Proceedings Commissioners Court.

This being a regular session with W. V. Dean, county judge, presiding, commissioners, Joe A. Williams, W. L. Pearce, J. D. Cavness and G. W. Long; Edgar T. Neal, sheriff and Arch Woods, Clerk, present.

The monthly report of tax collector, W. W. Skelton, was examined and approved.

It is ordered by the court that the Clerk notify the County Treasurer to resume the issuance of checks against county funds.

Commissioner, G. W. Long, was excused for absence, being sick at home.

The bond of W. W. Skelton as tax collector for the county was approved. The bond is in the sum of \$37,000 payable to the County Judge, with M. E. Millican, T. A. Wilton, J. H. Lindsey, L. E. Hicks, W. H. Taylor and P. C. Sloan as sureties.

The court also approved the tax collector's state bond in the sum of \$27,000 payable to the Governor with A. D. Nelson, W. H. Gibbons, J. M. Kuykendall, F. F. Edwards, R. C. Sloan and T. A. Murray as sureties.

Bond of Elbert McCoury as justice of the peace for precinct No. 4 was approved in the sum of \$1,000 payable to the County Judge with L. T. Doss, R. M. Lewis and D. F. Moore as sureties.

The bond of Jas. M. Cooper as constable of precinct 4 was approved in the sum of \$500 payable to the Governor with the National Surety Company of New York as surety.

The annual report of J. W. Griffin, county farm demonstrator, was ordered filed with the Clerk for inspection of the public.

Rules and regulations to govern janitor service at the court house were adopted and the County Clerk ordered to give notice and receive bids for janitor.

The court took up and considered the proposition of taking the sewer disposal out of the river to comply with the state law prohibiting sewers emptying into any river or stream and S. J. Bross, civil engineer, was directed to prepare plans and specifications, together with estimated cost, and report same to the court.

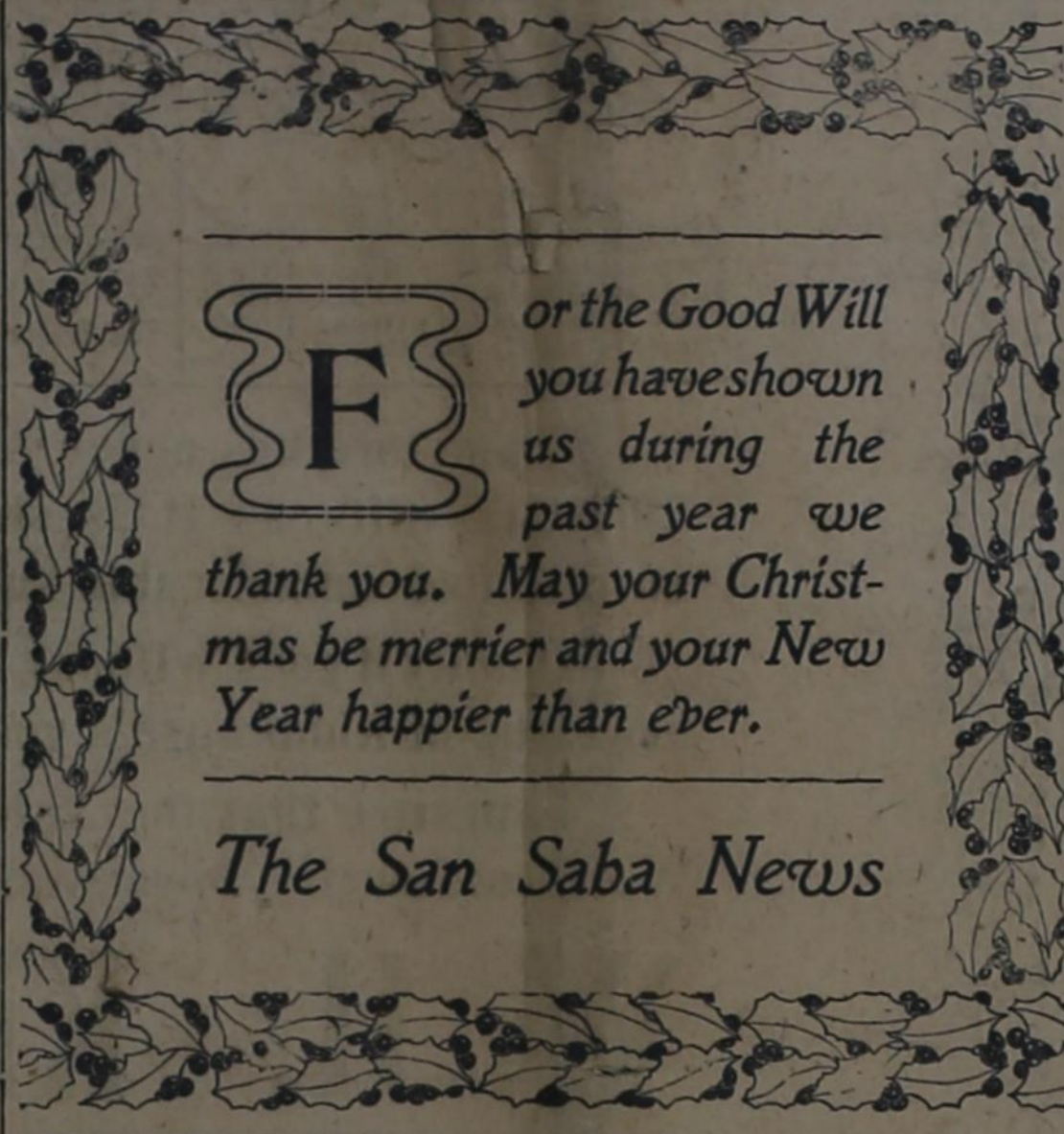
The next one is scheduled for the middle of January and B. T. Rich is the victim.

