Rising Star and once again Cross Plains was victorious, by a margin of 45-15. The teams from Rising Star did a good job and represented us well.

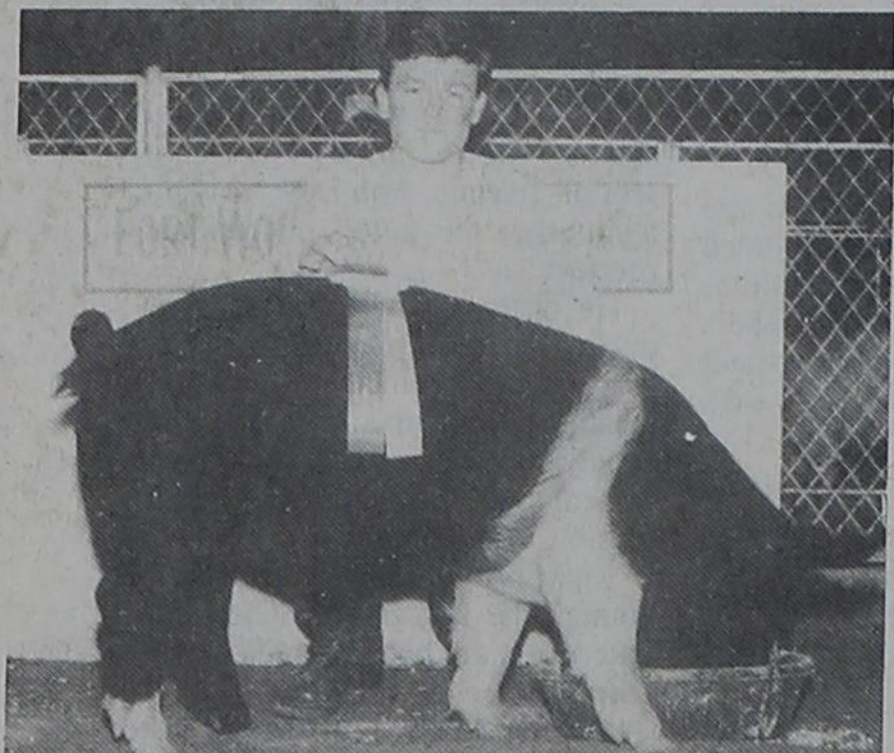

County to Continue to Support Ambulance Service

Eastland County Commissioners Monday had a tie vote on whether to continue to support the county's part of Ambulance Service in Eastland County.

Judge Scott Bailey broke the tie by voting to approve the motion. So support of Emergency Medical Services will continue.

Before the vote was taken there was a lengthy discussion on the Ambulance Services out of the Cisco and Eastland Hospitals. There were also questions from citizens who said they were dissatisfied with charges and with some of the services.

The motion which led to continuance was made by Richard Robinson, Commissioner of Pct. 1, who stated it this way: "The motion to discontinue financial support (for E.M.S.) be withdrawn, as long as it (the Service) stays within the money budgeted."

Billy Bacon, Commissioner of Pct. 4, seconded the motion. He said that as long as the County's part of the Ambulance Service stayed within the budget (\$2,000 per month for each of the four Precincts) he would like to continue. L. T. Owen, Commissioner of Pct. 3, said: "My Precinct has never collected a penny on this. I would have to be against it."

Norman Christian, Com-

missioner of Pct. 2, said that his Precinct hadn't collected anything yet-but hoped in the future to use some of the money.

"But I think people ought to get to vote on whether or not they want the County to furnish this kind of service - not let just a few people decide," the Commissioner said.

Eastland City Manager Paul Catoe asked to speak to Court.

"I would like to emphasize the situation we were in - the problems we had - before beginning this service last summer," he said. "From one year to the next we didn't know if we would have an ambulance."

"The Hospitals have taken on the Emergency Medical Service obligations and problems....Marsha Carr (Eastland Memorial Hospital Administrator) has indicated she wants to find solutions to the problems."

"I understand there are few complaints for the amount of people using the service. I support the Hospitals in their efforts, and hope and pray they may continue."

When Judge Bailey called for a vote, Robinson and Bacon vote for the motion, and Christian and Owen against. Bailey then cast his vote, and announced that the motion had passed.

HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Polls are fine, but the televised debates probably told us more about how the candidates see themselves at this point.

