There is a move now being made to tax abstract books, the question coming up between an owner of a set of Abstract books and the Commissioners Court of Hill county. The question involved being whether or not these books are "personal property of commercial value."

Brownwood, Tex., July 17.—San Saba and Llano are after a road from Fredericksburg to Brownwood and, so well succeeding, they have Northern capitalists interested in such a proposition and will at the proper time ask Brownwood what she will do toward bringing the proposed new road into a reality. Brownwood is keeping her eye on the proposition, realizing it will open up a very rich country and will mean much to the town. When the proper time arrives she will be ready to do her part in securing the road.—Dallas News.

We may get run over yet, but we are ready to do our best. The road that penetrates this valley, and gets the traffic of our cattle and cotton crop will find a valuable trade from the start.

It is astonishing what ignorance is exhibited by some of those editors proposing to enlighten their readers on the tariff question. For instance the editor of the Brownwood Bulletin looked wise and announces that if the price of tablets to school children is increased this year the people may understand that it is on account of the increase of the tariff on paper. Rot! The tariff on paper has been \$6 a ton all the time and the senate reduced that to \$4 a ton, the

house proposing to make it \$2, so that tablets would be cheaper if there was any difference. And how much would it affect the price of a tablet, anyway? Not the tenth part of a copper cent. Isn't it about time such editors were going way back where they can sit down? Or else they should be bored for the simples.—Hamilton Herald.

Look out for the Santa Fe

Brownwood thought for a long time that she had the Santa Fe cut-off, but Coleman knows now that she is in possession of that muchly coveted prize. And who knows but what Brady will some day be on the main Santa Fe line. If the Santa Fe system owns the Texas Central and it is said it does would it not be reasonable to suppose that they would fill the gap from Coleman to Llano and there intersect the Texas Central? By building this gap and a short line in south Texas they would have almost an airline from Texico to the Gulf.

President Ripley in one of his communications to Gov. Campbell said that their intention is to get a short line to the Gulf and not to enter undeveloped territory. Brady is destined to be on one of the biggest railroad systems in the country and a through line at that.—Brady Enterprise.