Some six or seven shots were fired, one of which took effect in the abdomen. Williams was unarmed. First report said he was killed, but a later report Tuesday night said he was in the sanitarium and hopes for his recovery were entertained. Report also has it that bad blood had existed between the parties for some time.

Both parties are known in this place. Mr. Williams, who ranches in the Valley Springs section, has been a frequent visitor at the San Saba fair.

At the regular meeting of the directors of the San Saba Building and Loan Association held Tuesday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock with all of the directors and officers being present; T. C. Henry, president; E. E. Fagg, vice-president; John Seiders, secretary-treasurer; W. V. Dean, Clarence Gosch, C. H. Hearson, J. T. McConnell, T. A. Murray and R. R. Thornless Cactus as a Live Stock Insurance

Mr. B. R. Russell of this place is fast accumulating stock of a hardy Texas Thornless (Ellis-sionia) cactus, for practical purposes. Starting with a find of one small bush four years ago, he now has stock to plant 20 acres, besides sending out many hundreds of test plants.

Mr. Russell's faith in the utility of this feed crop grows as he observes the cold resisting qualities of the Texas Thornless. He has lately planted a small, well prepared field to cactus for his Angoras, using more than three wagon loads of slabs as seed and planting with a plow. Mr. Russell believes that it pays to cultivate cactus, as a more constant moisture increases the yield enormously and makes the slabs far sweeter and more tender than the wild thorned, a fact not often taken into consideration. He estimates the yield of a fall planting during the following season at above 20 ton per acre. And he expects that with enlarged root system it will double that amount in following years. But its chief merit is not in its excessive yield, but as a succulent evergreen relish there is no more healthful food for cattle, sheep, goats and hogs than Thornless Cactus. Again it demands no storage, but is a safe and sure insurance against starvation. Just now many of our stockmen are at their wits end to save their cattle; are paying \$50 a ton for cake to tide them over. Three acres of Thornless Cactus, with a two year's accumulation of 50 to 75 tons per acre, fed out carefully would tide 100 cattle over January and February. 20 acres well set to cactus, with a two year's accumulated growth, would make safe, inexpensive wintering for 500 cattle. A neighbor is buying some 10 cars of cake for some 500 cattle a cost of \$10,000. Compare that with the cost of seeding and tending 20 acres of cactus two years.

All large ranches have attached pieces of plowable land that grow no more grass than rocky

land, but will grow and hold 25 to 50 tons of cactus a year. Mr. Russell does not advise the purchase of acre planting of Thornless Cactus. But nursery plants in gardens where projected and propagated fast 100 cuttings will plant an acre, the second year 2450 plants to the acre, 35 rows, 3 feet in row.

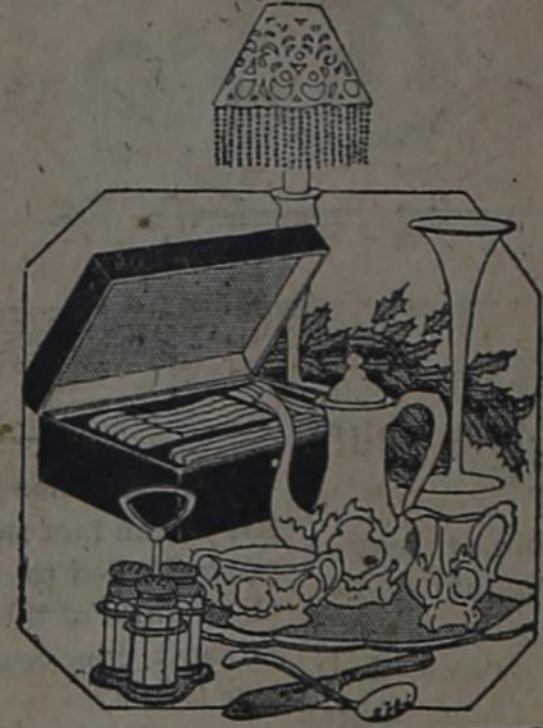

FIREMEN'S BANQUET

The boys of the volunteer fire company are to be the recipients of a complimentary banquet given them by the business men of the town. The date for this is Friday night, January 5. The resolutions published is the result of an informal meeting of business men called by the members of the city council for the purpose of a free consultation to see what may be done to encourage the volunteer firemen of the town. This meeting was held in the offices of Johnson & Braly Thursday night, and despite the cold weather a good representation was present.