Remember, the candidate's realistic objective is to gain a run-off election. Thus, he/she must come down the stage stairs more gubernatorially than going up.

First, an afterthought. Who would have foreseen the two parties would switch styles? The Republicans discussed a wide range of social issues while the Democrats focused on budget, crime, taxes and new revenues.

Both parties, obviously wooing the independent voter, have stolen several pages from the other side's playbook.

The cast, in alphabetical order:
■ Republican Kent Hance led the four-man assault to stop Clayton Williams from winning outright and stuck to his Reagan revolution guns to keep out of third place.

■ Republican Tom Luce, facing an "all brain, no charisma" rap, was personable, then tough, when he said he has "stood toe-to-toe with the Ayatollah Khomeini," over Americans held in Iran.

■ Democrat Jim Mattox tempered his bulldog image, hung his hat on a no new taxes pledge. He painted the other two Democrats as can't-help-it spenders who will undoubtedly raise taxes.

■ Republican Jack Rains continued his preemption strike for GOP women by saying "yes" to pro-choice, and wooed Hispanic Republicans by saying "no" to offi-

cial English. Both stances indicate a moderate voice-of-reason plan to overtake Hance.

■ Democrat Ann Richards disarmed with corn-pone, then attacked as a "good 'ol girl" standing up to the "good 'ol boys." Then took on Mattox to overcome a stalled front-runner image, but committed the only gaffe.

■ Democrat Mark White expected to be attacked for the record taxes and fees he advocated in his first term, and when the issue was served up, he swung to knock the cover off the ball, saying he would do it again if necessary.

■ Republican Clayton Williams was ready to be gang-tackled as the front-runner. He countered with an ear-to-ear grin which told the voters, "Hey, it's great being ahead."

Debate Moderators

Usually debate moderators are plain vanilla, but these groomed stars, both gubernatorial possibilities early on, were excellent symbols of their party's strength and a promise of the future. Both performed well.

For the GOP, George Bush Jr., the president's son, was a reminder of the Texans in the White House. Perhaps a harbinger of a kinder, gentler state after a rough recession. His substantial backing is on reserve for now; a loss would only have diminished the family's top power position.

The Democrats called on former San Antonio mayor Henry Cisneros, the popular, polished leader of Texas Hispanics. The Hispanics have arrived, and he, more than any other, can deliver the minority's majority. He was the front-runner himself until private marital problems became public.

The Richards' Gaffe

Not a major one for those who know Ann Richards, she nevertheless committed a gaffe by answering the state should not decide whether a "white woman" can have an abortion.

No right-minded person actually believes Richards is a racist, but it opened her to criticism.

But, political observers, including some of her supporters, are questioning the way she and her staff reacted to the slip-of-the-tongue.

Mattox, who claims majority support of the Mexican American Democrats and the Coalition of Black Democrats, harshly demanded that Richards apologize to black and Hispanic women.

White couldn't resist a more temperate jab, saying she needs to explain what her slip actually meant.

The silver lining for Richards? She got a weekend of free press to boost her name ID and her pro-choice stance, which could remain a plus long after the topic has died.

Hobby's Education Plan

Lame duck Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, remaining on stage as a voice of reason while the special session nears, said reforming school finance won't be enough to improve the state's educational product.

He disagrees with fellow lame duck Gov. Bill Clement's hard-line approach, which is to equalize funding with no new taxes to satisfy the courts and leave major reform to the Legislature's regular session next January.

Right now, Hobby's Democrats control the Legislature; Clements and others are banking on a closer margin after the elections.

Among Hobby's proposals last week:

- Lengthening the school year;
- Tougher achievement tests;
- Better pay for teachers;
- Tax credits for businesses that support education; and
- Reward school systems with superior achievement records.

Other Highlights

■ The Texas Secretary of State's office distributed voter registration cards in convenience stores in some cities. Absentee voting is from Feb. 21 to March 9; the primaries are March 13.

■ U.S. Rep. Pete Geren, D-Fort Worth, spent close to \$1 million to win his special election victory to replace former U.S. Rep. Jim Wright, according to the Federal Election Commission.

geotechnical consultants on the project.

