Lloyd George said Germany would make peace now only on terms which would enable her to benefit by the war. He asserted that would be encouragement to every buccaneering empire in the future to repeat the experiment.

More than twice as many German submarines were lost in the first ten months of this year as in all of last year, the premier asserted. The Britsh tonnage loss monthly now is not much more than one-third of the total destroyed last April.

Allies in Harmony.

London, Oct. 22.-The premier said he had hoped the enemy's terrible power might be broken this year, but that the temporary collapse of the Russian military power had postponed this hope. But time was on the side of the allies, he said. Time once was neutral, but two things had changed this-namely, the advent of America and the increasing failure of the German submarine war.

The allies were working in the greatest harmony, the premier continued. He said they were on the eve of the most important inter-allied conference ever held, at which for the first time representatives of America and of the Russian democthe conference meant to determine the ultimate issue of the war.

Lloyd George said that "Boloism" in all its shapes and forms should be looked out for.

"Beware of people who try to sow dissension, distrust and suspicions," will win."







Your banker will take your check for 2 per cent of the amount of the bond you decide to purchase. The remaining payments will be made s follows

Eighteen per cent on Nov. 15, 1917. Forty per cent on Dec. 15, 1917. Forty per cent on Jan. 15, 1918. You can pay in full at time of value of \$1,000 if you wish.

If you care to pay for your bond in full at the time of application you can have your bond by about Oct. 10. If you pay by installments you will receive your bond as soon as you have finished paying for it.

The bonds are free from Federal, State or local taxes. In the case of wealthy people who pay income surtaxes, and hold bonds of over \$5,000, there is a small tax, but as far as the average man is concerned they are tax free.

The interest on the bonds is 4 per cent, payable to you on May 15 and Nov. 15 each year.

The bonds may be redeemed by

PEASANT WITH SHOTGUN CAPTURED ZEP CREW Pourbonne, Les Bains, France, Oct.

22.—The L.-49, the only Zeppelin to fall into the hands of the allies intact, struck its colors to the shotgun of a local workman named Boiteaux. Lieutenant La Fargue of the "Crocodile" escadrille winged the Zeppelin, forcing it to land. About 9:30 o'clock Saturday morning Roiteaux was walking in a field with a dog and gun when he heard the sound of motors. He looked up and saw the Zeppelin surrounded by airplanes, which were peppering it. The monster was flying ery slow and very low. Suddenly the lows dipped into a clump of trees and the airship came to a standstill, subsiding gently across a narrow ravine n the bottom of which ran a brook.

"Immediately," said Roiteaux, "the nineteen men of the crew clambored to the ground. The last to leave, who I afterward found was the captain, lined them up in good order and said something to them, probably his last instructions. He then fired a pistol into the envelope.

"I at once grasped that he was intending to set fire to the Zeppelin and determined to stop him at any cost. I was about thirty yards away from him. I loaded my gun with buckshot and shouted:

"Stop that or I will do some shoot-

"The threat was enough, the captain dropped his gun, threw up his hands and cried: 'Kamerad, Kamerad.' The men remained perfectly crowd collected, when they were put under a good guard. The captain seemed furious at his fate, but the men seemed enchanted with the ad-

Washington, Oct. 22 .- It was officially announced today that the American destroyer which had an engagement in the war zone with a German submarine and got to port under her own steam after being damaged was the United States ship

The Cassin was torpedoed while on patrol duty on Tuesday, Oct. 16. Gunner, Mate Osmond Kelley Ingram of Pratt City, Ala., was killed by being blown overboard by the explosion and his body never was recovered. Five others were injured, but not serious-



And there is the further assumption that if land could be gotten free of cost, or at a low price upon easy payments, city people would fall over each other in going to farms, and that everybody would have a farm home and live happily ever afterward.
