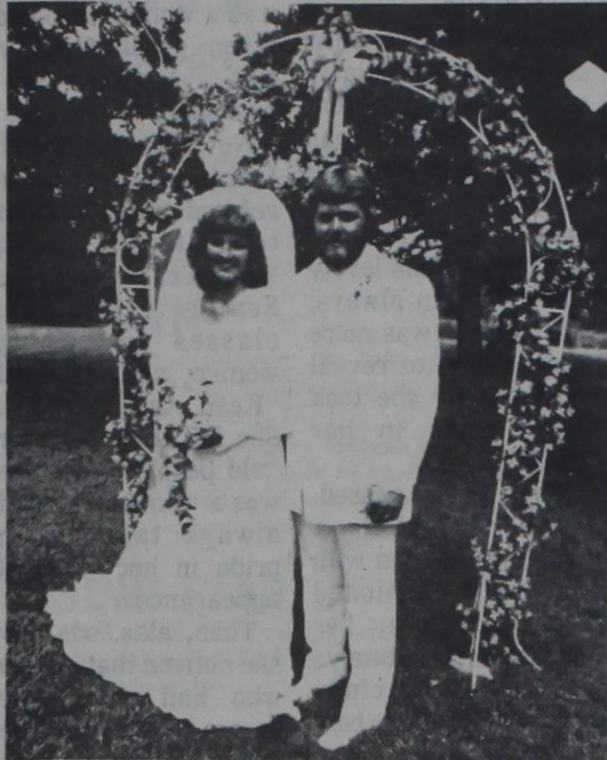

PROPERTY TAXES—  
GOOD INTENTIONS AREN'T ENOUGH

I want to talk this week about taxes and good intentions. As I travel around Texas, I notice that what's known as the Peveto Bill is the subject of much talk and controversy. This bill, named after state representative Wayne Peveto, is a tax reform law: legislation of the best intention.

The law was designed to end confusion and unfairness in the way property taxes were assessed. Property was often on different tax rolls at different values. Older properties went years, sometimes decades, without being revalued or updated. New construction and newly sold property was on the rolls at more correct values and so people who owned it paid a higher share of taxes. Some property was simply left off the rolls entirely. The system was confusing and inequitable.

In an attempt to correct these problems, the Peveto Bill created property tax appraisal boards for each Texas county. These boards were charged with the responsibility of setting all property at its full value—as residential or commercial property or as land used for agricultural purposes. Taxes could then be levied on this accurately assessed property according to the needs of the taxing entities.

It sounded good, but it hasn't worked. The biggest problem is that the people on the appraisal boards are appointed, not elected. They are not accountable to the taxpayers. So now we have a new, faceless bureaucracy to deal with. It amounts to taxation without representation.

My opponent has been on both sides of this issue, first supporting the bill in the legislature—then doing an about-face and calling it bad legislation after it was passed.

The Peveto Bill, though well-intentioned, has created problems which must be dealt with in the next legislature and as your next Lt. Governor, I will do just that. If you have any thoughts on this subject, please write me at 1213 W. 34th, Austin, 78705.

## Tenth Annual Hay Show

The tenth annual Eastland County Hay Show is planned for October 1 County Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon announced today. The event will be at the county livestock show grounds. Hay producers should set aside a hay sample now for the hay show. Entries will be due on or before September 14.

Hay shows provide an opportunity to compare different samples of hay and help producers evaluate what makes high-quality hay, according to Gordon. Hay is a major portion of the roughage diet of many ruminant animals, so an evaluation of food value and protein content can help growers determine hay quality more easily so that livestock can be fed according to hay value.

An individual entering a hay sample will

know the value of his hay when the show is over. Samples will have a protein analysis run and physically evaluated as to leafiness, steminess, color, foreign material and maturity.

Livestock producers preparing to feed hay will know if their hay is adequate to meet

animal needs or if supplements are needed. The hay show can take a lot of guesswork out of livestock feedings, says the agent.

Besides providing a hay analysis, hay shows can be educational. Discussion topics will deal with such areas as hay production, hay equip-

ment, soil fertility, storage, hay quality differences, feed value and forage testing.