The National Society of Professional Engineers, which celebrates its 56th Anniversary this year, is an organization of more than 80,000 professional engineers throughout the United States. Unlike other engineering organizations, NSPE was established to address the professional concerns of engineers across all technical disciplines. It is organized as a three-level association with membership at the local, state, and national levels and provides input from the engineering profession on scores of technology-related issues of concern to the profession and the general public.

Rising 190 feet above the river bed, Morris Sheppard is distinguished as the highest flat slab buttress dam in the nation. Over 390 similarly-constructed dams are located throughout North America and around the world. Designed by Ambursen Engineering Company, the dam was constructed by Lytle-Johnson Construction Company between 1938 and 1941 at a cost of \$12 million. The project was financed by the Works Progress Administration, Brazos River Authority revenue bonds, and State tax remissions.

The dam impounds Possum Kingdom Lake, located about 75 miles northwest of Fort Worth. With a capacity of 570,000 acre-feet, it is one of the State's largest reservoirs. The lake is especially popular among north and west Texas residents for fishing and boating. A substantial recreation-related business community has developed along its shores. In addition, about 2,000 homes are located around the shores of the lake.

The reservoir is used for hydropower production, water supply, irrigation and recreation. Located downstream are thousands of residents, hundreds of businesses, the Worth Boy Scout Ranch, the City of Granbury, and other substantial economic developments. The structure carries the classification of "high hazard" due to its size and the magnitude of consequences predicted in the event of failure.

During the 1987 5-year inspection conducted for the Authority of Freese and Nichols, it was determined that a portion of the dam was slowly moving downstream due to progressive failure of the foundation shales deep below the structure. This condition was reported to the Authority's Board which immediately ordered the lake level to be lowered eight feet to restore a reasonable factor of safety to the structure. An additional five-foot lowering of the lake level to elevation 987 feet was subsequently ordered by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, which licenses the hydroelectric generating facilities at the project. Lowering of the lake began on April 3 and was completed on April 24, 1987. The gates at the dam were raised in April 1988, when the repairs had progressed sufficiently to allow the process of refilling the lake to elevation 995 to begin. The lake reached elevation 995 in the middle of May 1989 and was restored to elevation 1000, the maximum normal pool elevation, in June 1989.

An around-the-clock repair and rehabilitation program was begun with installation of a network of piezometers, extensometers and inclinometers and a precision field survey system to precisely monitor any continuing movement of the structure and water pressures in the foundation. Piezometers indicated water pressures with uplift

pressures equivalent to 65 percent of the lake head. Observation of structural distress such as cracks in the footings of the mostly hollow spillway, and the hydrostatic pressure in the foundation confirmed there were serious problems with the dam.

Access to the inside of the dam was required to install relief wells to reduce hydrostatic pressure as well as to add ballast to further stabilize the sliding structure.

"Construction of the needed access passageways into the enclosed spillway bays was not easy", said Hoge. "It involved drilling an 8-foot diameter opening through each of twenty-four, nine-foot thick concrete buttresses." In all, an aggregate of 220 linear feet of concrete was penetrated. "In addition to allowing access", Hoge said, "the openings will play an integral role in helping stabilize the structure by allowing water to flow between critical spillway buttresses to eliminate buoyancy effects during high tailwater conditions."

After access to the interior of the dam was established, 18,000 cubic yards of mud and other material left in the bays during the 1938-1941

period of construction had to be removed. "It took about one week to clean each bay", Hoge said. "In some bays, divers had to use a suction dredge under as much as 30 feet of water to remove the muck." Next, 66,000 cubic yards of 3-inch crushed rock to add weight and serve as a work platform was placed in the bays using a telescoping conveyor. A new electrical system, safety equipment and ventilation system were provided, and an extensive monitoring system was put in place.

A plan for a series of six-inch diameter relief wells spaced every 13 feet was developed. However, once drilling commenced, some wells encountered pressurized flows of up to 450 gallons per minute. These unexpected and excessive flows called for additional wells in some bays. A total of 147 wells, some as large as 12 inches in diameter, were installed in an attempt to reduce the encountered flows and ultimately lower the hydrostatic pressures causing the foundation uplift.

Discharges from the relief wells indicated relatively direct contact from the lake to the numerous fissures and geologic anomalies causing flow paths through the shale

foundation. A program of core drilling confirmed that a longitudinal crack along the top of the upstream cutoff was allowing the lake to pressurize this system of fissures and cause uplift in the foundation. A program of grouting using sodium silicate grout accelerated by cement successfully closed off the breaks.

