## BULLETIN OF SELECTION BOARD

1. The following is a list of the names of registrants who have failed to return Questionnaires. It is the duty of any relative of any of these registrants or any other person who knows the present address of such registrant to give same to this Board without delay, but this to the side, this Board will greatly appreciate such relative or other person taking this action. This will be the last time this list will be published before the registrants will be reported to the Adjutant General of Texas as delinquents and thereby become liable to be penalized and punished in various ways: Lonnie Jowers, San Saba; Al Vernie Johnson, San Saba; Jahue Littlefield, Bend; Sam Thomas, San Saba; Juan Lopez, San Saba; Daniel James Bradley, San Saba; Floyet Estes, Junction City; Walter Byrd Lynn, San Saba; Willie William Rogers, Bend.

2. An erroneous report has come to the attention of this Board to the effect that the first installment of the next quota for this county is to be entrained on the 23rd instant. We want to repeat that registrants and others should pay no attention to any report or notice that is not official and not sent out from this office; that every registrant will be given proper and ample notice by this Board relative to every step that he will be required to take under the Regulations; and that one of the main functions of Local Boards is to give all necessary advice to registrants and other interested parties as to the Regulations in general and as to the duties of registrants in particular, and that registrants and others should promptly apply to this Board for any information instead of to other sources, which information will gladly be given.

3. Beginning the 23d instant, the final installment of fifteen per cent of the first draft will be mobilized. As this county furnished its quota in the first three installments, this movement will not affect this county. The only men that this county may be called on to furnish prior to the entrainment of the first increment of the next quota will be two registrants to replace two who were rejected at the mobilization camp on account of physical disability, and five men to replace an equal number who have been discharged for one reason or another from the mobilization camp after having been accepted for service.

4. All registrants placed in Class 1 will in the near future be summoned for physical examination. The next step in respect of them will be to give them notice of the finding of the Board on the report of their physical examination. Those who are found to be qualified for military duty will thereafter at the proper time be notified to report to this Board for military service.

5. Registrants of this jurisdiction are again earnestly requested to memorize their ORDER NUMBER, and in all correspondence with this Board or telegraphing or telephoning this Board or when calling at this office in person, to refer to such number. All records are kept according to ORDER NUMBER, therefore it will become immediately plain to all concerned to what extent this Board will appreciate the time saved by registrants heeding the direction here given.

## Child Rescued from Dipping Vat Recovers

Rescued after being immersed in a dipping vat four or five minutes, and alive and fast recovering from the ordeal is the experience of the little 2 year old child of Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Neal, who live on the old Savage place, 11 miles east of Brady, and below the F. M. Richard's ranch.

The accident occurred Saturday afternoon. Together with a sister a year or two older and a brother about 6 years old, the little lad was playing in the chute leading to the dipping vat, when he fell into the vat. The solution in the vat stood about waist deep to a man and was covered with a thin coating of ice. The older lad, after a vain effort to rescue his brother fled to the house some 200 yards distant, "a-squalling and a-flying," as he himself expressed it. Some four or five minutes must have passed before help arrived at the tank, and the child was then completely under the ice, only its dress showing at the hole through which it fell. The little sister, who had remained at the vat side, said the little brother had come up one time, with his eyes shut and his mouth open.

First aid was applied to the little one, and medical assistance summoned from Brady. Miraculous as it may appear, the child was revived, and is now able to play about again, the only apparent ill effects from the deadly arsenical solution being that the skin is peeling from its body.—Brady Standard.

## An Inexpensive Egg-Testing Outfit.

An inexpensive egg testing outfit can be made by the use of an ordinary shoe box with a circular hole in the side, midway between the top and the bottom," says F. W. Kazmeir, of the Extension Service, Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas. "Place a lamp or an electric globe in the box. When a lamp is used, make a hole in the top of the box for ventilation. Press the egg to be tested against the opening, so that the light will be reflected through the egg."

## PATRIOTIC Red CROSS DRIVE

### Red Cross Workers Urged To Provide For Wounded.

An appeal for Red Cross workrooms to fill up their store rooms and keep them full against the days of disaster which are to come when the American Army gets into the world war was made by Louis la Beaume, of St. Louis, director of publicity of the southwestern division of the American Red Cross Society in a communication. The communication follows:

"After the Italian reserves in late October an emergency call was issued to the women of America by national headquarters. The response to this earnest plea for more workers plainly showed the spirit of our women. Chapters from all over the country, with very few exceptions, promptly supplied the surgical dressings and garments requested of them. In the consciousness of work well done, however, many women drifted away from work rooms feeling that having helped their country through a crisis they might retire temporarily, awaiting the next emergency call. That call has sounded and will continue to sound until we have won the war and attained that peace, the desire for which is the basis for all Red Cross activity. Recent intimations from Washington point clearly to an early participation of our own soldiers in actual warfare. Nerves are strained throughout the world in expectation of the mighty struggle which will soon take place along the entire western front. From the North Sea to Switzerland millions of men are facing each other preparatory to engaging in the bloodiest struggle the world has ever known. Out of these millions hundreds of thousands will be American boys, our own flesh and blood.

"The medical department of the army is preparing itself for casualties on an unprecedented scale and the demand for surgical dressings and hospital garments is insistent. We are not only called upon to supply the demands of our allies, but must accumulate a great reserve to be used as operations become more active in the spring. The emergency is here and now. Fill up your workrooms and keep them full in order to turn out a steady stream of hospital supplies against the days of disaster which are to come. Double and treble your workroom capacity.