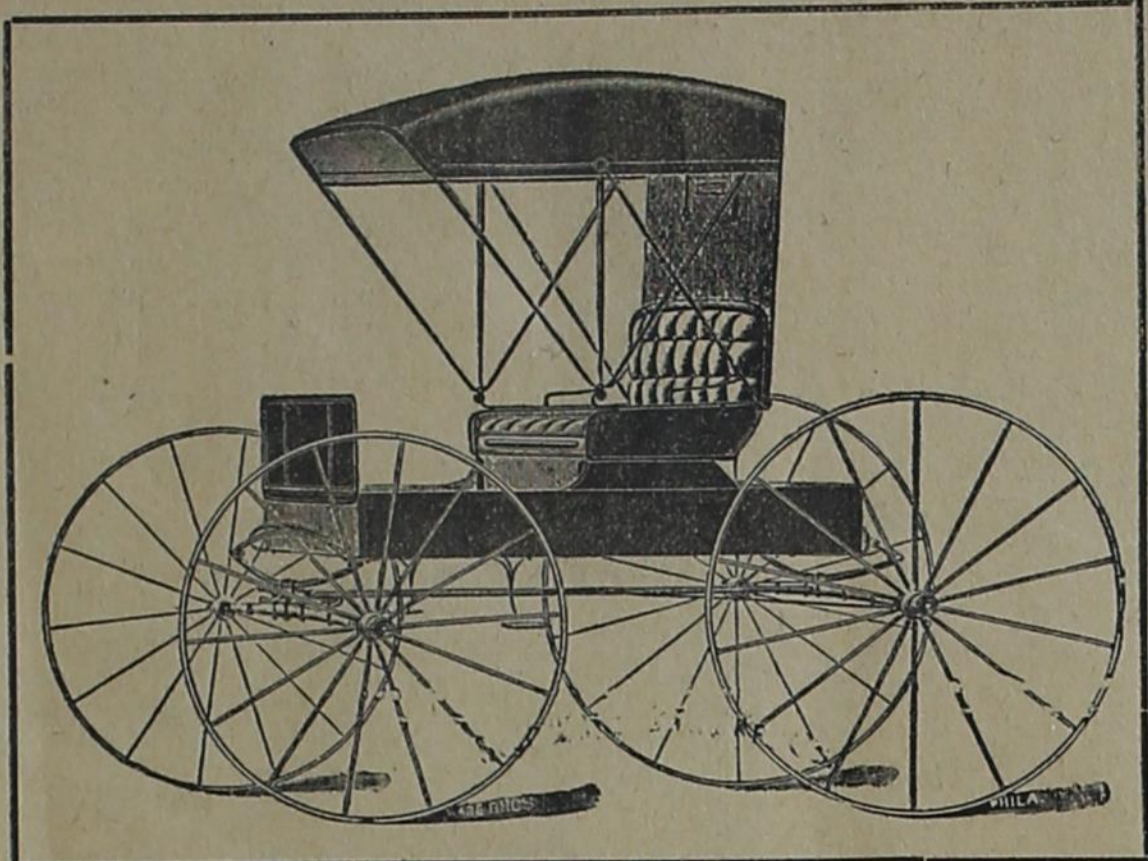

Remember the Great Lot sale of the Lindley addition July 28th Conducted by him of State fame, one Rufus J. Lackland. Now is the chance to secure a lot cheaper than you can ever get. The copper sulfate (common blue stone) by suspending in a sack in wooden vessel containing 1 gallon of hot water. Slack the lime in another vessel. The slacking should be done slowly, otherwise it is apt to be granular. Pour the copper sulfate solution in the spraying tank or other vessel large enough to hold 10 gallons. Add 4 gallons of water then add the slacked lime, pouring slowly and stirring at the same time; then add the required quantity of water to make 10 gallons. Note particularly that the lime should not be added to the sulfate solution until ready to use. This mixture is for spraying for fungous diseases such as mildew, rust, leaf bright, etc.

ARSENATE OF LEAD

Acetate of Lead 3 ounces.
Arsenate of Soda 1 ounce
Water 12 gallons
Dissolve the acetate of lead in

No Fair For Llano.

The directors of the Llano Fair association, owing to extreme dry weather have decided to hold no fair for this season, hence Llano will be fairless.

Arsenate of lead will not injure the tenderest foliage and is the best known arsenical poison with which to spray plants for chewing insects.

KEROSENE EMULSION.

Kerosene 1-2 gallon.
Rain Water 7 gallons.
Soap, (whale-oil preferred) 2 ozs.
Dissolve the soap in small pieces by boiling; take from the fire while boiling hot, pour in the kerosene and churn until the mixture is a creamy mass; then add 6 1-2 gallons of water and it is ready for use. It is better to apply on a bright day so that the evaporation will be rapid; occasionally slight injury may result during damp, cloudy weather. This mixture is to be used to kill insects that feed by sucking.

