REPORT OF THE GRAND JURY FOR THE NO-VEMBER TERM, 1917.

To the Hon. N T. Stubbs, Judge 33rd. Judicial District:-

We, the Grand Jury for the November term, 1917, of your Honorable Court, respectfully submit this our report for said term: We have made careful and dilligent investigation of all matters brought to our attention touching violations of the laws of our State in this County, an have endeavored to present bills of indictment in those instances where there seemed to us to be no question of the necessity for such action.

We have examined a large number of witnesses from all parts of the county and some from other counties, adjoining, and taking everything into consideration we have found the county in a fairly healthy condition, with reference to commission of crime; most of the matters coming before us are of a trivial nature and in this connection we urge upon the county, and city officials to be vigilant in looking after these minor offenses, at all times, to the end that the District Courts and Grand Juries will not be burdened with the trouble and expense of examining into such cases. We appreciate the fact that information along this line - cannot always be obtained by the local officials but the county and other minor officials can be of invaluable assistance to the Grand Juries by taking hold of all such matters and disposing of them promptly, as soon as their attention is brought to the same. 



Close by Byng's men swept over Bourlon wood. Its trees were splintered in the rain of shell fire, its artfully concealed German observation towers shattered and captured.

At Moeuvres the two armies clinched and swayed in the battle. Then the British doggedly battered the enemy lines. They seized German field guns, turned them around and loosed the enemy's own artillery against him. It was no question of accurate range. The guns were aimed point blank at the dense masses of and around San Saba was three-quarthe German gray.

As this is written the enemy is falling back on Pronville, a suburb of Cambrai, fighting desperately, but steadily forced to give way.

Fontaine's blazing ruins are believed now to be no man's land, the desolation.

SAVE THE HOGS

Help for Farmers Is Intention of Administration

Chicago, Nov. 3, 1917. Joseph P. Cotton, chief of the U S. Food Administration meat division, today issued the following statement relative to the prices of hogs:

The main purposes of the Food Administration as to hogs are four: To see that the producer at all times can count on a fair price for his hogs so number of hogs bred, to limit the profit of the packer and the middleman and to eliminate speculation.

All these purposes are necessary because we must have more hogs, so that the ultimate consumer shall at all times get an adequate supply of hogs at the lowest feasible price.

the packer. Fair prices to the farmer for his hogs, we believe, will be brought about by the full control which the Food Administration has over the buying of the Allies, our Army and Navy, the Red Cross, the Belgian Relief and the neutrals, which together constitute a considerable factor in the market.

The first step is to stop the sudden break in prices paid for hogs at the central markets. These prices must become stable so that the farmer knows where he stands, and will feel justified in increasing hogs for next winter. The prices so far as we can affect them will not go below a minimum of about \$15.50 per hundred weight for the average of the packers' droves on the Chicago market until

BRITISH TANKS CLEAR WAY FOR INFANTRY last year.

Ground Was Hard and Offered Easy to prepare the way for the infantry Going for Big Land Monitors.

British.. Army.. Headquarters.. in France, Nov. 21, 10 a. m .- About der of the day, in which he said: 5,000 German prisoners were in the British cages this morning as a result of yesterday's attack in the Cambrai sector and nearly a score of guns were captured.

The British continued the attack today and the troops which had poured through the gaps torn in the Hindenburg line by the tanks were making good progress in opening up the enemy territory south and southwest of Cambrai. Both Havrincourt and Flesquieres are well in the rear of the advancing British, who were pushing on toward Cantaing at the latest reports. Marcoing and Masnieres, south of Cambrai, had been entered and the high ground north of Marcoing, known as Premy Chapelle, had been fought over, the Germans being forced to withdraw.

The Germans this morning appeared to have stiffened their resistance and were reported to be fighting-with more determination on their last line of defense in these parts.

The correspondent early today passed the main Hindenburg line near Harvrincourt. The paths of the tanks through the great mass of barbed wire before this line could be clearly followed. In many places the tanks had torn the obstruction away completely, leaving wide gaps which were entirely free for the troops to pass through. The Germans trenches and dugouts were in a state of confusion, which showed plainly the haste with which the enemy abandoned this famous district

There was very little artillery work on the German side in this section this morning, and No Man's Land, where one would not have dared to show his head yesterday morning, was quiet except for the British consolidated sections. Roads are being pushed through with great speed to keep pace with the advance.

