



Stewart, national prohibition campaign manager expressed gratification over the result of wet and dry fights in states to- sympathy to those bereft. day. "Returns show that the drys have added four states-Michigan, South Dakota, Nebraska and Montana—to the dry column," said Mr. Stewart. "We saved Arkansas to the array of nineteen dry states with which we entered the campaign. The election of Bambarger as governor of Utah, a democrat favoring prohibition, I think means prohibition by statute out there.

With the swinging into the dry column of the four states noted above, twenty-three of the total of forty-nine states of the Union are now dry. And since large portions of the remaining twenty-six wet states were under local option, this means that considerably more than half of the United States will prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors from now on, or rather from the date on which the new law becomes effective in the newly dry
