TO THE VOTERS OF SAN SABA COUNTY.

Answering W. E. Yarbrough's Personal References.

I was very hopeful of running the Second Primary without having personal references made of myself or having to make personal references of Mr. Yarbrough through the press.

As Mr. Yarbrough has written a long letter to the voters of this county through the press of last week and making personal references to me, and at the same time giving the voters of this county advice as to how to vote, or how to dispose of me in the Second Primary; and also advising me that Uncle Sam needed me more than San Saba County needed me, which forces me to make reply through the press.

I am ready to serve my Country when the call comes, and I am not dodging the call when my Country needs me.

I am like all other men that have a family that loves them, I would like to stay with them as long as I can. I am not in draft age, was 36 years old the 15th of this month.

With reference to Mr. Yarbrough furnishing all his boys for the army: I understand that he has three boys living outside the County, they are all three traveling salesmen for a coffee firm, they are good business men with young families and they are not in the U. S. services, he has one son at home that is not yet in the service, from reading his letter you might think all his boys were in the army.

Mr. Yarbrough states that his age bars him from any service for Uncle Sam, I have recently noticed that there has been a call for volunteers from 21 to 60 years of age, and am sure his age would not bar him in that service. I cannot see that his age is any more in his way than my age is in my way so far as serving Uncle Sam.

Yet he would have you think he is fair in his letter and expects to run me a fair race, all of the above references are unfair to me: Just as some reports that have been circulated in this campaign are unfair and untrue.

I wrote a short letter to the voters that came out through the press and did not make any personal references to Mr. Yarbrough, I only made statements as to my own merits, and the experiences that I have had in a business which every business needs.

I do not want the office for the shade, as he does, and as he would have you think I did, if a man makes you a good assessor he will have to make a house to house canvass every year, rain or shine, hot or cold, if he does his duty and makes good as your servant. So if a man stays in the shade too much he cannot serve you as he should. I am soliciting your vote strictly on my own merits and promise, if elected, to give you good services in return for your votes.

TO THE CHAIRMAN OF THE CHAPTER COMMITTEE ON NURSING ACTIVITIES:

The enclosed registry blank has been prepared in order that we may make a survey of the graduate nurses of the Southwestern Division who are eligible for Red Cross Service. We have recorded on it the nurses already enrolled in your territory, and we are asking you to secure the applications for enrollment of any other graduate nurses of good standing who are now residents of your county.

Today and graduate nurse of good standing may be enrolled in the Red Cross. She may belong to any one of the three following groups:

- Enrolled and in active service.
- Enrolled and exempt from active service.
- Enrolled as a Home Defense nurse.

You will secure the names and addresses on the enclosed application slips and return them to my office where we will take care of the routine enrollment. If a nurse is not able to give active military service she may be enrolled in the Home Defense group, even though at present there is no possibility of her giving the service required of this group. It is necessary that we know exactly what our resources are.

The Surgeon General is now calling for the enrollment in this country of a thousand nurses a week in order to meet the overwhelming needs in France; and we can do nothing less than our best in view of the conditions that must exist as the present offensive goes on. I am sure; there is a shortage of nurses in France, for recently we have received a cablegram from General Ireland, stating that for every million men, 16,000 nurses are needed. We have more than a million men in France and less than 8,000 nurses; so that, based upon this estimate, less than one half the required number has been sent over.

May I urge it upon you to give the enrolment of the graduate nurses your immediate and serious attention. I need not tell you that there is no activity of the Red Cross that is more vital than this at the present moment.

A BOUNTIFUL CROP CALLS FOR HARVESTERS "UNCLE SAM" URGES YOUR ANSWER

The cotton fields of South Texas are calling loudly for pickers; the rice fields are crying lustily for harvesters; the corn fields longing to be filled with huskers; and the cane fields look wistfully to the laborers of the drouth-stricken counties of the north to be relieved of their bountifulness. Are those of you without employment going to sit idly by, loaf on your dried-up farms, lounge in pool rooms, talk disaster, bemoan the three years drouth, grumble and blame dame fortune for the disastrous conditions in this drouth-stricken section, when there is such a bountiful crop in the south needing harvesters so badly? Why do you hesitate? The real soldier does not hesitate to go wherever he is needed regardless of inconveniences; regardless of danger or "what not." Are you any less a real soldier than he who dons a uniform? How are you doing your bit? Food Stuff and other farm production so badly needed by your Government in near the wasting point in South Texas. Can you realize this?

The U. S. Employment Service located in the Chamber of Commerce room, Brownwood, is to advise you intelligently where work can be had at the least expense of moving; and the service is ready to aid you in getting to places where good employment at remunerative wages can be had. There is possible no time for idling. An id-

ler now is no more nor no less a slacker. Be you, Mr. Man, a slacker? The Inspector of Brownwood office is in close touch with every section of the country. As a sworn officer of the Government, he can advise you intelligently as to the condition in every section. If he tells you not to go to a section, he knows exactly why you should not go there. The employment Service is given free, all information is given cheerfully. Strange part of it is that of the 100 per day inquiries made in its office, only 25 to 50 per cent enroll for work. Could you hear the appeals for work, and see the great number of telegrams and letters received, you would not wonder that the Inspector gets to his office a 7 a.m., and remains until midnight. To relieve the distress of this section and help save the bountiful crops of the South which his Government so badly needs, prompts the long hours he gives. Would it surprise you to know that Capt. Dickson gets personal appeals from farmers will tell him that unless he can send pickers or harvesters at once the crops will be lost.

To waste now one pound of cotton, or rice, or wheat, or one ear of corn, or one stalk of sugar cane is criminal. Would it surprise you to know that Capt. Dickson listens every day to two scores tales of woe and then the helping hand he holds out to the distressed is declined by more than half of those who seek it. It puzzles him. Packers' Profits Are Regulated

The public should understand that the profits of the packers have been limited by the Food Administration since November 1, 1917. For this purpose, the business of Swift & Company is now divided into three classes:

Class 1 includes such products as beef, pork, mutton, oleomargarine and others that are essentially animal products. Profits are limited to 9 per cent of the capital employed in these departments, (including surplus and borrowed money), or not to exceed two and a half cents on each dollar of sales.

Class 2 includes the soap, glue, fertilizer, and other departments more or less associated with the meat business. Many of these departments are in competition with outside businesses whose profits are not limited. Profits in this class are restricted to 15 per cent of the capital employed.

Class 3 includes outside investments, such as those in stock yards, and the operation of packing plants in foreign countries. Profits in this class are not limited.

Total profits for all departments together in 1918 will probably be between three and four per cent on an increased volume of sales.

The restrictions absolutely guarantee a reasonable relation between live stock prices and wholesale meat prices, because the packer's profit cannot possibly average more than a fraction of a cent per pound of product.

Since the profits on meat (Class 1) are running only about 2 cents on each dollar of sales, we have to depend on the profits from soap, glue, fertilizer (Class 2, also limited) and other departments, (Class 3) to obtain reasonable earnings on capital.

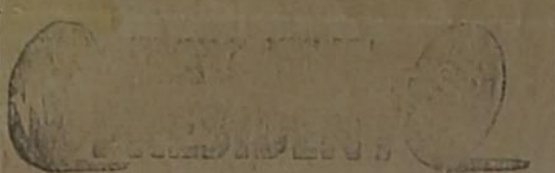
