WHAT HAS BECOME OF THAT rattling of dry bones about the University of Texas which Governor Ferguson promised. We are waiting patiently for the "music of the bones."

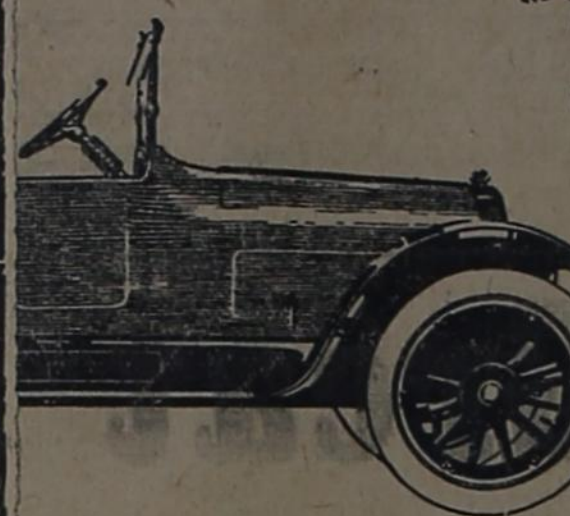

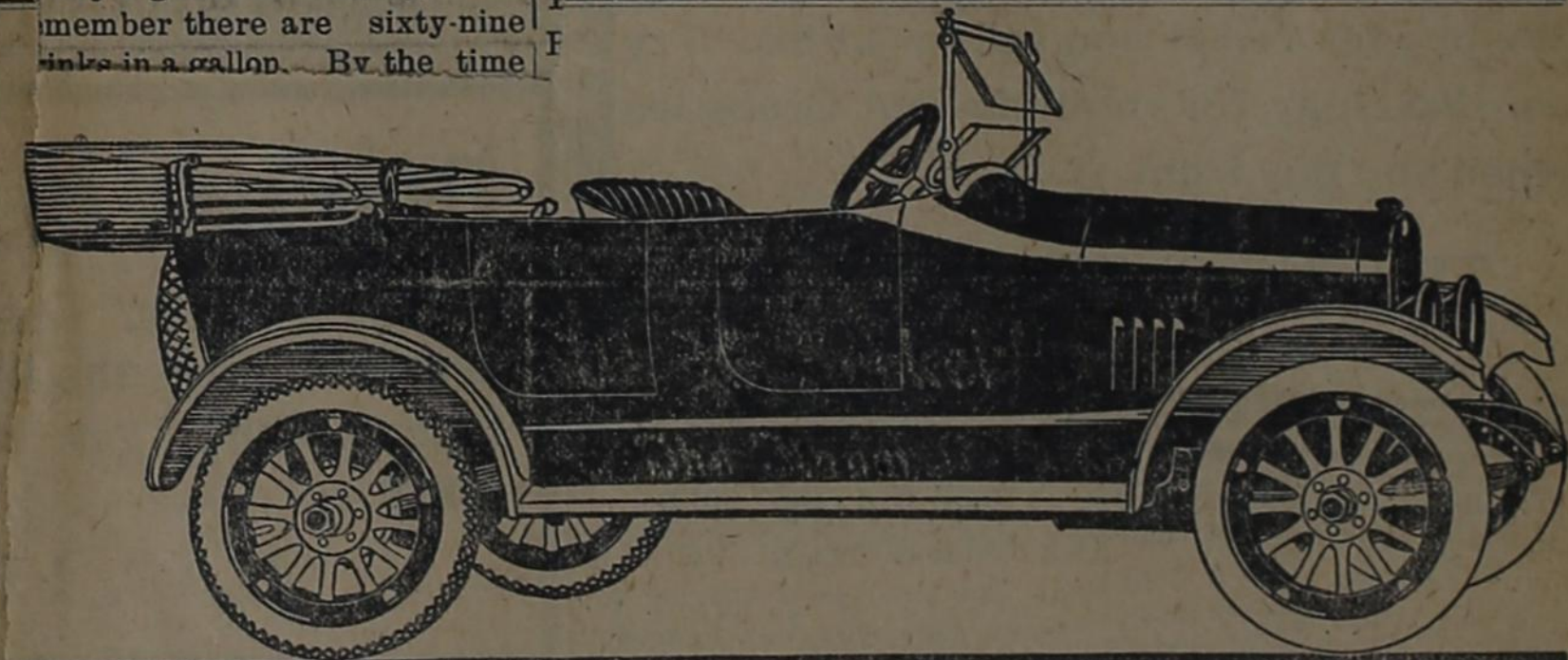

Democrats Carry Solid South and are Gaining in the West. Ohio for Wilson.

