BICENTENNIAL REFLECTIONS

Sunday, July 4, marked the conclusion of a series of celebrations in memoration of the 200th birthday of our nation.

This period of festivities actually began on July 4, 1975, and the official Bicentennial will extend through the remaining months of 1976. However, for the most part, the festivities have ended. Only the completion of the projects remains.

This Bicentennial has had varying experience, or in some instances, no significance at all. And this regrettable, for in this writer's opinion, the theory that "participation brings gratification" still holds true. On the local scene we were a little slow on the take - off, but

Thinking in terms of chronology, Rising Star's first Bicentennial accomplishment was the production of "Kaleidoscope of Freedom" last July 3, 1975. Mr. and Mrs. Carl Smith, Mrs. Rex Hudson, James Steel, the Community Singers and many others are to be commended for this effort:

A patriotic musical was presented on February 21, 1976, by the Crowley's Ridge College Chorus. In March, the Kaleidoscope Flags were presented to Dr. Guy D. Newman of Howard Payne University to be displayed in the Douglas MacArthur Academy of Freedom in Brownwood.

In a formal recognition ceremony on Saturday, May 22, 1976, Rising Star became an official Bicentennial city as Joe Hodges of Abilene presented the official Bicentennial flag and certificates to the city of Rising Star.

Owen Aikin, as chairman of the local General Bicentennial Committee, has given outstanding leadership to the various chairmen and committee members in a dedicated effort to sponsor a city - wide program of beautification and restoration.

Space will not permit the mention of all the projects, but this column would certainly be remiss if credit was not given to Mr. and Mrs. O.L. Burns and Chuck Elliott for their untiring efforts to beautify the designated "Bicentennial Park", located on the Horton lot on Main Street. Contributions for the completion of this project are still in order, for the finished product of this endeavor could well be a thing of civic pride for every citizen

of our community. The Carter Museum; the restoration of the Market Building; the publication of "Kaleidoscope of Freedom", a narration of the 76 historic flags written by Mrs. Carl Smith, and published by Mr. H.V. 

Skin Cancer Treatments Offering Positive Results

"Like any cancer, the best time to treat skin cancer is the first time," says Dr. Don A. Gard, a surgeon at M. D. Anderson Hospital in Houston.

While superficial skin cancer remains the most common form of cancer in the country today, a number of treatment methods are available which make this form of cancer the most curable.

Common methods of treatment used alone or in combination include surgical removal, radiation therapy, chemical burning and "electric spark" techniques, cryosurgery (localized freezing) and use of drugs in the form of ointments, lotions or solutions.

"I don't think a new method of treating skin cancer is a particular need to us now," says Dr. Gard. "What is most important now is earlier diagnosis and better case followup once a cancer has been treated and the patient returns home," he notes.

explains, because recurrent skin tumors tend to be a more serious problem and many times are more aggressive, often tending to spread widely.

He suggests that once a skin tumor has been treated, it is extremely important that the patient receive a routine, periodic skin check by his look for melanoma patients doctor. Any fair-complexioned person who has received extended exposure from the sun would also be wise, he adds, by having periodic skin checks and being observant

to changes in the skin such as scaly skin thickenings or pale, waxy, pearly nodules which may ulcerate and crust.

While superficial skin cancers are basically easy to cure when treated promptly, another less common form of skin cancer known as melanoma or "black mole" cancer is much more aggressive. Melanoma often spreads from the pigmented cells to other parts of the body through the blood or lymph nodes.

Although considered a skin cancer, melanoma can begin in any pigmented cells including the eye. Fortunately, it is considered a rare cancer, affecting only about 0.2 percent of the population.

The success record in treatment of melanoma is much lower than superficial skin cancers, with a cure rate of about 63 percent compared to the 95 percent for the more common skin cancers. The experts note that melanoma requires a very special treatment and must not be treated by "electric spark" Followup is important, he or chemical burning techniques.

While changing moles such as those exhibiting rapid growth, irregular pigment, bleeding or loss of hair - can be danger signals, it is important to remember that not every change in a mole means cancer, warns Dr. Gard.

In recent years the outhas dramatically improved through the use of aggressive treatments including new drugs and the growing understanding of human immunological systems.
