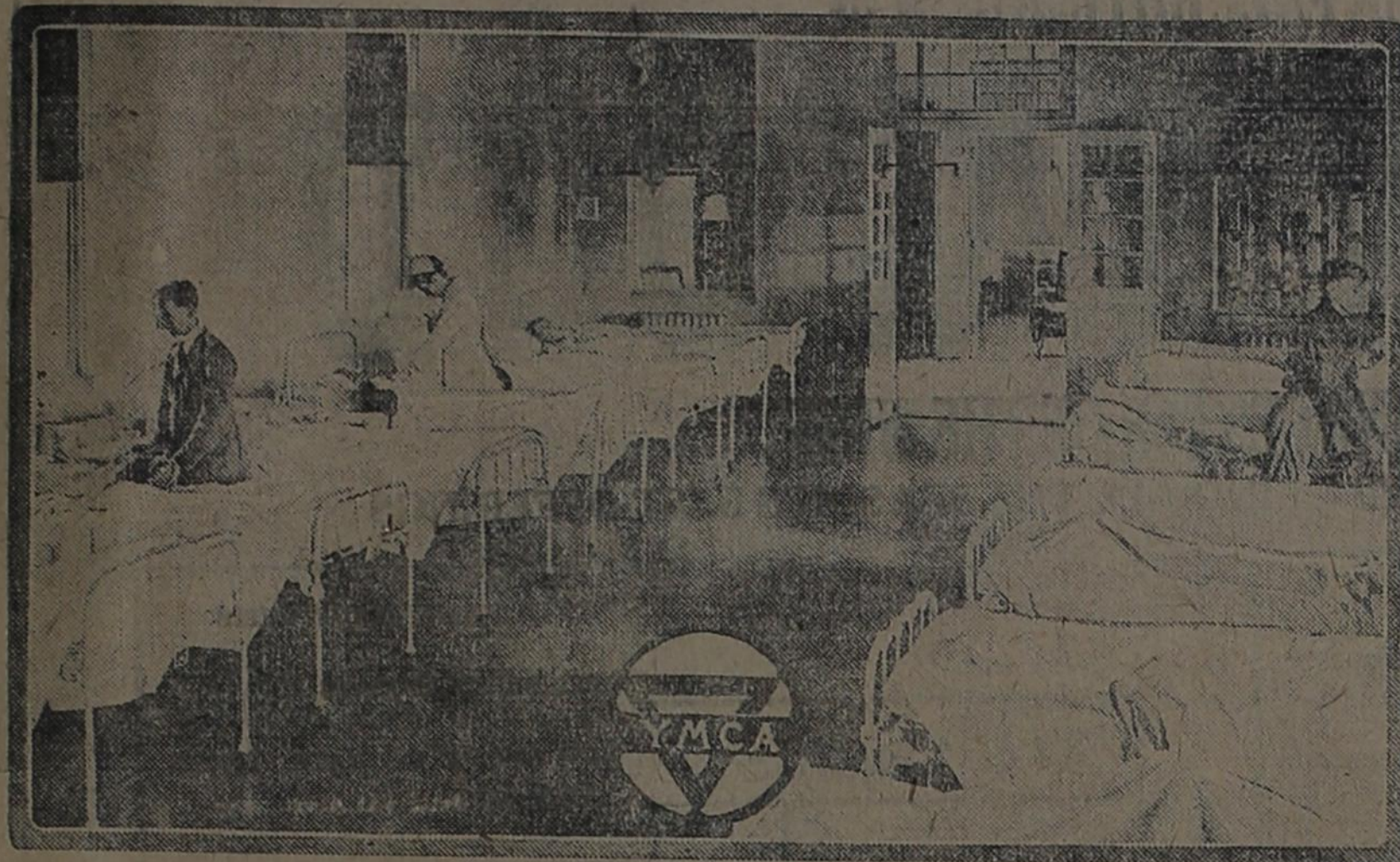

## AT THE BASE HOSPITAL, FT. SAM HOUSTON



Clean white beds, the very best of attention from the surgeons and nurses, and plenty of cheer-up consideration from the Army Y. M. C. A. secretaries make confinement at the base hospital as attractive as illness or injury can be made. Mothers and other relatives and friends with their beloved soldiers in the hospital can find comfort in the fact that their boys are not being neglected. The "Y" man supplements the regular ministrations of the military and the Red Cross with frequent and regular visits, bringing books, writing the patient's letters, and complying with his every wish as nearly as it is possible for him to do so. The Y. M. C. A. secretary in the picture is making his regular afternoon visit at the base hospital, distributing books to the soldiers.