There will be six classes of hay one may enter - Alfalfa and other legumes, Coastal Bermuda grass, Sorghum-Sudan Hybrids and Forage Sorghums, Other Perennial Grasses, Oats and other Annuals, and Peanut Hay.

Due to the trend to more large bales the forage committee made some changes in the rules. An entry may be one regular size bale or one large bale. If a producer chooses he may enter a cross section of the regular bale, 6 to 8 inches in thickness, string-tied plus a three dollar fee for protein analysis. If he has the

large bales he may enter a box of hay about 6 x 14 x 18 inches, a minimum of three pounds, plus a three dollar fee for protein analysis. An entire bale is entered there will be no testing fee.

Entries may be left at any feed store in Eastland County on or before September 10 or delivered to the county agent by September 14.

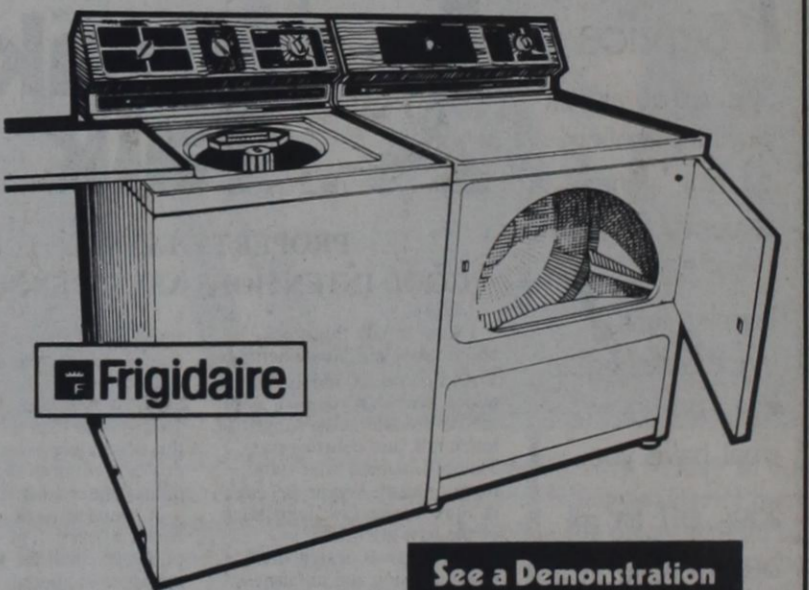

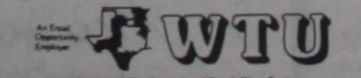

## GORDON SPOT

By DeMarquis Gordon

It's awfully dry in all parts of Eastland County. It seems our weather goes from one extreme to the other. In May and June we had record breaking wet months, but in July and August we have had less than 1½ inches of total rain fall in most parts of the county. Dryland peanuts, which were planted late because of wet soil, are now stressed because of lack of moisture. They need good growing conditions to mature before frost.

Due to the dry weather we have not found any pecan weevils at work in pecan orchards. We expect they will be there as soon as we get some moisture. This is not the case of irrigated yard trees. A few weevils have been found in yard trees that have been watered. If you have irrigated yard pecans, I would suggest spraying with Sevin®. You will need to do this again in two weeks.

Pecan producers in Eastland County are urged to check groves for damaging infestations of the pecan weevil. Emergence of adult weevils has been on the increase in recent days. Pecans are changing in physiological development from the water to the dough stage. The nut must be in the dough stage before the

immature stage of the weevil can develop. Feeding punctures before dough development will result in developing pecans to drop from the tree.

The pecan weevil is a large weevil being brownish in color and about three-eighths of an inch in length. Males are somewhat smaller in size than females. Pecan weevils have a beak about as long as its body.

Adult feeding is done prior to hardening of the nut shell. After nut kernels have hardened, the female chews a hole in the shell and deposits her eggs in little pockets in the nut. The legless grub feeds from three to six weeks. When the grub reaches maturity, they chew a hole about one-eighth inch in diameter in the shell and emerge from the nut and overwinter in the ground. Early maturing varieties may be more severely attacked than later developing varieties.