Too much stress can not be laid upon the necessity of using every ounce of energy available if we are to avoid misery unspeakable for our sons and brothers and humiliation unending for ourselves."

In the report sent out last week Richland Springs is shown to have only 83 members. Since that report was published the treasurer has received \$141.00 for 138 additional members from Richland Springs. This makes the total membership from that Branch 221 and the total membership of the entire San Saba County Chapter 1196.

Some of the team captains do not understand just what they are to do. Their duty will be something like this: Mrs. Arma Walters is team captain for San Saba. She will appoint persons on her team to assist her in canvassing the entire population of San Saba on February 22 to 25 for funds for the Red Cross. Rev. Chas. Nixon is team captain for Richland Springs; He will need fewer on his team. Miss Frankie Brown will need fewer on her team at Cherokee. Mrs. J. A. Parks will need still fewer on her team at Locker. And so on, for all the teams, in the county. Each team captain will decide how many and appoint his own

Let everyone lend a helping hand in this drive. The United States has gone into this war in tremendous earnestness and has put everything upon the altar for liberty and democracy.

Many of our young men are now, or soon will be, facing the murderous submarine, the shell and gas, the camouflage barage, the cold and mud. They will need the bandages and garments which the Red Cross furnishes.

In conversation with Pete Sloan who is in from Salt Lake City, he said they did not do things by litters for the Red Cross out there. So the report comes from all parts of the country. Will not the people of San Saba county now rise to the occasion and do something worthy of this great county?

Let each team be ambitious for its own community. We will make report by teams of what has been done in each community in this drive. G. W. Light, for the Ex. Com.

## Hen Sells for \$2.08.

Mrs. A. J. Perry sold six hens to the Eastern Produce Company this week at 19c per pound. The six weighed fifty-two pounds and brought \$9.88, averaging \$1.65 each. The largest hen weighed eleven pounds and brought \$2.08. This is the largest hen sold here in some time, as far as we have been able to learn. There are turkey hens sold here nearly every year which fall far short of the weight of this hen. Mrs. Perry can greatly assist in conserving the meat supply by the raising of such poultry.—Lampasas Leader.

## Says Some Baled Cotton Damaged By Recent Snows.

Much cotton which was on the ground during the snows of this winter has been damaged, Joe Marshall, head of the waste prevention and safty bureau of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railroad, said in a statement issued. He said the Katy is paying \$1,078 every day on account of damages which could have been prevented.

The following circular has been sent to all Katy agents:

"Because of the snow a great many bales of cotton resting on the ground have been exposed to country damage. As soon as the snow melts, the person holding this cotton should put it on edge, so the bales will shed water and dry out, in fact the owners should turn these bales every 24 to 48 hours until dried out.

"A great many cotton yards owned will not do this, consequently this circular is issued as a reminder to you to watch for country damaged cotton.

"Later on when cotton is offered to you in a damaged or soiled condition, be very sure that you sign for it that way. Do not issue any clear receipts for country damaged cotton. You will help us in handling future claims if you will give us advice of the names of cotton standing on the ground and which will later be standing in the mud."

## RED CROSS NEEDS 40,000 NURSES IN WAR ZONE ALONE

PATRIOTIC WOMEN OF SOUTH-WEST ARE URGED TO VOLUNTEER THEIR SERVICES.

### RARE CHANCE FOR PATRIOTS

Those Between the Ages of 21 and 40 Who Can Pass Physical Examination Are Qualified for Enlistment.

Women of the Southwest have a chance to show their patriotism now as never before since the beginning of the war. They have been bravely giving up their sons, fathers, brothers, sweethearts and husbands to fight in the great war; they have knitted thousands of sweaters, helmets, wristlets and mufflers; they have practiced food conservation, bought Liberty bonds, Red Cross memberships, thrift stamps and certificates; they have marched in dozens of parades, attended hundreds of meetings and made hundreds of patriotic talks.

But in few instances have they been given an opportunity to go into the field of the world struggle. This is the path they now have a chance to take.

The Department of Nursing of the American Red Cross, the mobilizing agency for nurses in military service, still is in urgent need of recruits. The Red Cross wants the strong, brave, competent women of the Southwest to step forward and prepare to go to France and help nurse the brave sons of the United States when they fall on the battlefield.

### Thousands of Nurses Needed.

This appeal to the Southwest is issued by Miss Lyda Anderson, head of the Nursing Department, Southwestern Division American Red Cross, and should be heard by every woman in this district. The need for more nurses is so acute that the surgeon-general of the United States estimates that within a short time the Red Cross will need 40,000 nurses for the army alone. Besides that, he points out that the Allies also are depending upon the United States to supplement their nursing service.

It is estimated that there are between 80,000 and 90,000 registered nurses in the United States at the present time, meaning graduates of accredited schools. Of this number 16,500 are enrolled Red Cross nurses, the majority of whom are in active service, ready for mobilization or prepared for specific service.

To be a Red Cross nurse one must be a graduate of an accredited school, be between the ages of 21 and 45 and must pass a physical examination. After the necessary 40,000 nurses are drawn from the total number of registered nurses in the country there will be only half enough nurses left here to take care of the civilian needs.

### Nursing is Fine Preparation.

Therefore, the only solution to the problem—the only way to provide sufficient number of nurses to care for the American soldiers in Europe—is for women of the Southwest to answer the call of the Red Cross and say