When the soldiers reach the convalescent period, the "Y" furnishes movies, entertainment, and music for the convalescing soldiers.

## BULLETIN OF SELECTION BOARD

1. Since the issuance of the latest bulletin the following registrants, all of the Class of September, 1918, have been individually inducted into the Students' Army Training Corps: Turner Richard Johnston, San Saba, University of Texas; William Morton Moore, San Saba, A. & M. College; Denver Howard Skelton and Benjamin Oliver Timberlake, San Saba, Howard Payne College, Brownwood; and Nelson Webster Gay, Cherokee, Southern Methodist University, Dallas. As stated in last week's bulletin, the 15th instant will be the last day that individual induction orders relative to students may be issued.

2. Call No. A-1427 for white, men, who registered before September 12, 1918, has been received, draftees under such call to be sent to Camp Mabry, Texas, where they will receive special instruction and training in auto mechanics. The quota for this county is one man. The voluntary period under such call closes on the 12th instant. Any registrant of this jurisdiction who is a white man qualified for general military service and who has had at least four years of grammar school education and who has some aptitude for mechanical work and some experience in auto mechanics and who registered before the 12th ultimo and who desires to be inducted under the call in question should file his application at once. A registrant in a deferred class must file with his application a waiver of all claims for deferred classification. Calls of the kind in point have been issued frequently during the past year and they afford exceptional opportunities for qualified men. There are always more men offering themselves for induction under such calls than are needed, and when any given Board cannot fill its quota, the deficiency is promptly absorbed by other Boards. The public is requested to give all the publicity possible to such calls as they are bulletinized by us, in order that all deserving registrants meeting the qualifications may be given the opportunity to apply for induction.

3. Any white registrant of the Class of September, 1918, who is qualified to enter the State University as a sophomore, junior, or senior, and who can pass the physical examination for general military service, and who should like to take training for a commission in the Marine Corps, is hereby directed to confer with this Board without delay.

## Notice To Teachers And Warning By U. S. Employment Service

Summary of Flag Law, Effective March 30 1918 Teachers Daily programs shall contain at least 10 minutes to the teaching of lessons in intelligent patriotism including the needs of the State and Federal Government, the duty of the citizen to the State and the obligation of the State to the Citizens.

The Board of Trustees of Common and Independent School Districts shall provide a suitable United States Flag for their several Districts, said flag to be paid for out of the funds of the district.

The State Superintendent shall give to the County Superintendents and Superintendents of Independent Districts the necessary instructions as to the enforcement of the law and it is the duty of said superintendents to see that the provisions of the law are enforced, and no Superintendent as above mentioned shall approve vouchers in the payment of any account until the provisions of this law have been complied with in every particular.

Any official or employee failing to comply with the requirements of this law shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined in the sum of not more than \$500.00 or removal from office or both.

The above summary of the "Flag Law" will be sufficient for patriotic and resourceful teachers and school officials. Later this office will publish suggestive programs for the use of teachers. We now have in the office a number of flags which can be had at prices ranging from \$3.60 to \$6.10 each. Don't delay in complying with the requirements of this law. Begin to-day.

## Government Agents Taking Census Of Available Labor.

(From The Brownwood Bulletin)

Mr. A. S. Harris, representing the U. S. Employment Service in the capacity of traveling examiner, began Tuesday a canvass for the purpose of making a correct census in Brownwood of the available supply of labor for war work. Mr. Harris is acting under the instructions of the Community Labor Board and the Chief Examiner of the U. S. Employment Service. This census will be taken also in Bangs, Blanket, Zephyr, May and other points in the county.

The canvass as explained by Capt. Dickson, is not for the purpose of enrolling anyone but is in compliance with an order from Federal Director Lewis to ascertain the available supply of labor to be had, so as to be ready to furnish such quotas as are needed when the regular call is made.

A full report of this canvass will be made to the Federal Director for Texas for his guidance of allotment of quotas. The Government is badly in need of men for war work and is compelled to resort to this canvass to obtain them. Men will be taken from non-essential occupations where women can be substituted for men.

