Sailor Boy Writes Home

U. S. S. New York.
 Firth of Forth, East Coast of Scotland, near Edinburg, Scotland.
 November 28, 1918.

Miss Elva Langham,
 Dear Sister:
 Will answer your letter which I got several days ago. I have changed my letter heading a bit, tho I am where I spent quite a lot of my 4 months in foreign waters.

It was 70 miles east, or northeast of here that we met the German fleet the 21st of November and from here our ships received all orders, as this was the headquarters of Sir Admiral Beatty in command of the Grand Fleet, of which our 5 ships were a part (the sixth squadron.)

We made two trips from here across the North sea to the German coast, and backed mine layers which planted mines all around their harbors. And I went to the Orkney Islands once, besides coming by them in July on the Arkansas. We were there the 1st of October and went nearly up to the Shetland Islands. Then we were in Lat. 60 degrees which compares with the Nelson River in Canada on Sitka, Alaska, not but 7 degrees below the Arctic Circle. I would like to go on further north to the land o' the midnight sun which we read about in geography. And the sun didn't set in Orkneys July 26th until 10.10 p. m. and rose about 2:30 or 3:00 a. m. It never got dark there.

Well I went ashore yesterday. Went to our little 4-hour Liberty town, Dumfermline, Scotland, tho I had all day.

Guess it was my last liberty in Blighty Scotland as we are to sail for Southern England Saturday, 30th, to meet the President. Hope we get to land at Calias, France, or go to Brest. I think we are to stop at Portsmouth a week or so. Guess we will go to London. I hope I do. But most of all I want to see New York City and I'm sure it won't be long. Did you all get the big picture of the ship's crew, or the little group picture?

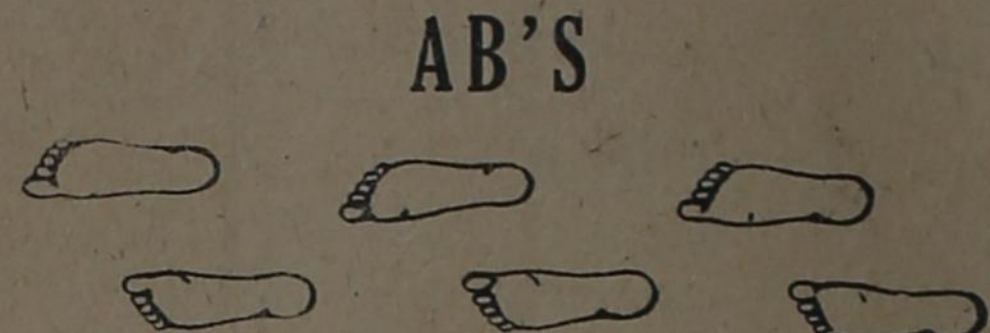
Tommie Owen Writes Of Trip.

November 23: Dear Father and Mother I will now write you all a letter about my trip over here. The ship we came on brought about 2,700 of us soldiers. We came by Liberty. Set sail July 31 and were on the boat 24 hours before we sailed. We had a big submarine battle on the morning of August 10 about six o'clock. We were all lined up going to breakfast when the battle began. I never even got excited over it. They gave the alarm for all to come on top. The boys went down stairs and stole all of the breakfast while the battle was on with the sub. So you see the danger we were all in and didn't get afraid—breakfast was what we wanted. We battled with those submarines for 19 hours. How do you like that. I didn't get excited, but believe me I sure did get sea sick the second day out. Was sick three days. There was one day I would not have cared if the ship had sunk. We had three battles on the way over. They shot all around us. They shot at us and missed the end of the boat about 30 feet. That was close, but a miss was good as a mile. I didn't hardly realize we were in a battle. After 19 hours we won it and our deck was under water nearly all the time. I began to think we never would see land again, were on the boat 15 days. We landed in France on August 12 and sure were glad to see land again. We had one cruiser, eight chasers and nine convoys and father we met a merchandise ship and those little cruisers would go running up and do just like a real bull that wants to fight. They kinder turn sideways and blow a whistle that makes the hair stand up on your head. They raise up on their tail and then run and they sure split the water, believe me.

When we landed we kicked about 5 miles full pack to a place that was named rest camp, but we had to work day and night, we built roads in the day and worked on the docks every night unloading ships. Stayed there about two weeks in the dirt and dust in our little "Pup Tents" and we had to carry all we eat about 3 miles and carry wood and water. We couldn't get outside without an officer with us. And we had to go three miles to take a bath. Didn't get to take but one. No place to wash face or clothes had one little canteen of water a day. Of course, you see, we didn't drink very much, it was too hard to get. One evening we got orders about sundown to strike tents, so we did, and also rolled our packs to leave. Well we stayed there then until about 2 o'clock that night and then marched out. We kicked it to a little town about 7 miles and got there about daylight. There we were loaded into box cars, 40 men to a car. We were sure crowded and then they gave us our rations for that day and we started out. We rode all day and that night we ran into a town called R..... Here we unloaded and kicked about half a mile and stretched "pup tents". We were all tired and given out. But we found a pool of water and took a bath and washed some clothes, so I did not sleep much that night. Next morning we stood around for awhile and got orders to strike pup tents and move to a new camp. We kicked about 5 miles and came to a town called Haversack and the French people let us go into some of their buildings all over town. They cleared up rooms for us to go into, so we found things pretty good here. Wedrilled pretty hard while we were here, but I never saw the like of blackberries in all my life and we would go out and pick black berries and make pies. And apples, those farms are little 5 acre patches and apple trees all over the field. We stayed at Haversack for three weeks and took a "full pack" hike every day. We were all feeling good. On Sept. 5th we moved to a new camp about 25 miles. My pack weighed about 60 pounds, but before we hiked all day it got to weighing about a hundred. We would hike an hour and rest 15 minutes. I carried my old rifle all the way over here and didn't get to fire a shot with it. So we got to this place on Sept. 6th, that was Friday. So I got to rest on the 7th. It was my birthday. We are still here. This is the best Artillery camp in France. Nothing but artillery here. We have been drilling with the machine guns ever since we got to this camp. I have never been sick a day. This is a healthy country, but understand dear old Texas for me. So don't worry about Tommie. He has gone all of those rounds and is all O. K. so I will close wishing you a happy new year.

This is to certify that I have this day made a careful inspection of the 40 acre field of Mebane Cotton being grown for seed by J. L. F. Pentress near San Saba, Texas.

This cotton is from seed carefully selected by me from year to year for the preceding seven years.

The plants in this field are of a pure strain of Mebane, very uniform and of a stocky well branched type. The bolls are well distributed and closely set to the limbs and are of good size and shape.

The field at this time is very free from Boll Weevil and other insect pests and seems to be free from plant diseases.

This cotton has been grown under irrigation using the least possible amount of water necessary for complete development and the seed will be as well adapted for planting under limited rainfall conditions as under heavier rainfall or irrigation.

Road Tax Petitions.

Petitions, asking the commissioners' court to order an election to determine whether or not there shall be levied a 15 cent road tax in all the county, are being circulated and signed in the various commissioners precincts.

It is understood the petitions will be consolidated and presented to the February term of the court for action.

The commissioners, as road supervisors, now have only the small rate of 3 1-2 cents on the \$100 valuation with which to work and maintain the existing roads and meet the expense of opening new roads and making changes. And this includes not only the upkeep of the public roads, but the necessary repairs and upkeep on all the bridges and culverts in the county.

News came last week of the death of S. J. Kendall at Ingram, Texas. Mr. Kendall was formerly a resident of this county and is well known here.
