My Story

Concerning the joyous return to their native home land and to freedom by the 52 Americans, after more than a year of physical, mental and political restraint, there are numberless stories which could be written. Doubtless, many will be told and written. But, the one story rising out of it, which I most want to write, is possibly the most difficult to put into words. For, the picture from which I take my story is without physical form; it comes near to being a matter of the spirit of America.

The return of the former hostages came at a time when our great nation was at a low ebb. Unity seemed to be something we talked about—a precious concept once held dear in this country, along with those of freedom, equality and the pursuit of happiness. For at least a decade, the nation had been experiencing much which divided the thoughts and feelings of her people. The Viet Nam Action had

inflicted painful wounds upon this nation. Even more hurtful than those inflicted by bullets, bayonets and bombs, seemed to be those on the home front. These were very deep and divisive wounds, open and unhealing—difficult to live with.

Watergate had brought its own brand of division to the United States. The citizenry lost confidence in the nation's leaders, her people in high office, and the very system by which she lives.

Further, in the past year, the United States had gone through one of the most painful political campaigns of her history. Bitter words have been spoken in the heat of that campaign—words which will be long remembered, the wounds deep and unhealing. America reeled and stumbled under the burden of its divisions; the loss of her "life's-blood" of unity, unselfishness

and mutual human kindness and concern was slowly and insidiously dragging her to her sick bed.

Then, almost as a miracle, the long-awaited freeing of the hostages began to restore the needed nourishment to her vital organs. The restoration of freedom to 52 special Americans brought renewal, revival and healing to America and to all Americans. The long hoped-for return of those Americans brought a new sense of oneness to our land. The spontaneous display of rejoicing and affection was so immediately restorative as to be almost heady in its effect. Americans now observe a renewal of deep and loving pride in this great Land we call our own. Unity and hope have risen up, strongly, from the old mass of division and pain.

Once again, God has indeed blessed America!

"Nevertheless, our taxpayer assistance program will be optional from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. each week-day to help taxpayers with their tax questions." To call IRS toll-free, dial 1-800-492-4830.

Taxpayers who require walk-in assistance may wish to

stop by the IRS office located at Third and Pine Streets, United States Post Office Building, Room 2305. Or they may wish to take advantage of the free tax preparation service offered by the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program. Community volunteers, including members of People for Progress, Community Action Program, YWCA, RSVP, and IRS employees will assist low income, disadvantaged, and handicapped taxpayers at libraries, post offices and other convenient neighborhood locations.

Taxpayers who age 60 and older can avail themselves of the Tax Counseling for the Elderly Program sponsored by the American Association of Retired Persons--National Retired Teachers Association (AARP-NTRA). AARP members, who have been trained in the special tax concerns of the elderly, will prepare tax returns free of charge throughout the filing period.

Memorial Tribute To Lexie Dean Robertson Given By Saturday Club

Joyce Easley reminded the members to thoughtfully stress each word in repeating the Pledge of Allegiance as a special thanks for America and the safe return of the hostages.

Irene Mayfield, president, expressed appreciation to the club for the splendid cooperation and read the following excerpt from The Texas Club-woman: "in the words of Ralph Waldo Emerson: 'The only true gift is a portion of thyself.' The most outstanding honor she received was being appointed Poet Laureate of Texas by the Legislature in 1939-41.

In the words of a writer of The Fort Worth Star Telegram: "To many Lexie Dean Robertson was only a poet. They were the ones who were not fortunate enough to know her as a charming friend, an inspiring teacher, a witty lecturer or a hearted humanitarian."

Vera Westerman gave a talk on "How to Have a Good Day Every Day."

"To me, it has become a challenge in which I follow these steps: think God-thank God, think positively, act. It is not what the day does for you, but what you do for the day."

evil, and his lips that they speak no guile."

PEOPLE IN THE NEWS

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm today was named to four key subcommittees of the house Agriculture Committee that will essentially serve as the staging area for formulation of the 1981 Farm Bill.

Subcommittee assignments for the 17th District Representative serving his second term in Congress include: Cotton, rice and sugar; livestock, dairy and poultry; tobacco and peanuts; wheat, soybeans and feed grains, including oilseeds.

Stenholm said he couldn't be happier with his subcommittee assignments since "all initial work on the Farm Bill will originate in each of the four subcommittees I will be working on."

While the entire Agriculture Committee will vote on the final farm package before consideration by the House, each subcommittee is handed the responsibility for policy formulation, including mark-up (complete deliberation and formal review) vote. In the past, mark-up has been before the full committee. "It would be very difficult to effect any real change or any guidance in policy direction for the commodities without being there at the beginning," Stenholm said.

"I expect to take a very active part in

work on the new Farm Bill," Stenholm continued, "and quite frankly, I'm looking forward to it. Right now there are a lot of questions regarding the future direction of agricultural policy in this country and that policy will have a widespread effect on the economy of the country as a whole."

"We know there have to be changes made," Stenholm said. We just cannot afford to continue to export our farm products below the costs to produce them. Neither can we afford the high toll on our soil, water and energy resources."

Hearings on the Farm Bill are expected to begin in mid-February.

Stenholm is now one of only two Texans on the Agriculture Committee, a committee noted for its domination by Texans in past years. Congressman E. (Kika) de la Garza of Texas is new chairman of the committee.

Other House Committee assignments for Stenholm include a return to the Small Business Committee. Members of this committee will caucus within the next week for subcommittee assignments.