Incomplete election returns up to 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon show Wilson and Huges running neck and neck.

A message to Simmons Drug Store from the Temple Telegram says the latest Associated Press dispatch gives Wilson elected by a majority of 22 electoral votes. This report covers the returns to 11:35 a. m. and gave a total of 288 votes for Wilson, and 266 will elect.

The headquarters of both Democratic and Republican parties are still claiming everything and there is in fact nothing definite.

A telegram from A. Wilson Lincoln at Boston, Mass., sent at 11:45 Tuesday night to A. R. Hill said "Huges elected. Carried New York and Illinois. Congress also won by republicans.

There has been no interest whatever taken in the state and county elections. The democratic nominees of the July primary are all elected in this county, tho as we go to press there is no information obtainable as to the number of votes cast in the county.

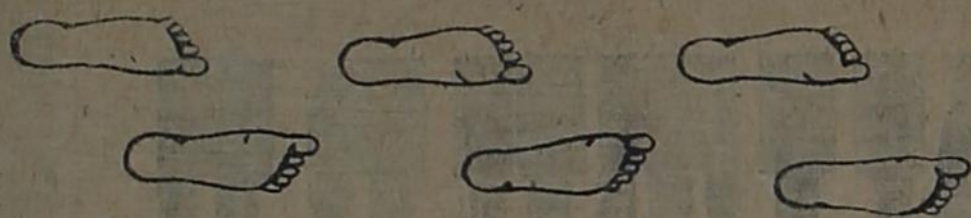

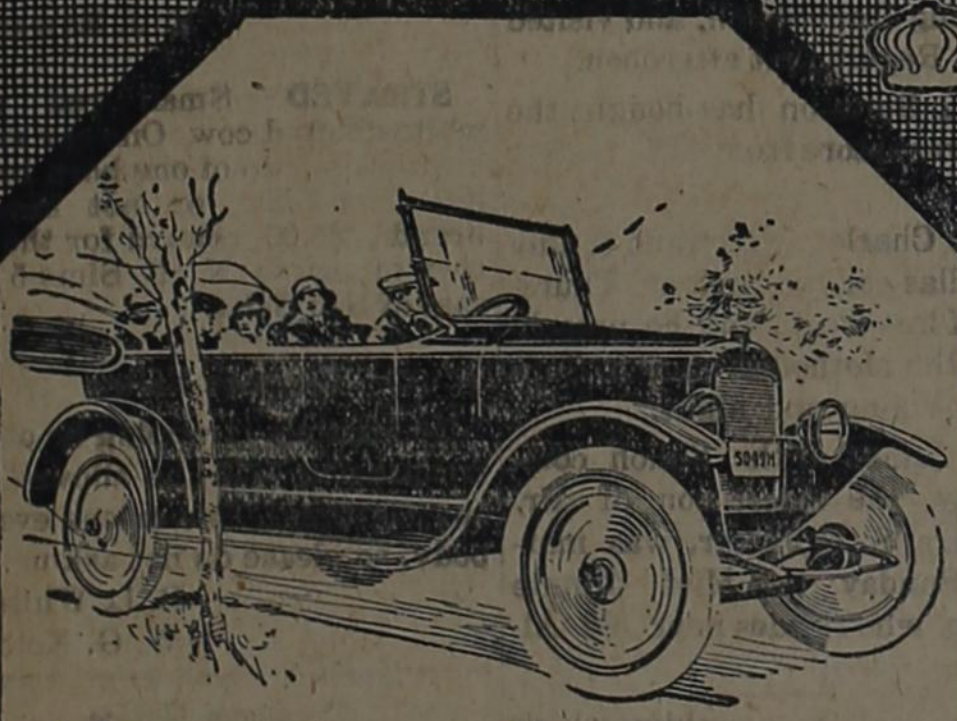