For weeks the process of concenattack had been going on and so carefully had it been done that comparatively few officers in the British army knew what was transpiring. It was a startling move on the part of Field Marshal Haig to open the battle so quickly on a quiet part of the line, far removed from the cockpit of Europe around Ypres. For many months there had been nothing more than occasional raids, with now and then a flurry of artillery fire in the Cambrai sector.

This morning before daybreak the lines were moving along at much the same pace. The unit for classification is the jurisdiction of a local board. The first class in any jurisdiction will meet all calls until it is exhausted, whereupon the second class becomes available.

You have before you a sheet showing the classification that must be accomplished. Without permitting yourselves, for the moment, to be appalled by the magnitude of the task, I ask you to suppose that the 10,000, 000 registrants in the United States have been segregated into these five classes. In CLASS I we shall then have, in every community, immediatey available for military service single men and a few married men whose removal will not disturb the reasonably adequate support of their dependents. In the industrial and agricultural aspect, we shall have segregated into this class, men who have not especially fitted themselves for industrial or agricultural pursuits so that our only incursion into the labor supply will affect but a small percentage of unskilled labor.

One of our friends in Parker county, Texas, who wishes his name withheld, sends the following recipe for curing English breakfast bacon.

Instead of using a box to pack ment in build a platform with one end four inches higher then the other so as to let all fluid matter drain off. in packing middlings let them come as nearly to a point as possible and cover with six weeks take up and wash in warm water and wipe dry with cloth. To a kettle of boiling water add one pound cayenne pepper and two pounds black pepper. Dip meat in this solution and then let dry. After meat has dried hang up and smoke, using hickory sawdust or hisckory wood to smoke with if possible.

It is best to have a close house in which to smoke the meat and when meat begins to sweat and has turned brown it is cured.

Meat cured in this way has a fine flavor and will keep for a long time without becoming strong or rank. The pepper will not injure the flavor, but vill add zest and piquancy to it.







A TRIUMPH FOR DEMOCRACY (From The Public)

Every democrat in the United vantaged of this earth. States must feel enthusiasm over the 95,000 majority returned for woman suffrage by the voters of the State of New York. An adverse majority in 1915 of 194,000, about equally divided between the City and up-State, has melted away, and one of the oldest and supposedly most cynical of American communities has responded to Mr. Wilson's exhortation that America prove the sincerity and depth of its democratic conviction and understanding. Woman suffrage is important, and this victory assures its com ing in the Nation. But more important is the people's realization that the issue of democracy is joined, at home as aborad, that our war slogan must be vindicated in America as well as in France that, in Mr. Wilson's words, "it is a time for the people . . . to show the world that there is no application of democracy which they do not believe in."

The vote was on referendum, procured by the liquer interests, on a statute of the Legislature granting the Presidential suffrage to women. This it was a liquor men's offensive, and they kept it through the campaign. It may also have been a rebuke of the Legislature for undertaking to do for the women what the men voters might perhaps have been willing to do for themselves. > The San Saba Independent School District, a district four miles square with the high school buildings as the center, was incorporated in 1893, and re-incorporated by a special act of the Thirtieth Legislature March 13 1907, for the purpose of levying and collecting a special tax to support and maintain the public schools in the district.

The District has its own trustees (7), assessor, collector and board of equalization and its board of equalivalues accepted by the County or City boards according to the latest city or county of San Saba has nothing to do with the assessing or collecting of the taxes for this District that they have a receipt each year issued and signed by the "Collector of the San Saba Independent School District." Property owners within the District should see that no delinquent taxes are unpaid, as all such taxes are now carrying a low per cent penalty and six per cent interest from the 31st. day of January following the year the taxes were assessed. Purchasers of property should see abstracts should show that all "San Saba Independent School District" taxes are paid, including the present year, as the property is liable for the taxes and limitation does not run against the District for back taxes.