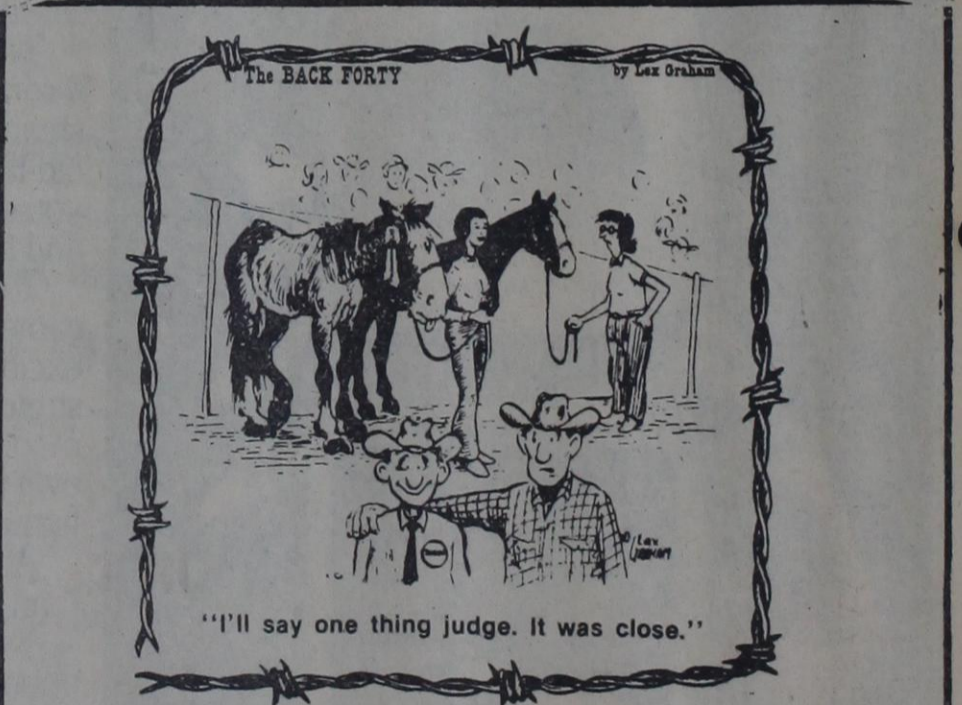

HOW TO BUY COSMETIC AIDS - AND SAVE

Mrs. Saunders is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Saving money on cosmetics while getting what you want takes time.

However, extra time spent planning ahead, comparison shopping, inventorying current supplies and learning from past mistakes will pay off, she continues.

Consider these money-

saving tips.

PRODUCT SIZE

Buy large, economy sizes for often-used products such as shampoo and hand lotion.

For first-time use, buy the smallest size available to determine likes and dislikes.

However, compare cost per ounce or unit - larger sizes are not always more economical.

Buy small-size containers of products that tend to evaporate or dry out.

PROMOTION/ADVERTISING

More expensive items are not necessarily better products but perhaps just more expensively packaged or advertised.

"Buy one, get one free" or buy \$10, get a \$25 value for \$5" is not a bargain unless

you need all or the majority of items included, the specialist advises.

However, if these items are needed, these promotions are well worth it.

FRAGRANCES

Scented products are usually more expensive than unscented.

Compare costs for adding a drop of your fragrance, or compare costs for similar

lyte fragrances such as florals or spices.

STORAGE

Keep products tightly covered and away from light and heat for maximum life. Discard unusables that are discolored, dried out or separated.

COST PER USE

For special-occasion use, such as an unusual eyeshadow shade, less ex-

pensive is best, Mrs. Saunders says.

Spend more on daily used products.

PRODUCT EXPERIMENTATION

Take advantage of company and in-store clinics to try products. Make appointments with in-store or company consultants for facials or a complete make-up, often low or no-fee.

"Trying-on" products and fragrances is important because effects often vary among individuals.

Ask about new products and colors discussed in fashion editorials. The more you can learn from the experts and experiment with products, the better prepared you are, the specialist adds.

The public has until January 30, 1981 to recommend price support levels and other provisions of the 1981-crop peanut program. Recommendations are requested for the national support level for quota peanuts, the national support level for additional peanuts, slaes policy for additional peanuts received under loan or acquired by the Commodity Credit Corporation under the 1981 program and sold for export edible use. Comments should be sent to the Director, Price Support and Loan Division, ASCS-USDA, Room 3741 S, P.O.Box 215, Washington, D.C.20013.

PEANUT MARKETING CARDS

Peanut marketing cards and producer ID cards are to be returned to the office as soon as sales are completed but in no event later than January 31, 1981.

1980 ASCS PROGRAM PAYMENTS

During the last two weeks in January producers will receive Form CCC 182 which will reflect all program payments made during the 1980 program year.

WOOL AND UNSHORN LAMBS

January 31, 1981 is the final date to submit the original sales receipt for shorn wool and unshorn lambs sold during the 1980 calendar year.

NORMAL CROP ACREAGE

The normal crop acreage (NCA) requirements for the 1981 crops have been suspended by an amendment to the USDA Appropriation Act for fiscal 1981. Therefore, farmers will be eligible for program benefits, target prices, crop loans, etc. regardless of their planted acreage for 1981.

As previously announced there is no set aside requirements for wheat, cotton, or feed grains. The NCA limitation is not applicable for the 1981 crop year. An increase in acreage in 1981 shall not be used in determining normal crop acreage in future years.