Rev. Z. V. Liles will leave Monday for Austin to attend the annual conference which is to be held in the University Methodist church in the city the following week.

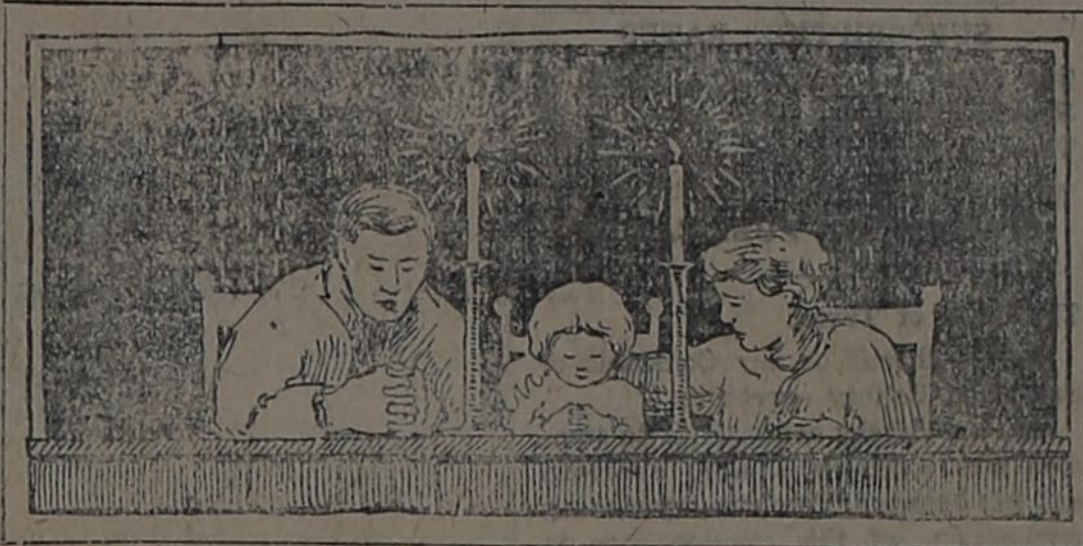

"We return thanks to THEE, ALMIGHTY GOD, for these bounteous gifts which Thou art about to bestow upon us."

It is a simple prayer, and still on the lips of millions who have not divorced themselves from normal dreams and normal goals; though I take it that the words do not ascend as freely today in an abundantly blessed Texas as they did in the days before the soul became distracted with automatic and mechanical things. Certainly where ever pride has been laid low, sorrow has cast its mantle over the cradle and the marriage bed; and want and destruction have entered the house and the utterance does sometimes well again to the distressed, remembering of bread the drinker of the cup of milk, and the contentment in a bit of meat—man's dependence upon something more than himself.

I cannot believe that the Belgians hold for America something akin to D-Day, and that the French, in throwing flowers upon our boys, throw them with the same sense of a something religious that they place flowers before the altars of their cathedrals; and when our men marched through French towns—there was surely the feeling that there walked through them a visible presence, which was the culmination of the prayers of English Catholics and Protestants.

In the face of such things as most of us are—only remotely in touch with the world's business and suffering across the seas, it seems to me (and so it should seem to everyone) that all these requests and admonitions to save and improve are unnecessary. The mere knowledge that a French Peasant will hold his head over their head in thanksgiving for what we have sent him, is a "good without" seems to me the greatest conceivable comfort. As for the poultry business of "going without." We seem an arduous lot, from the viewpoint, nor do I see why a multiplicity of maiming, shattering and killing are required to intensify the fact that frugality during these times is a magnificent privilege, rather than bovine acceptance of an obligation.

### Secretary Houston Did Not Say 25 Cents For Cotton

The following letter has been received by County Agent Elrod from his Chief in the United States Department of Agriculture. The letter is itself explanatory.

"Washington, D. C. Sept. 27 1918.— A statement concerning cotton price fixing appeared in a Washington paper on Saturday to the effect that it was understood that Secretary Houston had expressed the opinion that 25 cents would be a fair price for this years cotton. This statement, and any other statement that may have been made purporting to represent the views of Secretary Houston as to the price of cotton, if any is to be fixed, is utterly without foundation. The Secretary has expressed no opinion as to the price for cotton.

Please do everything in your power to give circulation to the correct statement above. It is inconceivable that anyone would publish such a false statement except with the deliberate intention of injuring the Department.