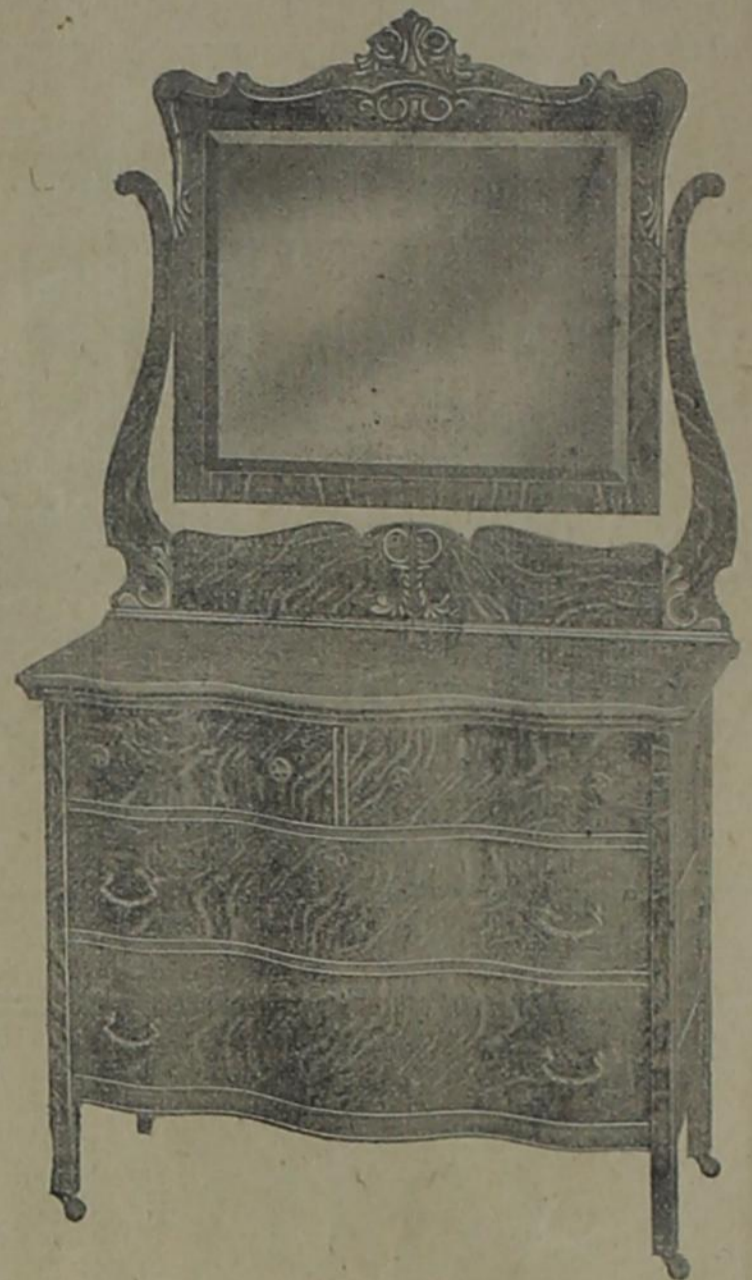

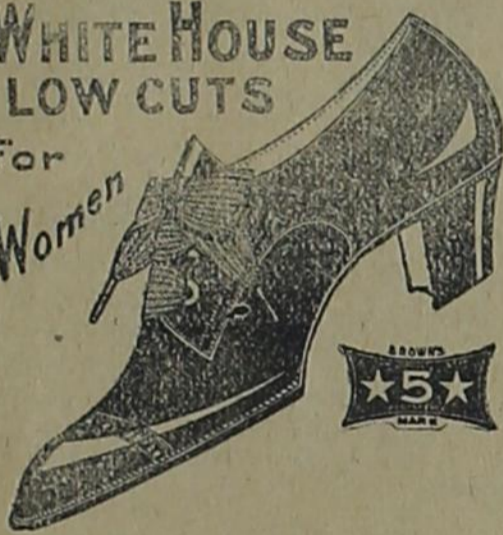

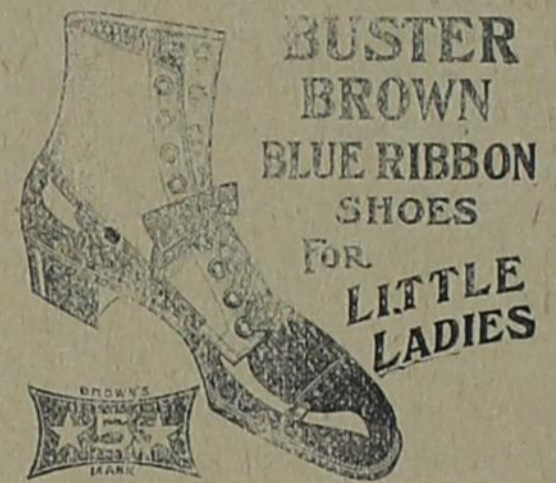

Irrigation

Signers are coming in very slow, there being only about 3000 acres contracted. We have tried heretofore to explain the necessity of rapid work in this matter. We are told that this 20000 acers should be contracted by Aug. 1st. It will take until Sept. 1st to close up the deal. All arrangements should be made by that time so that the plant can be put in operation for next year. There is no use in delaying. If you want this valley irrigated come in and sign up. Read the articles by Kelley & Burlason elsewhere in this issue. They explain.

Let us not permit this matter to drag along and die a slow natural death caused by neglect and carelessness, but rather let us meet these contracts and send

them back at once signed up. Then it will be up to them to go to work or pull down. We need irrigation. Let's get it while we can

To The Land Owners of San Saba Valley.