"Approximately \$12 million was expended on the emergency work accomplished to date", Hoge said. Essentially, this phase of the project was successfully concluded in March 1989. Work has now begun on the second part, which will cost an estimated \$20 million and includes adding more ballast to the dam, correction of erosion problems down stream of the spillway, major rehabilitation of existing spillway gates, installation of new release and monitoring facilities, general upgrading of project electrical and control systems and construction of a new emergency spillway. Overall completion of all work on the project is scheduled for November 1991.

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Carson Hoge Receives Achievemnets Award

The Brazos River Authority's project for emergency repairs to Morris Sheppard Dam at Lake Possum Kingdom has been named by the National Society of Professional Engineers one of eight outstanding engineering achievements in the United States during 1989. The Outstanding Engineering Achievements Award was presented January 31 to Carson Hoge, General Manager of the Brazos River Authority, which owns and operates the dam, at the NSPE national convention in San Diego, California. Principal consulting engineers on the repair project are Freese and Nichols, Inc. of Fort Worth. McClelland Engineers of Houston are

Pharmacy Topics

Research at East Tennessee State University links heart attacks to low magnesium levels. Shortages allow muscle cells (including the heart's) to keep contracting when they should stop, leading to muscle twitches, cramps, irregular heartbeat -- and maybe heart attacks.

Tests at Cochin Hospital in Paris indicate that cyclosporine -- the drug used to prevent the rejection of heart transplants -- may halt rheumatoid arthritis.

In a study of the infection that causes traveler's diarrhea, volunteers at the University of Maryland School of Medicine took vaccine made from the milk of cows immunized against E. coli, the usual culprit. Researchers reported complete protection from the germ.

New no-estrogen contraceptive has been recommended for FDA approval and is already in use in 12 countries. Implanted rods release continuous dose of progestin levonorgestrel for five years, but can be removed if the woman wants to become pregnant.

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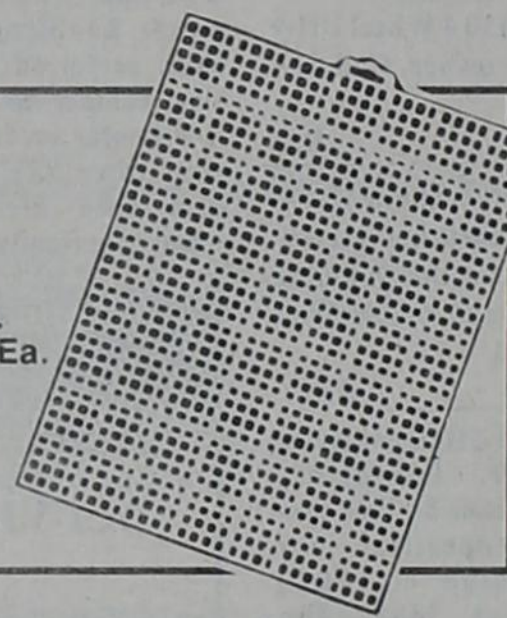

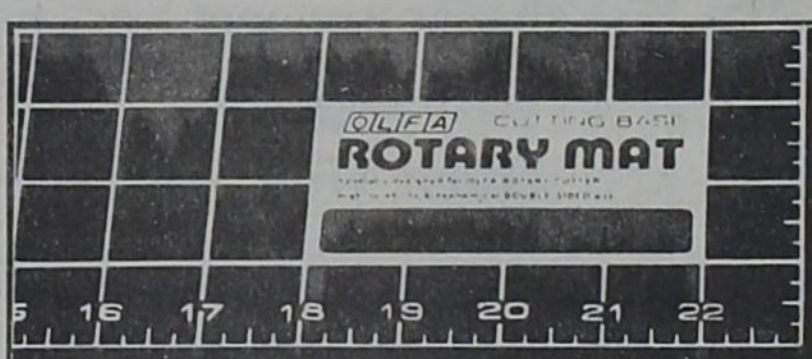

Gordon Spot

According to IRS Notice 907, agricultural employers are now required to withhold income tax from cash wages paid to farm workers. Income tax must be withheld from farmworkers on all cash wages paid after 1989 which are subject to social security taxes.