## Texas Oil Discoveries Up In August From 1981

Railroad Commission Chairman Jim Nugent announced that Texas operators reported 122 gas and 67 oil discoveries in August 1982.

One year ago, 130 gas and 37 oil discoveries were filed with the state's energy regulatory agency.

Gas discoveries in the eighth month of the year included 52 in deep South Texas, 27 in the Refugio area, 13 in Southeast Texas,

eight each in East Texas and West Central Texas, five in North Texas, three in the San Angelo area, and two each in the San Antonio and Midland areas and East Central Texas.

Oil discoveries included 13 in West Central Texas, nine each in North Texas and the Midland area, seven in deep South Texas, six each in East Texas and the Refugio and San Angelo areas, five in Southeast Texas, three in the

Panhandle, two in the Lubbock area, and one in East Central Texas.

Through the first eight months of this year, there have been 993 gas and 435 oil discoveries throughout the state. For the same period last year, there were 841 gas and 420 oil discoveries.

In August, operators reported 322 exploratory and field tests wound up as dry holes. New applications for permits to drill oil and gas tests totaled 2,510 in August compared with 3,388 in the same period 1981.

Applications to drill, deepen, plug back and for service wells in August amounted to 2,913 against 3,724 a year earlier.

Operators filed 845 amended applications to drill. A year earlier they submitted 874 amended requests.

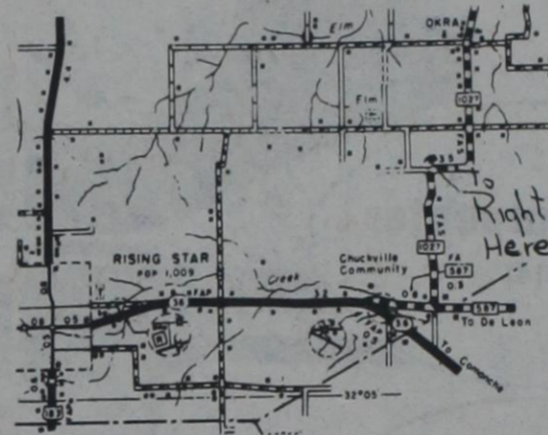

## PUBLIC NOTICE

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 2, 1982

### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that prohibits any state ad valorem tax. Receipts from previously authorized state ad valorem taxes that are collected after the effective date of the proposed amendment shall be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the county collecting the taxes and may be expended for county purposes. Taxes collected before that date shall be distributed by the legislature among educational institutions eligible to receive those funds under prior law. The proposed amendment also repeals a section of the Constitution levying an ad valorem tax for a construction fund for 17 state colleges and universities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment repealing the state property tax."

### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 62 as amended by Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would eliminate the \$80,000,000 ceiling on state welfare aid during any fiscal year.

The amendment would set the state welfare spending limit at \$160,000,000 for the 1982-1983 biennium.

The amendment further provides that, for each subsequent biennium, the maximum amount spent for state welfare shall not exceed one percent of the state budget.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide assistance through the appropriations process to needy persons and to place a ceiling on payments for needy dependent children at one percent of the state budget."

### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt machinery and equipment used in the production of farm and ranch products from taxation. No dollar limits would be imposed and the exemption would apply to corporations and partnerships as well as to families and individuals.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting implements of husbandry (agricultural machinery and equipment) from ad valorem taxation."

### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 77 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to set a four year maximum term of office for board members of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide terms not to exceed four years for members of governing boards of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts."

### PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 119 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize Tarrant and Bee counties to hold county-wide elections to abolish the county treasurer's office by majority vote.

Should the county treasurer's office be abolished, the duties, powers, and functions of that office would be transferred to the county auditor or his successor to the auditor's functions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties."

### PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would raise the constitutional interest rate limit on state general obligation bonds from 6% to 12%. The new 12% ceiling does not, however, apply to bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment increasing the maximum interest rate allowed on state general obligation bonds to a weighted average annual interest rate of 12%."
