A very noticeable and public demonstration of how very dry it is in San Saba and surrounding country, was that Friday evening, on the main thoroughfare, when a tire ran off the "water wagon"—or the street sprinkler, as this object of keeping down the dust was making its regular rounds.

The street sprinkler in San Saba is kept going from early in the morning until late evening, and it would be presumed that in its almost continuous contact with the water that the tires on the wheels would never need the attention of a blacksmith, but this drouth has caused miracles.

There are men in this town who by this one incident have vowed they will never get on the "water wagon" again because it's sure to "run dry" and fall from under them,—but some of their closest friends say the drouth has only "trumped" over their appetites.

### HOUSTON LAWYER DIES IN BALTIMORE HOSPITAL AFTER LONG ILLNESS

Ernest Wildbahn Townes, member of the law firm of Townes & Vinson, died Monday morning at 3 o'clock at the Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore. He had been East for several weeks on account of ill health. His condition became serious more than a week ago and his death was not unexpected. His father, Judge John C. Townes, dean of the law department of the University of Texas, his wife and other members of the family who have been with him for 10 days were at his bedside when the end came.

The funeral party will reach Houston Wednesday and the funeral will be held Thursday. The hour and other details will be announced later.

Mr. Townes was a native of Austin. He was born November 25, 1875, and was educated first at Webb's School at Bell Buckle, Tenn., where he graduated in 1895, preparatory to entering the University of Texas. He was graduated from the latter institution with the degree of bachelor of arts in 1898 and in 1900 with the degree of bachelor of laws. Mr. Townes comes from a long line of distinguished advocates and jurists and his success at the bar has been very marked. He was a finished scholar and a thorough lawyer. He was recognized as one of the leaders among the younger members of the Houston Bar. Before coming to Houston he practiced for a time at Austin and Beaumont. He was a member of the Houston Club and various other organizations and societies in Houston.

A meeting of the Harris County Bar Association has been called for Tuesday morning in Judge Ashe's courtroom to take suitable action on the death of Mr. Townes. When the courts adjourned Monday they adjourned out of respect to him.

Mr. Townes is a nephew of Mrs. J. H. Martin. Mrs. Martin is in Austin with relatives and will go from there to Houston to attend the funeral.

### SAN SABA CAMPING PARTY HAS RETURNED

(From Temple Telegram)  
"I wouldn't take a thousand dollars for the trip," declared Charlie Williams yesterday morning. He is the Telegram's machinist operator in charge of type setting machinery and linotyping. Had just returned from an outing in San Saba county. "It is the prettiest scenery I ever saw, has the finest springs and the nice thing about it is the way the people treat you. You can talk to a man two minutes and feel like you had known him always. They are the finest people you ever saw."

Mr. and Mrs. Williams left Temple July 1 in an automobile, going to San Saba by way of Lometa. They went with Mr. and Mrs. Worth Burleson. Mr. Burleson is the local manager for Swift & Company. His parents live in San Saba and were added to the party as it went into camp on the San Saba river on the Berry ranch at a place fifteen miles west of the city.

Monday was spent in reaching and arranging camp, but about sundown on that day these town fishermen wetted their hooks in the cool, clear waters of that beautiful river. They used minnows and artificial bait and caught enough bass, cat and perch for the evening meal. In fact they had all the fish they needed for every meal during their stay but they did not land as many bass as they expected—owing to the light of the moon. Charley declares that he caught twenty-five perch in twenty-five minutes.

Tuesday afternoon the party had forty minutes of real camp life when a rain storm, accompanied by hail, caught the entire party unprepared. The wetting they received proved only a pleasant memory and constituted a story to tell of how Williams tried to keep the tent stakes in the ground and Burleson anchored the car on the truck rods to be dug out the next day.

The party went over to Doran's ranch and tried the fishing there on Friday but the moon was still shining at night. All lands and fishing places were posted and it was through the kindness of the owners that suitable camping and fishing grounds were available.

July 4 was celebrated in an amusing way. Russell Burleson flushed an armadillo and tried to catch it, but the armoured vermint escaped in the weeds.

The party had made no arrangements for camping site when they arrived at San Saba and owe the pleasure of their visit to Dr. Clay Berry, who went with them to his ranch and stayed with them part of the time. Buster Berry was also added to the party in camp. Mr. Williams had the pleasure of meeting

Mayor W. A. Smith, editor of the San Saba News, but did not meet W. D. Cowan of the Star. Mr. Smith has a fine plant, with an up to the minute linotype machine. He assisted the other people of that community in making converts of the visiting party, all of whom would like to go to San Saba to live.

The trip was made with only one puncture to the tires and that was made just out of Temple on the outgoing trip. Dinner was taken at the camping grounds at Lampasas on the way to San Saba. Coming home, dinner was taken at Sulphur Springs in San Saba, where there is a nice swimming pool fenced with concrete. The trip home was made in six hours, with a heavy load.

This story has been told thus far for the purpose of introducing the scenery for the following: Charlie was told of a slough where the fishing was good. He went to the place and cast to the far side, a distance of about fifty feet, using fly bait. He caught a bass that fought him for five minutes. Later he whipped the stream with a dowgiac. Just as he was taking the bait out of the water a bass struck it with such force as to catch on the hooks and carry line and all up on to the bank—thus spoiling an opportunity for the fisherman to play with the fish before taking it out of the water.