Since this is a new requirement for agricultural employers not all agricultural employers will be familiar with the process of withholding, depositing, reporting, and

paying taxes and contains the tax tables which tells the employer how much income tax and social security tax to withhold. We have a limited supply of circular E in the Extension office.

These are the steps that an agricultural employers should take:

- 1.) Get an Employer number. This number is requested on Form SS-4. You can call 1-800-424-3676 to request Form SS-4.
- 2.) Get the employee to complete a Form W-4. These forms are available from the IRS at the same phone num-

 ber as in step 1. This completed form must be kept on file until the employee elects to change his withholding, at which time he completes a new form.

3.) Next, withhold the tax from the employer's paycheck. The amount of withholding is determined by using two tax tables in Circular E.

4.) Make timely deposits of the taxes at a financial institution normally a local national bank which is qualified as a depository of federal taxes. Make the deposit using a Form 8109, Federal Tax Deposit Coupon, which you will receive from the IRS when you receive your employer number. Deposit time requirements differ according to the amount of the de-

posit, but are normally made monthly or quarterly. More details on depositing taxes can be found on page 8, paragraph 13, of Circular E.

5.) An employer must annually report income tax withheld on the employee's Form W-2. The employer then submits to the Social Security Administration a Form W-3, which is a cumulative report of all W-2 reports given.

6.) An employer must report income tax withheld annually on Form 943, Employer Annual Tax Return for Agricultural Employers.

Now, what do you do until you receive your employer number? The circulars and publications listed later in this column contain information on how to make deposits, file returns, etc., if they are due before the employer has received the employer number.

If you must make a deposit before receiving the employer identification number (EIN), make the deposit with your IRS Service Center. The check payable to the IRS, should include an attachment showing your name as shown on Form SS-4, address, kind of tax, period covered, and date you applied for EIN.

Since the amount of income tax withholding is based upon a W-4, employees should get a signed copy on file as soon as possible. Begin withholding with the next pay period. In the absence of the W-4, withhold tax as if the employee is single, with no withholding allowances. Several methods of withholding may be acceptable, as long as the amount of tax withheld is about the same as it would be under the percentage method in Circular E.

An employee may claim to be exempt from income tax withholding if the employee had no income tax liability last year and expects none this year. However, the wages may still be subject to social security taxes.

Expansion of facilities and programs by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will give the state's outdoor resources a boost in the 1990's, according to Chuck Nash of San Marcos, Chairman of the Parks and Wildlife Commission.

Speaking at the annual

conference of the Texas Outdoor Writers Association in Athens last week, Nash told the writers that new fish hatchery facilities, a new training

facility and park for the department at Lake Bastrop, expansion of Type II hunting lands outside East Texas, expansion of the technical guidance program for landowners and opening of a portion of Big Bend Ranch to hunting and other uses will be highlights of the early 1990's.

"We hope to announce a second saltwater hatchery on the Texas coast by April," Nash said. The department already operates the GCCA-CPL Marine Development Center at Corpus Christi, a facility that has produced more than 50 million red drum fingerlings since 1983.

Ground will be broke during 1990 on the departments renovation and expansion project at the Huntsville State Fish Hatchery. Nash told the group the Huntsville hatchery will have many of the

modern features now incorporated in the state-of-the-art A. E. Wood production facility at the San Marcos Hatchery.

Nash said a recent agreement with the Lower Colorado River authority will eventually provide a conservation training center for the department, an upgraded state park on the shores of Lake Bastrop and possibly a bass fishery with special limits aimed at production of trophy-sized largemouths in the 1,000-acre reservoir.

Assistance to landowners in managing wildlife habitat will receive new emphasis in the future, Nash said, since most of the state's wildlife habitat is on private lands.

Our backyard Lake Leon really heated up this past week both in water temp and the bass fishing. A few limits were taken on crankbaits and spinner baits. Both of these had to be worked slowly, with the bait stopping quiet often beside cover. White spinner

with gold blades seemed to work best. And shad and crawfish pattern crankbaits seemed to be preferred.

Twinn Buttes has been producing a large number of fish in the 5 to 10 pound range on spinner baits in shallow water.

The lakes are warmer to 56 degrees, but this weeks expected cold snap will be a big set back. But the time is coming for some excellent "Fishing Outdoors."
