He sued the management for damages. But since the horse had never been troublesome before, the court could find no basis for liability. Nor can you collect if you

yourself are to blame. Thus: A racing fan, on his way to the betting window, came to a mud puddle. Although it was only a quater-inch deep, he decided to jump. He landed short, skidded, and fell down hard. A court ruled that he could not You cannot collect damages collect damages for an accident which, by his own bravado, he had brought upon himself.

But blame was pinned on the management when a grandstand seat caved in under a spectator. Proper maintenance, ruled the court, would have revealed that the wood beneath the seat had rotted away.

In another case, numerous spectators at an auto race were hurt when a car blew a tire, smashed through a fence, and hurtled into the stands. The blowout was traced to one of several loose nails, lying in plain sight on the track but overlooked by a clean-up crew, Here, too, the court upheld damage claims against the management.

Of course safety measures such as careful maintenance, adequate policing, and strong fences can be costly. But in the eyes of the law, cost is secondary. As one court put it:

"While the expense cannot be overlooked, it weighs less than human life in the balance. If a race cannot be held without inherent and extreme risk to life and limb, the command of the law is that it must not be held





"When It"s all put together, we've got a pretty good case," the agent said in Eastland Friday The counterfeiting project began when two Illinois men checked into the Quarles Lodge at Lake Leon last Thursday.

The printing operation was belived to have been under way over the weekend, and the pair checked out of the motel Tuesday, leaving a great deal of their equipment, and paying their tab with what turned out to be one of their products-a"nottoo-poorly printed \$20 bill."

The Quarlses contacted Sheriff L. E. Sublett and his department immediately began investigation, turning up unused offset plates, partially-burned billprinted sheets of 50-pound bond paper and other assorted paraphernalia, associated with offset printing.

Officers were guessing at weeks end that the pair may have "movedout" hurriedly after having seen official autos cruise the lake area Monday. (Deputy Loy Williams spent Monday at the lake looking for a party in connection with another case, and DPS Patrolman Carl Boustead was in the area of the Lodge, while working on his new home at the lake.)

The pair apparently went to Abilene where they stored the rest of their equipment and swithched autos. A warehouse man told Abilene police last week that two men left equipment there Tuesday. It consisted of an A. B. Dick offset duplicating machine, an expensive portrait camera and other supplies, which were confiscated by the agents, and brought to Eastland Friday.

Arrested Wednesday night in Tucson only three hours after he got there, and charged Thursday in Abilene and Tucson with counterfeiting is James Alexander Palmer, 30, of Des Plaines, Ill. Bond was set at \$10,000.

Also charged, but still at large, is Billy Gene Wilson, 40 whom authorities believe may have been with Palmer in a bar at the time of his arrest, but fled when a bartender argued with Palmer bout the \$20 bill he was handed.


