He introduced an entirely new point in his argument here yesterday when he quoted the educational records of former Governor James Stephen Hogg and Charles Culberson.

"They quote Hogg on the subject of education," he remakred, "so looked up the record to see what Hogg did along these lines. I find that he approved an appropriation of \$47,000 for the University for two years to Culberson and he struck out \$2500 of it and then he struck out \$5000 for books for the library on the ground that the appropriation had increased \$16,000 in two years and that was going too fast.

ANY INTERSTATE MOVEMENT IS HELD TO BE UNLAWFUL

Washington, July 14. - Instrucprovision of the last postoffice bill forbids every form of interstate transportation of liquor into the dry territory, whether by common carrier, private conveyance, in baggage or on te person. The carrier or shipper may be prosecuted in any district from, through or into which the liquor is transported, and as to the prohibition against carriage of liquor on the person, attention of attorneys is directed to the case of the United States against Chavez, in 228 U.S.

The policy under the "bone dry" provision will apply to interstate trans portation into a dry locality in local option States, providing the law of the States prohibits in such dry locality the manufacture or sale of liquor for beverage purposes.

### EXPERTS SAY TEXAS WILL PRODUCE THESE CROPS.

Here is the estimate of Texas crops for 1917, compiled by the Bureau of Crop Estimates, Department of Agriculture, and issued through the Weather Bureau of Houston:

Corn, 97,000,000 busnels. Wheat, 15,300,000 bushels. Oats, 37,200,000 bushels. Rice, 7,500,000 bushels. Potatoes, 2,940,000 bushels. Sweet Potatoes, 6,430,000 bushels. Hay, 784,000 tons. Peaches, 2,250,000 bushels. Cotton, 3,560,000 bales. Kaffir Corn, 27,000,000 bushels.