R. W. Burlison was made chairman of the meeting and A. V. Riley secretary. After a lengthy discussion of the further needed equipment and the method of providing the same the following committee was appointed to meet with the city council to consider this proposition, and to investigate and make such recommendations to the council as they may find neces-

sary and advisable. The members of this committee are R. R. Low, chairman, A. V. Riley and W. R. Harris.

Dr. G. A. Wilson and Burney Braly were appointed a resolution committee to prepare suitable resolutions expressing the sense of the meeting. The resolutions will be found below:

The banquet idea was then advanced and met with hearty and unanimous approval. Friday night, January 5, was selected as the date. The details of this first firemen's banquet was then placed in the hands of the following committees: Arrangement: A. R. Mosley, chairman, J. T. McConnell and U. M. Sanderson. Finance: George B. Clark, chairman, Dr. G. A. Wilson and Gordon Mackey. Program: W. A. Smith, chairman, S. E. W. Hudson and John Seiders. City Marshal, D. Chadwick, was appointed a committee of one to invite the volunteer firemen and present each with a complimentary ticket.

The committees each report a hearty response from the business men of the town and the

preparations for the banquet are progressing rapidly. The boys who are always on the job when there is a fire in town are deserving of every kind word and generous expression handed them. There is money in it to them. It means hard and dangerous work, wet and muddy clothes and exposure to them every time a fire breaks out. The only reward they expect is the consciousness of duty well performed and that their labors are appreciated by those whose property is protected.

RESOLUTION

To R. W. Burlison and the business men of San Saba, en masse assembled:

We, your committee appointed on resolutions, respectfully submit and suggest the following resolutions in the form of a communication to the members of the Volunteer Fire Company:

Be it resolved, that we, the business men of the town of San Saba, Texas, are mindful of the interest manifested by the Volunteer Fire Company, in the protection of property from the ravages of fire within the limits of our city, and that the citizens of our town are greatly indebted to the boys for their heroic work extinguishing fires and their untiring efforts in keeping the volunteer organization together.

2nd. That we, the business men and citizens of the City of San Saba, in consideration of the services heretofore rendered by the Fire Company, feel ourselves obligated to furnish the boys with the proper equipment and fire fighting apparatus, to the end that they may be prepared to meet such emergencies with more ease.

3rd. And that we further show our appreciation by tendering them a banquet on the night of January 5th, 1917, and that we raise funds for the transportation of the boys to the State Fire Convention and to pay their expenses while attending such convention.

4th. That a copy of these resolutions be handed to the Chief of the Volunteer Fire Company and that they be published in the local newspapers.

May the year 1917 hold for them an abundant portion of life's joys and much prosperity and happiness.

THE WAY OF THE NEUTRAL IS hard. President Wilson dare not make a peace offering to the war dogs unleashed in Europe. Not that peace is not righteous and war all that Gen. Sherman said it was, but because there are conditions worse than war, and that war in a righteous cause is one of the noblest forms of human endeavor.

MR. G. W. LIGHT SAYS THE address on "Christian Citizenship" delivered by Senator Morris Sheppard at Waco during the recent Baptist state convention was the greatest public speech he ever heard. His word picture of the Christ from the cradle to the cross is a jewel fit to adorn the walls of heaven. Morris Sheppard is as pure in life as in thought and language.

THE PEACE PROPOSAL FROM Berlin has met with a cold reception. Premier Briand of France answers by declaring that what has happened in 1916 shows "not a German, but a French victory, which in truth, has been inscribed on French flags." Further denouncing the proposal, M. Briand exclaims "No, you are the aggressors. The blood is on your hands. After the Marne, after Verdun, France—France resisting firmly, is offered this." Bonar law, speaking for the new English cabinet, merely repeated for the hundredth time that "they (the allies) require that there should be adequate reparation for the past and adequate security for the future."

SENATOR J. C. MCNEALUS IS Irish to the manor born. He is a graceful writer and a clear thinker who never dodges. His analysis of the Kaiser's peace proposal is the clearest, cleanest and most logical yet presented. His paper, the Dallas Democrat, is eagerly read at this desk and never an issue has come but was readable, entertaining and instructive. Mr. McNealus is an honored member of the Texas Senate and stands four square on every political question before the people.