Gentlemen: As most of you know, we have been at work to get some plan by which we can secure water sufficient to irrigate the high valleys on both sides of the San Saba river below Doran's for nearly 20 years. Up to this time, from one cause or another, the various plans have failed. In the first place the parties did not have a clear view of the magnitude of the undertaking; their estimates ran from \$125,000 to \$360,000. These plans would have been failures had they been put in at such prices. The estimates by Messrs Field and Schuyler are \$1,225,000 at the lowest, with a possibility of reaching \$1,500,000. With this we get a reservoir and dam sufficient to store water to irrigate from 75,000 to 100,000 acres of land.

We have a contract as favorable to the land owner as we could possibly secure, and upon which men with the money would finance the undertaking. This is the very best we were able to do, and compared with the cost of other irrigation systems in Texas it is favorable to the farmer.

In the Rio Grande country near Brownsville, the land in the brush costs \$60 to \$100 per acre and from \$6 to \$10 per annum, for water. This is the report made by Mr. A. J. Wise, of Richland Springs, who has just returned from Brownsville.

The great advantage of the present plan is that at the termination of the contracts in 15 years the entire plant is turned over to the farmers in the valley and we believe that in 10 years, or sooner, the farmers who contract and irrigate will be so prosperous that they can and will pay up their water rights and take over the entire plant; then it will only cost them the maintenance charge. This we had specially put in the contracts.

We are now ready to take contracts at our office and when we can secure 22,000 acres the work of construction will soon commence and water will be furnished in time for the crop of 1910. We need not submit arguments to show the advantages of irrigation in this valley. It is no longer experiment. The difference between an average of 20 bu. of corn to the acre for dry land and of 60 bu. for irrigated land, is about the rule.

Some parties have figured the total cost to them per acre, which is about \$85.20, principal and interest, for 15 years. They fail to calculate the value of 40 bu. of corn at 50 cents that they make over the dry land crop. This will leave them the 20 bu. per acre for home use and \$20.00 per acre for the surplus 40 bu. they make by irrigation. This is \$300 per acre for 15 years. So, after paying \$85.20 per acre for water right, the balance in favor of irrigation is \$214.80 per acre and we are not counting the 20 bu. which we leave for home use. The price per bushel, 50 cents, and the average crop per acre, 60 bushels, is below what experience has shown to be the actual facts and for this illustration we have taken corn which is the cheapest crop and one we are all use to. Mr. Maxwell, with his onions, tomatoes and potatoes, makes a net income of over \$300 per acre. The average cost per acre for 15 years is \$5.68. To this is added the maintenance charge which

can never be over one dollar and is likely to be from 40 to 60 cents.

In conclusion we beg leave to say that we are both over 60 years of age and we cannot visit you at your homes, but will always be found at our office, ready to furnish you with contracts and to explain the same. Terrific Storm Strikes Galveston

Wednesday, July 21st another terrific tropical storm struck the Island City at about 10 o'clock a. m. and raged until 1 p. m. flooding the city with some five or six feet of water, destroying the bathing houses, and wrecking parts of the large bridge. The wind reached a speed of about 65 or 70 miles per hour. Some lower parts of the city were flooded and considerable damage done to property, but at the present writing there is no reports of lives lost. The telegraph and telephone wires are down and communication was cut off. This gave rise to the report that Galveston was destroyed, but it was later learned that the damage is comparatively small, and will soon be repaired. This was mild as compared with the storm of 1898 when the wind

SCHOOL NOTES.

At the meeting of the school Board to pass on plans for the new building there were five Architects present. Their plans were gone over and careful and fair consideration given to each. The building, plans etc. submitted by C. H. Page & Bro. of Austin was conditionally selected, but some details are to be brought up before the contract is final.

The building selected is to be a two story stone structure with ample basement, and steam heated throughout, auditorium with gallery that pupils may reach the auditorium from first or second floor without ascending or descending stairs. The seating capacity of the auditorium is 800 dimensions 40 by 64ft. The building is 158 feet by 97 feet, ceilings 13 feet, basement 9 feet. Walls, basement 24 inches, first story 21 inches second story 17 inches.

The building shows a beautiful structure finished latest and best material and trimmed in modern style.

There are to be 14 class rooms 22ft. by 32ft. with sufficient seating capacity to comfortably seat 600 to 740 pupils.

There will be superintendents office, plunder rooms, shop rooms, and toilet rooms.

The whole building completed will cost approximately \$35,000 and will be a beauty. It will be furnished and equipped from top to bottom with new modern furniture with science apparatus and fixtures.

So soon as the bonds are approved and sold the contracts will be let.