GOVERNOR FERGUSON MADE no mistake when he came to San Saba county to get one of his cabinet officers. We have in mind E. B. House, who for eight years has been at the head of the state revenue department. That department of the state government has been presided over by such distinguished men as O. B. Colquitt and Capt. Bill McDonald. But no man has ever delivered the goods like Ed House has done. His bi-annual report this year will show that for the last 12 months \$200,000 have been collected and turned into the state treasury thru his department. The year before Mr. House's first appointment a pitiful \$6,000 was collected and many legislators began to discuss seriously the idea of abolishing the office. one of the really important departments of the state government. When he first went from the farm to the state capitol our Ed was good naturedly referred to by other heads of departments as the "farmer member" of the cabinet. But today the others are mostly all gone and the "farmer" is still on the job and making good. The editor of the News has known Ed House for many years; as friend, citizen and public official. He is an inveterate worker, a close student of the business in hand at all times. Of strong and clear convictions, he is frank and free of expression. As a friend he is true as steel and as a public official his highest ambition is to render honest, faithful service. We have often differed in politics, but these differences have never dimmed our friendship nor blinded us to those nobler traits of character and accomplishments worthy of record.

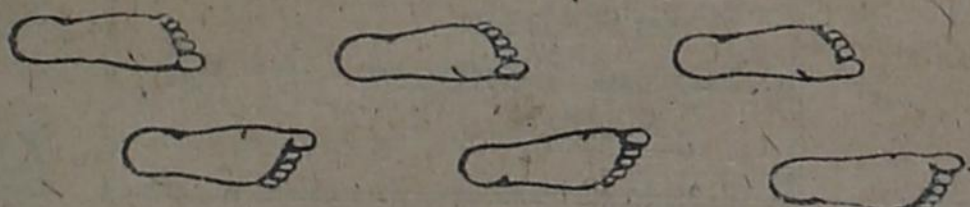

A Letter From Oklahoma

Apache Okla. Dec. 5th, 1916.
Dear Mr. Smith:—

I am writing to let you know just how we are getting along up here. Our derrick is completed and most of the machinery is on the ground and we expect to have everything ready to speed in some time next week. The San Saba Oil Company or rather its Oklahoma branch has about 3000 acres in what is considered the best location. This field is attracting the attention of all the big oil companies, not only of this state, but Pennsylvania and Ohio.

We have covered all of the shallow production with our line leases.

On Joe Black Bear's place which we have under lease and near where we are drilling two wells were drilled for water at a depth of 120 ft. Oil was encountered instead of water and these wells would produce one bbl per day each. On several adjoining farms oil was so strong the water could not be used.

A new field has just been brought in at Caneut 18 miles east of us. There is an oil field 22 miles south at Lawton and 30 miles west of us at Godobo is a good little oil field. All of the fields of any note in Oklahoma were first drilled on account of surface showings and we have what is considered the best of any. We have had several Geologists report on this field and they have traced two anticlines coming from the Wichita mountains that cross where we are drilling. Taking everything into consideration I am sanguine we will bring in a large production in the very near future.

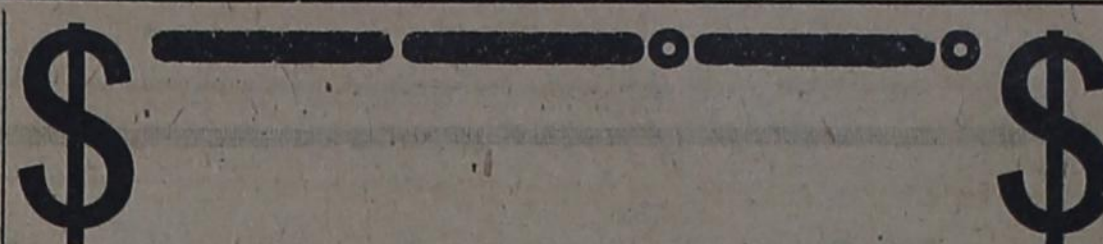

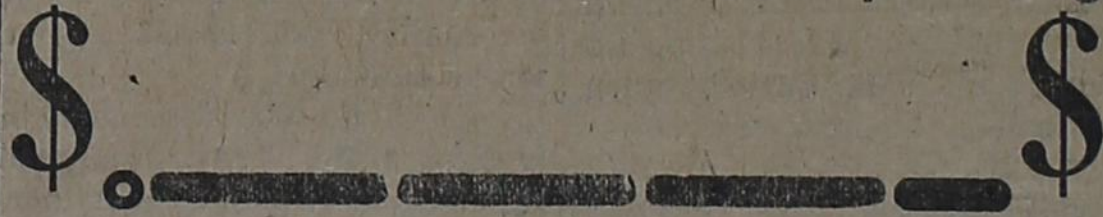
